

Kenya drive to offset cuts in timber exports

ALL-RACES STADIUM PLANNED IN NAIROBI

PLANS for an inter-racial stadium, open to all sports with facilities for football, athletics, cycling and boxing, have been drawn up at an emergency meeting of the Kenya Football Association, which has been set up to "keep the game as sound as possible," said Mr. G. D. Driver, president of Kenya F.A.

Running and cycling

To start the project, the F.A. has asked for a £10,000 government grant. A Colony-wide lottery will be held to raise the sum as soon as Mafundi Committee, a Kenyan lottery body, will be formed.

The stadium will be built on land outside Nairobi and work is due to start in January.

The stadium will feature modern changing rooms, indoor and outdoor running tracks to train the world's best athletes to train.

In the centre of the ground will be a football pitch 110 yards by 70 ft. The running tracks of international standard will be built around the football pitch.

Outside the track will be a cycling track 1,000 ft. long and three-and-a-half laps to a mile.

Representative games

The stadium will be used for all types of representative games that will attract athletes to Nairobi in the Colours of their countries.

Friendly manner

"The United States is to protest 'most vigorously' to China over an attack made by Communist aircraft on two American rescue planes searching for survivors of a British airliner shot down off Hainan Island. The American pilots destroyed the two Chinese fighters.

According to the Foreign Secretary, told the Commons earlier that the Chinese Charge d'Affaires in Peking has been instructed to convey the United States protest to the Chinese Government about the air incident and to demand an investigation on the airliner and 'the wanton interference with search and rescue operations in the vicinity of the incident.'

The Foreign Secretary also announced in Washington to minimise the seriousness of the second incident when he informed members of the Senate Select Committee of the second incident a few hours after the radio had carried a Chinese Government apology to Britain for shooting down the Skymaster airliner on Friday.

Royal Air Force transports flying between Hongkong and Nanking have had their routes altered to avoid the two miles off Hainan Island, the Air Ministry said yesterday.

Mr. Anthony Head, Minister of State for Air, said the fighters had been sent to Hongkong as a result of the friendly manner in which the Chinese had reacted to the American attack.

Mr. Head said: "I am sure that the Chinese will protest against this 'wanton interference with a humanitarian rescue operation being conducted over the high seas.'

Mr. Charnley, Secretary of State for Defence, later disclosed that the American team from the United States had been welcomed by the Chinese after they had been attacked and fired on by a Chinese LA7 aircraft, a low-level fighter-bomber, said to be of the Communist Air Force.

In London, Sir Winston Churchill called a Cabinet to discuss the second incident. It was announced that British

and American forces were to be involved—several British and American aircraft were based in Singapore and Hong Kong—and all military flights over Hainan were suspended.

The announcement issued by the Foreign Office on Saturday, July 24, had ordered two United States aircraft to the area and ordered them to proceed to the nearest friendly port. The two American aircraft had been shot down.

The United States can no longer afford to risk its aircraft to protect most vigorously the British and Chinese teams, and the American team had to make a hasty withdrawal with a dangerous interference with a humanitarian rescue operation in the vicinity of the high seas.



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
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
