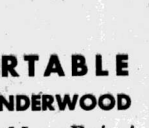

granted to this Department. Only after the suggestion that road company was necessary that the Railway found that it was doubtful if the Likoni ferry was a paying proposition and they were now anxious to let go of it.

It was an essential duty of Government to assume responsibility for trunk roads, a responsibility that they could not throw over its shoulders and that the Hon. Commissioner for Local Government should saddle a Municipal Board with what was a portion of a trunk road. Mombasa annually contributed some £20,000 annually to Government in the form of rates. He would not have believed, said the Hon. Member, that Government could ever consider such a Bill going through with the consent of any right-minded man.

The Hon. Member reiterated that it was the right and privilege of Government to maintain trunk roads and suggested that if Government dared to make the suggestion that a toll on any bridge for instance, should be levied north of Nairobi every newspaper, farmers' association, etc., would be up in arms over the proposal. Yet Council was now being asked to agree to a Bill that could result in the handing over of a right of way to a private company who might charge what they liked, and give what service they liked, without any redress to the public as the real owners. He could not have believed that such a suggestion could have emanated from a progressive Government.

The Nyali Bridge

He instanced the case of the Nyali Bridge and pointed out that Nyali Ltd. were allowed to spend a great deal of money on a large bridge and to try a toll on their own property, yet the right for ferries to ply between Taveta and the island had never been removed. The Railway collected the licence fees from such ferries, which equipped with the bridge and resulted in the company sustaining losses.

The Hon. Member repeated strongly the suggestion that a most important section of a trunk road such as the Likoni ferry, should be given over to a private company. He stated that he did not want a Select Committee. The Bill should be thrown out as a disgrace and opposed to the uttermost by justice. He trusted that a free

vote would be allowed on this matter and he was prepared to leave it to the discretion of the House whether this measure was passed or rejected.

Indian View

Mr. J. B. Panyava sympathized with the Hon. Member for the Coast and Members and asserted that the principle regarding ferries must be that they formed a part of the road system and as such ferries were essential to the proper development of markets and native produce. He did not oppose the handing over of the ferries to the Board but was opposed to any scheme of granting an exclusive lease to a private company. He stated that the realization of the principle of free ferries would be a benefit of no small importance.

The Select Committee still had power to alter the Bill and he did not think that an exclusive licence for the Likoni ferry should be permitted. If a public ferry which closed a public road, there were means of obtaining tolls, but if a private company had such powers it would inflict great hardship and retard the development of Coast production.

Closing of Ferris

At this juncture, Canon G. Burns (representing the interests of the African community) and that there were a few points which he wished to make clear. Reference had been made to all Coast ferries. Would the Board have full powers to fix the tariff for goods and passengers? If the ferries were leased to a contractor, would the latter have power to close any of the existing ferries? The Hon. Member made reference to the ferry between Taveta and the Island of Mombasa. The Hon. Member for Mombasa had stated that it imposed a hardship on Nyali Bridge owners if other ferries in their vicinity were permitted to ply.

The Hon. Member for the Coast interposed, on a point of explanation, that the Bill affected the ferries within the Mombasa Municipal area only. Canon Burns stated that such a limitation included the Pwani town ferry and he wanted to be sure that the users of this small ferry, a railway matter, would not be compelled to use the Nyali

Bridge. Such a compulsion would inflict hardship on many of the natives resident on that part of the mainland, who would be compelled to walk a distance of two miles to reach the bridge and also pay a heavy fee for transit, in some cases £2 and that he would like it to be clear that ferry contractors would not be in a position to close native ferries running between the island and the mainland.

Mr. Stansford-Deen also supported the Hon. Member for the Coast and Mombasa and added that he felt that the control of the ferry should be vested in the Municipal Board, but giving the people of the district an opportunity of expressing their views on the matter. He could not agree with the Hon. Commissioner for Local Government that the conditions in Mombasa regarding a bus service would be analogous with those existing in Nairobi, nor could he be applied to the Likoni ferry. People were compelled to use the Likoni ferry when coming from the southern part of the mainland. Therefore, he would prefer to see the Bill rejected, or so amended that natives and carriers of goods might have control of the ferry. The present trip with a cart, for instance, was atrocious.

Further Opposition

Lord Francis Scott (Edif Valley) also supported the opposition to the Bill and suggested that there was such a strong feeling at the Coast regarding the proposal Government would be wise to reconsider, or drop the measure and carry on as at present, with the Likoni ferry operation. The latter might be able to do something to improve the position.

At this juncture the debate was adjourned for the recess and on its resumption the Hon. Sir Ali bin Salim (Nominated Arab Member) expressed the view that the ferries should be kept by the Government and should be improved according to the promise made when they were originally taken over by the Government. The money derived from ferries within the Mombasa Municipal area should be spent on improvements for the benefit of people using them.

Mayor B. W. B. Robertson, Eastlea, contended that the ferries would be much better left to carry on under the present authority or under Government.

Retrospect Proposals

Capt. H. E. Schwartz (Nairobi South) said he could not subscribe to the suggestion that it would be better for the ferry, or any other concern, to be run by Government rather than a local authority. "It has been the policy of Ministers on this side of the House" he said, "to press for a greater measure of control by local authorities. That a proposal by Government to grant certain powers to a local authority should be cancelled in favour of granting such powers to Government must be a retrograde step."

The Hon. Commissioner for Local Government, in replying to the debate, said he was grateful to the Hon. Member for Nairobi South for answering an important point. He added that the Mombasa Municipal authority was willing to take over the ferries, given the necessary safeguards. The Bill was then passed through its second reading, and referred to the Select Committee, together with the supplementary Bill.

Plant for Profit or Pleasure!

PASTURES FOR PROFITS.
One of the greatest difficulties about farming at present, declared Mr. Fisher, principal of the School of Agriculture, Coedara, was that people attempted farming on too big a scale.
"Mr. Fisher explained that if a year were spent on fertilizing each acre of grass, the value of that acre would be raised to anything between £40 and £100. The yield of milk from an acre of ordinary unfertilized sward was about 100 gallons; but as Coedara 1,200 gallons of milk had been obtained from an acre of improved and fertilized Kikuyu, and this yield was likely to be exceeded this year. They had already shown that it was possible to do much better with a small farm properly run than with a large one that was left more or less to chance."
Although it cost £4 annually to fertilize and improve one acre of Kikuyu grass, such an acre when improved was worth "anything up to £100". Calculating the price of milk at the low figure of 4d. a gallon, this yield gave milk of the value of £30; and if the farmer's total costs were £10 an acre, he still had a profit of £20 per acre.
On fertilized land Mr. Fisher said that he had succeeded in obtaining 662 lb. of butter from three Jersey on one acre of grass in one year, which represented a revenue of £29 2s., as well as the value of 1,100 gallons of separated milk. The cows also gained weight on this sward.

MUNICIPAL AERODROME AT NAKURU

New Lay-Out Almost Completed IMPROVED FACILITIES

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT], Nakuru. In November 1934 the Nakuru Municipal Board considered a memorandum drawing attention to the fact that the rapid extension and improvement of air services had made these services a factor of vital importance in commercial progress. It was pointed out that the Director of a new company, were inaugurating regular air services between Kisumu, Kitale, Eldoret, and the Goldfields, and linking up with Nairobi and the Coast, and would appreciate landing facilities at Nakuru but would not risk the landing of large machines on the present landing ground which was of insufficient ground and had an unsatisfactory surface. Unless these objections could be overcome the business interests of Nakuru would suffer, and the provision of adequate facilities for air services could not fail to assist in the restoration of prosperity and in the forward progress of the town.

Members agreed that the provision of satisfactory aerodrome was of vital importance to the town and that expert advice should be sought in order to select the site selected would meet all requirements. The District Commissioner, Colonel G. C. Griffiths and Mr. W. W. Crewell, with power to accept, were selected a Special Committee to consider and report upon the suggestion that a municipal aerodrome be established.

The Nakuru Chamber of Commerce active support of the proposal, and nominated the Manager of Galley and Roberts Ltd. as its liaison committee on the Board's Committee. The lengths of the two runways on the Government landing ground were only 500 yards and 600 yards respectively, whereas for large machines a length of 1000 yards was required. Such runways could not be accommodated in the existing Aerodrome Reserve. Various other sites, both within and without the municipal boundaries, were considered, but the expense of purchase defied a high budget, and a central position would be a great advantage. It was found that, by extending to the Aerodrome Reserve certain areas of adjoining Crown Land, provision could be made for three runways, each 1000 yards long, on the alignments of the prevailing winds. An expert opinion was called into consultation and expressed the opinion that this area could be developed to meet the requirements.

Revised Lay-Out In February a levels survey of the proposed alignments was made by the Works Superintendent and showed the gradients to be very much better than that required by the aviation authorities. Plans for the revised lay-out of the aerodrome were then prepared and received the approval of the Registrar of Aircraft. Provided adequate facilities were provided for commercial air services the Municipal Board was not concerned whether the new aerodrome was prepared and main- tained by Government or by the Municipal Board, but if Government were unable to undertake the work, the Board was prepared to do so. It was realised that for some years to come, such an aerodrome was not likely to bring in a re-

(Continued from page 1.) attitude of Italy receives vigorous criticism. The "News Chronicle" says that "whatever may be said about the policy which proposes to cede territory in order to settle a dispute which is no direct concern of ours it is clearly not selfish."

Straight Talk The "Manchester Guardian" says, now that the offer has been rejected, Signor Mussolini should be told "that the Powers cannot and will not countenance so gross an infringement of the Covenant and of the principle of collective security as would be any use, as force against Abyssinia."

"The Times" is of the opinion that Italy's grievances, some of which can be understood, "do not entitle her to run completely counter to treaties and other agreements which she herself has signed. Her policy is not in accordance, for instance, with the separate treaties which she has signed with Ethiopia, and with Great Britain and France. It is contrary to the spirit, both of the Kellogg Pact and of the Covenant. It frustrates the very foundations of the collective system. It casts reproach on the League of Nations, which have been signed spontaneously. For these reasons the British public and British public opinion, views with profound misgiving the Italian policy towards Ethiopia, and will wholeheartedly support the Government in any proposition which they may still consider to have the slightest prospect of producing a peaceful solution."

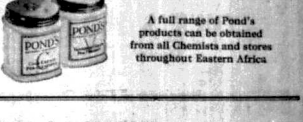

Status of Governors' Conference

PUBLIC APPREHENSION AT "COMPLETE SECRECY"

An Official Assurance

GOVERNMENT SAYS ORGANISATION IS ONLY AN ADVISORY BODY

That the Conference of East African Governors was assuming too great an executive power and that its proceedings were attended by quite unnecessary secrecy, having a debate in Legislative Council on a motion by Lord Francis Scott.

Government replied that the Governors' Conference was purely an advisory body; that none of its recommendations involving the expenditure of public money could be implemented without reference to the respective Legislative Councils; and that only those matters were referred to which obviously had no interest in the public interest be published beforehand.

Following a debate Lord Francis Scott withdrew the motion stating that it had been brought in order to bring to Government's notice public opinion on the question.

Debate in Council

At Monday's session of Legislative Council Lord Francis Scott moved the following motion—

"That, whilst realising that much benefit can arise from meetings of the Governors of the East African Territories, and that it is desirable that such meetings should be held as often as advantageous to the public interest, and that it is desirable that the status of the Governor's Conference should be clearly defined, and that the atmosphere of complete secrecy which it has hitherto maintained should be discontinued."

Speaking to the motion Lord Francis Scott traced the origin of the Governor's Conference, in the various reports of the Commissioner of the East African Territories in 1951, in which he stated that the various parts of the East African Territories were in a state of confusion and full discussion of mutual problems. At the same time a number of meetings had been held and had been initiated by the Hon. Shams-Ud-Den. He stated that it was impossible to have too close a cooperation between the various territories and the great benefits, both now and in the future, that the study of East African affairs were now being manifest.

Anomalous Position

Agricultural Advances

Referring to the Agricultural Advances Ordinance, Mr. Walsh stated that the provision was kept under consideration and detailed review by the Land Bank Board...

The motion, he went on, sought authority to write off £4,800 covering two advances deemed to be irrecoverable.

"It should be noticed," he added, "that under the Agricultural Advances Scheme a contribution has been made on interest on advances, after meeting all costs of administration, of a total sum of £13,082. This substantial sum should be in the nature of a contribution...

The Hon. Mr. Desser asked the name of the person or persons to whom the advances were made and the nature of the security on which the advances were made.

The Treasurer: "It is not the custom of Government to give names in circumstances such as these. (Applause). In every attempt has been made to secure returns on the advances and, therefore, results are impressive."

Advantages Outlined

The authors of the scheme propose that the holders of portfolios would be officers of experience capable of taking decisions and prepared to assume a considerable measure of responsibility.

Another argument advanced is that the public could get prompt and definite decisions from ministers who would meet daily as Ministers, instead of as a present having to wait the result of protracted inter-departmental correspondence and frequent unnecessary references to the Colonial Secretary and to the Governor.

Objections Met

Dealing with objections the Report says one would be that only few economies could be made with the existing departmental machinery and that the holders of high portfolios would require high salaries and some clerical assistance in carrying out their duties.

Secretary's Status

The adoption of these suggestions would further ensure the retention of the Secretary to his proper status of the Governor's business officer for the conduct of the Government's correspondence and correspondence to the Secretary of State...

Changes in the Kenya Government Machine

(Continued from page 8)

"We feel that these figures speak for themselves and economies in these unproductive administrative costs are long overdue. Under the present system in order to administer the Government we are paying under such heads as the Governor, the Secretary, Legislative Council, Conference of East African Governors and the Administration over £250,000 and yet over and above this sum we have to find a further £125,000 in order to 'stimulate executive, service, and technical departments and we feel that this £125,000 a very large proportion could and should be expended on direct services and not on the salaries of a largely non-productive clerical staff.

As a footnote to these remarks the two members believe that even under existing conditions the practice of retaining services and expenditure could be obtained if competent departments were generally adopted. From the evidence they had it appears that many officers drawing high salaries were appointed letters but liberally drafted them in long-hand. Many of the lady clerks employed by Government have a thorough knowledge of shorthand, but Government officers do not take advantage of their qualifications.

Minimum Staff

It is realised that this new organisation would not of itself solve the question of how recurrent expenditure could be reduced and kept within reasonable limits. The two members consider that adequate control will never be exercised until a recognised and rapid 'establishment' is adopted in regard to staff. Even should world conditions improve Kenya for many years must be administered on a minimum staff and recurrent expenditure is kept down to a minimum. When surplus balances become available productive expenditure can be incurred for special staff posts but in their view should be looked upon as recurrent. "This when world conditions are favourable in Kenya are not favourable we should have the minimum to care and when things are better we can afford to launch out an expenditure which will give to some capital asset in return without building up permanent millions round our necks.

This, they suggest, can only be done under a system which requires as permanent only the minimum establishment required in difficult times. All employees over and above this on temporary development works should be employed on a temporary non-permanent basis. The Local Council

Service is regarded by them as coming within the establishment. They understand that a similar system has now been adopted by the Harbour and Harbours and exists in other territories.

The two members of the Committee do not look upon the existing type of three year contracts with provisions for leave and passage as altogether satisfactory. In many cases officers who should only be engaged for special temporary work are not required for so long a period. "Admittedly a three months' notice of termination of employment clause is provided for in these standard agreements but this clause is never used by Government who appear to regard the expense of the rights for which provision has been carefully made by the Crown Agents as constituting something of a loss. We are at a loss to understand this contention as the contracts to which we refer are drawn up on similar lines to the usual contracts which exist as between employers and employees in civil life."

Decentralisation

In order to complete the picture of reconstruction the authors of the scheme considered it necessary that a fresh outlook should be obtained on the activities of some of the main spending departments, e.g. Medical, Education, Agricultural, Public Works, etc. and to this they apply the expression 'decentralisation' or the more definite partial transfer of the activities of these departments to an administrative basis. They consider that it is sometimes forgotten that the administrative officer must remain the spearhead of the attack on native backwardness and ignorance of all the matters covered by the activities of these departments. In the past, however, the development of these services had proceeded on an evenly balanced basis and the sense of proportion has been lost as a result of relying too long on an extension of the staff rather than on the necessary more advanced judgment of the trained administrator. Moreover they feel that the administrator, though primarily responsible for the advancement of the natives, has insufficient control of the various educational and developmental methods employed for that purpose. This has led to lack of co-operation, quality of results and dissipation of effort.

Using the language of engineers, they visualise a swarm of technical advisers and instructors who are in their special capacity to too great an extent a law unto themselves, loaned upon the unfortunate administrative officer on whom quite wrongly a whole lot of his collecting and office work has devolved endeavouring with insufficient powers to introduce some sort of coherency. They had heard it stated in evidence that the Provincial Commissioners had no knowledge of what was being spent on various services in their provinces. When Provincial Commissioners taken into the confidence of the Central Government the various services would be suggested and plans for a more co-ordinated development programme would be forthcoming.

Consolidation of Functions

They are aware that the Government instructions from time to time insisting on the fullest co-operation between departmental and administrative officers but consider that under the existing conditions and that in fact there is a real and serious loss of both office capacity and resources in the present complex system of departmental and administrative control. They therefore recommend that all technical officers engaged in field work should be posted direct to Provincial Administrations and that Government should seriously consider whether the necessary funds for their work should be budgeted for separately thus giving the Provincial Commissioners the necessary financial autonomy and a fuller measure of control of departmental activities in their provinces and districts. The two members do not suggest for a moment that Provincial Commissioners should endeavour to manage an engineer how to build a bridge or a doctor how to perform an operation or an agricultural officer how to grow crops but they do urge the importance of co-ordinating the work of technical staff under the control of officers responsible for administration. They also visualise the senior officers of each department posted to provinces bearing to a greater extent than the present kind technical advice of the Provincial Commissioners.

Provincial Budgets

The Report returns to the question of Provincial budgets making it clear that it would be undesirable to proceed beyond the point necessary to give the Provincial Commissioners financial autonomy for the performance of departmental activities in their provinces. It is pointed out that some thought might be given to building up extensive provincial secretariat's through various means forming the backbone of the service. The Report makes it clear that

research should not be carried out under the provincial system. It should be centrally co-ordinated having central hospitals, research institutes, the Agricultural Board etc. under the direct control of directors of departments.

Finally they emphasize that the attitude of the technical experts must of necessity be the finding of more technical work to be performed by an increased technical staff, while the attitude of the administrator is to make the funds available for technical development work while employing the maximum possible staff. Mr. J. R. Paudyal is confident that the most efficient and members of Government, but the reduction of the gross expenditure will within the £100,000 mark aimed at.

Indian Member's View

Mr. J. R. Paudyal in a separate note records his emphatic dissent from the foregoing. He is convinced that the reorganisation would increase expenditure and that it would be necessary to continue to employ technical heads of departments over whom would be the administrative officer or public man with the title of Minister or Postoffice holder in charge of groups and not his own secretary to keep him in touch with his departments. Nor could Mr. Paudyal see any reason to expect a reduction in the salaries of the present technical heads of departments who are paid, he believes, on their technical qualifications rather than for their administrative ability. He cannot see any reason why departmental heads should not take decisions now if such would mean to material reduction of work. In his opinion, however, the real reason at the back of this proposal for portfolio holders is to facilitate a further political advance for the European unofficial community. If this is so it should not be put forward in the guise of an economy measure but independently by European political institutions and decided by them. The Committee in his opinion the country is not yet ready for any type of further political advance. As far as the views of the Indian community are concerned, they are definitely opposed to any such political advance which would confer greater power on European officials in this country and he agrees with them. Mr. Paudyal declares himself in support of the principles of permanent establishments and greater provincial control of technical departments and if these measures were taken, he considers that there would be no need to have any reorganisation scheme involving grouping under Ministers.
