



WOMEN IN COLONIAL CIVIL SERVICES.

Swearing of Last Cadeil of Conspiring Sex.

DR. SHEILA VIEWS. Besides Spirit Abroad in the Colonies.

Dr. Drummond Sheila, M.C. who was Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies in the Labour Government, has been writing in the Journal "Health and Empire" on the "Health of Colonial Administration" in relation to Social Hygiene and to Human Welfare.

In the course of a long article the following occurs:—The widespread lack of knowledge of the geography of the constituent parts of the Empire is amazing. Ask any intelligent and educated citizen how many Dominions there are, or the difference between a Dominion and a Colony and you will get surprising and varied answers.

Restless Colonies.

A gravitation ago, Downing Street—where the Colonial Office is—had practically the first and last word in important matters arising in almost every territory under its jurisdiction. The position is now different. The wave of restlessness which has swept over the world since the War has not left the Colonies untouched, and the time is ripe for a revival of many of the local constitutions which are out of date and out of touch with modern democratic ideas.

In those Colonies which are demanding more self-government and more employment of local people in administrative and technical positions, there is usually a well-educated section of the community who make a habit of getting criticism of the services provided and charge that, if they were run locally and staffed by local people, they would be more efficient. There is some little evidence to support these views, but as it is available in the form of a book, it is not surprising that it has become a best-seller in the kind of agitation which is now being looked to this kind of agitation.

There is a certain amount of general agreement that the system of indirect rule, as it is called, is not a very desirable one. 

ed to understand why, on October 5, Mr. Purkis had refused to take him in the car, while his denied several acts and statements attributed to him. He testified about an automatic pistol on October 5, at Kitale when it was shown to him for shuffling while he was waiting for a golf club, but he had entered the light with an intention of hitting the pistol; nor had he previously expressed any intention to "bind" Mrs. Purkis.
He attributed the binding over proceedings to unknown persons and mourns regarding alleged threats to Mrs. Purkis. He told the Magistrate that Mr. Ferguson, at the time that he did not remember anything as he was under the influence of liquor, but he agreed to being bound over and did not want it. He testified it, however, for shooting Mrs. etc.

A Day of Tragedy.

Referring to incidents on October 5, he said he did not go on the farm as the horses had destroyed the maize, wheat and grass. He went off to the Club and stayed there all day, except for a period during the afternoon when he paid a brief visit to the farm. He drank beer and other drinks towards the evening. He remembered seeing Mrs. Purkis playing tennis. On finishing his drink he said "Good night" and went off with no intention of shooting anyone, particularly Mrs. Purkis, although he had the pistol with him. He explained that he carried the pistol about his person, but Mrs. Purkis playing tennis. On leaving the Club to go to his room, he did not remember anything else until several days afterwards. He did not recollect shooting Mrs. Purkis, nor did he remember being bound to the Magistrate. His first recollection was being restrained on a charge of murder. His memory in the interim had been a complete blank.

Cross-Examination.

Cross-examined he believed that Mr. and Mrs. Purkis were upright and honourable, but Miss Morgan was irresponsible and was probably drawing on her imagination in regard to things he did not say. "I believed she had a motive for shielding the witness Roberts who in the opinion of the accused, was at the bottom of everything. Accused was not the cause of any trouble or annoyance before October 14. When he told Roberts to keep out, that was her last notice to him. Mrs. Purkis but was accused Roberts was a married man, and she was quite alone with her children."

to have, at the Colonial Office, a most admirable system of training for children and young people. There was no subject which caused the most serious difficulty, and the Colonial Office than that of the treatment of juvenile delinquents. An inspection of routine papers and police reports from the various districts revealed a practice of savage sentences on quite young offenders for such offences. In many cases there was no distinction between the juvenile prisoners, no separate accommodation, and no probation or reformatory system.

This draft was discussed and approved by a representative conference of Government, and thereafter was dispatched to every Colonial Government with a strong expression of opinion that the Ordinance should be incorporated in the local legislation. STREET NOISES.

(Unofficial Survey in London.
[STANDARD COMPASSIONATE.]
London, January 17.
One mile from town.
An unofficial survey of the volume of noise in the parks of London has just been completed, and will probably take most of this year to complete. It is being undertaken by the Western Electric Company which has been entrusted with a similar official survey in New York. The method of conducting the survey is carried out in a similar manner to that of the various sounds of the most up-to-date pattern. The chief of the survey is Mr. J. H. M. The volume of noise is recorded in what are known as "decibels." The decibel is a unit of noise measurement similar to the length measurement. Instead of the amount of noise being registered on a sound record it is measured in terms of decibels. That it has been found that among the noisiest spots so far surveyed are Fleet Street and Ludgate Circus, with 75 decibels each. Lombard Street and the Bank were recorded 63 decibels each. The noise level in a park was a pneumatic drill used for excavation work caused no less than 82 decibels to be registered. It is pointed out that a knowledge of the noise level in any street will make it possible for steps to be taken to reduce the noise level. Various ways in which this could be done.

For instance the road surface might be changed to a more noise-absorbent material; necessary trees and shrubs might be planted to form a barrier; or the road might be altered to form a double-deck road; or the noisiest streets might be widened. Narrow streets tend to be a concentration of noise.



DEVELOPMENT OF KAVIRONDO GOLDFIELD

Sir Albert Kitson's Second Report.

OPPOSES GRANT OF SOLE PROSPECTING LICENCE.

Company's Offer Criticised.

RECOMMENDS FIVE DIVISIONS WITH TWO FREE PROSPECTING AREAS.

Sir Albert Kitson's proposals for the settlement of the problem raised by the application by Tanganyika Concessions Ltd. for a sole prospecting licence over nearly the whole of Kavirondo (5,900 square miles) are that the Kavirondo goldfield should be divided into five parts, in two of which general prospecting should be permitted.

Tanganyika Concessions should be offered an option over any one of the remaining three areas and Government should be prepared to receive from them or from any other companies or individuals applications for portions of the remaining areas.

These recommendations are contained in Sir Albert Kitson's report issued in Nairobi yesterday.

Throughout the report he is very critical of the development conditions tendered by Tanganyika Concessions Ltd. sought the licence and he remarks that future applications should depend upon expenditure of a much larger sum and the employment of a much greater number of native labourers than proposed by the Company.

He quotes figures to show that over a similar area Kenya would benefit greatly by development through its own miners.

Pending announcement of the policy to be adopted, the Kenya Government attaches greatest importance to the careful closure of the areas in question being most strictly observed, looks confidently for the co-operation of the public, and issues a warning that any proved cases of unauthorized prospecting will be most rigorously dealt with.

No sudden action will be taken and proper notice of the opening of the present closed area will be given if it is decided to open it.

Government Appeal To Public.


The Government of Kenya issued yesterday the Report by Sir Albert Kitson, C.M.G., C.B.E., on the application made by Messrs. the Tanganyika Concessions Ltd. for an exclusive sole prospecting licence for a minimum period of two years in a certain area of the Colony. When he arrived in the country some months ago to carry out the preliminary work in connection with a geological survey with special reference to Kakamega, the application was referred to him for advice.

In a brief introductory note it is revealed that the Report published by Sir Albert Kitson in November, 1937, had been received from Sir Albert Kitson in November.

Reading such announcements the Government of Kenya attaches the greatest importance to the careful closure of these areas because most strictly observed and hopes that in the general public interest the co-operation of the public to secure this will be forthcoming. Proved cases of unauthorized prospecting in these areas will be most rigorously dealt with.

No Sudden Action.
The "East African Standard" understands that no sudden action is in contemplation in connection with the closed areas, but if Government decides to accept the recommendations proposed, it will be given of the opening at some future date of the areas now closed.

Objections were immediately expressed by several representatives when it became known that the Government proposed that the area should be closed as an applicant company.
Objections Reviewed.
Sir Albert Kitson reviews and summarizes the main objections

filed. The objections held that the grant of such a large area was not in the best interests of Kenya and that there should be competition among applicants. They claimed that the Kavirondo goldfield was discovered by Kenya prospectors without aid from any large company; that they were better able to give the country a thorough prospecting and that companies should come in prospecting licence had made discoveries. It was noted that the profits of a large company financed from outside Kenya would go out of the Colony and it was stated that the grant of an exclusive prospecting licence over the whole of Kavirondo, including Kakamega, would deprive the energies of Kenya men and destroy their initiative.

Partial Examination.

In order to advise on the matter Sir Albert Kitson considered it necessary to examine the area although he was unable to do so fully owing to the indifferent conditions combined with the rainy season. He remarks that in consequence large areas were not tested of material value to a comparatively small area of the north of South Kavirondo, which is not nearly so valuable as the area investigated had also been made on almost entirely a restricted scale in the available material ground. In all some 2,500 miles were traversed by car.

In approaching the question of the concession the report says it can be considered from several aspects.
1. It is advisable that an exclusive prospecting licence for such a large area should be given to one company in the only part of Kenya in which gold in profi-

table quantities is definitely known to exist but in which no large deposits of the economic minerals are known, or would it be profitable to make it available for general prospecting or to grant applications from various companies for such small areas under exclusive prospecting licence?

2. Is the applicant company really able to give the country a better examination in gold than the Kenya miners?

3. What is the comparison between the total expenditures proposed by the applicant company and the probable expenditures by Kenya men over any definite area?

4. What is the comparison between the benefits derivable by Kenya under (1) the applicant company and (2) Kenya miners?

5. It is advisable to limit the possible westward to south-westward extension of the Kavirondo goldfield by an arbitrary boundary such as the road in question without taking into consideration the geological features of the country in that direction?

Questions Answered.

The report thereafter proceeds to answer these questions.
"In my opinion" states Sir Albert Kitson, "it is not advisable to grant exclusive prospecting licences over very large areas in the only part of Kenya in which gold in profitable quantities has been proved to exist."
He continues: "Sir Albert points out that strong reputable mining companies intend upon carefully prospecting the area as a great service to a country if their operations are keenly supervised by capable geologists and engineers. Without such supervision, there are numerous known instances of

great neglect on the part of some of the Kenya miners as they set, I suggested solely upon a salary without any participation in the results. "That is not the case when individual prospectors or parties of them as in Kenya are engaged in similar work, because upon the successful results of their energy and industry depend in many cases their financial obligations and the salvation of their farms and other interests."

It is added that if expensive methods of work are necessary a strong company can provide costly mechanical aids and a laboratory and, if desirable, can arrange for the development of the minerals found. These aids could not be provided by individual miners on small parcels of their limited means.

Small Prospectors' Capacity.
While a strong company could supply the costly plant necessary for the discovery and development of zinc deposits, has metals, oil, coal or water, such a company is not likely to apply to all areas or necessarily to all minerals. As regards gold, diamonds, and other minerals, their discovery in many cases was made with the ability of small financial interests and in some cases their development to prospectors who are not financially able to do so.

It might be considered a moot point as to which group would be the more successful—the small number of zinc prospectors or the many scores of men, some of whom are experienced in prospecting. These were the men who found the great deposits of the value minerals in the area under consideration. Turning to the second aspect—whether the applicant company is really able to give satisfactory




