

# ITALY STATES HER CASE AT GENEVA

## A Voluminous Indictment of Abyssinia

**NO ROOM IN THE LEAGUE FOR BOTH COUNTRIES**

**The Paris Talks**  
**PROPOSED REORGANISATION OF ETHIOPIA BY EXPERTS**

Italy at great length stated her case against Abyssinia before the Council of the League of Nations on Wednesday and the Italian delegate afterwards declared that this was his government's last word.

After dealing with the relations between the two countries during half a century and citing numerous instances of alleged breach of faith by Abyssinia, Baron Aloisi made it clear that Italy and Ethiopia could not both continue to be members of the League of Nations.

Mr. Anthony Eden reporting on the Paris Conference revealed that it had been suggested that the League should appoint experts to assist in the complete reorganisation of Abyssinia, that the possibility of territorial readjustments by agreement should be considered, and that a new treaty should be negotiated.

The British delegate again emphasised that there was no quarrel between Britain and Italy, the British Government being concerned only with the honouring of the League's commitments.

Meanwhile the mobilisation of the Abyssinian Army is proceeding apace.

## The Last Word?

(Through Reuters Agency and British Official Wireless)

London, Sept. 4.

The meeting of the League Council at Geneva today attracted intense public interest and the lobby was something with excited journalists and delegates prior to the arrival of the Council.

Mr. Laval was greeted with cheers and cries of "Viva Laval!"

After a brief private sitting, the President, Don Luis Guzman Argentinian opened the meeting with the announcement that the Arbitration Commission had submitted a unanimous report to the Italian and Ethiopian Governments on the Wabai incident.

The report will be communicated to the Council.

The President then called on Mr. Anthony Eden to make a statement regarding the negotiations in Paris on August 10.

Mr. Eden said Baron Aloisi had presented a number of complaints regarding Abyssinian action on the frontier and in Abyssinia. He also demanded that predominant Italian financial and economic interests in Abyssinia should be protected.

Therefore Mr. Eden submitted a programme of an exploratory character.

The situation in Abyssinia, said Mr. Eden, called for reform and it was suggested that Abyssinia should appeal to the League for reforms which must be reached with the full and free consent of the Abyssinian Government.

According to the proposals made, the League would appoint experts to assist in the complete reorganisation of the country together and take special measures for the protection of Italian interests while the four Powers concerned would negotiate a new treaty.

Provision was made that the free activities of foreigners should be increased.

While the suggestions maintained the full independence and integrity of Ethiopia it was understood that the possibility of territorial adjustment by agreement was not excluded.

his power to assure a peaceful settlement of this dispute. In these past ten years the nations have striven laboriously and sincerely, and with a measure of success, to create a new international era, which shall spare mankind the horrors of war, because they have learnt at long last the bitter lesson that war is a costly means of progress.

That is why they pleaded themselves in the Pact of Paris to resolve war as an instrument of national policy. It was for these reasons that members of the League had previously expressed their determination, and gave form to their conviction in the articles of the covenant. The machinery of the new order is here, if we have its spirit also we cannot fail.

**A Vital Test**

The British Government was acutely conscious of its responsibilities as a member of the League. He concluded: "World opinion is watching us. In the judgment of the world the League faces a vital test. If it does not pass it successfully its influence will be gravely impaired. The collapse of the League and the new international order would be a world calamity."

**Britain and Italy**

There is no question of any political or economic conflict between Britain and Italy, Britain's

substantial interests in Ethiopia have been explicitly recognized by Italy and the British Government was not in any apprehension that they will not continue to be represented. Historically Britain has only been concerned as a member of the League and a signatory of the Kellogg Pact. It is the members' duty to use the League machinery. If they obtain the loyal co-operation of the parties, in the dispute they will not fail to achieve a peaceful settlement which will so earnestly be desired.

**French View**

M. Laval, the French Prime Minister who followed Mr. Anthony Eden yesterday in the work of consideration of the League was guaranteed that he can tonight still be associated with the League of Nations. That was the talk of the Council which could be assured of the full collaboration of France.

## ITALY'S CASE NO LONGER ABLE TO TRUST ETHIOPIA

Baron Aloisi, the Italian delegate, submitted voluminous documentary evidence in which he went into detail the history of the Italian-Italian relations during the past 50 years. He declared that Italy had always shown patience and fairness. Ethiopia, he continued, was exploiting its membership of the League to evade the League-Ethiopian Treaty of 1928.

Baron Aloisi 'fold' numerous examples and stated that the Italian Government was no longer able to accept its declarations. Italy would feel profoundly wounded if Ethiopia belonged to the League and Italy was not. Italy and the Italian Government reserve the right to defend their liberty of action in order to defend the interests of the League and the security of its colonies.

After Baron Aloisi's speech the sitting was suspended until the evening.

## BRITISH LINER IN COLLISION

**While on Pleasure Cruise**

**Call for Help**

**PASSENGERS TAKEN OFF BY OTHER SHIPS**

London, Sept. 5.

The Cornard White Star liner "Doric" carrying over 700 passengers on a pleasure cruise was involved in a collision with the French steamer "Formigny" off the coast of Portugal to-day.

The "Doric" sent out an S.O.S.

Four hundred passengers have so far been taken off by the British steamer "Orion" and a number by the P. and O. liner "Victory of India."

## What Italy Means

The Council adjourned without fixing a time for re-assembly.

## All Safe

London, Sept. 5.

The trader's department was only precautionary as the "Doric" had encircled the S.O.S. and refused aid.

## Worst Hurricane in Living Memory

**TERRIBLE DESTRUCTION IN AMERICAN ISLANDS**

**5000 People Dead**

At least 5000 people are believed to have perished in the hurricane which swept over islands off the Florida coast. The wind was so fierce that it tore people's clothes to shreds.

**Thousands in Peril**

(Through Reuters Agency)

Miami, September 4.

It is already estimated that 5000 people have been killed in the hurricane and thousands are still imprisoned in the devastated areas.

The hurricane was the most severe visitation within the past 100 years. Most of the damage was done in the Key Islands.

Survivors report walls of water 15 feet high. Buildings were crumpled like ripped boxes and the raging wind ripped people's clothing to shreds.

It is impossible accurately to assess the damage owing to the destruction of communications.

 London, Aug. 24. Details are now available of the results of the preliminary run of the Kintimngi Gold Miner's Company's mill which, as forecast in the last progress report, commenced operation in June. During the period from June 15 to July 25 the mill ran for 492 hours and treated 1,700 tons of ore. The actual recovery of gold was 6.31 dwt. per ton, or in addition 1.19 dwt. was left in the tailings, so that the total value of the ore milled was 7.5 per cent. Production for the period amounted to 436 oz. of fine gold. "The Financial World" gives some interesting comments on East African issues this week. It remarks: "For the time being, East African gold shares defy prediction of higher prices, but certainly remain very steady. Development news continues favourable, and when later in the year..."

THE mining point of view in 1956 was characterized in Kenya by the continuing progress made by many of the larger companies in securing and opening up of new properties; by the enormous increase in the financial resources available in Kenya gold fields; and by the promising finds in No. 2 Area. "Although without exception," he adds, "mining activity has increased throughout the Kenya Province adjacent to Laikipia, where the mineralization is associated with the igneous rocks of the younger granites." In this respect it is interesting to note that "younger granite" outcrops in the area are about 4,000 ft. in diameter and appear to be from the same period as the granite which has been dated at 6.2 or 6.3 million years old.

**THE SHARE MARKET**  
 A DULL WEEK

ONCE again there is little interest in reports practically all shares show weakness and most decline. Various schemes closed to general prospecting, Tanganyika Company have had No. 1 Area for two years and no further development has taken place. It is reported that Kintimngi Gold Area Ltd. has been assigned No. 1 area in Kenya, and has only abandoned No. 2 area.

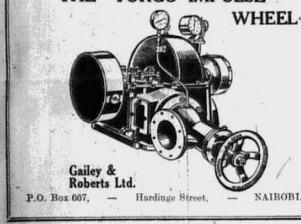

CLOSING OF THE SUEZ CANAL

(Continued from page 1.)

1888, the British authorities justified it on the grounds of safeguarding the Canal.

Canal Statistics

The study summarizes the Statistics of the Suez Canal to-day as follows:—

(1) The Canal is operated by a private Egyptian company, a minority of the stock being held by the British Government. Upon the basis of a concession granted by the Egyptian Government, which expired in 1956.

(2) The Convention of Constantinople of 1866 provides that the Canal should always be free and open in time of war as in time of peace to every vessel of commerce or of war, without distinction of flag, so that the defence of the Canal should in no way be prejudicial to the interests of Europe.

(3) The British Government established a bilateral protocol with Egypt in 1914 and closed the Canal to enemy vessels.

(4) Egypt has made no treaty recognizing the British claim to defend the Canal.

Should the Council proceed to enforce the British Government to close the Canal under article 20 of the Convention (which also obligates it to understandings inconsistent with the Convention), it might be open, says Mr. Buxby, to the Italian Government to challenge such action before the Permanent Court under the Optional Clause. The Italian Government could contend that the Convention of 1888 was still in force, and that Egypt, instead of Great Britain, alone had jurisdiction over the Canal. The Court might then be put in a position of passing judgment on the relations between England and Egypt.

Mr. Buxby adds that underlying the immediate problem of whether the Suez Canal will be closed by the League is the fundamental question whether the great canals of the world, both the Suez and Panama, should be internationalized.

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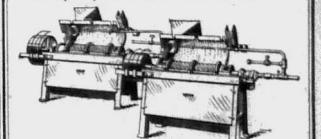

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The Future of Kenya District Councils

TO BE THE SUBJECT OF A ROUND TABLE CONFERENCE

Economy Proposals

SUGGESTED FUSION OF UASIN GISHU AND TRANS NZOIA DISTRICTS

A Round Table Conference to discuss the future of District Councils is to be held in Nairobi, probably towards the end of next month.

The announcement was made by the Commissioner for Local Government, Lands and Settlement at a special meeting of the Uasin Gishu District Council.

The Road Grant

A special meeting of the Uasin Gishu District Council was called on August 20 to meet the Commissioner for Local Government, and for the purpose of discussing a memorandum which had been submitted dealing with the revision of the basic grant.

Mr. Logan asked Council to consider very carefully the scheme as proposed with a view eventually to sending down District Council delegates to a Round Table Conference which he proposed to call probably towards the end of October.

He realized that in any revision of the basic grant the Uasin Gishu Council would be contributing more than its fair share in this regard by virtue of the fact that it had received a 25 per cent increase in its basic grant in the shape of Customs Duties, petrol tax, and he asked the Council to consider this point.

With regard to bridges, Councils under the new scheme would be called upon to provide from their own funds the grants for the purpose of constructing permanent bridges to replace existing semi-permanent bridges, agreed upon an average period of 12 years, and in addition to this would also be called upon to provide a reserve for repairs of such bridges.

TASKS FOR THE CONVENTION

To The Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—May I make no request appeal to the forthcoming Convention to include throughout their deliberations that they are coming together at a most critical time in the country's affairs, and that their decisions may have far-reaching effects upon the future of Kenya, for better or for worse. Those who carry the responsibility of guiding public opinion were called upon to give of themselves in the past, in their manliness, it is surely now when our material and physical resources are nearly exhausted and the dawn of recovery is just showing itself above the horizon.

In particular, may I appeal to those who have had their terms prolonged in the courts, to those others who are unable yet to see daylight through the clouds of their financial difficulties. It is not too much to ask of the former that they should subordinate their sense of personal grievance to the public interest, and the necessity for goodwill and cooperation between all who are engaged in the country's economic recovery; and to ask of the latter that they should find consolation in the knowledge that improvement in the position of the country generally must inevitably have favourable reflection upon their own.

It is to be hoped that the country is now definitely on the road to recovery. It is becoming ever apparent every month. Another six months perhaps must elapse before the position has improved sufficiently for its effects to be felt generally, but already it has sufficiently improved to justify confident belief that the crisis has been safely passed and that we are on the solid foundation upon which the future can be securely built.

My appeal to the forthcoming Convention is that every consideration should be subordinated to the task of rebuilding Kenya. I venture to prophesy, as destined to make greater progress in consolidating and deepening the work of settlement and re-education during the next five years than in any similar period of the chequered history of the public men will in the spirit of the age unflinch themselves of narrow ideas of the Victorian era, take stock of the position as they now find it, and hold for the future, or modern times.

Inspired by unshakable faith in their adopted country, the Colonists of Kenya have by their courage in the past emerged from periods of depression with their spirit unbroken, and astonished friends and acquaintances by the manner in which they have made adversity a stepping stone to greater prosperity and new progress. I am confident it only needs a percentage of that spirit and determination to see us through the last stage of the greatest depression in economic history. Lastly, I make appeal to the President-to-be in like spirit. The people having submitted to

heavy sacrifices and suffered most individually so that "an efficient government" machine might be built. It is now that this crisis has been passed, and that the Government to embark upon a vigorous policy of assisting the people to resist their shattered fortunes.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—I take it that the explanation given by Lord Francis Scott and other Members of the Legislative Council of their views, and their actions regarding the "Kisumu" incident. These explanations had to be given and the difficulty has been surmounted with good sense and good feeling.

Now that they are out of the way, would it not be wise to let the incident be allowed to drop and be forgotten? It behoves us all to concentrate on the situation in which it has given rise, and to use this situation to the best advantage. Whether the action was wise or opportune is a matter of opinion and is not matter of fact. What does matter is that it has brought things to a head and that the feeling of the country, which could not in any case have been suppressed much longer, has been vented. Those who approve the incident feel that so much time has been saved, that a better moment might have been chosen, cannot put the clock back. Therefore let us all go straight ahead in the way of recovery.

The task before the Convention and the country is now to put forward clearly and with no misgiving the broad basic policy which it is intended to instruct its leaders to follow.

What are the main points on which practically all are agreed? (1) That the system of Crown Colony Government as at present instituted is unsuited to the urgent needs of Kenya and that some measure of self-government is essential. In fact that opinions vary widely as to what form it should take or how far it should go, but their intelligence to worry out what is best for the country. That the public is not unimpressed by a sensational cry, but is generally trying to find the best method of improvement.

(2) That the financial position of Kenya is such that Major Grogan points out in his most valuable letter. Further delay in dealing drastically with the question can only precipitate disaster. (3) That there are no real hopes of setting matters right through the existing system under which a minority of Councilors battles vainly against an impossible wall, and that the country does not seem to be still and see the useless struggle continue.

(4) That the expenses of Government are impossible heavy and that true economy must come, and that Kenya has a fair opening for her growing population in Services, and that she does not intend to rest until they have been met. If these main questions are firmly and unanimously dealt with by the Convention its decisions must not only carry great weight but will probably entirely alter the future of Kenya. There is a marked increase in steadiness and sense of responsibility in the tone of recent correspondence, which augurs well for the spirit in which the Convention

will meet. The vital importance of the questions for debate has evidently brought realization that this is no time for hot air in any form.

An expression given by the Convention of calm determination will probably have more effect than any number of impassioned speeches. The more so since opposition will look for quite other signs. It must however be made plain that the country has no intention of sitting down under a defeated negative from the Permanent Officials of the Colonial Office. That is the crux of the whole matter. It is essential that we should be brought to grasp the fact that the situation has gone beyond that where a mere majority of the Members shows any similar cause.

What is Kenya fighting for? Simply for action from rapidly approaching rain, and for self-expression. This is a good and just cause. Let us see to it that we drive it through to a successful issue.

COFFEE STANDARDS AND PRICES

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—This does coffee planters talk much about the bad coffee prices realised. All coffee we produce a large percentage of "lower grades" but "A" coffee offers the same rate as inferior on the local market, as well as on the London market. This is somewhat puzzling.

We must be prepared to compete on the world market at world prices, according to the Coffee Board and some local buyers. At the same time, His Excellency the Acting Governor in

a recent speech says we all know that we are producing the best coffee in the world. How do prices of the world's coffee compare with prices on the world market? July average prices for Kenya coffee are: "A" 125/-, "B" 108/-, "C" 83/-.

At the same time New York 441; Hamburg 435 all per ton. The grading of Santos No. 4 shows for major defects per lb. and 40 smaller defects, not mentioned in the London market, and 820 "minor" defects it goes into a higher grade.

"Defects" are valued thus: 1 black bean, 1 defect; 1 cherry, 1 defect; 25 "seeds" (detached, hollow beans), 1 defect; 2 broken beans, 1 defect; 1 soft or badly treated bean, 1 defect; 1 large stick, 2 or 3 defects; 1 average stick, 1 defect; 2 or 3 smaller sticks, 1 defect; 2 parchment beans, 1 defect; 1 unripe bean (dead beans or quakers), 1 defect; 1 small average stick, 1 defect; 1 large stick, 1 defect; 1 nut, 2 or 3 nuts are able to see from above, there is allowed to be 1000 small stones, etc., plus 1480 small stones, etc.

It is this excellent mixture, that gives Santos coffee a higher value on the world market.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—The catastrophe fall in prices, unless quickly remedied, must leave the country in a state of depression, and in wholesale discharges of labour. In both of these lies danger. The opinion has been expressed by Natives that of either of these happens there is bound to be an increase in lawlessness, and many questions as to the future of the country.

The obvious remedy is to ensure to the coffee planter a fair return for his produce, and this can only be done by a system of acts. But a subsidy to maintain the coffee planter on his estate and his Natives in employment may in the long run be cheaper than meeting the situation later when "chaos is ahead." To be forwarded is to be forwarded.

I also suggest for a moment that a colossal sum should be expended on bolstering up an industry which is in a state of pitiful through. But I do believe the present low prices are only temporary. My proposal then is that each coffee planter be guaranteed a minimum price by Government of fifty pounds a ton for his first twenty tons only. That will be fairer than subsidising some men at the expense of others. Above the first twenty tons, the subsidy will either be a rapidly diminishing scale or not at all. This all planters would have a certain sum guaranteed to them which should help them to carry over and this will be far and away better than the Agricultural Credit Scheme which benefited a few and left the rest to go to the wall.

The real cost of a subsidy per ton will be estimated, £15,000 or more. The money could be obtained either from a Development Loan or from Gains Licenses or increased taxes on liquor and entertainment. Yours etc, NEQUE MEL YONG APES, Kisumu, August 28, 1935.

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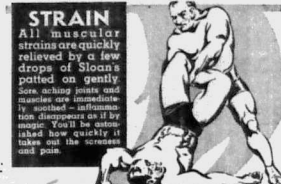

### The Silence of God (in Perspective)

# Tennis of the Times

No. 3

"HOW TO IMPROVE YOUR PLAY."

(By Sir F. Gordon Lowe, Bt.)

Many reach a certain proficiency at Lawn Tennis but can get no further. Probably it is only some little thing that is holding them back, such as a faulty grip, dropping the head of the racket during a stroke, looking up too soon, or the hundred which even first-class players manage to frequent.

Lack of concentration, the failure to rivet their attention on the game, has kept countless players in the position we hope they will retain this year. Everyone, of course, cannot be a Perry, but a few of the best players in the world may be taught to play as well as their physical and mental gifts will allow if they will only take the trouble.

At a start, let us consider how Merrett Bealer, the well-known English player, has improved. Mr. Allen Parker, Miss Balesock and others makes chump up. Learning to make a game first, he says, is half the trick, and then knowing how to dispense your own style. He has reduced entirely to mathematics and motions, so there must be some reason for the improvement. To attain accuracy in his playing Bealer has done three things. This is after the style of Miss Lengren's early training.

Certainly many fall because they have not sufficient defense to fall back on when their attack has been mastered. Some times having to Miss Murns and Miss Nuthall. As Mrs. Lonsler Chambers recently said: "Your modern player seems to try to make every shot a winning one, which is quite impossible."

Heaven sent chances do not often occur twice, therefore make the most of the easy ones when they do come along. I am a great believer, too, in having the ear set out on the board instead of going for the most spectacular and difficult one. Take the ear set and sweat road to victory.

A series of lessons from a reliable coach, of whom there is a large choice in this country, is a necessity for the beginner, and will probably do the advanced player no harm. There are certain strokes which seldom come naturally, especially service and backhand, that require expert advice.

### Play Singles

Points of practice against both players is also essential and the obvious answer to this is to join a first-class club where this can be obtained. A single, by the way, is worth a dozen doubles for putting your strokes and yourself into trim. Every player keen to improve should be writing every reach of a practice book where he can refer to after quiet half hour to develop what they all admit that in their early days they found the practice book a tremendous help.

### How to Start

My advice to a beginner would be first of all to read through a good book on the game in order to get a working knowledge of how to start. For this purpose there is nothing better than Captain Caulfield's "Lawn Tennis Made Easy," written in collaboration with Bunny Austin, his most distinguished pupil. The two things certainly go hand in hand and are the chief factors in my view of success to the best form of defence, and never play for safety, is another very point Perry makes.

### Eyes on the Ball

Let me end by giving the golden rule of stroke production. First of all, keep your eyes fixed on the ball once it is in play. Half the foolish shots at tennis are due to looking up too soon. Players would score far fewer faults if, instead of glancing up at their opponent's court, they would watch the ball all through.

Never drop the head of the racket below the wrist, during a stroke. For the forehead and neck should be held more or less in a straight line with the arms, and above the wrist for the backhand and all volleys. Many indeed fall over their backhands because they do not keep their neck heads up. Watch Captain Austin and Wood in this respect; they all carry out the rule.

In my view the proper procedure to playing the ball should be short to allow for the back margin for error. The "back" margin varies, according to the player's fitness, swing, and speed. The back should be aimed to swing through the ball, not to stop it. Do not forget the side-swing, as that will give the ball a little more of the "kick" than a straight swing. ## MEDICINE MEN AND WITCHDOCTORS

## Amazing Influence on Minds of the Natives

## Methods Adopted Among the Various Tribes in East Africa

By BEATRIX L. BELLINGHAM

ONE day an old man made his way to the door of the native hospital at Kericho, staggering on the path in such a state of weakness and emaciation he could hardly walk, with a stick in one hand and a little tin of water in the other. He was put to bed and cared for as one who was too late to save him, and the next day he died. Before his death he explained what had happened to him. He had been drinking at a capsule pool when a Lillou tribesman had stirred the water with his feet, making it all muddy; but when he protested the Lillou told him that rights he had to criticize his actions, and because he had done so, cursed him, telling him that for the rest of his life he would not water should pass his lips. The result was that the old man never touched food again, only little sips of water, and so died of starvation.

This is merely one instance of what the Medicine Men of Africa can do to an ignorant tribesman and the extent of their power is simply amazing. With our modern medical and scientific knowledge we should call it the effect of misanthropy, auto-hypnosis, and in a few cases the credulous and terrified mind working on the body.

In another case a Lillou woman fell down paralysed and eventually died because a Lillou, who had a grudge against her, had cursed her, telling her she would never move or get again, and indeed, almost any native cured by a Medicine Man will do so.

Mr. Silvester, in a recent address, stated that the natives of the Northern Frontier Province have secret societies, ruled over by Medicine Men, who merely have to order those who offend them to stay in their huts and they stay there, without being in any way punished or hurt, until they perish of hunger and thirst.

### A Superstitious Race

All the African tribes are superstitious and regard their lives as a dread of witchcraft. The "Maji" and "Machaka" brought upon them by malignant spirits. Each tribe possesses both medicine men and witchdoctors, the former being the most powerful as they are said to produce rain, children and success in war, also to forestall the natives who are conscience-stricken; but not always. The witchdoctor, on the other hand, has no such power, but he can do what he dabbles in the occult and mystic and will say who is the witch or evil person, who has caused the illness, and he will also say which he is being consulted. He is also a primitive physician

and chemist and has some knowledge of curative herbs and methods.

The Lillous are the Medicine Men of the Lillou tribe. They all belong to the Kidongi family of the Ater clan of the Maasi and are said to be descended from a personage called Olo-Mwanya, who came down from Heaven some nine generations ago and was found by the Ater sitting on the top of Mt. Ngong. He was so small that he was first thought to be a child, but his miraculous powers were soon discovered. Eventually his descendants became powerful, numerous, and some of them so troublesome, that a number of the latter were put to death by the Maasi, those who remained taking refuge with the Lillous, since when they have developed themselves into a large clan. Lillous, the present chief Medicine Man of the Maasi and the most mighty power of that tribe, is a direct descendant of Olo-Mwanya and passes on to one of his sons when he dies.

The Medicine Men claim to be rain-makers and say that they can either hold back or bring the rain to their tribes. They also claim to be able to cure any disease, and it is easy to understand their importance among their own people.

### Rain Making

In "The Secret of the African" by W. Smith, the writer gives a description of rain making, as follows:—The Medicine Man goes to a certain spot, pours of certain tea and spins water. He then takes a quantity of the rock into the pool, and stirs the liquid into froth, which he then blows into froth. Then he burns a certain powder, which makes a noise. While this is going on, all the people sing. "Come to us with continued rain. Let us have rain." This is the name for the Supreme Being. As the rain comes, a promise is made only to carry out this ceremony which is a pretty sure the rain will come. If, however, his efforts are usually successful.

The Lillous are said to receive instructions from a "Mojombo" in a snake with a man's head as a messenger, which he is supposed to be able to send to all approved he wishes to take. The Lillous are also believed to turn into snakes after death. In league with spirits, mysterious little beings about 3 ft. high, they

may get drunk with honey-wine and prophesy while under the influence of the fumes.

### A Curious Incident

The medicine men of the Maasi are said to "send their heads to watch a battle." Actually some of them possess strongly developed clairvoyant gifts. I remember being told years ago by Professor J. E. B. Moore, author of "To the Mountains of the Moon," that in 1905, when he was engaged in exploring the territories round Lake Victoria, Nyansa, he was disturbed one night by the great noise his campers were making, started around their camp fire. He sent for the headman to ask what was happening. The headman said that one of their number could see, in the picture of a big fight that was going on down south, at that moment between white men. Professor Moore called for the man and went down exactly what he said he had seen. Some months later, when he returned to civilized parts, he asked if any fight had taken place in South Africa on the night of December 31, 1905. He found he had an exact description of the Jaumoon had taken down on the very night it occurred!

All of things the African medicine men and witchdoctors fear the influence of education and the Christian religion on the tribespeople, for they know that with the progress of civilized teaching, their power must wane and they no longer get rich through their magic. Unfortunately, the witchdoctors are not so much afraid of the Christian religion as they are of the white man, who they have only to tell a wretched man that he must

believe or steel and he does so, some awful curses will be put on him or his. Needless to say the initiator usually comes off the richer for these transactions, though carefully keeping in the background himself.

### Easy Victims

It is easy to see why the people fall such easy victims. The natives have no idea of the value of a thunder, lightning, the growth of crops, the increase of stock, make the untrodden African feel that he is before a Prætorian guard, that he cannot understand. "What is the death?" he asks, "where do the dead go to?" "Why should my lady die?" "What brings disease to the fowls and the cattle?" "Why does the rain come some years and give good crops and in others fall so that there is a famine?"

The people learn instinctively, as Herbert Spencer says, that "Amidst all the mystery of our inscrutable existence, there remains one absolute certainty, that we are in the presence of an infinite and eternal energy from which all things proceed." To them this is magical and so accepting that they turn to their medicine men and witchdoctors to help them when they are afraid.

In Africa there is "black magic" which is harmless, and "black magic" which is definitely evil, and it is through the practice of "black magic" that the witch wand and sorcerer have spread among the tribes such superstitions, terror that their enemies fall an easy prey to these evil-minded gentry, who make use of them merely to serve their own ends.

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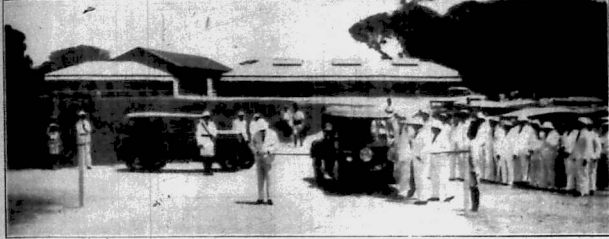

# PRODUCTION IN THE SEYCHELLES ISLANDS

## Progress of Essential Oil Industry

### WEATHERING THE DEPRESSION

#### SCHEME FOR CENTRAL DISTILLERY UNDER CONSIDERATION

(By Captain Hugh A. D. Mackay)

It is no doubt generally known that, like her sister colony Kenya, Seychelles islands are a purely agricultural country.

The archipelago was supposed to have been first discovered in 1505 by a Portuguese navigator led by Mascarenhas, who, however, made no attempt at colonisation. Later the islands were again discovered by the Dutch, and a small settlement was made, but abandoned after a short time. From that period onwards the islands were the haunts of pirates and privateers who used to infest the Indian Ocean, until in 1772 the French Government of Isle de France, at Mauritius was, at that time, called upon to take over the islands with a view to planting spices, so as to try and break the monopoly of the trade which was in the hands of the Dutch in the East Indies.

Mr. Gillis reported favourably on the islands, and the first serious attempt at colonisation was made, and spices, including cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, and pepper, were planted and, incidentally, given.

#### Plantations Destroyed

The only set back to the industry was the outbreak of cholera in 1780, when France and Britain went to war, as the effect of which was a sudden destruction from Mauritius, that in the event of the outbreak of cholera, the islands were to be destroyed by fire. One day, a French vessel, transporting slaves from Madagascar, called into Mahé for wood and water, and being the island to be in the hands of the British, boarded the English flag at the main.

The officer-in-charge of the island, a man called de Bonnaville, thinking the ship was hostile, at once gave orders for the burning of the plantations, which order was carried out. History does not record the reason which must have passed between the two senior French officers at meeting, but must be left to the reader's imagination.

In spite of this disaster to the spice industry, trade went on as usual, but in a lesser degree, and in the course of Seychelles was ceded finally to Great Britain under the Treaty of Paris in 1815. As time passed, Seychelles prospered, especially with regard to the export of coconuts, vanilla, and also nutmeg and cloves, until a few years ago the world depression came and prices dropped.

#### Trade Difficulties

Vanilla, the bean of an orchid, was still exported from the colony, but Masters were hard hit by the discovery of vanilla, which is a chemical substitute for vanilla, and is used as a source of vanilla flavouring. Vanilla is largely made from imported, and as exported, the planters turned their activities to the distillation of cinnamon leaf oil which is in demand to the manufacturers of vanilla.

Luckily, cinnamon grows all over the island of Mahé, so that it is not so much a matter of state. Many distilleries were opened, and the industry began to flourish in a measure. Unhappily owing to one reason or another, the trade dropped, but with the encouragement from Government, it is hoped in due course the trade will be revived.

At the same time the planters were distilling a certain quantity of patchouli oil, and also palmarosa oil. Unfortunately in the past years the quality of palmarosa oil was not very good, but it has been discovered that the fault of the palmarosa oil was not the quality of the palmarosa grass having crops in with the palmarosa grass. (Ginger grass is most objectionable to all species, and can only be sold by the difference in smell of the two.)

#### Further Experiments

At the time of writing, planters are also experimenting with essential oils, and lemon grass, and Zingiberaceae oils, and also with the manufacture of soap, but owing to the high price of production there has been practically no market for this oil, and as well, the fact that the good market for citronella oil at Sh. 1/6 per pound. If this can be done, there is no reason why the oil industry of Seychelles should not replace largely the Java citronella oil.

#### Signs of Improvement

This is the situation with regard to the essential oil industry in Seychelles at the present time, and there are signs of the sun's rays breaking through the dark clouds of agricultural depression. A further sign of the sun's rays would be if the colony's agriculture could be revived to the extent of a professional export, and the colony had also a highly trained scientific agricultural expert at its disposal. The Seychelles Government are doing all in their power to advance the agriculture of the colony, and there is a scheme on foot, if money is available, for the erection of a model distillery for the stimulation of the production of the most essential oils, and also the possibility of erecting a central distillery where planters may bring their products for distillation.

Finally, there seems to be definite signs of improvement in the agriculture of Seychelles, and if as it is hoped, the colony will soon be standing on her own legs again, it will be due, alone, to the untiring efforts, hard work, and sympathy of His Excellency the Governor, to whom the thanks of the Colony will be due.

## TWENTY YEARS AGO

The following extracts are taken from the "East African Standard" (founded 1904) for the week ending September 6, 1915.—

On the Western Front, terrific artillery activity, especially in the region of Nisport, Hatan, south of Arras and east of the Lille road, as well as in the Arras region, has been a feature of the recent fighting. Artillery have done much valuable work and the enemy's counter-artillery fire has frequently been studied. Trench fighting continues on the Russian front and the enemy have driven back with losses in killed, prisoners and war material at several places. The Austrian forces are making a big effort to turn the Russian flank in Galicia and Von Hindenburg's efforts in the Italian Front have continued. On the Indian front our ally's advance continues on the Upper Burma and considerable progress is also reported in the Philippines. In East Africa, war against the British has continued and exploded a lighter fall of mortar shells on the British position near the harbour mouth. The enemy steamer "Marked" was also destroyed. In East Africa, enemy patrols were dispersed, as well as at Makulu and Mamba. While in East Africa, enemy patrols were also driven off.

Losses caused by Zeppelin air raids (Zepplin) on the 20th and 21st inst. were 101 adults and 18 children killed and 159 adults and 11 children injured. All these have been civilian casualties, not less any damage of military importance being caused.

The financial front of the war is illustrated by the issue by both Allied and enemy powers. The Germans have borrowed a further loan of 99, carrying a 5 per cent. redeemable not before 1924. Russia has also to have borrowed £20,000,000 instalment of a £100,000,000 American loan which has been issued. It was overvalued, 20,000,000 dollars in British securities and gold were recently received in New York at payment for war material.

The coal crisis, involving nearly 10,000 South Wales miners, has been settled, and the men have returned to work.

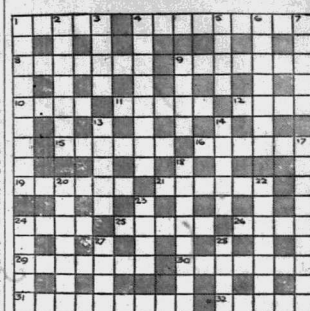

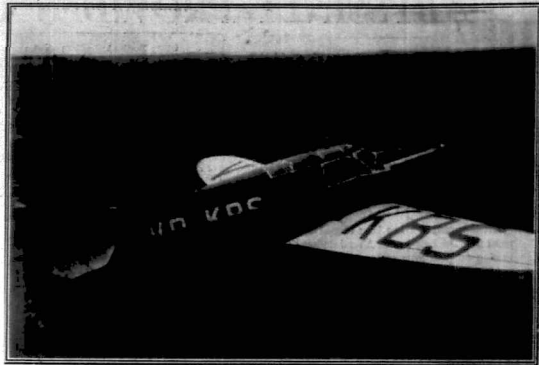

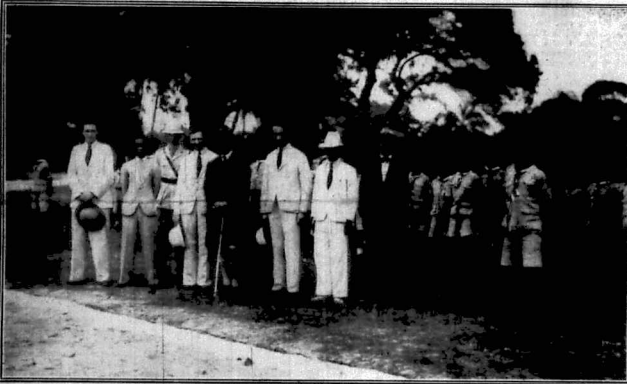

DR. LEAKEY'S EXPEDITION IN EAST AFRICA

A Giant Sheep

IMPORTANT RESULTS OF EXCAVATIONS IN OLDOWAY DEPOSITS

The East African Archaeological Expedition, under the leadership of Dr. L. S. B. Leakey, has made further important discoveries in various areas of the country particularly in the Oldoway Gorge, where work was initiated in 1921.

Among the discoveries was that of a nearly complete skull and horn cores of what appears to be a genus of prehistoric sheep. The animal must have been the size of a buffalo with a horn span of over six feet.

Dr. Leakey also visited the ruins at Enkarsika, where preliminary investigation and survey work were carried out. He studied some interesting and valuable rock paintings in the Kondoa Frangi district and judged them to be of prehistoric age.

A Primitive Mastodon

Several important discoveries have been made in different areas in East Africa by the East African Archaeological Expedition, under the leadership of Dr. L. S. B. Leakey, whose fragments of what are known as the Kanjara and Kanjara men created some of the earliest human beings known to man. to the point if we provided against that contingency by making good a case for mitigation of the bond-issues between Tanganyika and the adjoining British territories.

#### Taxation

He questioned the wisdom of opposing continuance of the graduated Poll Tax into 1936. In his opinion its withdrawal would give relief whatever to the producer and improvement in those positions was really the crux of our problem—and it might be argued that it was being done at the expense of Government finances at this stage in place Government in a position to embark upon a credit expansion policy.

#### Economy

"I cannot too strongly emphasize," he continued "my deeply considered opinion that the time has now arrived when the effort to curtail government services in order to effect comparative real savings should cease and a policy of putting new money into circulation should be embarked upon. We are vainly pursuing two contradictory policies in trying to oppose the rehabilitation of government finances and at the same time making more government expenditure possible."

He pointed to the tax-payer and the producer of adopting all the recommendations of the recent Expenditure Advisory Committee and taking of the graduated Poll Tax would be so trivial as to be of no real assistance toward the country's recovery. On the other hand if Government can show a substantial surplus for next year that the country has got through the crisis and is on the road to recovery, the case is straight away made out for immediate application of the new Land Bank capital, and for expenditure upon reconstruction schemes."

Mr. O'Shea hopes that it will be possible for him to attend the Convention next week, in which case he will advocate that instead of the graduated Poll Tax being withdrawn, Government should render the cost of the new Land Bank, and that permission be sought from the Imperial Treasury for three years' suspension of the sinking fund charges on the government loan, the savings to be devoted to relief of the primary producers.

are found. The strike of these zones is persistent and may be followed for a great distance but the gold content is erratic. The zones follow the contact of the slate and strong granite, and gold-bearing quartz veins have been found in the granite.

Kisumu Prospecting Syndicate. The claims held by this old established syndicate lie at the contact of the granite and slate where numerous small quartz veins have been discovered. An interesting feature of this property lies in the fact that the gold which is derived from these veins has been caught in an adjoining laterite deposit and for many years this material was mined with successful results. The property was sold recently and the new owners are now developing the quartz vein.

Kenya Gold Mining Syndicate Ltd. The properties held by this company have been operated for a number of years and are known as Blackhall, Steels and M.K. They are all regular quartz veins carrying arsenopyrite and Bismuth.

Linos Limited. This company's claims are the most westerly of those found south of the Yala River. A variety of the Randed Ironstone runs through the property and within this a number of small quartz veins have been explored. C. F. Syndicate. These claims adjoin those of Linos Limited and lie to the east. A good deal of trenching has been performed on the continuation of the Randed Ironstone, which here approaches in character a highly ferruginous quartzite. No underground work at depth had been performed at the time of the visit.

Mr. W. P. Alderson's Exploratory Prospecting License. The area held by Mr. Alderson under license is north and west of the junction of the Kaka and Gora Rivers. The country rock is a hornblende schist and this is traversed by a series of doleritic and felsite dykes. Associated with this is a number of quartz veins of which the most promising are now being developed.

#### Kakamega Area.

Edwards Mining Company. The claims of this company are situated on the right bank of the Edwara River a mile or so below the Kakamega Kisumu road. The ore is mined from a series of small veins and

lenticles found in the ophiolite quartzite contact described previously. They appear to be extraordinarily rich and in the course of their weathering have taken quite a different character and originally barren country rock so making a zone two feet to three feet wide of payable ore.

Kakamega Ore Reduction Co. A similar occurrence to the above is found on this company's claims and the weathered country rock carrying from one to three dw. is being treated.

Leakey's Claims. These are situated below those of the Edwara Ridge Mining Company on the left of the Edwara River. The gneiss that is being exploited runs across the river and is about 2 m. wide. It places it is said to have carried 7 to 10 oz. of gold to the ton.

Willmore's Claims. These lie to the south of the Anshira Hill. An open excavation has been made on a small line 30 ft. long and a recovery of 1 oz. to the ton is said to have been made.

S. M. Syndicate. This company was developing claims situated to the north of the Yala River and opposite Kiss Hill. The ground that is being explored is on a similar contact to that described on page 22 and the local conditions are found in few small veins, some rich, some poor with a dissemination of gold through the south-west rock. The company is also exploring claims belonging to the Yalaka and Sokoia and to the south where the ground rises sharply to 200 feet above the rivers. An outcrop of zirconiferous laterite is present in the area. 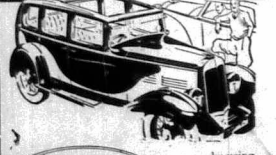

Standard," Sir—In view of the fact that the majority of the Ratepayers will agree with Council's view that I talked rubbish at the Council meeting last Tuesday on the subject of Nairobi Street lighting, I would crave the courtesy of your columns for the purpose of undertaking to correct such an impression...

TEA BREAD

It is common knowledge that for over 15 years, applications from many parts of the Empire and roads have been in (from of Council). Nothing was done until May 1928 when a correspondence was started between the Council and the Packer's Company in which the latter offered the services of the British Tea and Food Co. Ltd. to lay out a scheme of the distribution of street lighting...

It was decided to recommend to Council to appoint a sub-committee consisting of not more than four members, to devise an im-

proved scheme of street lighting and to consider the various requests which have been made for extending the street lighting to districts which are not at present lighted, and that the Sub-committee report direct to Council on the matter at an early date as a practicality.

To date August 1935 no report has been received. Very sorry. Owing to this delay I supported the request of the Native Affairs Committee that it was urgently necessary to light the Quarry Road housing. The Council on Tuesday refused my request, although in my opinion a very strong case can be made for an immediate execution of this particular work. Further, I was approached by a very industrious Ratepayer asking for my support that this lighting was essential and I personally investigated the position and arranged with the Municipal Engineer to make a plan for the housing lighting requirements. One of the arguments produced by Council members was that the whole scheme of street lighting will soon be revised, (sic) and alterations may have to be made in my installation that may be considered later. I am not at all in favour of this excuse, as the particular type of lighting that may be proposed for general street lighting and lighting on the lighting proposed for a block of buildings which included a dwelling house to be tenanted by a doctor and visitors thereto. I repeat, however, will consider my accusation and if my constituents considered that my statement was "rubbish" I am prepared to offer my resignation to them. I mentioned some time ago that unless some strong body of ratepayers express their opinion in a motion before the Council of the Town would definitely deteriorate. If it takes seven years to come to a decision with regard to what I consider a matter of domestic detail, how long shall we have to wait until our new water scheme is installed?

THE NANI BEAR?

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—On Monday, August 29, I was travelling by car to Kericho. About 7.30 am we were passing through V.C. Turner's camp on the foot of the Nandi hills. In the distance, Matson and Kilgus. In a dry ditch, about a mile beyond Mr. Turner's camp, I saw a Nandi. I saw the Nandi driver saw an animal which was stalking. It was about the size of a full grown dog, but heavier build and hung on the hind legs in a manner similar to a baboon. I could discern yellow spots underneath in the place of the belly. It had a heavy long tail. I would like to mention that the Nandi had a long ear and journey was a class of bear with my bush at Nakuru. I have been over twenty-five years in Kenya, and have shot and trapped during that time most of Kenya's animals. I have never seen anything like this animal in Kenya before, and the distance which I saw it was not more than ten feet.

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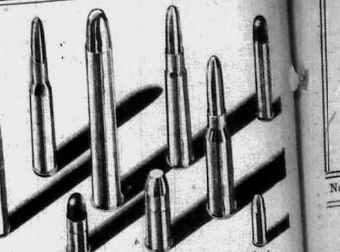
