## THE SECRETARY OF STATES' STATEMENT.

### Reply to Critics.

#### WHY IT WAS NECESSARY TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE.

In view of the controversy in the British Press over the amendment to the Native Lands Trust Ordinance, necessitated by the discovery of gold at Kakamega, the Secretary of State recently issued an authoritative statement on the subject.

#### African Interests Safeguarded.

The statement reads as follows:—A full statement on the position was made by the Secretary of State for the Colonies in reply to questions in the House of Commons on the 29th December, 1932. Since then some criticism has been made, based largely on a misunderstanding of the facts.

As this cannot at present be included in Parliament, it is desirable that the position should be made clear in an authoritative statement.

In East Africa, minerals are the property not of the occupiers of the land (whether European or native) but of the Crown. Large areas have from time to time been set aside for the benefit of the native tribes and the creation of such native reserves has in no way infringed the Crown's ownership of minerals in or under the soil.

The Ordinance passed in 1932 (The Native Lands Trust Ordinance) established the principle that the lands thus reserved (totalling nearly 81,000,000 acres) should remain for the use and benefit of the native tribes of the Colony for ever. These lands were placed under the control of a Central Board, Trust Board, and Local Boards were created in each district to administer the Central Board's lands.

The Ordinance also provided that, with the advice and consent of the Central Board, the Governor could exclude from a Native Reserve land required for any purposes as railways, roads, quarries, towns, waterworks, and for the development of the mineral resources of the Colony. Where any such exclusion was made an equivalent area of land was to be added to the Reserve. It is clear from the terms of the Ordinance that the exclusion of land was not a purpose of the Ordinance.

Following upon the Report of the Joint Commission of Parliament of 1931 a Local Commission was appointed to examine the needs (both present and prospective) of the native population in the Kenya Colony and to report on the desirability and practicability of various methods of satisfying these needs.

## NOT A SOLUTION OF THE KENYA CATTLE PROBLEM.

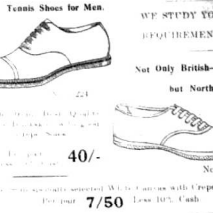

# DEVELOPMENT OF KAVIRO NDO GOLDFIELD

## Sir Albert Kitson's Second Report.

### OPPOSES GRANT OF SOLE PROSPECTING LICENCE.

### Company's Offer Criticised.

### RECOMMENDS FIVE DIVISIONS WITH TWO FREE PROSPECTING AREAS.

Sir Albert Kitson's proposals for the settlement of the problem raised by the application by Tanganyika Concessions Ltd. for a sole prospecting licence over nearly the whole of Kaviro Ndo (5,000 square miles) are that the Kaviro Ndo goldfield should be divided into five parts, in two of which general prospecting should be permitted.

Tanganyika Concessions should be offered an option over any one of the remaining three areas and Government should be prepared to receive from them or from any other companies or individuals applications for portions of the remainder.

### Government Appeal To Public.

The Government of Kenya issued yesterday the main Report by Sir Albert Kitson, C.M.G., C.B.E., M.I.M.S., upon the application made by Messrs. the Tanganyika Concessions Ltd. for a sole prospecting licence over nearly the whole of Kaviro Ndo (5,000 square miles) in the North Central and South Kaviro Ndo districts of the Colony.

When he arrived in the country some months ago, Sir Albert Kitson was to carry out the preliminary work in connection with a geological survey with special reference to Kakamega. His application was referred to him for his advice.

In a brief introductory note it is revealed that the Report published yesterday was received from Sir Albert Kitson in November. A further announcement will be made as to the policy which Government proposes to adopt as a result of the report.

Resulting from the announcement of the Government of Kenya attaches the greatest importance to the continued discovery of these areas being most strictly observed and hopes that in the general public interest the co-operation of the public is secure this may be forthcoming. Proved areas of unobstructed prospecting in these areas will be most rigorously dealt with.

### No Sudden Action.

"The East African Standard" understands that no sudden action will be taken in connection with the above areas, but if Government decides to accept the recommendation, proper warning will be given of the opening of new mining areas of this area soon.

The report opens by reproducing the text of the application by Tanganyika Concessions Ltd. dated November 1931 and signed on behalf of the company by Mr. G. A. Stewart. The applicant also asks for a grant of a sole prospecting licence for a certain area and also for the grant of a prospecting licence for a certain area of the river and lake beds only in the area of the concession but in the whole of the North Central and South Kaviro Ndo districts.

The Company were willing to proceed in prospecting a concession area of 2,000,000 during the first five years which would include the right to work in the area of the concession and also to work in the area of the concession and also to work in the area of the concession.

On March 19, 1932 the Kenya Government gave notice to the applicant of the Mining Ordinance an area of approximately 5,000 square miles in the North Central and South Kaviro Ndo districts.

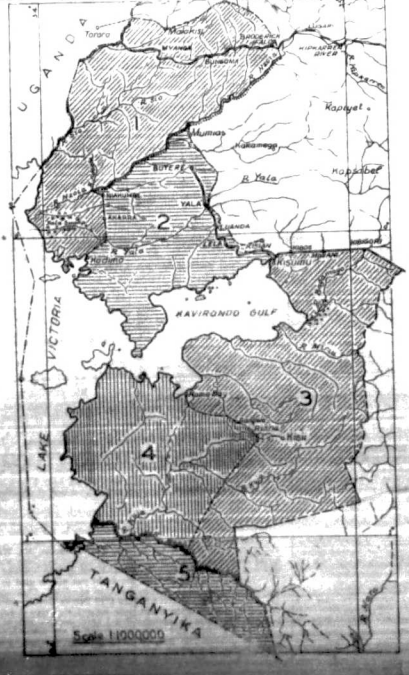
Objections were made by several organisations and a licence was granted to the applicant.

### Objections Reviewed.

Sir Albert Kitson reviews and summarises the main objections forwarded. The objections held that the grant of such a large area was not in the best interests of Kenya and that there should be competition among applicants. They claimed that the Kaviro Ndo goldfield was discovered by Kenya prospectors without aid from any large company, that they were better able to give the country a thorough prospecting and that companies should come in after prospectors had made discoveries. It was urged that the grant of a large company financed from outside Kenya would go out of the Colony and it was stated that the grant of an exclusive prospecting licence over the whole of Kaviro Ndo, including Kakamega, would deprive the energies of Kenya men and destroy their initiative.

### Partial Examination.

In order to advise on the matter Sir Albert Kitson considered it necessary to examine the area although he was unable to do so fully owing to the indifferent conditions combined with the very small size of the area.

3. What is the comparison between the total expenditure proposed by the applicant company and the probable expenditure by Kenya men over any definite area?

4. What is the comparison between the benefits derivable by Kenya under (1) the applicant company and (2) Kenya miners?

5. Is it advisable to limit the possible extension to south-west and extension of the Kakamega goldfield by an arbitrary boundary as the field is so small?

### Questions Answered.

The report thereafter proceeds to answer these questions. "In my opinion" states Sir Albert Kitson, "it is not advisable to grant an exclusive prospecting licence over very large areas in the only part of Kenya in which gold in profitable quantities has been proved to exist, and can be obtained by individual miners or parties of them with limited means, as in the Gory River goldfield in South Kaviro Ndo, and in areas contiguous to a goldfield (the Kakamega) in North Kaviro Ndo) the auriferous rocks which extend definitely into such contiguous areas. A field of the one metal that exists in a form readily available for sale and under certain conditions, as in these fields, is easily extractable at low cost and reliable at least without having to be treated metallurgically or otherwise as is the case with most of the other metalliferous minerals. In the case of the base metals—such as lead, copper, zinc, and iron—of which great quantities are required for expensive plants for mining, separation and smelting, strong, reputable companies with good financial resources and ability to wait indefinitely for a satisfactory return, are necessary. It may also be stated that at varying depths below the surface reef gold often occurs associated with ores of base metals. In such cases, expensive treatment and ore separation and treatment may be necessary before the metal or metals for sale can be obtained. This metal capital and so becomes a matter beyond the resources of the ordinary miner. This is a question for the strong company. It can purchase the mine from the discoverer and develop it. Thus instead of the strong company which desires an exclusive prospecting licence over an area being handicapped it is helped by being given the opportunity of carefully selecting promising auriferous occurrences to develop without all the preliminary prospecting and the expenditure of time necessary for that purpose."

Continuing, Sir Albert points out that strong reputable mining companies intent upon careful prospecting can do a great service to a country if their operations are keenly supervised by capable geologists and engineers. Without such supervision, there are numerous known instances of gross neglect on the part of some of their staff in doing their best, engaged solely upon a salary without any participation in the mine. "That is not the case when individual prospectors or parties of them as in Kenya are engaged in similar work because upon the successful results of their energy and industry depend in many cases relief from financial obligations and the instruction of their farms and other interests."

It is added that if expensive methods of work are necessary a strong company can provide costly mechanical aids and a laboratory and, if desirable, arrangements for the development of minerals found. These aids cannot be provided by individual miners or small parties of them with limited means.

**Small Prospector's Capacity.**  
While a strong company can supply the costly plant necessary for the discovery and development of ore deposits of lead, zinc, oil, sand or water, successful discoveries did not apply to all ores or minerals to be discovered. As regards gold, diamonds and mica, for instance, the discovery in small quantities with the ability of small financial interests and in some

World's Non-Stop Flight Record Broken.

ACHIEVEMENT BY ROYAL AIR FORCE OFFICERS.

London to Walvis Bay

SIX THOUSAND MILES COVERED IN FIFTY-SEVEN HOURS.

Squadron Leader Gayford and Flight-Lieutenant Nichollett, flying an R.A.F. Fairy-Napier monoplane have succeeded in beating the world's non-stop flight record by 266 miles. Leaving Cranwell at 7.15 a.m. on February 6, they landed at Walvis Bay in South-West Africa at 4.50 p.m. on February 9.

Their original intention was to fly to Cape Town, but owing to heavy weather in the Canaroes they had insufficient petrol for that purpose and decided to land in Walvis Bay satisfied that their chief objective had been achieved.

Details now follow the three main aviation records, namely: petrol, altitude and non-stop flying.

Three Records Now Held.

Rugby, February 8. Two important flights began today. A Royal Air Force Fairy-Napier long range monoplane left Cranwell at 7.15 a.m. on an attempt to fly to South Africa without an intervening landing and thus establish a world record non-stop flight. Squadron Leader Gayford and Flight-Lieutenant Nichollett are the pilots of the machine.

Meanwhile reports from Batavia state that the squadron of destroyers are fulfilling a search party preparatory to joining the fleet of the mutinous crew.

Renewed Offer of Terms.

Batavia, February 5. A renewed offer of surrender on the terms laid down in the previous message has been made by the mutineers on the "De Zeven Provinciën" in a fresh message. The message adds: "Please inform higher authorities that we are in no commercial league with any power and we are not in any way protesting against the war. Even the thing above is all right and there are no casualties." The "De Zeven Provinciën" is officially reported as steaming at a speed of seven knots along the coast of the South Sea Islands, Sumatra.

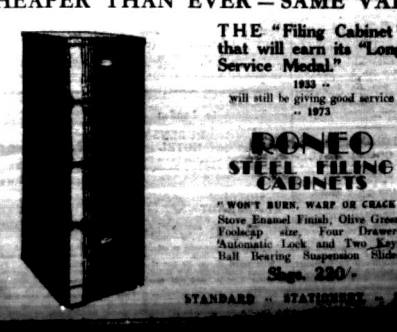

## Mr. Roger Gibb's Recommendations.

### ABOLITION OF POST OF COMMISSIONER.

### APPOINTMENT OF BOARD IN LONDON TO CONTROL RATING POLICY.

The report of Mr. Roger Gibb on railway rating policy and finance in East Africa was issued on Monday.

Mr. Gibb vigorously criticises the Railway Advisory Council and the policy in which the Kenya members believe that the railway should be used as an instrument for colonial development without any obvious railway reason in its favour.

He recommends abolition of the post of High Commissioner for Transport and of the Advisory Council in its present form.

In substitution thereof he proposes the appointment of a Railway Board sitting in London with representatives of all Governments in railway policy and the maintenance of Railway and Harbour Councils here on much the same lines as before but without the same influence.

Mr. Gibb thinks that there is no justification for the closing down of branch lines but he believes there is a case for the closing of the Nairobi-Kisumu line.

The rates classification and the principle on which the rates are based are regarded by him as the most important of the proposals. In prosperous times railway rates should be increased and should act like the bank rate, as a check on unbound investment and a safeguard against inflated land prices.

He is of the opinion that the maize traffic should be sacrificed to the interests of cotton if the transport problem cannot otherwise be overcome.

### Fate of Branch Lines.

# PRINCIPLES OF RAILWAY RATING.

## THE ABOLITION OF COUNTRY PRODUCE RATES.

### The Maize Industry.

IF NECESSARY, MUST BE SACRIFICED TO COTTON INTERESTS.

In the following further extracts from Mr. Roger Gibb's report on railway finance, his criticisms of distribution rates and country produce rates are set out. In both cases he recommends their abolition.

He considers that in regard to the latter the proper place is given to protection in an industry if protection is needed, as at the Customs barrier and maintains that if additional protection can be secured through the closed doors of the Railway Advisory Council the fact undermines public confidence in the soundness of the rating policy.

An important section of the report deals with maize and cotton rates. Mr. Gibb holds the view that cotton need on account of its association with lime is more valuable to the Railway than maize. If one traffic has to be sacrificed, that traffic must be maize.

He suggests that the Railway should concentrate on the transport of maize in January and the first three weeks of February; that from then, until the end of May, preferential treatment should be given to cotton seed and thereafter to maize.

He, however, an operating preference is given to Uganda cotton from March to May. The railway rate might be increased in accordance.

If the tonnage of maize still remained higher than the load which can be carried at 15s. 10 per ton the rail should be further increased.

### Distribution Rates.

In view of the importance of rates as a right factor in a road traffic, Mr. Roger Gibb's report on railway rates and finance, has been applied to all items which would be transported on the normal rates in all cases. The first sections given in detail elsewhere in this issue deal with the position of the Railway Advisory Council, the High Commissioner, and the Transport Manager. The first section of the report is devoted to present railway rates and proposed alterations.

Mr. Gibb points out that railway rates apply to 1. Goods and 2. Passengers. The former are divided into the following sub-sections: (a) District rates; (b) Country produce rates; (c) Mail and ocean rates; (d) Contracting and non-contractive; (e) Amendments to present rates to meet immediate needs.

### Distribution Rates.

Transporting distribution rates. Mr. Gibb states that these are applied to South Africa for the purpose of subsidizing the railway. Existing contracts against these rates are in force. He considers it is not making sense to have extended contracts in force which have been made on a basis which is no longer valid. He suggests that the rate for the transport of a given article should be a low rate for the first 100 miles and then to be raised to a normal rate for the rest of the journey. ### Hints on Tracing of Troubles.

### Causes of Sudden Failures.

In Kenya, roads are either bordered by deep ditches on one side and where sharp bends are frequently experienced, it behooves every driver to make sure that his lights, and that these are always in first class order. A sudden extinction of these may prove disastrous.

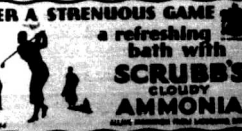

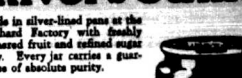

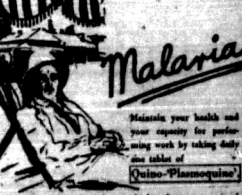

YAME RHINO AT NYERU

A Great Attraction to Visitors.

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.] Nyeru, February 4. The friendly rhino at Nyeru is proving a greater attraction than any numerous visitors go out to see them, and seldom fail to see the animal and leave laughing people wild within sight of the road. There are two bulls, four cows, and a half grown youngster which still follows its mother.

Two or three parties of people recently who went out to see them watched with some amusement and much disgust the efforts of the herd, as it failed the rhino drove wild in the long grass and bush. The watchers on the opposite bank could see both male and rhino, although they were both hidden from the other. 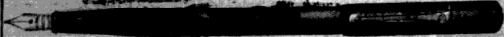

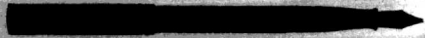

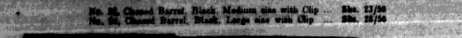
