EXPLICIT DECLARATION BY ITALIAN CABINET

Reply to League Speeches

The Cabinet, which sat since 10 a.m. today, has examined the circumstances under which Italy's continued membership of the League of Nations would be rendered impossible...

Signor Mussolini's communique adds that the Ministers feel it their duty to reaffirm in the most explicit manner that the Italo-Abyssinian dispute does not admit of a compromise solution after the vast efforts and sacrifices made by Italy.

PREPARATIONS PROCEEDING

From the military point of view, states the communique, the Italian preparations in East Africa are proceeding with greater intensity in order to guarantee Italy against the preponderating Abyssinian forces whose mobilisation is now in progress.

In view of the restlessness demonstrated in certain Cyrenaican circles, the reinforcement of Italy's defenses in Libya is progressing.

CAN MEET ANY THREAT

On the basis of the detailed information supplied, it is stated that the total Italian military, naval and air forces were sufficient to meet any threat, from whatever source it emanated.

The Cabinet sat for two and a half hours with 11 Duce presiding over a full attendance of Ministers. It considered the situation created by the British and French declarations at Geneva.

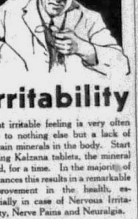

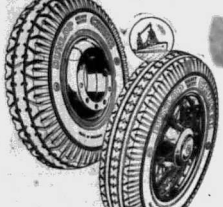

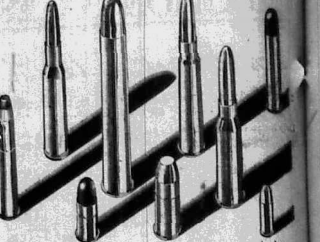

In an address to a specially convened meeting of the Reichstag on Sunday night, Herr Hitler spoke of Germany's desire for peace and immediately proceeded to deal with the question of Memel which he said must receive Germany's attention.

Referring to Memel, he said, and still others: "Peaceful Memel had been taken by Lithuania. The purpose of Memel have been oppressed for years. Germany must give attention to this matter. Representations to foreign Powers have been fruitless and Memel citizens have been treated worse than orientals."

The Fuehrer, speaking ironically, said that the recent Congress of the Congress at Moscow had clearly underlined the statement of the Lithuanians that they were not going to interfere in the politics of their country.

Herr Hitler appealed to the League to prevent things which might be regretted by all concerned.

The Kenya Problem

DEVALUATION

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir—I have read Major Graham's article and letters and the correspondence which has arisen therefrom with considerable interest and should like to set down the conclusions I have come to. I have no pretence of being a financial or economic expert. I do this with considerable diffidence, but I have no doubt some of your correspondents will correct the fallacies in my conclusions.

To begin with, I take it that the devaluation of the Kenya shilling will not cause a rise in local costs. For instance, if I now pay Shs. 20/- to Government for my Education Tax, I shall still pay only Shs. 20/- of devaluated shillings and I pay a boy Shs. 10/- now, I should still pay only Shs. 10/- of the devaluated shilling.

In the same way prices for locally sold produce would remain the same in Kenya shillings, for they would actually be lower in terms of sterling.

Taking this for granted, I would examine the effect of devaluation on the various groups of the Kenya population and for this purpose I would divide the population into three groups. I. Primary producers, black, brown or white, who produce entirely or mainly for the export market.

II. Secondary producers who produce entirely or mainly for the local market.

III. The merchant and trading community.

IV. Government servants and paid employees of private firms and companies.

V. The Government itself including the Railway and Post services.

I. This group would undoubtedly benefit as before. In fact, if they produce as before on world markets and receiving payment in sterling or its equivalent in Kenya shillings. It is in fact business he is exactly where he was before, but he is better off. For instance, if a coffee planter sells a bag of coffee on the London market for Shs. 100/- if am making no attempt at securing favour he can either spend the Shs. 100/- on importing goods such as say, gunny bags of fertiliser or change them into 132 1/2 Kenya shillings and pay taxes, wages or other local expenses. In any case I would place producers of coffee, steel, wool, cotton, tea, gold, tin, etc., and more to a certain extent.

II. This group would lose by the change. A member of this group sells his produce for Kenya

shillings and in so far as he uses local articles or pays wages, taxes, etc. he is in the same position as before. If for some reason he has to import goods he has to convert Kenya shillings into sterling and loses on the deal. For instance, if a wheat grower who now gets about Shs. 15/- for a bag of wheat, would locally will get Shs. 15/- in Kenya shillings, but if he wishes to buy a pair of boots or buy extra for his new English, though he must change his Shs. 15/- into Shs. 11/- sterling and will therefore have to sell more bags of wheat to buy his new English. In this group, I would place producers of wheat, sugar, dairy produce (partly timber, fish, poultry products, maize (partly) etc. This group is by no means negligible. While it may not count so much in the aggregate, it probably contains a great number of individual farmers and the greater part of the Native population. Obviously there will be a certain amount of over-issuance of Kenya group (I) and (II). For instance, maize and dairy products are sold partly locally and partly on the London market.

III. This group will not be very much affected. They will merely pass on the increased cost of imported goods to their clients. For instance, one who used to be paid for 4,000/- Kenya shillings will now get for £280/-. Their local expenses, taxes, incomes and salaries will be smaller but their tax will probably be smaller, especially where their clients are long to groups II and III.

IV. They produce nothing except labour and will get a smaller amount than before. They will pay the same for local produce of course but receive for all imported goods, petrol, clothing, drink, etc. This group is a very large one, especially among the spending power and its reduced spending power will react on groups II and III.

V. The Government itself has seen it stated that government's contracts will be home-purchased services are in terms of sterling. I do not know if this is correct but if it is, it would place a serious question in the same position as group I and would make the position of group V even worse.

VI. The Government group would be no heavier. All their revenue in taxes, incomes, and freight, etc. would be reduced by a third and their heaviest expenses in the way of loan interest, imported material, cost of leave, passage, etc., would remain the same. Their local expenditure would be smaller but I think there is little doubt they would be lower on the deal.

I have not included banks in my survey. For one thing, I am as far as I can be a financial expert and for another the contribution of the banks to the country's recovery has not been so great as many of them much popular sympathy for the banks in any case. As they scored heavily when the rupee was pegged at two shillings, there was to be some justice in a reduction of the country's overdrafts.

In conclusion, I would say that those who point to the benefits of devaluation in such countries as say, Australia, have forgotten that the Australian farmer can buy a much greater proportion of his requirements in his own country. The same applies to the South African farmer and the other export farmers machinery produced by the same firm.

I consider that a greater proportion of the community would be losers rather than gainers under

devaluation and I therefore remain and sign myself.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir—The deputation of the Convention was well reminded by His Excellency that there were other matters than the agricultural involved in the question of devaluations. The agricultural industry in this country has been spread almost from the inception and if the question of mortgage relief and a moratorium is to be gone into, it is an incontestable fact that a part of the mortgage should be taken into account and the rest left to go down.

People who have made this country their home for the last 40 years are not a negligible number, but having lost everything, just as well as having lost their investments, and being on the question of mortgage and a moratorium, it is as well to consider all mortgages whatever. There are many mortgages who have paid an interest, as much as the original lent, and over. If possible, it would be good if the Agricultural Bank could for ever all mortgages whatever and spread the requirement over a period of 30 years or more. To-day property is being mortgaged and sold for one-fifth its value of a few years ago. I do not see the conditions as being sympathy and urgent attention.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir—We must thank you very much for exposing the only alternative to devaluation, in the down right way of Kiala men. But 25 per cent. of the producers of Kenya up-country produce should be those that would perhaps amount to 500 producers of maize and coffee in Kenya and give their wives and families. It would be a bit of a mistake, but if we did not know any other way of Kiala men, we would be glad to see coffee the price of these articles would remain the same. But the proposals of devaluation, in fact, that the fall in prices is a worldwide phenomenon. We must therefore look at our massacre from the point of view of the English producers of maize, cotton, sis, etc. Having sold 500 ounces of maize for the Kiala solution and forthwith about 50/- a bush of maize, the English manufacturers in England with their wives and families. Unfortunately for us these second 500 are consumers of coffee and maize—at least of those who are in the Kiala solution, but would be applied once it is the only way of raising world price.

The greatest advantage I can see in the Kiala method is that it requires less brains to understand it. If you shoot half the inhabitants of the Earth and don't bury their money in their coffins with their remaining inhabitants will still have the double the money they had before. The price level would not be about where it was in 1928, a few fewer producers, and all consumers will double the money, there would be no overproduction. This is precisely the view that bankers,

money lenders, and anti-devaluationists take. They don't shoot the producers and consumers, they starve them to death, ruin them in bankruptcy, render impossible the education of the children, prevent the marriage of the young, and the birth of children.

Their whole idea is that the other hand say that money costs nothing. It is only printed paper and figures written in leaden letters. They say the amount of money in the hands of each inhabitant of the earth should be doubled by issuing more paper or writing more figures in bankers' books. I know it is a most terrible crime in the eyes of money-worshippers. But it is not generally a slight half the inhabitants of the Earth? Yours etc. "SRYZGY," Nairobi.

Italy Determined to Go to War

MUSSOLINI BLAMES LEAGUE AND ABYSSINIA "Too Late to Stop" ABYSSINIA PREPARING FOR A GENERAL MOBILISATION "We march on. It is too late to tell us to stop," declared Signor Mussolini in an interview with the correspondent of a London newspaper.

AN ETHIOPIAN DECREE Reuter's correspondent at Addis Ababa cables that a decree ordering general mobilisation and the proclamation of martial law in all parts of Ethiopia will be signed and awaits the Emperor's signature. It will be signed immediately if, as it is feared here, Italy rejects the recommendations of the Committee of Five and withdraws from the League.

OFFERS OF HELP Another Reuter message states that five thousand Irishmen have offered to fight for Ethiopia in the event of war with Italy, according to a Government statement. In addition, 3,000 Frenchmen, and hundreds of British, Germans, Brazilians and Russians have also volunteered to serve in the army, but secretly any offers are being accepted.

Criticism of British Policy [THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCY.] London, September 16. As a preliminary step to the signing of a new pact, British ministers are giving consideration to the fact that the risk of damage or loss from war would be to be seriously involved after the treaty has expired.

At Gibraltar Gibraltar, September 16. It is officially announced that an obstruction has been placed across the southern entry of the Admiralty harbour, and passage through the entrance is prohibited.

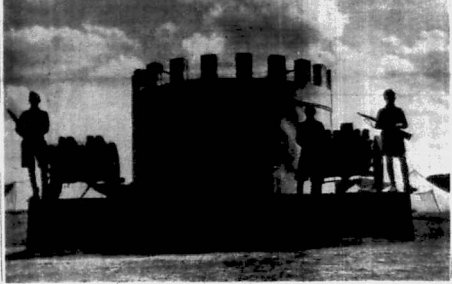
Assurances to Egypt Cairo, September 16. It is officially noted that as a result of the conversations between the Premier, Nessim Pasha and the Acting High Commissioner on the issue of Egypt in the event of war, the Egyptian Government has obtained a written undertaking from the British Government that Britain will not interfere with Egypt's rights and that British officials will not take any special measures in Egypt except in agreement with the Egyptian Government.

Kelly, has stated that the Egyptian Government has not mentioned the Premier's statement that His Majesty's Government was fully aware of the situation of Egypt and has advised in previous full reports.

LEAGUE COUNCIL Poland, Rumania & Ecuador Elected [THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCY.] Geneva, Sept. 16. Poland, Rumania and Ecuador have been elected to the Council of the League of Nations.

LETTERS DELAYED THROUGH ITALY [THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCY.] Rugby, Sept. 17. The Post Office is making enquiries regarding complaints of delay and non-delivery of letters sent through Italy, especially to and from Malta. It is thought that the delayation may be due not to any deliberate act but to changes in personnel in Italy consequent upon mobilisation and the demands on transport for the movement of troops.—British Official Wireless Service.

MAULED BY LEOPARD Further Details of a Uganda Incident [STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.] Kampala, September 16. Mr. S. F. Grey, the engineer in charge of the tug serving the Kagera River, was badly mangled by a leopard last Sunday week. He had gone ashore to about noon for his regular work when quite unexpectedly the leopard sprang out from the bush and attacked him, biting his right arm and left thumb badly. A native boy was also mangled. Mr. Grey shot the animal which made off into the thick scrub, badly wounded. He then walked the five miles back to the boat and attended to his own wounds and those of the natives.

SIR SAMUEL HOARE To Spend a Few Days Resting in Country [STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.] Rugby, Sept. 17. The Foreign Secretary, Sir Samuel Hoare, who will suffer from the after effects of a recent attack of arthritis, is leaving London tonight for a few days rest in the country.—British Official Wireless Service.

Stabilisation of Currencies French Proposal to Powers Geneva Discussion PLAN DESIGNED TO AID INTERNATIONAL TRADE [THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCY.] Geneva, Sept. 17. The proposal that the principal commercial powers should make the experience of the provisional stabilisation of their currencies in order to give international trade a chance of recovery without being unduly exposed to daily fluctuations, was made today by the French Minister of Commerce, M. Bonnet, to the League of Nations Commission dealing with commercial questions. M. Bonnet added that France was willing to make provisional agreements with liberal limits with all countries agreeing to stabilise their currencies at a given rate for the duration of the agreement. The Commission agreed to give members a chance of examining the subject before replying.

British Isles Swept by Fierce Gales

MUCH DAMAGE DONE AT SEA AND ON LAND Channel Service Cancelled The British Isles were subjected yesterday to heavy gales which did a great deal of damage at sea and on land. For the first time for many years the cross Channel service from Folkestone to Boulogne was cancelled.

A Lost Submarine [BY WIRELESS.] Rugby, Sept. 17. Early this morning gales were raging over a wide area that embraced a large part of the Bay of Biscay, the south coast of England, and stretched into the Atlantic as far as 200 miles west of Ireland. A gale of 36 miles an hour was recorded in the Solly Isles. The storm moderated slightly later but at noon today the gale was still blowing and occasionally heavy seas were running in the Channel and off the south-western coast.

Call for Help When the storm was at its height an S.O.S. was received from the Elder Dumster steamer "Mary Kingsley," a four-stained steamship, near the Solly Isles stating that three of the crew were injured and the position was very critical. Assistance was offered by several vessels in the neighbourhood where the "Mary Kingsley" still lies, having been forced to leave to sea.

An Assurance by Lithuania [THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCY.] London, Sept. 16. It is learned in London that a satisfactory reply has been received from the Lithuanian Government to the representations of the guarantor Powers, England, France and Italy that the forthcoming elections in Lithuania should be carried out in accordance with the Statute of 1924.

The Kenya Problem
DEVALUATION
To the Editor, "I, J. D. Standard, am sorry to see from your account of the Government proceedings that they eight men here had from the whole and carried a Resolution proposing 'Devaluation'. These thirty-eight gentlemen have made such a show of the question that what is now felt can come forward as currency experts and definitely pronounce that 'devaluation' is not the 'correct' method of dealing with the more serious falling of the value of the Kenya Shilling for careful consideration.

Mr. Z.—"And I've got a new thing special outside at school in England to whom I am just like in present by name Shs. 1,000/- or 150 each quarter, so about my salary of Shs. 20,000/- per month, should 'devaluation' come about I would find it impossible to run the Shs. 1,000/- which would then be required to make up the quarterly 150 payable in England, without an increase in my salary. Campbell Black's New Attempt

Cabled information was received in Nairobi yesterday that Mr. Tom Campbell Black intended to start from England at 4.9 p.m. yesterday (British Summer Time, equivalent to 4.30 p.m. local time) on an attempt to break the England-Cape flight record.

Increased Exports and Imports July Figures NEARLY 50 PER CENT BETTER THAN A YEAR AGO

An increase of exports amounting to 4.5 per cent over the previous July is reported by the Tanganyika Trade and Information. Local Agency Council for the month of July 1950. Products of the value of £115.21 were exported, a figure exceeding by 130,000 shs. the corresponding figure for July 1949. The increase in value and the export of coffee increased in quantity, though value dropped.

The exports for the first seven months of the year amount in value to £1,911,683 which compares with £1,312,603 during the same period last year and with £1,199,100 for the corresponding total for 1950. The increase this year over last is therefore £792,450 or 27.2 per cent.

The biggest increases are in cotton, groundnuts, gold and sisal. The tonnage of coffee exported increased by 100, but the value was £28,000 less.

Cotton's Huge Leap In terms of percentage, sisal increased 16 per cent in quantity and 2 per cent in value, but 20 per cent in quantity and 33 in value, cotton 100 per cent in quantity and 214 in value.

The danger of 'villadom' deepening the history of England's coast was stressed by Dr. Vaughan Cornall, of Cambridge, in making a strong plea for the British Association for public ownership of coastal land where there are cliffs, which make up 200 miles of England's 1,800-mile coast line.

It suggests that under the Act the garden fronts of houses which are built up on the cliffs, for example, before it can be taken to make a real advance, is being the outstanding problems of residential. One might say that the problem of housing is not only a social problem, but a national one. It is a problem that is at least half a dozen different ways.

Dr. Cornall said that the cost of purchase would be relatively small—about £2,400,000.

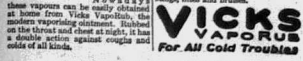

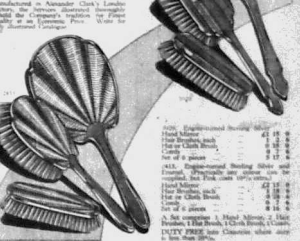

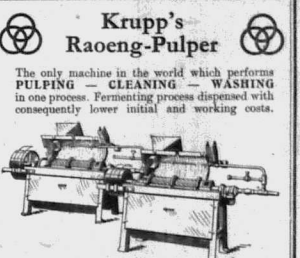

New Ships For The Union Castle

Passengers, Mail, and Cargo

Special Provision For Perishable Produce

PROOF of the increasing attention paid to the South African mail, passenger and cargo trade, and to the traffic along the East Coast of Africa, is provided by recent announcements of additions to the fleet of the Union Castle Mail Steamship Company, Limited, and its subsidiary company, Messrs. Bullard, King, and Company.

The most notable of the Union Castle Company's new ships is the R. M. V. "Stirling Castle," which has a gross tonnage of 25,000 (approximately). She is one of two Union Castle mail, passenger and cargo vessels under construction in the yards of Messrs. Harland and Wolff, Ltd., and was launched at Belfast on August 15. The launching ceremony was performed by Mrs. Robertson F. Gibb, the wife of the Chairman of the Union Castle Company.

Speed and Grace
Built primarily for the South African trade, under Board of Trade and Lloyd's survey, the "Stirling Castle" has an overall length of 725 feet and a beam of 83 feet. The high standard of

THE CONVENTION OF ASSOCIATIONS.
THE recent meeting of the Convention of Associations marks the beginning of a chain of events which may prove of great importance in the history of Kenya. It can be argued that the Convention itself accomplished little and the measure of its influence on the future is dependent on the action of the Colono's Vigilance Committee. I prefer to believe that the Convention re-energised and gave great force to the idea of East Africa as a Land of Destiny, dedicated the latter part of his life Since his death the idea has withered under the blows of economic adversity. This adversity, aggravated and intensified by weary years of deflation, and the prospect of recovery is paralysed by an outburst bureaucracy, has caused an intense revival of the demand for a greater measure of control over our destinies. There is nothing more powerful than a vital ideal, for history is little more than a sequence of events caused by the snail-like impact of a series of ideas.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.
The interest of this article will be focused on the Anglo-Kenyans' disquiet, and the efforts of the League of Nations to avert war. It has been argued that this generation will be judged by the ability, or failure, to hand on the League, not to its survivors yet another failure to preserve peace. Dr. H. Fisher, Reader in Public Administration in the University of London, has recently published, through Messrs. Odgers, a book called "Mussolini's Italy," which throws an interesting light on the League of Nations. In the course of his book, Dr. Fisher says: "I strongly suspect that Mussolini has a violent, if publicly controlled, nostalgia for Bismarck, the German Chancellor, who carried out his career in the League of Nations, and that he will not be able to resist the temptation of his power to anything else which threatens it—his remains in power."

STRIKING CONTRACT.

I am told that Mr. C. K. Archer was a most excellent Chairman. It was evident that he was far from well and yet he carried through a difficult task with courage, tact, and unflinching good humor. Mr. Archer's opening speech created an atmosphere, and set a standard, of astute simplicity and moderation which was maintained throughout the session. I wish that His Excellency, and others who delight in the thrills and the honor of the moment, should take a short course in ornithology and consign their shy head to a distant and misty no-man's-land.

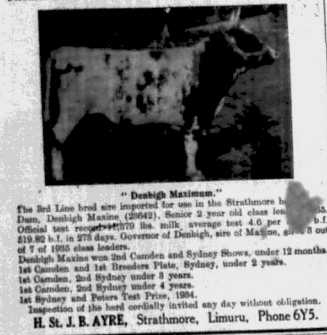

The response does not raise unless he has two quick tricks, or one suit with half weak distribution.

Play of this system must realize that an opening bid of one spade is unlikely to be raised, unless the response gives a forcing bid. Avoid opening a major suit with four, except in the case of four honours, with Ace/King/Queen and another and one Ace/King/Queen. Disparaging this maxim is a source of danger, as an enemy can reduce your trump to three.

An opening bid of one spade which offers two and a half quick tricks with other original bids of one spade, two hearts, or when vulnerable, three quick tricks with fair distribution. However, when holding three spades and two queens it is advisable to open with a two no trump bid.

To support an original no trump partner must have two quick tricks and a secondary trump.

When more than two quick tricks are in the minor suits it is better to open the bidding with no trump.

Any hand that contains three quick tricks and two secondary trumps must be bid as Two-Is a one club opening, you therefore inform your partner that you do not hold quite three and a half quick tricks. This is not forcing bid and the response should just say less than one and a half quick tricks.

Lastly it is fatal to take out your partner's denials from a weak suit; if you cannot show a quick trick or tricks remain silent.

TWENTY YEARS AGO.

The following extracts are taken from the East African Standard (founded 1904) for the week ending September 19, 1935.

While there have been few infantry actions on the Western Front, the violent artillery duels that have characterized the last fortnight, continue, particularly on the southern portion of the line. The French field artillery has proved much superior to that of the enemy. The Russian forces have secured a striking success in Galicia, where some 5,000 prisoners were taken. Von Hindenburg's forces have captured Skidat, but only after a terrific battle in which the final issue is still in doubt. The Dardanelles have been quiet for the past few days.

The most nation of the British Army amounts to an aggregate of 77,000,000 lbs. per annum.

A meeting of Legislative Council was held on Monday last at Government House, Nairobi, when the Registration of Persons Ordinance, 1935, passed through its various stages and became law.

Prices realized at recent stock sales are: Jubaland rubber, Rs. 125 to 145, novos; Col. S. H. grain, 140 to 160. Two films fetched Rs. 1,000, and more to follow Rs. 600.

On the East African front mounted infantry surprised and routed a body of the enemy on the morning of September 18; seven miles south of Malindi. The casualties were one officer and two men killed and seven wounded of the 12th Battalion, and one man of the 1st North Lincoln, wounded. On September 18th, a hostile party of 400 men, in a heavy force, was routed and was material captured. The enemy suffered losses in an attack upon a Belgian post near the Congo border.

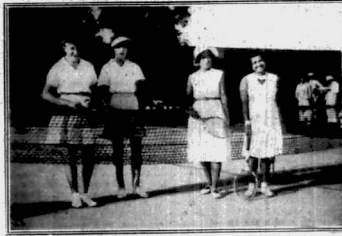

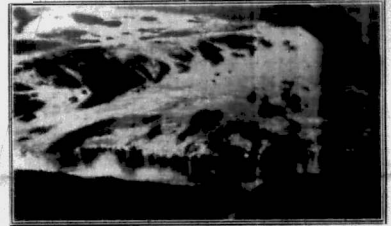

PERMANENT MANDATES COMMISSION

Sir Harold MacMichael on Tanganyika

IMPROVED FINANCES

At the thirteenth meeting of the twenty-seventh session of the Permanent Mandates Commission, held at Geneva, Sir Harold MacMichael, K.C.M.G., D.S.O., Tanganyika Territory introduced the annual report of Tanganyika Territory for the year 1934.

Replying to the welcome extended to him by the Chairman, Marquis Throbbin, he expressed the honour he felt at being invited to address the Commission on the stewardship fulfilled during the year 1934. The territory, he said, was prosperous, and its problems were multiple and extended over a wide area.
