ITALY DEMANDS POLITICAL DOMINATION IN ETHIOPIA

Emperor Equally Firm

HOSTILITIES MAY BEGIN SOONER THAN WAS ANTICIPATED

It is widely believed that war may break out between Italy and Abyssinia sooner than was anticipated, all attempts at conciliating having failed.

Signor Mussolini has made it clear that Italy will negotiate only on the understanding that she will be granted political domination over the whole or part of Abyssinia, while the Emperor of Ethiopia in the course of a further vigorous statement announced that no solution impairing the sovereign independence of his country will be acceptable.

Attire these are being taken to protect the British Legation at Addis Ababa and a million sandbags for the purpose have been sent from Egypt.

Sandbags for British Legation

[ETHIOPIAN SERVICE'S AGENCY.] London, July 19. A meeting of the League Council on the 19th inst. will probably be held on July 20. It is believed that Italy will consent to a full discussion of the Italian case which it is believed that a clear statement of Italy's case might help towards a solution, but it is believed that Italy is naturally unwilling to be arranged before the Council by Abyssinia.

Abyssinia Resolute

At Addis Ababa, July 20. A categorical announcement of his intention to refuse any solution involving an Italian or other protectorate over his country and the independence of his people and freedom of his empire, was made by the Emperor of Ethiopia in a statement to Reuters' Special Correspondent today.

He said in the course of the statement that he was confident of his own and his people's strength and that he would resist the expected attack with determination.

The Emperor complained that other nations had placed an embargo on arms for the League because he was not aggressive, but he said he had no hope that a way might be found by signatories of the League Pact to avoid a demonstration to the world which the Emperor said was only an expression of a firm hope which might be disregarded by any nation which was not a member of the League.

The Emperor concluded "I am confident that the development of the League because we are confident that our cause is just and must prevail."

BEING PREPARED

Protecting British Legation

[ETHIOPIAN SERVICE'S AGENCY.] Cairo, July 20. Foreign Powers represented at Addis Ababa are taking urgent steps to protect their consulates from breaking out.

It is reported that a million sandbags from Egypt for use in the British Legation at Addis Ababa have been ordered, which were being taken to ensure the safety of the British Legation.

Reports of the invading of the Italian colonies under the Sudanese Government from Massawa and from Meqdisho should be disregarded. It is understood that the Italian troops are only equal the normal wastage due to the trying climate.

Seventy deaths from an outbreak of the mauling, some of which were Italian labourers from the Italian colonies out of a total of twenty-three deaths are reported by the Italian Consul-General, which is reported as well-off for matters concerning the Italian troops.

Excitement in French Capital

A Thousand Arrive

PROTEST AGAINST THE PAY CUTS

[THROUGH SERVICE'S AGENCY.] Paris, July 20. There was great excitement this evening when thousands of civil servants defying Government's ban against street demonstrations assembled to hold a mass meeting in the Place de l'Opera against the pay cuts.

A large force of steel-helmeted armed men in black uniforms drew a cordon round the Place.

The crowd singing the "Internationale" and shouting Communist slogans tried to break through the cordons. Traffic was held up and there was a tremendous uproar.

The police repeatedly charged the mob and made 600 arrests. Finally traffic was resumed and the police cordon was withdrawn.

KING REVIEWS POLICE

First Occasion of Its Kind

[BY WIRELESS.] Rugby, July 20. The last of the great Silver Jubilee reviews is being held today in London.

It is the first Royal Review of British Police and the only review of such a nature since the days of the Crown have been gathered together such large numbers for any purpose whatever.

Altogether eight thousand representatives of the Police Forces of England, Wales and Scotland will be gathered in Hyde Park, the contingent being drawn from 181 counties, city and borough forces in England and Wales, and 48 forces in Scotland.

Every branch of the police services is represented, including Scotland Yard detectives, mounted police, special constables, women police, flying squad, cars and wireless vans.

Many of the four thousand provincial police officers have brought their families with them to London and the review is without precedent since the present police system was established over a hundred years ago—British Official Wireless Service.

TRADING LICENCES DISCUSSED

Dissatisfaction With Present Law

COMMITTEE OF ENQUIRY Representing all Traders' Organisations

A Government amendment to the Licensing Ordinance 1914 having the effect of making a trader with two places of business in the same place liable to pay a separate "ambush" licence fee was attacked at Friday's monthly meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce. An amendment suggested by Mr. A. C. Tumbull to the effect that two business premises in the same place under the same proprietor should be treated as one under the Ordinance was approved, and it was decided to co-operate with the Nairobi Traders' Association and the Indian Chambers to consider the question.

In opening the discussion Mr. A. C. Tumbull, who presided in the absence of Mr. R. B. Hamilton stated that the Government's explanation of the amendment was that, while the original ordinance had been intended to provide for a licence for a quarter of a mile from Mrs. Matruh.

Mr. Tumbull thought it was unfair that a person who happened to carry on business in two places should be charged two separate licence fees calculated on the amount of goods sold in each place. He would not however especially oppose valuation being made on the total amount of goods sold in the two places.

Airman Uninjured But Plane Wrecked

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Reduction in Sugar Prices in East Africa

DISSENSION BETWEEN LOCAL MILLERS

Distribution Pool Abandoned

The Nairobi Chamber of Commerce will no longer support the Nairobi Traders' Association in urging upon Government that the existing "Bank" holidays should be made compulsory upon shops and stores by an amendment to the Public Holidays Ordinance, 1912.

A resolution opposing making the eight public holidays compulsory closing days for traders was carried without dissent at the Chamber's ordinary monthly meeting on Friday.

It was stated that communications referring to the amendment proposed by the Traders' Association had been received both from the Association direct and from the Acting Colonial Secretary through the Association of Chambers of Commerce. It was also stated that the Association of Chambers had received representations from a constituent chamber to the effect that the closing of shops on public holidays should be made compulsory by an amendment to the Shop Hours Amendment Bill.

Consequent upon dissension between the sugar millers in Kenya and Uganda, there has been a considerable reduction in the retail price of sugar locally. It is possible that this reduction will not be reflected in the price charged by some firms until they have disposed of their stocks of sugar which they purchased at the former wholesale price.

The trouble apparently started with the refusal of one large miller to enter the pool, namely the East African Sugar Distributors Ltd., and so strong was this miller's competition that other individual members of the organisation were compelled to resist by competitive activity, leading to their withdrawal from the pool.

Uganda Also Affected

Disension between the sugar millers of Kenya and Uganda has resulted in the abandonment of the sugar distribution pool during the past few days. This has caused a sharp fall in the wholesale price of locally produced sugar.

Pool Abandoned

The almost revolutionary reduction in the price of sugar manufactured in Kenya and Uganda, is a direct result of the abandonment of the sugar pool during the past few days. The East African Sugar Distributors Ltd., commonly known as the sugar pool, was an organisation composed of five of the principal sugar millers in Kenya and Uganda, its primary function being distribution.

One large miller refused to enter the pool. This has caused a sharp fall in the wholesale price of locally produced sugar.

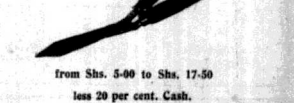

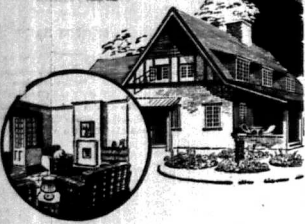

Inappropriate Time

Mr. H. F. Bargman was of the opinion that it was an entirely wrong time to impose more holidays.

Unfair Competition?

"It has been thought by my Society," he said, "that there has been a certain amount of unfair competition between shops which closed on the public holidays and shops which did not close. We took into consideration the matter of religious holidays. It was found that the Hindus, who are a big percentage of the shopkeepers, kept religious holidays, though there are five, but the majority do not observe more than 50 hours a week. Mr. Newark then discussed the matter from the assistants' point of view, and said that, although the Shop Hours Ordinance provided that no assistant should work more than 50 hours a week or nine hours a day, out of a list of 287 firms all but 14 worked their assistants more than 50 hours a week. A large number of them (101) worked their assistants for over 70 hours a week, and 48 over 80. The shops which opened on public holidays worked their assistants longer and did more trade. Mr. Puri denied that Hindu shopkeepers in the town observed only one religious holiday. They observed at least three or four and some five or six. He challenged the statement that any Indians worked shop assistants for 80 hours a week. Deducting Sundays and public holidays that averaged 15 hours a day and he reported a 40 per cent. reduction. After some discussion as to its exact terms, the following resolution was passed: That Mr. Wood and seconded by Mr. Puri: That this chamber is opposed to making the eight public holidays already imposed under the Public Holidays Ordinance compulsory closing days for shops. Mr. Chumali supported the resolution and speaking of Mr. Newark's allegation that certain shop assistants were working 80 hours a week said he must be referring to people living in the shops. Several members, who were not directly concerned in the issue, said they were in the room when the resolution was put, and it was carried by six votes to none.

Study of Africans

"The purpose of the trip to Africa," he said, "was to study some primitive people in connection with a comparison with those of the modern world and to note whether the same facts about life were found in other parts of the world. It is of fundamental importance that nature's laws should be studied and that provision should be made for her requirements in each particular physical and social environment. The problems encountered by the interior of a great continent and those which obtain among people living along the coast of the sea, are vastly different. There is a marked evidence that primitive races have assimilated wisdom from an intimate study of nature's requirements, for their environment, and that this wisdom is not in practice in most of our modern civilisations. There is a chemical basis for perfect physical development and maintenance, and the variations described below nature's minimum requirements and cannot be substituted for. There is a tragic commentary that we are now seeing a civilization in the process of decay and that this will go on to complete dissolution as has happened to many previous nations, will depend largely upon whether this civilization will learn and obey nature's laws. While it is of great importance to dispense injurious taboos with higher systems of ethics, moral strength cannot be built up and maintained without maintaining a high physical efficiency. In all of the primitive races studied moral discipline has accompanied physical discipline. A First Essential It is of fundamental importance, therefore, that we should be built upon a physical efficiency. More knowledge alive to the demands of life and to nutrition would seem to be one of the first handicaps of all programmes. That this is possible has been clearly demonstrated by applying these newer principles evolved in our modern research laboratories."

Effect on Native Trade

Almost at once the native commenced to buy in large quantities and, if the reduction penetrates to his calculations as he must do eventually—there is little doubt that the local consumption of sugar will be increased enormously. The native is very fond of sugar and will always be the greatest consumer of it in Kenya. It is now being so educated to drink tea. His domestic reduction took place is something of a mystery, and it does not matter much now that sugar is a reasonable price and it is sincerely hoped that the manufacturers will not return to the former figure of 10 cents per lb. retail, which is far in excess of the locally made article.

The Kenya Problem

PLIGHT OF THE PRODUCER

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—In the speech of His Excellency at the opening of the Legislative Council he rightly brought the Kenya problem before the country. At that time he did not mention the millions who had perished it out of his hand—though he did so later at the Agricultural Conference.

With all due respect, however, the connection in which he gave the figures also gave an entirely wrong impression of the magnitude of the problem. The producers who produced those hundreds of thousands of pounds for the revenue produced for themselves hardly a shilling. One felt that His Excellency should have concluded with the words "There will be general relief and income in the evening." And then further he could very fittingly have addressed the producer as "My fellow citizen" the one about to be executed. "You won't see him, but they'll be there all the same."

One wonders how many recall the time that is not only being but has actually collapsed in several places, and that many of the people are even now full retreat.

This was brought home to the writer only the other day when talking to a friend who had come by train from up-country. He told me he was shocked at the amount of once fertile and irrigated land that he saw which had even now reverted to bush having neither the fence nor rail and abandoned a pathetic remnant of their hopes.

The same train that brought him down also brought me a letter from another friend telling me that he and a neighbour had abandoned their farms and were leaving for the South with their families, but without cash. Help them!

When the farmers are all recruited in one, another two years' time how long does Government estimate that it will take the African to settle and recolonize the abandoned lands? Take the enormous tract of land from Kabete through Kiambu, Thika and Thika to Makuru which is being abandoned that is useless for anything but the production of coffee. I cannot visualize a farmer settling to work on a plot of land that is so full of bushes in that particular block. We had up ships with them and then filling in the holes and replanting with maize or sugar. Let's take the land which would be the epitaph on that tombstone.

Would it take ten, fifteen or twenty years? And during that period who would put up the money for the Administration? The Imperial Government, having refused to help their own countrymen and while settlement would be delighted to finance a block country, but even then I expect they would have a few remarks to offer.

If my theory would be that the Government salary must be re-

duced by two-thirds. Another third half of the Civil Service, while another third would probably be that building up the Municipal Council and such like should be handed over to the Municipalities or perhaps used as native markets.

Which would be very well and God save the Secretary of State! Or, to adapt Kipling: "It's the Mikes not least to my throat," "Good-bless 'em."

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—Like many others, I have read Major Grogan's article on our difficulties with much interest. Various criticisms by correspondents have appeared almost daily in your columns but none seems to fall in the realistic situation in the ordinary everyday expenses of the average person. Suggesting Major Grogan's proposals were adopted, how and to what extent would the cost of living be affected particularly the following, among other heads of expenditure:

- (1) Housing. Although a fair number of articles in this category are now produced locally, a large amount of one's needs still have to be imported. Further, we must suggest that quite an appreciable amount of raw material to produce some of our local commodities is not so much as it appears. I am not mistaken, hope for the manufacture of beer, steel, for the manufacture of local oatmeal, etc., etc.
- (2) Clothing, blankets, etc.
- (3) Machinery of all descriptions.
- (4) Enamelware, china, etc.
- (5) Hardware, including tools, agricultural implements, etc.
- (6) Cars, and parts and spares thereof, not forgetting tyres.
- (7) All rubber goods.
- (8) Petrol and kerosene oil etc.

This list could be added to almost indefinitely for our manufacturers are almost all, so far as the man in the street is concerned, the products of foreign countries. For naturally a very large number of people (including the farmer) would not suffice to keep the will from the door. These people, and there are many of them, very naturally have no desire to disturb the sleeping dog.

Although Major Grogan's article has been expressed in as simple a way as possible, the articles read as far over the heads of most ordinary people. Even experts will admit that it is fraught with great difficulties and complications, its ramifications extending throughout the country.

I should have thought that the fact that it is thought that this country should devote its attention to its endeavour to become far more self-sufficient than we are at present. We had up ships with our raw materials for manufacturing countries only to manufacture them in the form of manufactured articles. For example, as export hides and cattle back and receive back leather and leather goods! Why, when we have end less source to work factories of our door not being utilized? It is true we have no coal but we have innumerable rivers quite big and powerful enough to work an industry.

I therefore consider that a survey of all streams rivers should be made at once, not omitting the information of facilities for transport from possible sites for factories to the nation to be laid before the

public and an endeavour made to encourage the expenditure of capital in what undoubtedly would be paying propositions. For example the best oil seed trade would be in our hands—we have the hides, the waste, the tannery industry, the water power and the market. The same may be said of many other articles which we now import. I suggest that we should not thereby putting substantial profits into other people's pockets instead of our own and reducing imports, thereby minimizing our difficulties.

I suggest that all the emergency and extensions of the country's brain power should be directed into these useful and fruitful channels. The matter might with profit be taken up by the Legislative Council. It would I take it be very much in their line.

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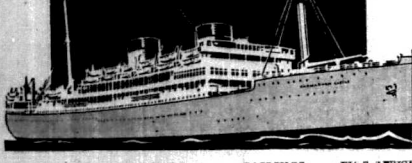
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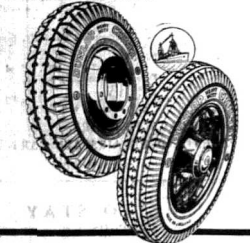

FURTHER RIOTING BY FRENZIED MOSLEMS

Sequel to Communal Dissension

POLICE CORDON SUBJECTED TO BARRAGE OF BRICKS AND STONES.

The dispute between Moslems and Sikhs at Lahore over the latter's demolition of a mosque, has culminated in serious rioting by frenzied Moslems, who refused to disperse when called upon and attacked the police cordons barring the progress of their processions.

The mob became increasingly violent and subjected the police and military to barrages of bricks and stones. The rioters took no heed of warnings and as a result the military were forced to open fire.

More Troops Drafted to Scene

Lahore, July 20.
Two parties were killed and several were injured when the Royal Scots were compelled to fire four rounds on a crowd of 2,000 Moslems, who in defiance of the curfew order camped in the streets all night long. They attempted that morning to reach the Shikharaj Mosque, attacking the police cordons barring the progress of their processions.

The Moslems, mentioned in the previous item, by a mob of 2,000 men with the Sikhs over the latter's demolition of an old mosque, are now reacting to positive reports and refuse to disperse, despite the arrest of 200 of their number.

At Lahore police are at present confining over the area and troops are standing by.

Serious Situation.
Lahore, July 21.
Another two were killed and many were injured in the riots. The whole area is strewn with bricks and stones with which the mob kept up a barrage. Fifty police, including five British soldiers, were injured and one seriously wounded. The crowd has not been dispersed by the shooting and tear-gas is still in full use.

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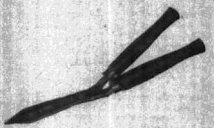

SEYCHELLES TO HOLD AGRICULTURAL SHOW

Annual Event Starting
Next Year

BOARD'S PLAN

[* STANBARD'S CORRESPONDENT.]
Seychelles, July 16.

The Board of Agriculture, Seychelles, under the presidency of His Excellency the Governor, is to be constituted on its general policy.

This Board had been defunct for a number of years, but it has recently been again brought into being and is doing excellent work. The Board deals with all agricultural matters—makes recommendations to Government, disseminates news of agricultural and industrial progress, and discusses agricultural problems.

The latest proposal emanating from the Board is to hold an Agricultural and Industrial Show in Mahé during next year, and thereafter annually. This proposal has met with general approval throughout the Colony, and it is hoped that all members of the community will rally round and give the support that is wanted by such an enterprising scheme.

The general management of the Show will be in the hands of the Agricultural Board, and committees, to which ladies and gentlemen will be invited, will, in due course be formed to take charge and organize the various sections of the Show.

That there is plenty of scope for such a show is undoubted, and it is really amazing what a variety of goods Seychelles can produce, both grown and locally made. It is anticipated that competition will be keen.

The main reason for the Show is to stimulate interest in agriculture, and more especially in those in the newer sections of crops such as Egyptian cotton, sugarcane and banana, and a special section is to be devoted to this end. Other sections of the show will be for agricultural products, essential oils, horticulture, arts and crafts, cattle and poultry.

Mr. T. H. Marshall, Senior Agricultural Assistant of Tanganyika, and for the last six months Acting Director of Agriculture, Seychelles, presents today on his way to the United Kingdom, via Mozambique, Seychelles is left with a great sense of loss. NAKURU BURGLARY

Seven Months for Old
Offender

Nakuru, (by mail).

Burglary took place on a recent Saturday between 7 and 9 p.m. at Mr. Milano's home, Indubutu. Two boys, Oleno s/o Oleno, and Onyango s/o Aguma were charged with the offence.

Mr. Joseph Henry Milton, in giving evidence, said that the man accused had been employed by him some years ago on his farm. The second had been his cook for several years. On the night in question he went across to his bedroom, which is in a separate part, after dinner, and found a lot of blankets stolen. He was away to another hut, usually occupied by his daughter, but who was away from that date. He found that many more things had been taken. Next morning as soon as it was light he found some tracks going through the main, and followed them to the house of his daughter's things which had been stolen. He went with it to Nakuru and reported the matter. He did not suspect Onyango, when he reported, as he had been seen by Milano to take the bundles. He went with the man, who took the bundle to the bar of Mr. Heuston's newspaper. Milano was in the bar. He asked him about the clothes, and Milano replied that they were his. He thereupon arrested him, and took him with the clothes to the Police Post. He did not know the second accused.

Onyango agreed that he left the bundle at the eating-house at Hongai. The things had been given him by Onyango, who had told him to keep them as they had been given him by the brother. Many years ago he had worked for Evans Milano. He was now working for James Heuston. Onyango denied giving the goods. He was cooking in the kitchen, after which he and another boy took the food to the dining-room. When he went to empty the bath he could not see very clearly but he believed everything was all right. He did not see Onyango on the farm that night.

The Resident Magistrate, Mr. Robinson, in giving judgment said that at the end of the evidence he had come to this conclusion that there was no evidence pointing against Onyango, and he had discharged him. Onyango denied all knowledge of the theft and he believed him. He was quite satisfied as to the guilt of the second accused. The goods were found in his possession the next day.

There were five previous convictions against him—all against property, and he was sentenced to seven months hard labour, and to be under Police supervision for two years after that.

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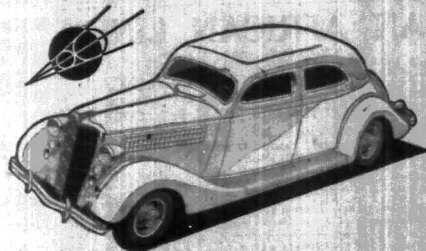

MEASUREMENT OF WORLD'S AGE

Placed at 3,000 Millions Years

METEORITES AS GLIDES

Gas Analysis at South Kensington

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.] London, July 14. (By Air Mail.) The earth is not more than 3,000 million years old, and probably not a great deal less if the evidence given by meteorites is to be accepted as correct.

This is the conclusion reached by Professor A. A. Penzance, of the Imperial College of Science and Technology, South Kensington, after the analysis of specimens of some 30 meteorites from all parts of the world.

Its significance, it is that the age of the oldest rocks of the earth's surface which have so far been measured is only 1,500 million years.

Between that and the time of the supposed formation of the earth, there is a gap of a further 1,500 million years, which has so far only been bridged by speculation.

The difficulty is that the rocks which are presumably the oldest, those deep within the earth, are not available for measurement.

On the widely favoured supposition that the meteorites which come to time hit the earth are the relics of a long exploded planet, Professor Penzance's measurements give an indication of the age of the surface and therefore, as the solar system is believed to have originated as a whirling of dust.

It is only accepted that the bigger meteorites are to be regarded as part of the solar system, their significance, as providing a pointer to the age of the earth which will vary.

It was Lord Rayleigh, Professor Penzance explained to a representative of the "Morning Post," who was responsible for the idea that the age of the earth's rocks would be measured in terms of the minute proportion of the rare gas, helium, which they contain. The helium is supposed to have been produced in the breakdown of radio-active materials within the rock through millions of years. Professor Penzance is applying the same method to meteorites.

It is now at South Kensington which is probably the most accurate equipment in the world for measuring small amounts of helium. This technique is generally quoted as the finest, equivalent of a cubic centimetre. On this basis, Professor Penzance can measure down to a hundred-millionth of a cubic centimetre of pure helium, and can detect its presence in even smaller amounts.

"Quiet" Meteorites

Unfortunately the great majority of his measurements is largely wasted on the earth's rocks. It is necessary to assume that the rocks have, as do those in their history, lost any of their helium, for example, as the result of heating. This is probably untrue.

Meteorites, on the other hand, may be supposed to have lost a relatively quiet existence, and, being mostly made of iron, with in any case retain their helium under conditions when any normal rock would lose it.

Professor Penzance is mainly occupied with his apparatus, a strange string of glass tubes, operated under a high vacuum. The greater part of it is devoted to the finding of all the helium but helium from the sample of gas to be examined. His final measurement depends on the slight leakage of heat which takes place when a minute amount of helium is introduced into what was before a vacuum. This arrangement, he explained, is due to Professor Priest of Berlin.

Warning Throated

Lahore, July 21. Four persons were killed today when troops fired on the mob for the third time since the riotous display started. The Muslim crowd, which was held up by a barbed wire entanglement, did not disperse all night long and increased in numbers in the morning. Later they became violent and stoned the military who fired six rounds as noon after a warning. The crowd continued to be defiant and indulged in stone throwing. They did not heed the warnings and the Royal Scots fired a further two rounds. Two are believed to have been killed.

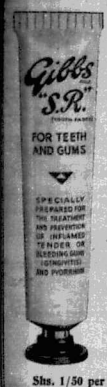

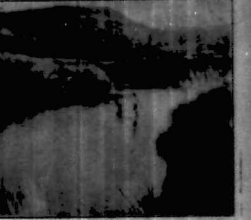

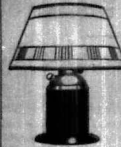

money for the sound farmer, would give the planter who is in difficulties a greater chance of recovery; and would accumulate for the benefit of the whole industry a reserve fund which could be expended on the general advancement of the industry.

If the Government of the financing of the crop from the marketing of the crop would be the advantage of every planter. Although under this scheme Government would require the right to impose an export tax on coffee in order to meet the demand of the Board, Government would, at the same time, take every possible step to ensure that no such imposition would ever become necessary. It is for this reason that a wide margin of safety in regard to individual advances is imperative and that early reservation of an adequate reserve as an integral part of the scheme must be made. (Vide (a) and (c) above).

Advances

It would seem reasonable to expect that a properly constituted Finance Board should be able to work within the limits of (a) above and that the financial risk to the free planter in lending his security would be extremely remote.

The Chairman, having his visit to London, was privileged to meet the financial houses who are interested in placing their money as the disposal of the industry, with permission of the Colonial Office and with the approval of the Board. The firm in question states quite clearly that if they were to supply, admittedly, if there was no need for anticipatory finance, but that they would be financing of the planter as one of the proper functions of their business and state that, if they are not required in Kenya as merchant bankers, in their fullest possession of the meaning of that term, they would prefer to fade away rather than to attempt to do so. They would not have been previously been accustomed to stating their view that it is the financing of the crop that is the business of the planter.

The question of finance on the above lines has been discussed with the various merchant banking firms now handling our coffee; briefly, the way in which it was suggested to them that the Board's finance should be as follows:

- (1) That the Board should offer finance to all such planters as are in a position to provide adequate crop security. (2) That planters had to merchandise by reason of shortfalls should be able to avail themselves of such finance by agreement as between the merchant, the planter and the Board. (a) the merchant continues to handle the crop and to own his commission on it. (b) The Board shall have a prior charge on the crop. (c) the merchant shall receive payment of his shortfall out of any surplus proceeds of the sale of the crop, shall not necessarily be entitled to raise the entire surplus in any one year. (d) the merchant, if interested shall have power to re-strict the amount advanced by the Board, but no power to increase the amount which the Board is prepared to advance.

Such an arrangement would assist planters by providing certain finance at favourable rates and might make possible the gradual recovery of those planters who are at present handicapped, but whose estates still permit them to offer adequate crop security. It is not in any way a one-sided arrangement as it recognises the claims of the merchant in respect of previous shortfalls, even though he has in many cases little prospect of recovering them.

A Chance to Recover

It has been felt by the Board that there are a number of planters who, by reason of the size of their existing shortfalls, are in danger of having their finance curtailed and possibly of losing their estates, whereas, under an arrangement of the nature outlined above, they would still stand a reasonable chance of recovering their debt, and of being able to start afresh without in any way endangering their more fortunate fellow planters.

In other words, under this arrangement every planter would start level. A planter who, in a previous shortfall and a prospective crop valued at £2,300 would be able to borrow in anticipation up to a maximum of £1,000 and the total extent of his liability to the industry would be that £1,000; a planter who is shortfall at a total and prospective crop valued at £2,300 would also be able to borrow in anticipation to a maximum of £1,000 and £1,000 would be the total extent of his liability to the industry.

The attitude of the merchant bankers to this question of finance is not unambiguous and in one case completely at variance with the Board's previous understanding of their real interest in the East African coffee business. The firm in question states quite clearly that if they were to supply, admittedly, if there was no need for anticipatory finance, but that they would be financing of the planter as one of the proper functions of their business and state that, if they are not required in Kenya as merchant bankers, in their fullest possession of the meaning of that term, they would prefer to fade away rather than to attempt to do so. This attitude, coupled with reduction of interest rates to one per cent on shortfalls in certain cases, probably reflects the Board of the necessity for examining in greater detail its proposals for alternative finance and it would seem that this is a matter upon which the planter, and the planter alone, can come to the final decision. The planter must decide for himself whether he can safely rely upon finance always being available to him from a limited number of firms, or whether he would prefer to have alternative and independent finance made available to the whole industry. Industry to Decide

In this matter of finance the Board places itself entirely in the hands of the industry and is prepared either to continue aspects of present handling, or to make a complete change, or to drop this activity entirely. With the support of the industry, the Board is confident that a fully detailed and comprehensive scheme, satisfactory to all interests, could be evolved. But unless the whole industry shows its support, the Board is not prepared to waste

its own time, the time of those who are ready to lend the money and the time of the Government of Kenya in further discussion of the matter.

The Board has not on its own account carried out any investigation whatsoever as to the possibilities of relieving the industry of its long term mortgage commitments. The Board understands that the Land and Agricultural Bank of Kenya has already put forward its case for further funds and for an increase in the statutory limit of advances, which would permit it to grant larger loans here in keeping with the needs of the coffee industry (see time additional funds are made available). The Coffee Board feels that it can serve a more useful purpose in the present emergency by giving its unqualified support to the Land Bank Board rather than by attempting any independent effort on its own account.

In conclusion, the Board does not intend to interest itself in long-term mortgage finance—that is for the Land Bank. But the Board's attitude of having itself set to the necessary guarantees, and in an alternative way, provided that the coffee planters in Kenya are ready to accept a reasonable measure of responsibility, as outlined in this document, is the policy of the Board.

Co-operation is essential and the decisive vote is in the hands of the planter.

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DISEASE BY PLANE

Warning by Governor of the Bahamas

London, July 27. (By Air Mail).

The new danger of infectious disease being carried by passenger aeroplane was mentioned by the Hon. Sir Bede Clifford, Governor of the Bahamas, in London. He was speaking at a dinner given by the British Social Hygiene Council in connection with the 7th Imperial Social Hygiene Congress now being held in London.

"In the Bahamas," Sir Bede Clifford said, "we have within 300 miles of us 150,000 people, with whom we are connected by a daily air service. Recently a contagious fever broke out in the other country, and we apprehended that the aeroplane might be taken to see that the disease was not introduced into our colony."

"We learned later that the aeroplane was being disinfected after the passengers had alighted. When we complained that we were anxious that it could not be done before because the passengers complained about the smell!"

This Sir Bede thought, illustrated the ignorance that existed on important health matters.

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
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

Opportunity for Social Service

[STANDARD'S CONGRATULATIONS]. London, July 2. (By Mail)

The hope that the "Oxford spirit" would, through the agency of the Oxford Society, permeate and spread wherever the English language was spoken was expressed by the Marquis of Salisbury when he presided at the annual meeting of the Society in London.

Lord Salisbury said that although the Society was formed only three years ago, it had been shown to have great vigour and power of development. There was one branch of public effort to which they were looking forward particularly, and that was social service. Although their first duty was to Oxford and Oxford men, the spirit which was first developed among their own people might afterwards be spread generally. There must be a greater unity of purpose corporate and not merely in Oxford but among their countrymen far and wide.

Mr. Richard K. Stoddart (Belmont) said that he would like to emphasize that Oxford was not only English but British. "Since you have taken the step to set free a large territory of our Empire," he said, "this is just the point where the Society can come in to do what has not been done up to the moment—to make British people in Oxford fit for the responsibility which you are going to ask them to shoulder without having prepared them to shoulder it."

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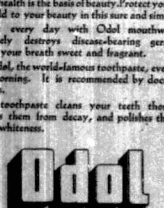

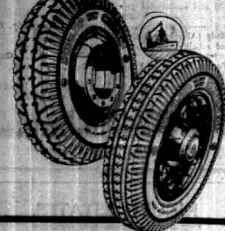

In war. An uncompromising attitude hinders the essential adaptability of strategy to events as well as to conditions.

A Giant's Dream

The aim of complete unification must also be measured by the topographical conditions. The rugged plateau with its towering escarpments might be likened to the medieval castle of a giant's dream. Approaches are few and difficult, being fortified by Nature with massive mesas and barrancas, while the communications of an advancing force would be so hard to safeguard as to create "Air-pressure" on the defender's keep would not offer the promise of effect that this new form of the re-entrant holds out in other parts of the world, even in similarly decentralised and unindustrialised States. Addis Ababa, the capital, is over 400 miles distant from the Italian bases in Eritrea and stands over 8,000 ft. above sea level; as a bombing target it would thus seem to be well out of reach of present service aircraft. The air problem might be diminished as the Italian land forces advance more deeply into the country, but the farther they go the harder may become their military problems.

The number of regular troops of whom the Emperor might dispose are not likely to amount to more than 60,000, and, although levies amounting to well over 500,000 might be available to oppose an invader that threatened the heart of the country, such numbers would have little value except for guerrilla warfare, even if the miracle of keeping them supplied could be performed. The modern Abyssinian artillery is said to include only some three batteries of "75's," beyond this it is made up of a number of "hand-guns" and a hundred or more ancient pieces. Mortars, the aircraft and tanks may be counted on the finger. Machine-guns probably total about 300, with double that number of automatic rifles.

By contrast, we may reckon that modern armament will give to the Italian troops a fighting value much greater than their actual numbers. The extent of these is not certain, but a short time ago it was reported that there was one white division in Eritrea, with the equivalent of three native divisions, and another white division in Somalia.

PARSEE AIRMEN

Proposed Flight from Bombay to Cape Town

Three Parsee aviators, Messrs. F. P. Dabul, P. H. Dastur and K. D. Poddanawala are preparing to carry out a flight to Cape Town and back, commencing from Bombay on August 1 next.

Their itinerary will be Bombay-Karachi (700 miles) on the first day and thereafter, averaging a day for each "leg," the route followed will be: Karachi-Sokatra (540 miles); Jambou-Bombay (610 miles); Bombay-Baghdad (610 miles); Baghdad-Cairo (845 miles); Cairo-Yendi-Haifa (602 miles); Yendi-Haifa-Khartoum (518 miles); Khartoum-Juba (730 miles); Juba-Matruh (600 miles); Matruh-Alexis (900 miles); Alexis-Bulawayo (884 miles); Bulawayo-Victoria West (220 miles) and Victoria West-Cape Town (235 miles) arriving at the Cape on August 19. The return flight is due to commence on September 1 and will follow the same itinerary as the outward flight. Bombay being reached (according to schedule) on September 19. The flight will pass through Nairobi on the outward journey on August 18-19 and on the return trip on September 4-5, a stop overnight being made in each case.

per cent. Mr. Lettlem added that this rate was not less than one and a half per cent. below that charged by the Kenya Land Bank. He expressed his appreciation of the results and the debtors had increased their appreciation of the concession. He was not, however, satisfied that the essential necessity of the policy was as yet realized or appreciated by the community as a whole, and he pointed out that on the successful handling of this matter of loans to planters depended in no small degree the establishment and rate of progress of the agricultural bank and, to some degree, the obtaining of other assistance by the Colony. He emphasized the loan to establish confidence in the bank, and that sharp against the Colony's assets and funds from the beginning arrangements must be made to pay the interest.

The Land Bank

The Colony is ranking all this for the extremely important object of establishing agricultural credit but we must realize that we are doing this without present resources or future resources on which to rely, with a precarious commission and with our present paper assets tied up in loans. Mr. Lettlem said that had the position really been as was stated to him when he came to the country, that practically no capital was recoverable and not even the interest on these loans to planters could be paid and had he accepted that now possesses attitude, he was quite sure they would not now be looking forward to an agricultural bank of their own.

The Governor informed council that the Imperial authorities had rejected a proposal for a very large grant of interest for the purpose in view on a large scale. He had, however, taken the responsibility of accepting the immediate liability of a loan with which to open the bank, believing that it was perhaps better for the Colony in the end. He had been anxious to assure the house authorities that the question of agricultural credit could be handled in the Colony in a businesslike way.

You will appreciate therefore that the course of action sometimes urged upon me, that Government should lightly and carelessly attempt all attempts to recover assets on all the loans indiscriminately and reduced the rate of interest therefrom, while at the same time expanding agricultural credit at Government expense by means of a bank, is one that I could not possibly have followed. That course would in fact need that arguments with happy results in the last few days, and had a pose of good news for the council. In reporting progress to the Secretary of State he urged that the position was one of encouraging and the effort of the debtors to deserving of congratulation that he considered a reduction in the rate of interest to four per cent. might be made in a number of cases and the Secretary of State had approved. This meant that interest was reduced to little over half the old rate and two and a half per cent. below the rate charged by the Kenya Land Bank. The repayment of capital, of course, had to be made in a reasonable time.

His Excellency again assured the Council that the concession could not have been obtained by dilapid and indiscriminate treatment of the loan question in the spirit of desolation.

More Economies

With regard to the second, particular task of the year the further reduction of recurrent expenditure, he had already said that a point had been reached when further retrenchment could not be carried through without prejudicial arrangements in order to avoid administrative or other breakdown in public services. Nevertheless, definite arrangements of economies had been planned to give savings of about £1,200,000 which would be possible in the course of Civil Service savings.

Planned Development

With regard to the third immediate task of the year, the further progress of the economic development, the position was extraordinarily satisfactory. Not a single application for assistance had yet been refused and seven had been granted in seven months totalising £1,115,000. It should be emphasized, he thought, in order to give direct assistance had been vouchsafed to three already by the Imperial Treasury. The purposes of these grants included mining at Adowe, fur production of plumes, silkworming,

sericulture and aquaculture, and in this, the Silver Jubilee year of His Majesty the King.

An Unofficial Tribute. Mr. W. J. Stephenson, Second Unofficial Member, who paying tribute to His Excellency's untiring personal efforts to get the financial position of Government in order, said it must not be forgotten that permanent financial recovery was dependent on re-establishment of the industrial position. In view of the expert opinion of the advisers of the Secretary of State that the copper market could no longer be depended upon, the outlook for the Colony remained very gloomy and the need to develop local agricultural resources was quite imperative. He appreciated that Government was doing its very utmost. He referred appreciatively to the agricultural bank and the reduction on the rate of interest on Government loans, and said that the concession imposed upon the debtors of Government the most responsible to strain every nerve to meet their obligations to Government.

Mr. Stephenson said that the Governor had given the Colony a new deal. He had transformed the relations between Government and general public and had put all good citizens under the obligation to undertake such public work as he might call them to.

His Excellency in reply expressed his entire agreement as to the vital need of a variety of economic products and emphasized the necessity of obtaining a firm and certain outlet. He commended ardently upon the fact that producers of copper were apparently unwilling to sell, gambling on a possible rise in price, with the result that the cargo space on a steamer had not yet been taken up. The policy pursued to him, short-cutting and might deprive the benefits to the colony of a regular and direct steamer service at cheap rates.

In conclusion, he expressed the hope that everyone would continue for a time to put up with present troubles with an good a grace as possible. VISITOR'S IMPRESSIONS: K.U.R. TRAVEL

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir,—I have just spent a fortnight in Kenya and Uganda on a business trip and have no intention of returning Home to write a book on it but I would like to state the reactions of one average Englishman.

First your people. Their reception of the stranger within their gates is of the kindest and friendliest description. I have travelled over most of the world and nowhere have been better treated.

Secondly your hotels. I doubt that any small white population can match that of such good second-class hotels. Truly the lay-out of Nairobi. Four people and other labor agitators or far-seeing politicians. Main street would be a credit to a city with a population of half million.

Thirdly your energy. You give more of your energy and determination of your people, are things that every visitor must admire.

England and Wales without any credit to me and I wish to see the day when all I have said here—probably even more than I have said—shall be more than a mere possibility.

It is the most inefficient, costly, unworkable line I have ever travelled on. It has led to loss of travelling from the terminus at Kampala to Mombasa by the few charges were often more than the fare of the same route in rail. Thus that goods from England borne thousands of miles by sea, which is had straightened out and put up the cost of living to every inhabitant of the country. I did not however anticipate, in view of its extortionate charges for first class passengers that it would be in rail but lurches while, when occupied by four people are claimants of the Black Hole of Calcutta! On the train on which I travelled from Kampala there were two of us in a compartment about eight feet by six, as far as Nairobi. It was a lot better than the first class passenger must have seen in a compartment, it was one enough. At Nairobi, despite our protests, two more lurches passengers were travelling night on, were bundled in. Yet on that same train paid officials of their relatives were travelling night on the same size compartment. I don't blame them—the spite went out too much—I blame an incompetent to deal with visitors to the railway. I don't know whose job it is to make your railway attractive to visitors, but not providing additional coaches for the same size compartment. I don't know whose job it is to make your officials might perhaps be useful if employed in a factory for creating carriages but they do not know the elementary A, B, C of railway work. In addition, the coaches were most of the dirtiest and most dilapidated I have ever seen on a main line.

In England we had such conditions in a public company there would be questions in Parliament and the responsible officer would be in the speedy road to the sack. Instead of spending hundreds of thousands of pounds on unwarranted administrative buildings, it would have been of far more use to cut the cost of freight and provide passenger accommodation suitable for human beings. If you must have expensive hotels of this type I suggest you sentence them to periods of from five to six months imprisonment in their own railway coaches riding continually between Kampala and Mombasa. If they survived—which is doubtful—the sentence afterward might show some respect.

I repeat my pleasure in meeting such delightful residents. I hope to meet many of them again—but if it is to be in Kenya it will have to be after they have returned or ended their appalling railway.

NORMAN TITMATT.
En Route to England, June 8, 1932.

It is the most inefficient, costly, unworkable line I have ever travelled on. It has led to loss of travelling from the terminus at Kampala to Mombasa by the few charges were often more than the fare of the same route in rail. Thus that goods from England borne thousands of miles by sea, which is had straightened out and put up the cost of living to every inhabitant of the country. I did not however anticipate, in view of its extortionate charges for first class passengers that it would be in rail but lurches while, when occupied by four people are claimants of the Black Hole of Calcutta! On the train on which I travelled from Kampala there were two of us in a compartment about eight feet by six, as far as Nairobi. It was a lot better than the first class passenger must have seen in a compartment, it was one enough. At Nairobi, despite our protests, two more lurches passengers were travelling night on, were bundled in. Yet on that same train paid officials of their relatives were travelling night on the same size compartment. I don't blame them—the spite went out too much—I blame an incompetent to deal with visitors to the railway. I don't know whose job it is to make your railway attractive to visitors, but not providing additional coaches for the same size compartment. I don't know whose job it is to make your officials might perhaps be useful if employed in a factory for creating carriages but they do not know the elementary A, B, C of railway work. In addition, the coaches were most of the dirtiest and most dilapidated I have ever seen on a main line.

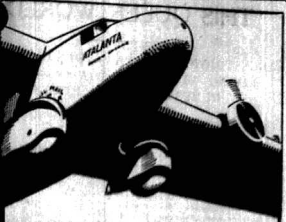

"GAS" STORAGE OF FRUIT

Rapid Progress of a New System

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.]
 London, (By Mail.)
 Remarkable progress is being made in the gas storage of non-grown fruit—that is, storage in a special atmosphere, in which the oxygen content of normal air is reduced and that of carbon dioxide is increased.

The first commercial gas storage was built in 1920 by Mr. H. W. Mead, a caterer, fruit grower. To-day 40 stores, with a total capacity of 400,000 bushels are in operation, and the method is still in its infancy.

The storage was developed by the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research following the discovery that English apples, up to four weeks, were liable to rapid rotting on removal from cold storage. It was found that an increase in the proportion of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere with a corresponding decrease in the proportion of oxygen retarded the living processes of the apple, so an apple continues to live for a longer time after it has been picked.

It is now the life of the apple could be prolonged for as long as six months without the need for harmful cold—although low temperature is still needed.

Gift of Aparatus

A 41 day rig, P, and with the air oxygen reduced from 20 to 10 per cent, and the carbon dioxide proportionally raised, the Bramley's Seedling, our most important variety, in the best of conditions for 12 months. Practising experiments are also being made with pears and tomatoes. These will be added by a valuable gift of plastic made as an acknowledgment of the value of this work to the fruit-grower's industry.

Five colors, specially made to complete the equipment of the laboratory's experimental refrigerated chambers, were presented, three by Mr. Mount on behalf of fruit-growers, and two by Lord Dudley D'Arcy, an inhabitant of the makers of the colors. The gift was accepted by Sir Frank Smith, secretary of the department.

THE "EGRET"

New Type of Sailing Vessel for Lake

The launching of "Egret"—an all-steel, six-masted, motor-launch sailing craft—on Kingston on Friday last, was the first of a new type of social function, but an event of considerable significance to the industry of the country.

Mr. Longest-Higgins christened the craft, by drawing a bottle of wine on the steel hull, and after "Egret" had taken the water once, the new venture was steamed on board the s.s. "Egret."

"Egret" (the first of her kind) was brought into existence as a result of local enterprise and industry, and is a fine example of the work of the owners, a syndicate consisting of Mr. T. Burnett, Superintendent Longest-Higgins and Mr. C. Tomkinson, who have formed a series of articles, which is especially interesting and it is hoped that, if the demand is large, enough similar vessels will be constructed for a sum in the region of £100,000 each.

Construction Details

The craft has been built to a standard of strength and stability beyond conditions by Commander T. A. Burnett, and it is hoped that it will be the first of a new type of sailing vessel, and will result in the formation of a Yacht Club in the country.

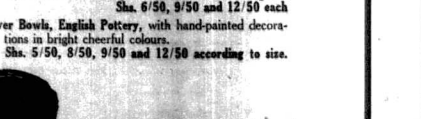

4. Control, Conservation and Reconditioning of Land

We are frankly terrified by the rapidly and the extent of the erosion and denudation of land which is taking place in the Native Reserves. As has been pointed out in the report of the Agricultural Commission which was under the Chairmanship of Sir Donald Hall in 1920, and in the Kenya Land Commission Report published last year, the only legal compulsion can prevent the eventual complete ruin of the country. The problem must be tackled both amongst agricultural and pastoral tribes. We are convinced that any further procrastination must lead to disaster and we intend to press for the immediate implementation of paragraph 2040 of the Kenya Land Commission Report.

5. Financial Policy

Our financial policy remains constant and we adhere to the views expressed by us so frequently during the past few years. Our aim is to effect a reduction in the recurrent overhead expenditure of Government to a figure as low as possible, reasonable annual surplus even during the present adverse conjuncture as we will bear a proper relationship to the Colony's economy. In no other business do we secure that when the tide turns, the Colony will be able to meet a belated demand for the extremely serious cost position and will be able to build up again adequate reserves to be utilized, not as in the past to meet the extravagant Government machine, but to provide expenditure for urgent public purposes. The policy which the Colony will acquire tangible capital assets.

6. Taxation

In order to allow Government the widest scope possible to enable it to effect readjustments in conformity with changing world conditions, we agreed to the imposition of certain temporary emergency taxation measures. In spite of what Government may allege we maintain that these measures were only agreed to on the strict understanding that they should be temporary. During the past three years, both the Executive Advisory Committee and the recently appointed Economic Commission have reported and it is the duty of Government to implement the recommendations made, thereby abolishing any necessity for retaining emergency taxation and affording relief in the circumstances which are at present imposed on a hard pressed Community.

It is possible that at a later stage the whole Fiscal System may require re-organizing, but we do not see how to do so with a bold and energetic solution of the questions of salaries, loans, and possible re-organization of the machinery of Government.

We shall continue to oppose to the utmost the re-imposition of emergency taxation and we shall decline to negotiate further with Government on this issue.

7. Railway Rates

In 1923 the Railway was faced with a heavy deficit on the year's working. During 1924, in spite of increases in imports and exports and train mileage, the Railway partly by reductions in overhead and operating costs and partly by increases in Railway rates, showed very substantial profits. The Bill now may not be regarded as an integral part of the Colony. An efficient Railway, operating in an impoverished Colony would be even though of necessity short-lived, a grave economic liability.

We advocate a link between the railways and ourselves. The identity of economic and social interests of all communities of Kenya and Tanganyika demands a single Union accompanied by a single Assembly and a single administrative and financial officers by the unified permanent residents of the various territories. Both these Territories are to be assured in the future. Union will be beneficial in the separate financial budgets of separate administrations, and both Territories would benefit by treating the large questions of policy on one time and place, and in a single Assembly consisting of the most experienced representatives of each Territory. This will enable the Territories to reach themselves without conflict or jealousy to the many questions of common interest which it is obvious cannot any longer be satisfactorily settled by individual Governments separately as they are by frontiers abruptly across the map, which are essentially in some cases, upon reduction of the same, and divide alike. Naturally any conditions of Union must absolutely safeguard the position of the White man in each Territory. We further trust that I regard will see her way to join in such Union in the course of 1925.

11. Settlement

We are convinced that the future prosperity of East Africa depends on strong and increasing White Settlement and we therefore support to the utmost the efforts being made by the Kenya Association and the Kenya Settlers' Association and the stimulation of White Settlement on sound and considered lines.

12. Education

In our view it is essential that all our children should receive primary education in their own languages at the cost of the State, (Objective) and we are in favour of the proposal that the resulting cost to the Colony is insignificant. 13. Employment of Kenya Born Boys and Girls

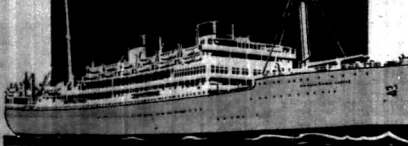

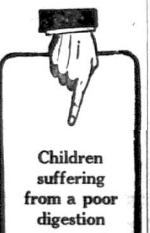
