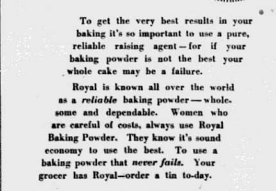
Preparing for Christmas PLUM PUDDING AND SAUCE

THE time for making Christmas pudding has come, so I'll reprint from the "Country, Women's Book," a good recipe for a plum pudding (it makes a large pudding and two small ones). The ingredients are not extravagant in the country, where I live. 1 lb. beef suet, 1 lb. raisins, 1 lb. currants, 1 lb. sultanas, 1 lb. brown crumbs, 8 eggs, 1 lb. flour, 1 lb. sugar, 1 lb. mixed candied peel, 2 teaspoons mixed spice, 2 wine glasses brandy.

Method: The fruit must be well washed and thoroughly dried. Blanche and chop the suet, wash the currants and raisins and add the dry ingredients which have been previously mixed by hand for preference, stir in beaten eggs and sufficient milk to make a thick mixture, add the brandy and thoroughly mix before putting into tins. Put the large loaf for six hours, the smaller ones for four hours. Then grease paper over the top of each loaf, then place in a square of cloth, tie securely round, but rim of bread and tie the four ends together on top. 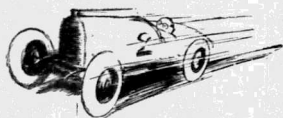

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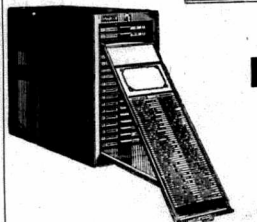

A well-fought race, the runners finishing in a bunch at the top. Half Mile: 1. Miers (Kenya) 2. Lule (Uganda) and Kayika (Kenya) dead heat. Time 1 min. 16 1/2 seconds...

This was a wonderful race. Lule (Uganda) was considered unbeatable at this distance but the Kenya man Miers was so good he made Lule lose his head.

High Jump: 1. Mwangwa 2. Bulwery 3. Turumwa (all Ugandas) Height 5 ft. 7 1/2 inches. First of the Uganda record by 1 inch. Kickura (Kenya) fell out at 8 ft. 6 1/2 inches.

Quarter Mile: Kenya team won in 4 minutes 42 seconds beating the Uganda record by 5/8ths second. A good race the outstanding performance being the 440 yards race by Nye Niyuma (Kenya).

The whole crowd rose from their seats for the finish as the excitement was intense and tumultuous cheering broke out as Mols won. It was probably the race set by Washan at the start that put Mols on his mettle and urged him to win such a fine victory.

THE 1935 RAILWAY BUDGET

CONCLUDING STAGES OF DEBATE

Estimates Approved. GENERAL MANAGER REPLIES TO CRITICISMS

Continuing the Debate on the Railway Estimates, at Monday's session of the Legislative Council the Hon. Mr. Luber Das in a lengthy speech pointed out that the state of the Railway finances, as presented by the Hon. the General Manager appeared to be far from satisfactory. He said that the reasons given by the Hon. the General Manager for this unsatisfactory state of affairs were two-fold: the world-wide depression and the extension of motor transport in competition with the Railway.

Mr. Luber Das contended that the reasons were that previous to 1931 the Railway Authorities purchased large quantities of rolling stock for which there was no economy; that there were lines on the Railway paying as much as 5 and 6 per cent. interest, interest was a burden, and that, although the Railway Administration is not commercial, but is controlled by the State, yet the wages of employees were higher than those in any other part of the world, and should have been cut down long ago. In addition there had been large expenditure on unnecessary buildings and improvements.

With regard to rolling stock, Mr. Luber Das claimed to speak with authority, as he had seen things for himself, and stated that quantities that had been bought in such quantities that at Kajulu, Gilgil and other places there were miles of country taken up with stabling for this rolling stock which would never be used, and no effort was made for its disposal elsewhere.

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which averages nearly 20 miles each hour. He was not in favour of accelerating. Experience has shown that the time required for stoppages at stations is very small, but in practice the train results a severe retard between the stations, thus endangering the life of passengers travelling, and causing an enormous amount of unnecessary time at the stations.

Cheng Labour. He suggested that those who had more scope for economizing in the Railway suffer from a mistaken idea that they should not employ the most economical labour in the market. In this country the cheapest labour is native labour, but as the natives are not so plentiful, then the next best expensive labour should be employed, i.e. the Indians. If you cannot get Indians then you must go to the Europeans, who are also the most highly paid, and there seemed to be a preference for European staff. He had not noticed, however, that European employed European staff in the Railway. He said that the General Manager had referred to the remarks of the Hon. Member for Taita-Nandi, who had written to Messrs. Commins and the Hon. Mr. Doss, asking that the rate on the Railway Advisory Council and the Railway Administration should be paid the same as that of the last meeting. The fact that we should do nothing to promote the development of gold mining is very fully understood, and will be done fully in time. At the present time the Mining Industry is being asked to pay the same rates as others have been paying. Although the time may come when special rates for that industry, at the present rate are not interfering any real hardship.

With regard to the rates on all, he admitted that the return rate on empty tank waggon was high but that the Oil Companies had already been informed that this rate would be reduced. Several other items to which Hon. Members referred such as chemical reagents, had only come before him yesterday. He had a list of those items and will have to deal with each one separately. These will require full consideration, and if any definite hardship is involved, relief will be recommended.

DEFAULT ONLY OUTCOME OF PRESENT "PROFLIGATE POLICY"

Taxation Reaches Saturation Point

SPURRED DEFENCE OF THE EXPENDITURE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Lord Francis Scott, leader of the European Elected Members, vigorously replied to the Government declaration that the Expenditure Advisory Committee's Report should be accepted as a justification of the proposed expenditure. He quoted at length from that Report and from speeches in Council by Government Ministers to show that, first of all, in the opinion of Government, the Committee was not to be regarded as "the repository of all wisdom" and secondly that the Committee itself realised further economies and had repeatedly in its Report warned Government that further adjustments must be made.

Lord Francis declared that while he was sitting on that committee he had been asked to put up with a very effective smoke screen to prevent us getting down to the real facts of the situation.

He did not consider it a fair game to play the Standing Finance Committee to give them such an impossible Budget and expect them to put it right in a week or two when Government had made no attempt to do so over a period of two years.

If the present profligate policy was to be carried on, he saw no way in which Kenya could avoid the catastrophe of default which has overtaken Newboldland. He cited the 1933 Revenue figures as "deliberately overestimated."

"Taxation," he said, "has reached saturation point."

Lord Francis quoted scripture effectively, using the young man's advice to Rebekah, and applying it to the Government policy. "My father chastised you with whips but I will chastise you with scorpions."

TAXES FOR 1935.

Graduated Poll Tax and Trade Licences

Yesterday's issue of the "Official Gazette" contains—Introduction into Legislative Council—"A Bill to make Provision for the Levy of a Non-Native Poll Tax at a Rate Graduated According to the Taxpayer's Income."

It is proposed that the Ordinance shall continue in force until December 31, 1935, and shall then expire.

"The objects and reasons" state: "The object of this Bill is to provide for the levy on non-natives of a graduated poll tax for the year 1935. Other than a few amendments which are designed to simplify the collection of the tax, the Bill reproduces the provisions of the Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, 1933."

The same Gazette also contains a Bill to give effect to the recommendations of the Committee appointed to revise the Licensing Ordinance 1933.

Complete schedules are given both for "professional" and "business" licences.

A Breathing Space

"I think it must be admitted that these questions, which I have made myself justify our criticism, that the Bill was always intended to be of a temporary nature. Government Criticized

"I fear, Sir, that I have quoted a few words from that Report but I feel that in justice to those of us who are Members of that Committee it is our duty to say that that Report was not intended to reduce still further the cost of Government."

Extremely Unsatutory

"In page 169 of this Report we pointed out that on the then basis of revenue and the expenditure of the Government under our proposals, there would be the remaining year of 1932 a deficit of £100,000. This was made sufficiently clear to Government Ministers at the time. It is a very unsatisfactory one, that it was the duty of the Government to make a statement that the expenditure was kept within the spending capacity of the Government. 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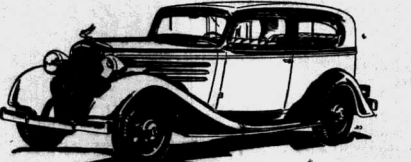

The natural consequence of that beating was that they suffered no immediate injury, and that three days later they were suffering from nothing more serious than bruising and superficial abrasions. Two witnesses stated that there was no blood on the bodies of the natives. Unfortunately, all the Suk natives became infected and diseased, and I am now despondent about the future of the country (straggle) infection, which in all cases runs from one year and six months to three years, and in some cases to death.

MAGNIFICENT SCENES OF PAGEANTRY IN LONDON

The Abbey Service

VAST CROWDS THROUGH THE EMPIRE'S CAPITAL

Such crowds as even London has not seen for many years, Kings and Queens, Princes and high officers of State of Britain and many other countries this morning drove in procession to Westminster Abbey for the marriage of the King's fourth son, the Duke of Kent, to Princess Marina, the youngest daughter of Prince and Princess Nicholas of Greece.

The event created unprecedented popular interest. There have not been in the history of the last few years, either in Britain or elsewhere, many such happy occasions for festive jubilation, and the nation had evidently decided to keep the day as a high festival.

POPULAR COUPLE

The better excuse could in any case be wanted than the wedding of an exceedingly popular prince of the greatly beloved Royal House to a princess whose personal charm has already won the hearts of the British people.

Crowds had begun to assemble overnight. They were steadily augmented as trains and motor coaches arrived with their loads for every part of the United Kingdom. By dawn the routes were already lined and hours before any of the processions were due people were waiting in a solid mass thirty deep at many places.

Tumultuous Enthusiasm

London, Nov. 27. London is dawning its wedding day. The streets are alive with flags and banners of red, white, and gold. Noisier than the decorations are huge crowds of people with flags and banners, paraded in white garb with white and gold, and with "torches," overhanging their brows. Grandstands, colored in red, white and gold, have been erected in the neighbourhood of Westminster Abbey. Signs display photographs of the Duke of Kent and Princess Marina with the initials G. J. M. in artistic monogram.

Day of Rehearsals

The day was devoted to rehearsals. The Majesties this morning there in St. James Palace, where further gifts are arriving hourly. Three of the largest state apartments are filled with gifts of silver and gold plate, glasses, crystal, jewellery, fine household linen and handsome furniture—all of which will be shown to the public after the wedding at a small charge in aid of "torches," overhanging their brows.

Visitors Pouring In

London, Nov. 28. A heavy fall of fog blanketed London today. Nevertheless the Air Ministry weather experts are hopeful of a bright wedding, although they anticipate that some darkness will prevail. Visitors are hourly pouring into London from all parts of Britain, and also from Continental countries. The French authorities are running special excursions. Crowds throng the neighbourhood of the Abbey, where decorations and stalls, capable of accommodating thousands, have been erected. The police describe the traffic as the most ever known.

Brilliant Party

The rehearsals for the wedding took place in the brilliant party given by the King and Queen at St. James Palace this afternoon when distinguished guests viewed the wedding gifts.

Spectacular Pageantry

London, Nov. 29. The most brilliant and spectacular state pageantry that London has witnessed for many years thrilled the crowds which lined the route of the wedding procession from early hours. Besides the streets, which were thronged with eager spectators from all parts of the country, every window and roof of the surrounding buildings, as well as the specially erected stands was packed.

Turbid cheers from the densely packed crowds outside Buckingham Palace greeted Their Majesties as they drove out at 10.06 a.m. to the lead of the first procession in a "glass coach," with specially large wheels. The coach was drawn by two magnificent bay horses and was accompanied by an escort of household cavalry. It was followed by a file of royalists in state livery with bay horses.

Other Processions

The Duke of Kent, the Prince of Wales, and the Duke of York, also in a "glass coach" drawn by six horses led the second procession from St. James Palace, their equerries and controllers following behind. Princess Marina and Prince Nicholas headed the third procession from Buckingham Palace. The Princess looked most charming. Brilliant colour was added by the footmen, cavaliers and outriders, who were in full state livery of scarlet and gold with powdered hair further enhanced by the uniforms of the troops lining the route and consisting of decorations of the King, the Marine, and the Scots, and of the Irish Guards commanded by Lieut. Gen. C. J. Great, C.B., D.S.O., G.O.C., London District.

Arrival at Abbey

Princess Marina arrived at the Abbey two minutes after her bridegroom and two minutes before the service began.

Kenya's Congratulations to Royal Couple

TELEGRAM DESPATCHED BY GOVERNOR

The following is a copy of a telegram sent yesterday by His Excellency the Governor of Kenya, Sir Joseph Byrne, to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, for transmission to Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Kent:—

"Please convey to Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Kent the loyal congratulations and heartiest good wishes of Kenya on the occasion of Their Royal Highnesses' wedding."

The first carriage in the first procession contained King George Queen Mary and the aged Prince Waldemar of Denmark, brother of the late Queen Alexandra. In the second carriage were the King and Queen of Denmark and the King and Queen of Norway. The third carriage contained King George of Greece, the Prince-Imperial of Venezuela and Prince Nicholas. The procession was followed by officials and arrived at the Abbey at 10.50 a.m.

Route Followed

In the first carriage of the second procession were the Duke of Kent, the Prince of Wales, and the Duke of York, followed by their controllers and equerries. They arrived at the Abbey at 10.50 a.m. The third procession was headed by Princess Marina and Prince Nicholas, who gave her away, followed by attendants. They arrived at the Abbey at 10.58 a.m. All the processions travelled on the Mall at the Horse Guards, Whitehall and Parliament Square.

Form of Service

The scenes at the Abbey were reminiscent of the coronation of King George V, with the

brilliance and dignity of the clerical vestments, the Archbishops wearing gorgeous copes, and the Canon歌歌 were at the King's coronation in 1911. Other vestments included an exquisite blue tunic worn by the Crown-bearer, and a mantle specially designed for the Serret on the occasion of the coronation.

The bride and bridegroom drove to Buckingham Palace via Whitehall, the Horse Guards, the Mall, St. James Street, Piccadilly and Constitution Hill. They rode alone in a "glass coach" drawn by bay horses and were escorted by captains of the Life Guards. They were greeted along the route by excited crowds which were estimated a mile away. The bride couple were followed by Their Majesties and the other royal couples, who took the same route as on their way to the Abbey.

The Problems of Colonial Credit

MAJOR GROGAN CRITICISES BRITAIN'S MONETARY POLICY

Four Proposals Made

Major E. S. Grogan has contributed to "The Times" an important article on Britain's monetary policy in relation to financial and economic problems of the Colonial Empire.

He regards it as inconceivable that the price level should be left at the mercy of the ebb and flow of gold and declares that some steps should have been taken to maintain physical constancy in respect of the burden of obligations in all transactions between Britain and the Empire.

Major Grogan makes four proposals: An exchange discount for local currencies to offset the effect of an appreciated pound to which currencies are linked; Consolidation of all Empire loans and conversion thereof to lower rates; Release of accumulated sinking funds and the Railway Betterment Fund for the conversion of internal loans, thereby restoring the credit of the Territories and the resumption of development loans.

The East African Shilling

London, Wednesday. The recommendation of the Committee of Experts of I.O.S. in favour of the earliest possible return to an effective gold standard. As a result, under the heading "Colonial Credit." Major Grogan outlines England's post war monetary policy and points out how necessary it is to its complete financial stability. He stresses the effect of that policy upon the African Empire. He stresses the effect upon Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika.

The new shilling currency system started, he says, with a deficit of £250,000, the balance of £220,000 in paper.

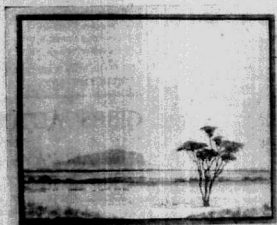

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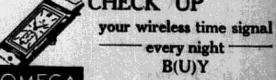

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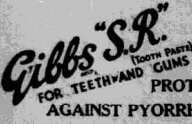
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Indian Representatives and the Estimates

It would be generous. The noble Earl the member for Bill Valley in the course of this debate yesterday, said that he was wrong in having suggested the increase in Civil Service pay in 1922. I am very glad that on the side of the House we are beginning to turn our backs on things that are things that the scientific process of influencing thoughts through wireless wave-lengths generated in the human brain will have a beneficial effect on the other side of the House.

Terms of Service Although in 1920 the Select Committee on Civil Estimates had expressed the view that the terms of service for European and Asian clerks was on a scale which was unrelated to conditions under which service in Kenya was performed and was much more onerous than that which would be offered, yet in May this year when the new terms of the Local Revenue Civil Service were before the House a member from the unopposed side of the House suggested that where, in fact, he had given figures and indeed in some ways the scales were higher than had previously been stated.

After estimating the rates of pay in Northern Rhodesia and Kenya, Mr. Pandya said in considering the question of service less and the running of the Government machine an argument was usually advanced that those services should be such as to keep reasonably efficient Government machinery in being; but as Lord Salisbury had once said on this subject must be relative and it must take into account not only the requirements but the resources of the people for whom that efficiency was desired.

"It is clear," continued the Hon. Member, "that we are not in a position to afford the cost of the present scale of efficiency and the best way to deal with the problem would be to adopt the standard of efficiency within our means. . . . In the very eloquent speech which we heard from him yesterday the noble Lord, the leader of the European Elected Members, indicated for the first time in the history of this country perhaps the identity of interests which we recognised. It is a very true and a very happy and a very policy will be consistently pursued in the future.

Suggested Expenditure "Now, we coming to the question of what would be approximately the figure which the people of this country could reasonably be expected to pay in taxation, I consider that our total expenditure including pensions and interest and sinking fund charges should be in the neighbourhood of two million sterling. I have based this on the figure of 1924 because that is the year of the figures of domestic exports and customs revenue which indicate a basis of tax yielding capacity. In 1924 the domestic exports were £2,300,014 and the Customs Revenue £908,211, that year was £3,850,531. Now, my comparison with this is not the domestic exports were £2,200,000, that year was £3,000,000. It is therefore reasonable to assume that Government expenditure should be in the neighbourhood of that figure and in fact I have put it at two million pounds.

"Now, let us see what would happen if the Budget was projected with a expenditure of two million instead of three million pounds. It would be deduced that a further million would be deducted for inevitable items of interest and pensions, etc. It would leave half a million for our services of redoubtable kind. There are the present Budgets stand at one and a half millions so that the reduction from redoubtable kind is by 66 per cent. Of course, it is impossible to say whether or not the reduction from redoubtable kind is more than the reduction from interest and whatever may be the reason for the reduction from redoubtable kind, I am not satisfied that they are insuperable.

DEFINING DEFAULT "A Question of the Use of Politic Terms." The first thing any other country in difficulty would have done would have been to suspend paying interest. This is not a new thing, it has happened with every country in the world including the worst of us. My opinion would be in many ways in credit because such a suspension of interest is now a generally recognised procedure. If this happened to Tanganyika, would it be considered from their high pedestal and without any realisation of the fact agree to carry on for some time without interest. In commercial transactions this happens almost every day.

Perhaps there is not much difference between a graduated poll tax and income tax because both in a way are a tax on income. But whereas one is unscientific and was chosen for that purpose because it was a temporary measure, the other is a more scientific one. If the Government desire to continue the scientific tax as a permanent form of taxation, then certainly in the light of new circumstances the position would have to be considered again very carefully. On this issue, when the time comes, I will study most carefully the details of any proposals submitted to us, from the point of view of the Indian community.

Revenue Over-Estimated Dealing with the revenue side of the estimates Mr. Pandya said he did not believe that the Customs Estimate would be realised and he based this view on over-estimation by this department for several years past. Moreover the purchasing power of the people had gone down very considerably and it would be unreasonable to assume that the estimate for 1925 could be realised unless something important happened. With reference to the expenditure side of the estimates the Hon. Member said he understood that special grade posts reserved for Asians numbered 25, but the estimates showed that only 14 posts were filled and he would therefore suggest that Government should keep the remaining posts in abeyance. If it was argued that the reason was present financial circumstances—a very conventional argument which in the Asian Civil Service was concerned—he would point out that principle had not been observed throughout in the preparation of the estimates. As an instance the total number of posts reserved in 1922 was 14, but by reason of the increase in collection which were in abeyance in 1924 would be filled in the whole of the year. BROAD PRINCIPLES Agreement with European Elected Members Concluding Mr. Pandya said "I am very glad indeed of this opportunity of identifying myself with the noble Lord, the leader of the European Elected Members on the broad principles relating to this Budget and the Government expenditure. In his eloquent speech I see that the seriousness of the situation has been realised and although that realisation has been late in coming it is better late than never. I submit, Sir, that Government should equally realise the seriousness of the situation. The state today is comparable to a ship in danger. We cannot afford to argue with each other in this time of danger. We must direct our attention in one direction—directly and only—that is to the saving of the ship. That is broadly speaking, our position to-day on this side of the House. In my observations on the various aspects of the policy of Government and the European Elected Members I have taken a broad view of things and not tried to indulge in vituperation and recrimination for the sake of the Government's view which the community I represent continues to suffer.

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Referring to questions affecting the Coast, the Hon. 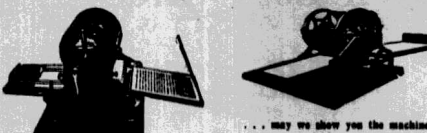
