Debate in Council

LIMIT OF TAXABLE CAPACITY SAID TO HAVE BEEN OVERSTEPPED

The Trade Licensing Bill after passing its second reading in the Legislative Council yesterday was referred to a Select Committee.

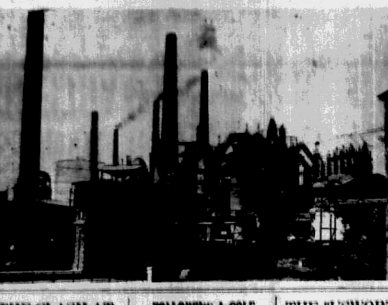

Unfortunate Incident in the Saar

CROWD ATTACKS BRITISH OFFICER

Following Motor Accident

British Officer, named Justice, was injured in a fracas here this morning.

It appears that Justice, who is a member of the international police force, was motoring with two friends, all of them being dressed in plain clothes. The car, taking too wide a turn round a corner, mounted the pavement and injured a woman, whereupon a hostile crowd immediately gathered.

Justice produced his papers and saying that he was a police officer, requested the crowd to disperse. The crowd became angrier, so Justice, it is alleged, drew his revolver and fired into the ground. Several persons tried to seize him and one man was slightly injured by a second revolver shot which was accidentally discharged.

The Saar police restored order and rescued Justice and his friends from the crowd. Justice was removed to hospital suffering from cuts and lacerations.

AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT

An official communique states that the police officer concerned has been relieved of his functions pending a final investigation.

The communique states that he was reversing his car in the street and the car mounted the pavement, injuring one person. A crowd gathered and adopted a hostile attitude towards the three occupants of the car particularly against the officer, for reasons not yet definitely established. A fight broke out and several shots were fired, one person being wounded in the stomach. The police officer was injured by blows and taken to hospital.

The result of the police enquiries will be communicated to a competent tribunal. The police have been specially ordered to carry out this investigation with all severity and to proceed against all persons regardless of their position.

Berlin, December 16. Herr Nietman, deputy leader of the German Front in the Saar is reported to have protested to the Publicist Commission and to have demanded the punishment of the officer concerned.

Many Casualties Reported from Anatolia

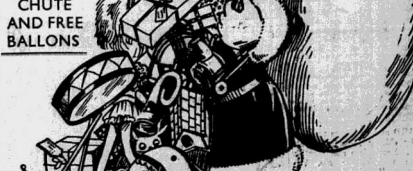

## EXPLANATORY STATEMENT BY UNION GOVERNMENT

### "Espionage System"

**PARTY IDENTICAL WITH GERMAN STATE AND GOVERNMENT**

A statement covering the recent action of the Government of South-West Africa regarding the Nazi Party in that Territory, has been issued by the Prime Minister of the Union of South Africa.

The statement declares that the organisation in South-West Africa is a branch of the Party in Germany and that the Party is identical with the German State and Government.

"It is clear, therefore," says the statement, "that the Union Government, as Mandatory, could not allow such an organisation of a foreign State in the Mandated Territory."

It is pointed out that a principle binding on members of the Party is to show absolute and unflinching obedience to the chief leader who is head of the German Reich; and that the leader in South-West Africa is appointed by an official in Germany who stands directly under the chief leader.

The Administrator had, therefore, no choice but to declare the Party in South-West Africa a prohibited association and to order Major Weigel, the head leader of the Party in the Territory to leave the country."

### "No Other Choice"

The Department of the Prime Minister of the Union has issued the following statement regarding the action of the Administrator of South-West Africa (Dr. D. G. Coetzee) in declaring the Nazi Party in the territory an illegal association and in ordering his removal from office and the arrest of the chief leader.

A POLL TAX POINT

Allowances for Lessees in Dual Businesses

In yesterday's edition of the "East African Standard," as published in a letter signed by the Secretary to the Government of the Colony, the following statement was made and says in substance that the interpretation of the graduated Poll Tax law, where the Taxpayer has more than one business, or more than one farm, is—

The writer understood that during the month of November demands were made by the Revenue Officer for additional sums by way of Tax in respect of statements of Income, where the lessee on one farm or business had been set off against the profit on another the Revenue Officer maintaining that such a loss could not be set off.

Continuing the writer said he had had considerable experience of taxation in other countries but he could say with certainty that never before had he met with such an amazing contention.

In conclusion he intimated that unless some change could be effected any more money was "squeezed out of the Taxpayer," and he added that the Revenue Officer appeared to be banking on the probability of a serious attack on the part of the Taxpayer rather than face the enormous expense of going to the Supreme Court.

Official Reply

The Central Revenue Department here made a complete answer to the allegations contained in the letter and said that the second as a matter of fact is not the second paragraph. On the contrary the loss on one farm or business has been set off in every case before the income of the Taxpayer has been assessed. In fact, the tax is assessed on the income derived by aggregating the profits and losses.

Supposing a lawyer owns a farm, and while making a profit on his legal practice, needs a house for the working of the farm, he would be allowed to set off the losses on his farm against the profits in his other business.

It was added that the Revenue Office is always willing to interview any Taxpayer on any matter of doubt or difficulty.

THE NON-NATIVE POLL TAX

To the Editor, "E. A. Standard," Sir—I notice that the final Section (Section 59) of the existing Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, 1933, provides as follows:—

"59. (1) This Ordinance shall be in force from the thirty-first day of December, 1934, and shall then expire."

"Provided that such expiry shall not affect any liability, penalty or punishment incurred under this Ordinance or any legal proceeding commenced in respect of any such liability, penalty or punishment; but any such legal proceeding or penalty may be carried on or sought as if this Ordinance had not expired."

"(2) The Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance is hereby repealed, on the expiry of this Ordinance the provisions of the said Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance shall revive and be of full force and effect."

The Legislature tells us here, in unmistakable language, that this section will expire at the end of this year and that we shall then revert to the old Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance (20/- per head).

What in fact, is now happening? Instead of reverting to the old Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, the Government introduces a new Non-Native Poll Tax Bill, telling us in the "Objects and Reasons" that "Other than a few amendments which are designed to simplify the collection of the tax, the Bill reproduces the provisions of the Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, 1933."

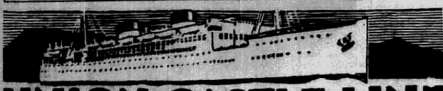

equal of Englishmen. In Tanganyika Territory it has been decided that a person of color or nationality should not be taken into consideration for the higher positions, and there is a bill now being introduced with a first class official's post. In French Colonies, Africans hold commissions in military ranks. In Portuguese Colonies, Indians hold positions of Chief Justice and Attorney General. In this connection a Government is doing a deal now on Indian rising. An Indian might be an eminent lawyer, but he would not become a Magistrate of the office of the law. Retention was no good, but the Government should have an economical point of view, Government was making a gross mistake by giving way to these racial feelings.

Mr. Stimson said there were considerations there should be a greater Civil Service Board, and when a vacancy occurred it should be reported to that Board, which Board should hold examinations and fill the post in accordance with efficiency. Vacancies at present were filled competitively and those who had experience were not considered. There was no opportunity for the development of genius and men could not get out of the rut into higher positions. He had known a European Police Constable who had been the Commissioner of Police in India and had been the Commissioner of Police in London. This he considered was an invaluable record for the Colony.

There were many anomalies in the service as it was organized. 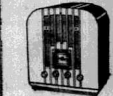

## LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL DEBATE NEW BILL

### Some Opposition

By a majority of nearly four to one the Legislative Council endorsed the Government's policy on the future constitution of the House of Representatives. The bill was passed by 229 yeas to 62 nays which was a pleasant surprise to Government supporters.

As last week the House of Commons passed the Government's bill, it was to be expected that a new year for the introduction of the Government's bill in the House of Representatives would be a formal first reading this week.

The peculiarity of the vote was that in the Commons the Labour Party was in the minority of 127 whereas in the House of Lords the Labour party obtained four votes.

### Protests Against Employment of Africans as Barmen

A considerable amount of time was devoted by the Legislative Council last week to debating the Bill to provide for the control of the sale of liquor. The Bill was referred to a Select Committee.

Although the majority of members agreed that the Bill was a very great improvement on the existing Ordinance, it was nevertheless, as expected, not without its critics in the House. One member described it as "nothing less than a tragedy."

### Club Licences

The Hon. the Attorney General, in moving the Second Reading of the Bill to provide for the control of the sale of liquor, in the Legislative Council last week, said he was moving the Bill for the first time in the House. He said that the Bill was a very important one and that it was necessary to have it passed as soon as possible.

The Bill provides for the issue of licences to clubs and for the control of the sale of liquor to members of such clubs. It also provides for the issue of licences to hotels and for the control of the sale of liquor to members of such hotels.

### Amendments Introduced

**Manifesto**  
 1. While expressing great respect for the Civil Service of Kenya, the Progressive Movement wishes to emphasize that its members are unaffiliated supporters of the Legislative Assembly of Kenya. It is their determination to bring to their determination radical measures to reduce revenue.

 had a license, part of the value of the property by in the fact that it had not a license. In Kenya, the Licensing Justices had not got the right to refuse licenses except on the ground of public safety as a business being ill-conducted. If it was considered there was no reason to believe in the neighbourhood, the matter was referred to a Commission of Enquiry and that the course of the property did not feel to be as the mere exercise of a power to change from year to year, but lower he always had the right of appeal to the judicial authority. In Kenya they had not got that safeguard, they had to ask for renewal and had no right of appeal whatever.  
 Already Enough Licences  
 The Hon. Shabazz-Deen (Indian Elected Member) wished to compliment the Attorney General on the Bill, which had been framed in the House of Representatives. He contended it brought the Liquor Law of the country up to date. He considered there were anomalies however, and for one thing he would like to suggest broad principles that as far as possible no more licences should be granted in Nairobi and similar towns. He considered there should be a clause introduced into the Bill giving power option to local authorities to restrict or reduce the number of licences. Instead of raising the cost of existing licences from £50 to £100, he would like to see the price of all new licences doubled. An extra £500 licence now being issued in Nairobi.  
 Club Licences  
 Colonel the Hon. J. G. Kirkwood (The Chief) was under the impression that the aims of the Ordinance were to improve the law and to ascertain whether the licence were contributing to the revenue. As far as revenue was concerned, the amount charged to Clubs paid 1 per cent. on all the liquor brought for sale to Members of that Club. He could not understand why Government had not introduced the laws of England into the Ordinance. In South Africa the law for Clubs and Hotels was almost identical. They both paid £100 for a License, they had to pay £200 for a renewal. In this country, Col. Kirkwood continued, in many cases you find clubs supplying gin and tonics, and catering for the general public and not for members. This competition was most unfair.  
 Another anomaly, he considered, was the system of reciprocity, flagrant in many cases you find a member who signed the book, or not, as the case might be, and there were many clubs who were not appearing in this respect. He could see no reason why Clubs should not contribute at least something towards the revenue and submitted that the present was an excellent opportunity for obtaining extra revenue in this way.  
 Elected Members Col. Kirkwood continued, had not his vote been put forward as a Member of the Select Committee. He did not mind this, but considered it unfair. Although he owned an hotel he did not run it and the license was not in his name. Honourable Members opposite, he said, were the members of the Nairobi Club and the whole House were Members of the Club or members of the hotel. In Clubs provided they functioned as Clubs and not as hotels with a license, then they became a

ing the drunkenness of certain areas, at high altitudes such as Nairobi, Johannesburg and Birmah. It stated that with a European population (including women and children) of 2,000, there was more alcohol consumed per head of the population in Nairobi than in any of the other towns of the world. This article, he continued, had never been contradicted.

With regard to the licensing of Clubs and extension of hours, he understood that God Friday and Christmas were religious holidays, and yet Government suggested people should get drunk on those days.

**Conditions at Monrovia**

The Hon. Major R. W. D. Robertson-Stein, speaking on behalf of himself and the Hon. Member for Monrovia who was absent, said he wished to support the Bill of the Monrovia Legislative Committee, he said would be sending a report and memorandum on conditions in Monrovia. These conditions were peculiar to Monrovia in that they had had to compete with the ships that come into Kintona Harbour, which ships had no license. The Bill under discussion provided that steamship liquor licenses had only on the lakes, and no mention made of Kintona Harbour. The state of affairs constituted a hardship on the hotels in Monrovia, he believed, but he had no objection to ships selling liquor on Sundays or on public holidays.

**Three Suggestions**

Colonel The Hon. Lord Pringle made suggestions of his own, which he said he would support. At the same time, there had been three points raised with which he was in sympathy, and which he said he would support. The first point was the one raised by the Hon. Member for Nairobi, that people who had obtained a large amount of money on an hotel should be liable to have their licenses taken away if the value of stocks in the hotel in the preceding year should be less than the value of stocks in the hotel in the year immediately preceding. The second point with which he was in sympathy was one raised by the Hon. Member for Nairobi, that people who had obtained a license should not be permitted to sell liquor on public holidays and Sundays should not be permitted to sell liquor on public holidays.

Thirdly, he agreed with the Hon. Member for the Coast who contended that the hours in Monrovia might be slightly different from those of other ports.

**Africans in Bars**

The Hon. the Rev. Canon G. P. Horn (Native Interest), said he was in favour of total prohibition. One of the greatest needs of the Colony could possibly be said, was a sober people. He was here to represent the African people, and it hurt him to think that the job of Africans in the various hotels in Nairobi might be shown open to a select class, but he had been told that native barmen were employed. If this was so, he thought the sooner clubs were closed the better.

With regard to the African bar, he understood that in Africa and here in Nairobi, Canon Burns was a great help and emphasis as his committee had. If he allowed this, the Government would be doing the African one of the greatest injustices ever perpetrated on the people of this country. He continued, were discussed on the sale of liquor, such as Methylated Spirit, etc., being sold to the Africans, and for this reason he had opened African Beer Shops. To make an African a barman was to put him in a place where he had to sell, and until he was found out, he could easily make some of the liquor. "For that reason the Elected Members asked for a complete assurance that the task of the Committee would be to produce definite measures of economy resulting in at least £100,000 reduction in net expenditure and possibly suggestions for the saving of a far greater sum."

Moreover the acceptance of the Government's offer was conditional upon the grant of complete freedom of action to the Committee including permission to report on savings, expenditure and relief.

The suggestion that the burden of pensions payable to the members of the Railway Administration should not be supported by the Railway and not by Government was put forward by one of the Members representing Native Territories.

#### ENCOURAGING THE GROWTH OF PRIVATE FLYING IN KENYA

On Boxing Day the Aero Club of East Africa are holding an Air Rally, the third of their kind to be held in Kenya. The Rally will probably be attended by some 20 machines and it is expected that this year the Rally will be even more successful than in previous years.

#### Interesting Programme

One of the biggest attractions in Kenya during the Christmas holidays will be the Air Rally taking place on Boxing Day, at the Imperial Aerodrome, the auspices of the Aero Club of East Africa.

Invitations to attend have been sent to all Companies and Clubs interested in aircraft south of the Equator, as well as to many private owners, and it is anticipated that 20 machines will be able to take part, which is six more than last year. This year's rally will be the third of its kind, the first being held on the old and now defunct Imperial Aerodrome in 1927 when the visit of Mr. Alan Cockburn to Kenya. It was the success of the second Air Rally held on September 20th which immediately upon its conclusion the Aero Club of East Africa decided to hold an annual event and the first rally since was held on the 24th inst. owing to the fact that more aeroplanes would be able to participate on that date, however, it was subsequently decided to hold the rally on December 29, which fits with all accounts the extension of the day has met with general approval.

#### Objects of the Rally

There are two main reasons for holding these Air Rallies. The first is with a view to giving an afternoon of entertainment to the public, and at the same time, including a general display of air-mindedness, as well as to demonstrate the latest types of aircraft to those who are little versed in aviation.

The second reason is to obtain funds for the Club's expansion in order that it may progress with the further development of their chief objects for which it is deemed, and the hope of the Club is that a more active interest in the growth of private flying may eventually be brought about by bringing down to the status of tuition and ownership to be made by means of three individual subsidy.

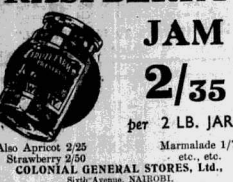

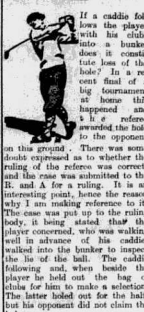

Grounding Clubs in the Bunker

An Interesting Decision by R. and A.

**PRACTICE STROKES**



If a caddy follows the player with his club over a bunker does it constitute a breach of the Rules? It is a question that has been raised at the Royal and Aniston in the following circumstances:—The player concerned, who was walking well in advance of his caddy, walked into the bunker to inspect the lie of the ball. The caddy, following him, who beside the player he held out the bag of clubs, walked into the bunker. The latter held out for the ball, but his opponent did not claim the hole.

(1) Under the section of the caddy walking into the bunker with the club constitutes a violation of the Rules. (2) Was that violation punishable by the loss of the hole? (3) Should the opponent have claimed the hole if he had not been awarded it to him? (4) Did the referee err in not giving his decision? The answers received from the Royal and Aniston were:— (1) No. (2) No. (3) Not necessarily. It is for the referee to take cognizance of any breach of rule he may be called upon to apply to the players on the point or not.

**Outline in Kenya**  
I have heard the question raised in Kenya as to whether a caddy has allowed in bunkers, and whether any breach of rules committed by them should fit a player penalised. There is not the slightest doubt that the caddy, who is usually a member of the club, commits an offence not punishable by penalties, and that it is quite right to allow him to follow the player. I believe one club has ruled otherwise.

**The Practice Stroke**  
The past few days has brought me into conflict with a player who has been in the habit of practicing on the greens in the middle of the afternoon. This is a practice stroke on the greens is legitimate, and I do not object to a player practicing in any way that he likes before every shot. The legitimacy of this has never been questioned, indeed, the governing body state definitely that they are permitted provided Rules 10, 15, and 21 (1) are not infringed. SPOON.

Here we are, with only a matter of some two or three weeks to go, and then the Stellenbosch Rugby will play in our midst, and yet practically nothing has been done in Nairobi in regard to getting together, and which will give them a game. It is not the fault of the Rugby Union, but rather that of the players. They have failed to attend those practice matches, and the results it has that there are few players left who are in a position to fight fit for the fray.

In some regards one must give the credit to the visiting team. They were to some extent a certain amount of criticism at the door of the Rugby Union. Few of the members turn up to these practice games, it may be that they are diverting their whole or a very large part of their attention to the organizing of the tour, but that, while important in itself, it is not the main factor. Kenya, and Nairobi must prepare itself to give the "Scraggy" his own share of warm and cordial welcome: we must be prepared to meet them not only on the field, but also on the road. There are one or two players who will be able to take the Stellenbosch team by surprise, but low man will not be prepared for a hard and rugged game. That is not to say that the game will be a one-sided affair. Stellenbosch having done Kenya the honors of a visit in what appears to be a very smart team, surely they will not be afraid to meet them at the end of the road—and if it can be so.

**Final Practice To-morrow**

O! his doors are small, That does not put it to the touch, To gain or lose it all. Kenya surely is not afraid of its fate? Defeat means nothing to the true sportsman; the spirit to win must live and survive. For posterity a good loser than a good winner. We are too inclined in these times to count the losses and not the gains, and to make too much fuss over a victory which is but a petty spasm, and a petty squint.

To-morrow will see the final practice game at Maricao prior to the arrival of the Stellenbosch team, and it is hoped that all Rugby players in Nairobi and district will turn out. The Selection Committee are to be on the ground, and every ready to receive a certain number of game. Everyone, it should be noted to be up to the form so as there may be no excuse for the player turning round and saying that he was not asked to play, or that they were not on their visitors, so let's all pull together and give our very best.
