

Mr. Ngala's meek weep board in polls

Two-phase party election in Mombasa ordered by President Kenyatta on Wednesday to solve the two-year-old leadership row in the town, had attracted great interest and were seen as the first test of the primary elections system.

The elections seemed to be fought more or less on a tribal or sectional basis, although supporters of Mr. Ngala included a comparatively larger number of the two main tribes from Nyanza, the Abaluhya and Luo.

The elections were held as a group of the number of votes received by the chairman of each group was taken to have been polled equally by all candidates in the party.

The acting secretary-general of the group, Mr. R. S. Matano, who on Thursday ordered that names of successful candidates be forwarded to him by noon today, toured all the centres to offer help if needed by the supervisors.

The results of the sub-branch elections are being forwarded to the President Kenyatta at 10 a.m. tomorrow. Since Mr. Ngala's name has emerged victorious, they might well be unopposed.

Closest fight was up at the Tator/Tonoka sub-branch election in which losers included the former Speaker of the Senate, Mr. T. M. C. Choke, who wanted to become a member of the committee, the Deputy Mayor, Coun. A. N. Muidau, who contested the post of vice-chairman, and Mr. M. Jahazi, M.P., who wanted to become sub-branch secretary.

Elections went on peacefully except at Changanwa, where Mr. Ngala's group polled 1450 votes against 124 received by their opponents, led by Mr. S. Omar, M.P., who later went away after complaining of what he termed "unfair treatment" of his group.

All other candidates were later elected unopposed after Mr. Omar led his group away.

O.A.U. urged: Aid Rhodesia

The Political Committee of the Ministerial conference of the O.A.U. in Addis Ababa yesterday began examining a report on the Rhodesian problem by the O.A.U. Secretary-General, Mr. Daulo Telli.

He blames Britain for the Rhodesian problem and to freedom movements fighting the Smith regime be overthrown.

An O.A.U. spokesman predicted that discussion of the report would probably continue today, because the committee wants to spare no effort in finding new proposals for a solution to the problem.

Mr. Telli's report says an uprising of the Rhodesian African population against the White regime has emerged victorious.

It outlines the history of the Rhodesian rebellion and accuses Britain of "cowardly" "double-dealing" and "apathy" in its handling of the Rhodesian affair.

Confidence sources said that Mr. Telli also accused Western Powers of using the "internal machinery" of the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation in that part of Africa.

He said France had become the main supplier of arms to Rhodesia through South Africa.

The report also argues that although the proclamation of a republic in Rhodesia may sever political ties with London, economic and trading co-operation between the two countries will develop considerably.

Mr. Telli issued at least one large campaigner operating in Rhodesia whose main shareholders are leading industrialists in London.

In fact, he claimed, Rhodesia's economy does not suffer from the sanctions policy, and was now booming.

The report blames this state of affairs partly on the African States for refusing to vote a resolution providing for a general severance of diplomatic ties with London.

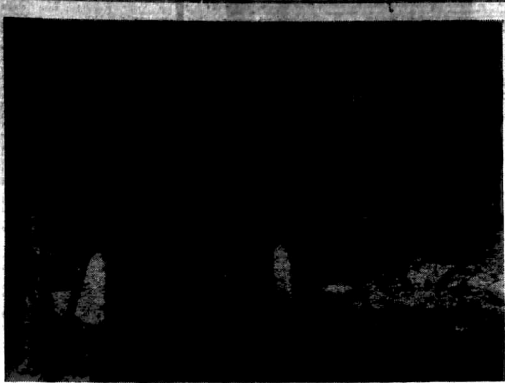

'Put your back into it', President tells farmers

President Kenyatta yesterday opened the Mombasa Show by putting a call to Coast farmers to put their backs into the agricultural development of the province.

The potential of the Coast was "fully immense," he said. Out of 40,000 square miles, at least 10,000 was fit for crops and this must be fully utilized.

"I have already announced that the Government is going to settle and assist in the management of the farmland as the 'Land of Cash Crops and Livestock' programme."

The rest of the province was well-suited to beef production and the Government was determined to initiate and expand rapidly.

Farmers must learn to keep abreast of the latest farming methods. This also required a new approach to extension work, with not which the farmers' efforts would not be profitable. This was why the Ministry of Agriculture had recently been reorganised.

Referring to the work of the Mwanja agricultural research unit, the President outlined prospects for some crops at the coast.

Cassava offered the chance of a breakthrough into the European market. High-yielding varieties were in great demand in world markets and a good farmer could get 250 sh per acre from this crop, about half of which would be profit. This crop should be developed rapidly.

A new crop scheduled for introduction next year was papaya. Kenaf and bixa had already been introduced. Mangoes were on sale overseas and the demand was increasing.

Work was continuing on high-yielding varieties of maize which would make the province self sufficient.

Although outdoor seed production in the Galole Irrigation Scheme was good, there was a need for more research in other areas.

President Kenyatta said one of the values of the show was that it encouraged the creative spirit among farmers, providing an incentive that they should take back to their homes and shambas.

He added a special word for the youth of the country. The future of agriculture depended on them. They must get their hands dirty in living and playing their part in the national effort.

They must cultivate a new attitude to farming in order to develop a sense of pride in doing a developed and lending stock using modern scientific techniques.

NEWS IN BRIEF

Airliner hijacked

ATHENS — A T.W.A. Boeing airliner en route to Athens has probably been hijacked to Damascus. Reports said that the plane had been forced to land in the Red Sea and that the hijackers demanded to change route while flying over Greece.

FRAGILE — Czechoslovak Communist Party leader, Dr. Gustav Husak, said that the East-West invasion of his country last year was not an unprovoked act and that the troops were actually to Czechoslovakia's aid.

SALISBURY — A Bill to pave the way for the introduction of a new Republic in Rhodesia was passed in the House of Commons yesterday.

BARCELON — South Vietnamese troops were ordered to drive through the Red-paddies and swamps of the southern Mekong delta, a military spokesman said yesterday.

ACEHA — Communist forces were reported to have been active throughout Ghana yesterday as the country was rocked by the first civilian Government since the overthrow of President Kwame Nkrumah by a military coup in 1966.

HONG KONG — China has accused the Kremlin of trying to control Asia and Africa, coupled with the threat of economic and industrial aid. Communist leaders were reported to have said that the Soviet Union for setting itself up as a superpower which would dominate the world.

Expatriates back but not as headmasters

The "backed" expatriate headmasters will continue to teach in Kenya — but they will not be re-instated, the Ministry of Education said yesterday.

The teachers, who were dismissed with short notice by the Ministry several weeks ago, and who had received an assurance that their terms of service would be honoured, were told this week to return to teaching by the Public Service Commission.

The Teachers' Service Commission, which is responsible for the recruitment of teachers, said it believed all the replacements, said "We have sent our teacher back to school but not as a head."

Asked if the Ministry had been consulted, a spokesman said "No, it was not necessary."

Last night the Ministry issued, through a civil servant, a statement criticising yesterday's report in the East African Standard of the P.S.C. spokesman.

The statement said "The statement appearing in the East African Standard of the P.S.C. spokesman, who is a member of the Ministry of Education, is a gross distortion of the facts. The question of terminating a contract of services of an expatriate in certain categories is handled by the P.S.C. As to where such expatriates may be posted is a matter for the Ministry of Education which has already decided to place them elsewhere in order to have Africans as headmasters in the schools concerned. Any of the expatriates concerned in this matter has already cleared the matter with the P.S.C. which has stated categorically that the commission has not ordered or instructed any of the expatriates to be transferred to remain at their original posts because they are being transferred by the Permanent Secretary concerned according to the rules governing all civil servants."

The statement was signed by Mr. G. R. M. Mwanuzi, for the Permanent Secretary.

Serengeti in no danger yet says Tanzania

Lack of an immediate agricultural potential in the Ngorongoro Conservation Area means that there was no present threat to migrating herds, a spokesman for the Tanzania National Parks said yesterday.

He was commenting on the Tanzania Government's decision to hand over part of the 100,000 square mile area to the Wildlife Management Commission for agricultural development. Only the Ngorongoro and Kilimanjaro Game Reserves remain under the Conservation Unit's control.

"This does not appear to be an issue for all this alarm from conservationists," said the Parks official. "The area that is being handed over to the farmer is a barren, virtually worthless and dustbowl for seven months of the year."

"The Masai certainly will not use this for agriculture because they have many better pastures to go to. If at some future date it is found that the Serengeti is overgrazed and that the Masai who live in the area to be given were threatened their Government action would be expected."

Tanzania Minister of Agriculture, Mr. D. Bwona, said that the decision would in no way interfere with the movement of game. It was a matter of interest to him to run Ngorongoro and we have to intensify our work in this regard."

The decision had been taken following the recommendation of a team of Canadian experts who had carried out a two-year survey.

The same area had long been earmarked for joint development of Masai ranching game and tourism.

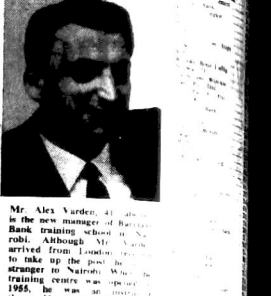

The view of the City Health Officer and Health Committee, Com. E. N. Njirau, in planning new drug handling rules, after he presented these rules yesterday, The City Council earlier yesterday afternoon, was that the new rules were aimed principally at curbing the activities of Kenya's backstreet "quacks".

The rules state that nobody other than those authorised sell or purchase poisons, or deal in any way with drugs.

For many years people in need of treatment by drugs - particularly sufferers from venereal diseases - have been duped by bogus doctors in clandestine premises.

These doctors have been known to acquire syringes and other medical equipment from contacts who assist them in hospitals. A patient who believes he is being treated is frequently being injected only with distilled water, which has been coloured.

'People uncounted in census' claim by Mayor of Kisumu

Standard Correspondent Kisumu.

The Kisumu Township branch of Kani has appealed to the Government to extend the time for the census so that all the people can be counted, because the census would be of prime importance for the economic development of Kenya.

Coun. John Odoyo, township organising secretary, complained bitterly that a number of people in Kisumu Town alone had not been counted. "If the census is to be completed that way, then the result will be ridiculous, because only half of Kenya's total population will be counted. Even here we have not counted, with my family," he said.

Many people in Nyanza expressed their dissatisfaction on the census, because the biggest portion of the population had not been counted. The census is something which with enough personnel to carry out the work Mr. Odoyo said:

"We would like to know if the people of Kisumu and surrounding places are not needed in this, the Mayor of Kisumu, Coun. Odoyo, said when he alleged that he had received complaints from a number of people who told him that they had not been counted.

Coun. Odoyo said that in order to put things right the Government must allow the counting to go on for another week with a strict directive that all the places

visited by census officials must be revealed.

Many people who were travelling on Kenya's roads when the census opened had not been counted. Some came home to find that census personnel had already visited their homes and only recorded the names of those found inside the home.

Kenya's economical growth was based on the country's population. It was, therefore, essential that counting must be arranged properly, irrespective of the cost, he added.

Dr. Azikiwe calls for peace talks

Dr. Nnamdi Azikiwe, former President of Nigeria, has called for a speedy end to Nigeria's two-year-old civil war through a negotiated peace settlement and announced he hoped to return soon to Nigeria.

Dr. Azikiwe, who led his country to independence in 1960 and has for some time been living outside Nigeria, made his call in a statement released in Lagos by the Nigerian Federal Ministry of Information.

An Ibo himself, he pressed Ibo and non-Ibo people in Biafra to urge their leaders to go to the conference table and negotiate for a just and honourable peace.

He said he hoped history would identify him as a national leader rather than a tribal one.

Confessing that he had had doubts about the personal safety of the Ibo people until a year ago, he said he was satisfied there was a concerted plan to commit genocide against the Ibo and non-Ibo people who constitute that part of Nigeria which is at war with the nation.

He dismissed charges of this nature as "a cock and bull fairy tale" and "artful propaganda designed to buttress the disbelievable claims of those who wish to foment an unpopular leadership on an impoverished, destitute and unarmed people."

Observers interpreted his statement as signalling a final break between Dr. Azikiwe and the secessionist régime, with which he was closely associated last year.

He fully endorsed General Gowon's emphasis on "One Nigeria." He said he believed himself had coined the phrase even before independence.

Dr. Azikiwe raised hopes for an end to the civil war when he met General Gowon during a brief stopover in Lagos last week on his way to Liberia, and to Monrovia he joined Gen. Gowon and President William Tubman talks on the war. He left Monrovia for London last Friday.

Dr. Azikiwe said he appreciated Gen. Gowon's flexible attitude and his willingness to see the other fellow's point of view without necessarily compromising on fundamental issues.

This was "a mark of true greatness in a leader" and presaged hope for rebuilding a united country.

Today's session will be addressed by the Premier, Mr. Wilson, who will have to face demands for the

abolition of current prices and incomes legislation and the Prices and Incomes Board. He is expected to dangle in front of the congress the carrot of legislation to strengthen trade union rights, while refusing to discuss the Government's plans to extend its prices and incomes legislation for four months after its expiry on December 31. This could mean a new trial of strength between a leftward-moving T.U.C. and a Government based up with an approaching General Election. The Government has the financial support of the T.U.C.

The congress's attitude will help to determine the outcome of the coming negotiations between T.U.C. leaders and the Secretary for Employment and Productivity, Mr. Cates, on the prices and incomes. But if Mr. Wilson needs to keep on good terms with the T.U.C. in the pre-election period, he and the T.U.C. leaders are both anxious for a truce in industrial relations. Following the T.U.C. victory over the Government in June when the unions obliged the Government to withdraw its proposed legislation against unofficial strikes in favour of a "voluntary" T.U.C. drive to restrain such strikes, doubt has arisen as to whether the T.U.C. will in fact prevent unofficial strikes. One other subject of conflict seems likely to arise, in the shape of a resolution from the Engineers and Technicians Union, led by Mr. Clive Jenkins, calling for the withdrawal of Britain's application to join the European Common Market. The T.U.C. chief, who are on the whole pro-Market, will try to prevent discussion of this resolution so as not to embarrass the Government.

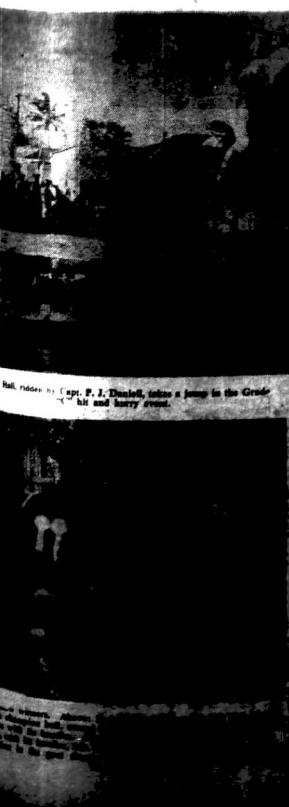

Malindi in danger of losing its appeal

If tourism is to remain the mainstay of Kenya's economy, many county and urban councils will have to improve their services. There appears to be, on their part, a general lack of pride in the appearance of their towns and villages, with no regard for the rate-payer.

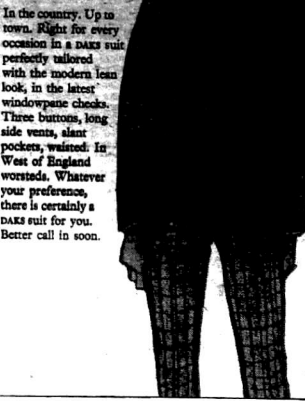

50 held for plotting against Greek regime

The Army-backed Greek Government said at the weekend that its security men had discovered a Royalist underground organisation aimed at overthrowing the régime and restoring King Constantine. About 50 people, including high-ranking retired officers and former politicians, are being held by the police for their part in the plot. Mr. Dimitrios Zafropoulos, director-general of the Press Ministry, told a Press conference in Athens.

The organisation had been formed in the summer of 1968 by officers cashiered for their part in the Royalist coup in December, 1967, he said.

It was later joined by other officers, opponents of the present Government and left-wingers.

The aim of the plot was to provide 'uphaul' in various parts of the country in the style of the Royal Coup in December 1967 and thus provoke intervention by foreign governments. Mr. Zafropoulos said.

He added last December the officers addressed a letter to all former Greek politicians, including the Right-wing leader, Constantine Karamanlis, now in Paris and Genoa, Karamanlis, secretary-general of the outlawed Greece Communist Party in the Eastern bloc.

If that succeeded they would have brought back King Constantine and abolished the new Government by an overwhelming majority last September. Mr. Zafropoulos said.

Callaghan plea on 'package deal'

The British Home Secretary, Mr. Callaghan, flew back to London at the weekend after a three-day visit to Northern Ireland, during which he visited the areas of Belfast and Londonderry affected by violence last month.

At a Press conference in Belfast before he left, Mr. Callaghan called for the barricades in the riot-torn areas to be taken down and for the people to accept a 'package deal' which had been put forward earlier in a joint communiqué issued by Mr. Callaghan and the Northern Irish Government.

The communiqué which followed talks between Mr. Callaghan and Government Ministers, said the following reforms were necessary:

- 1—Equality of all Northern Irish citizens in employment in the public service.
- 2—Protection of all citizens against incitement to racial violence.
- 3—Guaranteed impartiality in the allocation of local authority housing.
- 4—Establishment of an effective procedure for the hearing of complaints against the public authorities with provision for compensation in successful cases.
- 5—A equitable representation of minority groups in public bodies at local and national level.

The communiqué said that Mr. Callaghan had taken note of the Stormont Government's decision to set up a body to ensure that the Catholic community was not subjected to any religious discrimination.

It added that a joint committee of the Stormont and London Governments would be set up to examine the areas in which the Stormont Government's policies were capable of giving equality for all the people of Northern Ireland, notably with respect to housing, employment and community relations.

The communiqué disclosed that the British Government was to give £1250,000 in aid to the last victims.

At his Press conference, Mr. Callaghan said there was the question of doing away with the Stormont Government, a measure demanded by civil rights militants. He added that he could not assist what he called the demands of a few and ignore the 95 per cent of the people who only wanted peace.

A self-styled 'Ulster Truth Squad' consisting of Mr. Robin Baggie and Mr. W. Stratton Mills, members of the Parliament of Northern Ireland have arrived in New York to counter the allegations of Mrs. Bernadette Devlin, 22, the British M.P. who has been touring the United States in search of funds for the relief of the civil victims.

Mrs. Mills said Mrs. Devlin was giving a 'distorted picture of the situation' and declared that 'this female Castro in a micro-skirt must be put in her true perspective'.

Amendment to state of emergency rules in Zambia

Those mentioned for the first time at the weekend include an amendment providing that a state of emergency need not be renewed by Parliament every six months.

It would in future be revoked by the President or by a resolution passed by a National Assembly majority.

Another amendment will disqualify detainees from election to Parliament. Six months' restriction or detention of a Member will mean he will automatically forfeit his seat.

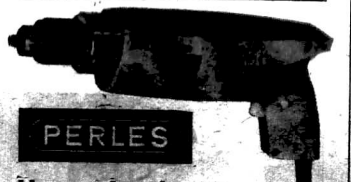

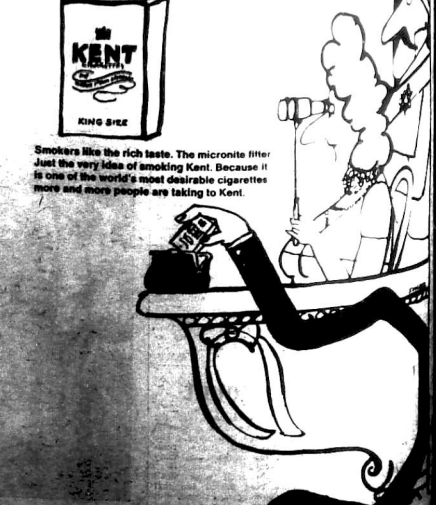

Mr Zafropoulos said that the party, which appeared in the Eastern Bloc, is considering a similar strike against King Constantine.

Callaghan plea on 'package deal'

The British Home Secretary Mr Callaghan flew back to London at the weekend after a three-day visit to Northern Ireland during which he visited the areas of Belfast and Londonderry affected by violence last month.

At a Press conference in Belfast before he left, Mr Callaghan called for the barricades in the riotous areas to be taken down, and for the people to accept a "package deal" which had been put forward earlier in a joint communiqué issued by Mr Callaghan and the Northern Irish Government.

The communiqué, which followed talks between Mr Callaghan and Government Ministers, said the following points were necessary:

- 1—Equality of all Northern Irish citizens in the eyes of the law.
- 2—Protection of all citizens against discrimination on religious grounds.
- 3—Guaranteed impartiality in the allocation of local authority housing.
- 4—Establishment of an effective procedure for the hearing of complaints against the public authorities with provision for compensation in successful cases.
- 5—An equitable representation of minority groups in public bodies at local and national level.

The communiqué said that Mr Callaghan had taken note of the Stormont Government's decision to set up a body to ensure that the Catholic community was not subject to any religious discrimination.

It added that a joint committee of the Stormont and London Governments would be set up to examine the extent to which the Stormont Government's policies were capable of ensuring equality for all the people of Northern Ireland, notably with respect to housing, employment and community relations.

The communiqué disclosed that the British Government was to give £250,000 in aid to the riot victims.

At his Press conference, Mr Callaghan said there was no question of doing away with the Stormont Government, a measure demanded by civil rights militants. He added that he could not satisfy what he called the demands of a few and ignore the 95 per cent of the people who only wanted peace.

A self-styled "Ulster Truth Squad" consisting of Mr Robin Bullock and Mr W. Stratton Mills, members of the Parliament of Northern Ireland, have arrived in New York to counter the allegation of Miss Bernadette Devlin, 22, the British M.P. who has been touring the United States in search of funds for the relief of the riot victims.

Mr Mills said Miss Devlin was giving a "distorted picture of the situation" and declared that "this female Castro in a mini-skirt must be put in her true perspective."

Amendment to state of emergency rules in Zambia

The Government has announced new Bills to amend constitutional changes recently announced by President Kaunda.

The Government Gazette also published Bills to make other amendments to emergency rules.

The amendments mentioned for the first time at the weekend include an amendment providing that a state of emergency need not be renewed by Parliament every six months.

It would in future be reviewed by the President or by a resolution passed by a National Assembly majority.

Another amendment will disqualify detainees from election to Parliament. Six months' restriction or detention of a Member will mean he will automatically forfeit his seat.

Inquiry into stand collapse

The Northern Transvaal Rugby Union will hold an inquiry into the cause of an accident in which more than 200 people were injured, some seriously, when a stand collapsed at a rugby ground in Pretoria on Saturday.

Some of the spectators fell 70 feet and were trapped in wreckage when the stand gave way minutes after a match between Northern Transvaal and the touring Australian.

Police cars and ambulances rushed to the ground after the accident, but hurriedly departed, ignoring appeals to clear the area, hampering rescue efforts.

In the inquiry, it is expected that the cause of the accident will be determined. The stand was built in 1968 and was supposed to be safe for 20 years. The inquiry will also look into the safety of other stands in the country.

Karanja wins three-mile race

Joseph Karanja, Kenya's international miler, took to the three-mile race for the East African Posts and Telecommunications athletics meeting at Mbagathi, on Saturday at a time of 14 min 55 sec.

He trailed the Kenya poleman, Wachira, for most of the race but took the lead on the final lap with a time that is equivalent to a 14 min. 27 sec. 1,000 metres run.

Karanja was competing in the open events and had run prior to this in the 400 metres against another Kenya international, Robert Okoko, who won in 49.76. Okoko also took the open mile in 4 min 12 sec, from Wachira but the best performance of the afternoon came from Edward Kumbua, a schoolboy, who won the open 100 yards in 9.56 sec on a loose-murdered race.

In the E.A.P. and T. championships, Kenya edged out Tanzania and Uganda in the team event, winning 147 points. Tanzania was second with 132 points and Uganda third on 121 points.

Performances were generally a low standard in the closed events but four records were broken. Two went to I. Olole of Uganda who won the mile in 4 min 28.2 sec and the half-mile in 2 min 26.6 sec. A Tanzanian, J. Zambi, won the long jump with 21 ft. 2 in to break the record. A Kenyan, C. Okoye, won the triple jump with a record 44 ft. 4 in.

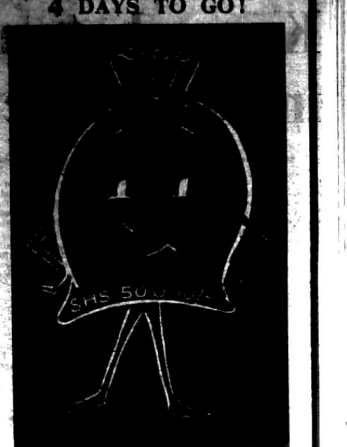

At exhibits of a briefcase and a gun. On July 9, Mr. Hobbs went on a revolver and seven live cartridges were found in a box under a bed in the house which Njenga lived in with his wife, in Ofisa Jericho.

The revolver was wrapped in a handkerchief and bound with string, placed in an envelope, which, in turn, was in another envelope.

The cartridges were Wadsworth bullets. They did not come to a rounded point, but had a definite edge and were the kind used for target practice.

Expert witnesses would say that the bullets taken from Mr. Mboya's body appeared to be of the same type.

An expert would tell the court that he carried out tests with the gun and with two bullets. He would give an opinion that the two bullets recovered from the body were fired through the barrel of the gun found in Njenga's house.

Evidence would be given of how the barrel of each gun was found through the same as that of any other gun, and of how they were fired through the barrel of a gun which had an impression of the barrel's imperfections.

On July 10 police had found a briefcase in the same house which had been overlooked on the first visit. The house had, however, been under guard.

The case would be shown to be similar to the one carried by the man seen running away from the scene of the shooting.

A plastic wallet had been found inside the case. The court would see the wallet and certain marks found in it and would hear a police officer with experience in that kind of work compare the marks and the gun.

Samples of fibres from the floor of the case and from the handkerchief would be produced and it would be shown that the fibres on the handkerchief could have come from the fibres of the case.

Minute traces of lead on the inside of the wallet would be shown to be consistent with the wallet having been in contact with bullets.

It would be part of the prosecution case that Mr. Hobbs said that the gun was at some time carried in the case along with the handkerchief.

Mr. Hobbs outlined some of the evidence that would be brought concerning fingerprints allegedly found on the briefcase and on the inside of the cylinder of the gun, before calling his three witnesses, Mr. Oromo Nundu.

Mr. Nundu, answering Mr. Hobbs, said he was a private secretary to the late Minister. On the day the murder Mr. Mboya had been at his office in Treasury Building from 9.30 a.m. and had left between 12.30 and 1 p.m.

Mr. Nundu said he accompanied Mr. Mboya to the car park as he left his office. He saw Mr. Mboya dismiss his driver and get into his car. That was the last time he saw Mr. Mboya alive. He identified the Minister's car and said it was about one year old.

She remembered that he had been wearing black trousers and a checked coat and carrying a black briefcase in his left hand. The briefcase had a "white stripe of steel" similar to one shown her in court.

Mr. Warburton did not cross-examine Miss Bux. Her witness called was Miss Val Fernandez, a secretary, who was employed by the British-American Insurance Company in Nairobi.

She said she was shopping on July 5 in Government Road when she saw a man running towards the opposite side of the road. She turned to look towards Chhani's Pharmacy the street on from which the shots had come.

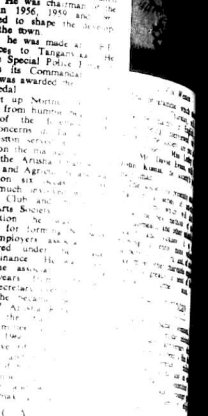

Chama's President-elect, Dr. Keil Busia, says his Government will examine anew debts from foreign creditors incurred during the regime of ex-President Njirama.

Many of the debts could not have scrutiny, he said in his first statement since his Progress Party stormed to a massive victory in the first recent elections since Dr. Njirama's overthrow in 1966.

The 56-year-old sociology professor told reporters at his press conference on Sunday that Ghana would honour all legal contracts. But some were corrupt, he added, "and we will deal with them."

On foreign policy, Dr. Busia predicted eventual political links with Ghana's neighbouring French-speaking countries of the Ivory Coast, Upper Volta and Togo, but the first priority, he said, was Ghana itself.

At the latest election count the Progress Party had gained 100 seats in the 140-seat National Assembly against the 79 of its nearest rival, the National Alliance of Liberals.

The United Nationalist Party has two seats, the All Peoples' Republic Party one and independent Dr. Busia won nearly all seats in the majority Akana-speaking tribal areas. His main opponent, Mr. Kwame Gbedemah, of the National Alliance of Liberals, dominated in the Ewe area of the Volta Region.

Marciano dies in air crash

The former world heavyweight boxing champion, Rocky Marciano, was killed in an airplane crash in Iowa, it was announced yesterday.

Rocky Marciano, 49, born as American Italian parents in Brockton, Massachusetts, was described in his prime as the most dangerous unarmed man in the world.

One of the few great fighters that money could not attempt to



make a come-back he retired on April 27, 1956, as undefeated heavyweight champion of the world.

No other boxer is likely to bear his remarkable record of having won all of his 49 professional fights, all but six of them by knock-out. He was only floored twice in his career which lasted eight years.

After winning his title in 1952 from Jersey Joe Walcott by a knock-out in the 13th round he defended his title six times, finally basing up his gloves as a Archy Moore in the ninth round in 1955.

He never fought again for two reasons because of his wife Barbara and daughter Mary, for whom he wanted to make a good home, and because of his injuries.

Now called the Rock, he was a fighter but more frequently a boxer, underestimated as he was, for he does not rank among the first six of the all-time great heavyweights.

His life followed the usual pattern of great fighters, climbing from rags to riches through their father's shop and then as a labourer digging trenches.

Marciano's early days of boxing came when he was in the U.S. Army, in which he boxed with great success as an amateur.

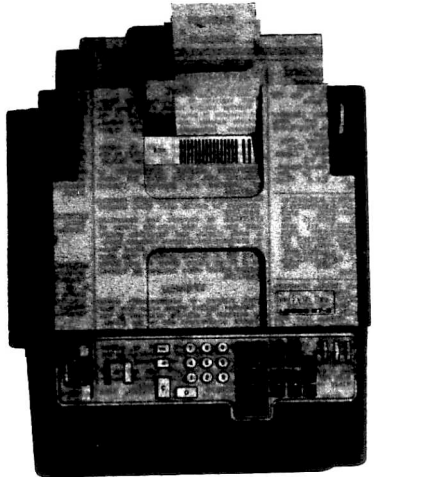

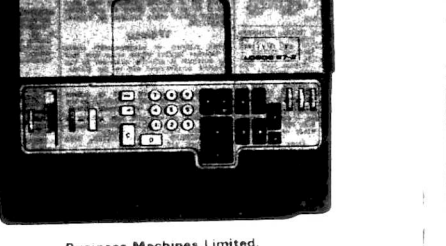

House search for Njenga's safety

Standard Staff Reporters

Asked in cross-examination by Mr. Sam Waruhiri, defending Njenga, to say why, Mr. Sokki said: "We had observed a fairly large crowd gathering outside, and if the fact of finding the gun had been known to the crowd the life of the accused would have been endangered by keeping him there."

Lengthy legal arguments followed concerning the admissibility of alleged statements in which it is claimed Njenga told police he brought the gun from a Kiili tribesman, and asked them: "Why don't you go and get some big man? We did what we are told."

Mr. Justice Simpson finally admitted the evidence, saying he would give reasons later.

Inspector tells of print on revolver

 The second day of the trial opened with evidence from Mr. John Makau who lives in Nairobi. Answering questions from Mr. Justice Simpson, Mr. Makau said he saw the white walking towards the railway station in front of the Hilton Hotel. Mr. Makau saw him running round a shop adjacent to the pharmacy.

He said the man was of medium build, about 5ft. 4in. He was an African. He had not seen his face, only the side of him, and he could not identify him at identification parades.

Cross-examined by Mr. Waruhiri, the witness said the man had tried to run. He thought the man might be someone going in the same direction.

Asked by Mr. Waruhiri if he had seen anyone going in the opposite direction, Mr. Makau said: "When I heard the shots some people were going towards the pharmacy and some were running back because they were frightened."

He agreed there had been many people in the street at the time.

Ans. Supp. J. J. Njoroge, attached to the scene of the crime, said he was called to the scene of the crime on July 9. He gave instructions to the police to search for fingerprints, and to take some pictures.

The same day he went to the casualty department of Nairobi Hospital, where he saw the body of a man he recognized as Mr. Mboya. Dr. Rogoff began the post-mortem examination. Mr. Rowe said one photograph was an actual-size picture of a bullet wound in the centre of the left side of the forehead. Another was an actual-size photograph of a hole in the right forehead.

Both holes were on the front of the body.

On July 9 he received from Supp. J. J. Njoroge a revolver. The number C58714 was on the butt and another, 6985, on the cylinder. When he received it it was wrapped in a handkerchief and both the gun and the handkerchief were inside a small envelope which bore the name of Nahason Isaac Njenga Njoroge.

All these articles were inside another envelope which had the name of Nahason Isaac Njenga Njoroge on it. The envelope was addressed to Mr. Grimey, Nairobi, Kenya.

At the time he had produced the envelope, it had photographs of the revolver and the bullet taken from the right shoulder. He examined the revolver for fingerprints. This was on the finger of the cylinder, which was protected by the top body frame of the cylinder. The cylinder was clipped back into place, there was no mark on it and it could then be removed only by pulling the trigger. It was impossible for a finger to be placed on the cylinder when it was closed, there was no other mark on the gun.

Asked if he had any explanation for this, Mr. Rowe said: "The gun had been in a handkerchief which could have wiped clean of prints. The gun had been photographed by the police."

Mr. Rowe said he had produced the gun to the witness and said: "On July 9, it is the witness, who had produced it to the court, and Mr. Rowe said: "Yes, I had handed it to the witness, and he had produced it to the court."

Addis awaits Biafrans

A "semi-official" Biafran delegation, expected soon at the O.A.U. Ministerial conference in Addis Ababa, will try to pave the way for the arrival of an official delegation, possibly led by Biafran leader, Gen. Ojukwu, a relative of the Biafran leader.

The arrival of the "semi-official" delegation is seen as the result of an invitation by Emperor Haile Selassie to General Ojukwu to attend the conference in person.

Gen. Ojukwu, the source said, had already sent an aide-memoire to President Houphouët Bouigny of Ivory Coast and Rongo of Gabon setting down a number of indispensable conditions for his presence at the O.A.U. summit opening at the end of this week.

The conditions reportedly are:—

- 1—A modification by the O.A.U. of the "paritetic" Kinshasa resolution, which states that any settlement must be based on a Nigerian unity.
- 2—Recognition of the possibility of settling the conflict by force of arms. The aide-memoire proposed that a ceasefire be effected and that negotiations should be resumed without any prior conditions.
- 3—Dissolution of the consultative committee created by Emperor Haile Selassie.
- 4—Recognition of the Biafran delegation to the O.A.U. conference. This would place Biafran delegates on the same footing as the other delegates.

Given these conditions, conference circles remain very sceptical about the chances of the progress on the Nigerian conflict in the three or four days at its disposal.

FEDERAL GUNBOATS HARRY PILOTS

Relief flights into Biafra are facing renewed anti-aircraft attacks from Federal Nigerian gunboats stationed in the Atlantic. A World Council of Churches source said in Orléans, Biafra yesterday.

He added that the gunboats had suddenly resumed action after a month's silence. Pilots bringing relief materials on Saturday night reported heavy firing.

The World Council forms part of the joint church aid group bringing relief supplies into the breakaway territory.

Three Soviet warships, including two missile destroyers, sailed quietly into Lagos Harbour on Monday according to a Federal Defence Ministry official. He said the ships were in transit.

A visit to Lagos by four Soviet warships in March created panic on the waterfront when they exchanged ceremonial gun salutes with a shore battery.

President Tsiranana of Madagascar has proposed that Nigeria become a confederate state in which Biafra would have its own diplomatic relations with foreign countries.

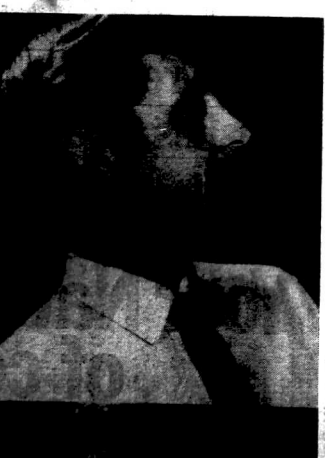

The first step is a letter to the advertiser or advertiser. Since he usually prefers to conceal his identity, the mail is forwarded to his address through the newspaper's "box" system.

In recent years India's newspapers have become the country's major match-makers, displacing those traditional matrimonial merchants, the barbers and the Brahmins. Hundreds of married couples owe their married state to that little advertisement. This is how it goes.

The father of a grown-up girl reckons it is time the apple of his eye was settled in wedlock. He drafts a brief insertion for the matrimonial column in his favourite Hindi girl, 21, B. A. B. Ed., well-connected, respectable family.

The prospective groom's parents read the advertisement and size up the girl and her family. The educated and good-looking girl is desirable in a good dowry. So, a note will go to the particulars, academic and professional attainments, salary, career prospects and family background.

More letters are exchanged and if both the parties approve the girl's parents usually accompany the parents. After lunch or tea the two parties separate to consult their relatives and family friends.

making business was left to the family's priest or barber who happened to know all the families in the neighbourhood. But with the trick to the cities the professional matchmakers have gone out of business. The newspapers have filled the vacuum.

The matrimonial column made its debut in a Punjabi English language paper about 30 years ago. Then, it evolved into a matrimonial column as a reliable and easy match-making market. For one thing, in tradition-bound India society where sex segregation is the rule rather than the exception, few young men get a chance to meet girls in clubs or lose face if the marriage deal falls to come off, because many others are doing the same thing now.

The advertisement is cheaper than the expense involved in divorcing a party who might be living in a fat-off town.

It only costs 30 to 50 rupees newspapers which on Sundays fill six to seven columns of space with 100 to 400 matrimonial notices and Sunday circulations are booming.

Leading newspapers engaged in the matchmaking business include the *Hindustan Times*, *Times of India*, *Indian Express*, *Hindu*, *Amrita Bazar Patrika* and *Tribune*. Scores of vernacular papers run matrimonial columns to boost their otherwise small revenues.

Radio Tripoli broadcast the information that the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine had sent a message of support to the Libyan Revolutionary Council, which said the Front's leaders considered the revolution "a great step forward on the road to the liberation of Palestine."

All these signs strengthen indications that Libya has moved into the militant Arab fold at a time when the Heads of State of the U.A.R., Syria and Jordan, with an Iraqi delegation, are meeting in Cairo to consider measures for increasing the tempo of their opposition to Israel.

An American view, expressed at the headquarters of the Occidental Petroleum Corporation in Los Angeles, one of the most important companies operating in Libya, is that oil supplies will not be imperilled because the new Government needs the revenue and support to the Libyan (Libyan personnel) to take over. In the long term, this may turn out to be an over-optimistic opinion. If there are no Libyan oil technicians, there are plenty in other countries of the Middle East and the U.S.S.R.

The revolution has ranged one of the richest Middle East States alongside the Arab Socialist countries. Since the discovery of oil after the Second World War, Libya has leapt from poverty and obscurity to immense wealth as the third biggest oil producer in the world — 197,000,000 tons a year, its per capita revenue is the highest of any country in Africa and Libya benefits from high standards of free education and medical treatment. Despite this economic and social progress, Libya has been politically unstable ever since its formation in 1951 after the period of French and British military rule succeeding the defeat of the Axis forces.

Libyan access to the consortium of socialist republics dominated from the Middle East will weaken the power of the three remaining Arab monarchs — King Faisal of Saudi Arabia, King Hussein of Jordan and King Hassan of Morocco. In turn, therefore, it could complicate the task

A message from the U.N. in New York states that, politically, the coup appears to reinforce the position of those Arab leaders who insist that only war can solve the Middle East crisis. These leaders regard the U.S.S.R. as their friend and the U.S. and Israel enemy in hostility.

King Idris had refused to accept the 20-year Anglo-Libyan treaty, signed in 1953, despite pressure intensified after the June War. Libyan armed forces consist of some 7,000 men and 5,000 and 7,000 men stiffened by a small British cadre, with a naval force trained by the British and an air force stationed at the gigantic American Wheelus base. Under the agreements with the U.S. and the U.S.S.R., these bases are due to be closed in 1971.

Consequently, military thinking projected beyond the immediate thinking about the coup cannot exclude the possibility of co-operation between the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. and the U.A.R., leading to the establishment of Egyptian naval and their use — the Soviet and American forces.

The U.A.R. air stations are currently within easy striking distance of Israel. Withdrawal of Libyan bases, the U.A.R. strategic air force would be more protected from a pre-emptive strike than was the situation in June 1967, when it was written in the first day of hostilities. Indeed, U.A.R. bases in Libya would be out of the range of aircraft currently in Israeli service, until the delivery of the Phantom Jets promised by the U.S.

The coup has seriously upset the strategic balance in North Africa and the Mediterranean region. No wonder U.N. observers are reported as having grave fears that the prospects of a negotiated Middle East settlement have receded.

The life of Biafra's soldiers

Biafra is fighting Nigerian tanks and plants with an army of 150,000 soldiers aged from 18 to 23, each armed with an automatic rifle and 40 cartridges, writes an A.F.P. correspondent.

All men available for conscription are not necessarily in the army which is partly made up of volunteers and partly of young peasants sent to the front. In Biafra, the young men are ordered to follow them. Very often these young men take to their heels into nearby fields and have to be chased by soldiers.

Once the young peasant is a soldier he has little chance of returning to his village. There is no time limit to his army service and he is only demobilised when he is wounded. Exempted from military services are civil servants and those who are employed in charitable organisations as the government feels their work is of national importance.

A young recruit is given a month's training before being sent to the front. If he shows outstanding ability he is sent to the officer cadet training school at Owerri, a former school, in the north-west of Owerri. This cadet school, in a former school, is commanded by a magnificent band of officers of about 30. Col. Onwaka, one of the heroes of the capture of Owerri, is in the post. His military training, having graduated at Sandhurst, is for 18 weeks before the young recruit is sent to the front.

"Unfortunately we have inherited the majority of our military equipment from the English," the Colonel said. "But we have adapted them to the kind of war we are waging. What counts above all is how a man goes into battle. Our soldiers must learn how to hit hard, quickly and unexpectedly. The cadets are learning each day 'the new revolutionary tactics' as the Colonel calls them, while at the same time they are subjected to strong psychological pressures. For two hours every week the soldiers are shown photographs of Nigerian troops in preparation for going into battle."

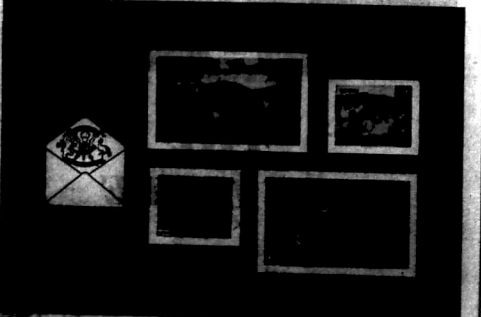

President Kaunda in full command

Dr Kenneth Kaunda, Zambia's President since independence five years ago, has emerged as the arbiter of national unity after a week of political crisis and months of tension.

The country was more strident than ever he said at a dinner in honour of the visiting Gambian Premier, Sir David Jusuwa.

The tension reached its peak with the resignation on Monday last week of the Vice-President, Mr. Simon Kapwepwe, who said his fellow Zambia tribesmen were being discriminated against and he wanted to avert possible bloodshed.

Today Mr. Kapwepwe, though absent from office, has remained in the Government as a member of internal peace in the next 12 months.

Dr Kaunda appears to have firmly reasserted his position. He has set the nation well on the way to its final goal with sweeping constitutional, economic and party reforms, all moves which should enhance his authority.

Some observers interpret events of recent weeks as a crisis planned from the top to preserve the unity of the ruling United National Independence Party and, therefore, the unity of Zambia.

Trade unionists have recently accused nationalist leaders of being involved in tribalism, which one has described as a national cancer. Some believe the underlying reasons for these attacks and party reforms announced by the President is that campaigning on tribal lines for posts in the Union executive had got out of hand.

The President, who led his country to freedom on a policy of moderation, last week said he would appoint a commission to reform the party constitution. The reforms were essential, he said, to counter sectionalism and tribalism among politicians.

The political crisis came soon after his announcement to a party rally on August 11 that the State would take a 51 per cent interest in the country's copper mines.

Fortunes in used cars
Car smugglers are making a fortune in Nigeria because of the civil war. An embargo on the importing of new cars has sent second-hand prices soaring.

Nigeria's roads are clogged with cars with foreign registration number plates. British, French, German and American number plates are everywhere.

The law allows these imported cars to be used for three months. These plates must be changed to Nigerian numbers. But cost is prohibitive - anything up to 100 per cent import duty on the value of the vehicle.

Hence the sky-high prices of used cars. A second-hand Volkswagen, Mini or Opel which in the past would have cost about £200 or £300, is now being offered for £800 or £900 - more than the new.

A unique role as a 'flying squad' is planned for a batch of newly-qualified teachers in the Federal Republic of Cameroon to help speed up its educational expansion. In this article ALASTAIR MATTHESON of Unicef explains how they will be used.

The authorities are meanwhile anxious to ensure that the next phase of the programme will be as successful as the first - hence the doubly important role of the 'flying squad'.

Only one of these five Kikuli children of Northern Cameroon has a chance of attending school, on present statistics. There is such a shortage of teachers that only 10 per cent of children of school age are actually at school, compared with 84 per cent in the more developed south of the country.

President Kaunda in full command

Dr. Kenneth Kaunda, Zambia's President since independence five years ago, has emerged as the architect of national unity after a week of political crisis and months of tension. The country was now stronger than ever, he said at a dinner honouring the visiting Zambian Premier on David Lwanga.

The tension reached its peak with the resignation on Monday last week of the Vice-President, Mr. Simon Kapwepwe who said his fellow Zambians were being discriminated against and wanted to avert possible bloodshed.

Today Mr. Kapwepwe, though shorn of some of his powers, remains in office. He withdrew his resignation after an appeal from the President.

Mr. Kapwepwe's continued presence in the Government is considered to be the best guarantee of internal peace in the next 12 months.

The reforms were essential, he said, to counter sectionalism and parochialism among politicians.

The political crisis came soon after his announcement to a party rally on August 11 that the State would take a 51 per cent interest in the country's copper mines.

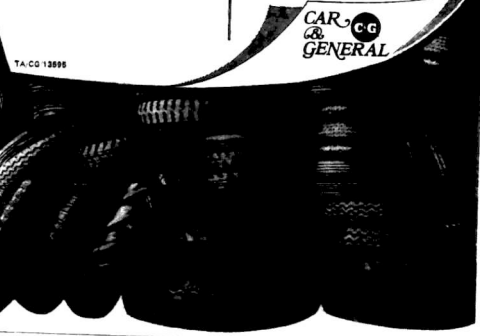
Fortunes in used cars

by language, tribe, religion and so on. There are 200 different ones, and people are tackling their formidable problems with a vigor that is the envy of many other African States.

The North has a modest, but rapidly growing industrial base. What is helping to diversify the economy away from agriculture, although coffee, bananas and cocoa remain the mainstay of the export trade.

But one of the most serious disciplines in the Cameroon today is in education. Lack of schools is hampering the improvement of living standards, especially in the Northern Cameroons, where school attendance is a mere 14 per cent of children of school age, as compared with 80 per cent in the more developed southern areas.

Although it was never the policy of the colonial rulers to administer the North as a separate entity from the South, the mountain barrier presented by the 100-mile-wide Adamoua Range, plus the fact that the North is largely arid, rocky and unproductive, has accounted for the fact that the Northerners do not have the amenities available to those in the lush rainforests of the South, or in the pastoral prairies of the Grasslands Plateau in the West.

The North has received a new deal in the second Five-Year plan now being implemented by the Ahdjo Government. This is designed to bring about a more equal distribution of wealth, and hinges on the development of Cameroonian qualified teachers.

In the six years from 1961 to 1966, the country was able to increase enrolment to more than 600,000, but then encountered the teacher "bottleneck". This is due largely to the fact that in the Cameroon as a whole, only 25 per cent of the teaching staff are regarded as "auxiliary teachers" but without them the existing education system would collapse.

Only 1 per cent of the teachers are fully qualified by recognised standards. Faced with this depressing situation, the authorities took the bold step of instituting a "crash" training programme designed to bring about a dramatic change in the teaching pattern by 1970 and a whole new system by 1975.

To do this they enlisted the aid of the United Nations Development Programme with its Special Fund and of the specialised agencies - UNICEF and UNESCO. The programme will involve the re-training of its less than 40,000 under-trained teachers at the same time as new, younger teachers are given intensive courses which will have a strong bias towards agriculture and rural life.

The first step came in 1967 with the opening in Yaounde, the inland capital, of a new type of teacher training college, the Ecole Normale d'Enseignement Rural. First intake was a modest 70 students, but by next year full enrolment will reach 200. Six

UNESCO experts are on the way to be opened. Three more similar colleges are being considered necessary and are being set up in 1970. A 70-strong force of newly trained teachers will be sent into a "flying squad" to form the nucleus of the new schools. Their task will be to train or retrain teachers for the existing schools, for the training or retraining courses that they can acquire an up-to-date orientation.

The end result of the programme, or so it is hoped, will be the upgrading of 100,000 teachers, while the "flying squad" will be used to make up the deficiencies caused by the loss of the under-trained teachers who will eventually drop out of the system.

The authorities are determined to ensure that the programme phases be left without interruption. Hence the double importance of the "flying squad" system.

The staff of the bureau is available for short term advisory visits overseas and provides a professional corps within the Ministry to assist in the processing requests for aid and in the recruitment of suitable people for overseas assignments.

One of the principal concerns of the bureau is to stimulate activity directed towards population study in British academic institutions.

One immediate result of this will be the inauguration of a course in medical demography, financed by the Ministry for Overseas and local post-graduates at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. This one-year course, probably leading to an M.Sc. degree, will give an academic multidisciplinary foundation for graduates making their careers in these new programmes.

Another project to start soon is the formation of a research unit to study fertility behaviour in its psychological and sociological manifestations.

COMMUNAL RIOTS IN INDIA

Petty prejudice that leads to murder

If pious resolutions and brave talk could substitute for action, India's communal problem would have been solved long ago. Whenever communal clashes occur in any State and no State, alas, has escaped this communal frenzy — India's leaders deluge the hapless public with rhetoric.

"We must declare a total war on communalism."

"The Government will show no mercy to merchants of mischief and traders of lies."

The day after the outbreak of the riots from the troubled areas the resolutions are forgotten, a couple of hundred had characters put behind the bars and a judicial probe ordered.

Communal violence is the antithesis of national integration — it is in sight.

The Hindu-Muslim riots in early June in India, a beautiful town in Madhya Pradesh, which claimed more than a dozen lives, should prove that slogans are no substitute for action. I believe the leaders know that the trouble-makers understand only the language of ruthless punishment.

Suggestions were mooted at the National Integration Council conference to combat the communal problem. Mr. P. G. Gopalswami, a former Chief Justice, advocated the death penalty for public flogging. Another leader urged summary trials of ringleaders.

But the leaders are reluctant to antagonise the majority community which counts at the polls. Every politician has his eyes on the next election.

Urgent police action can prevent communal trouble but the police themselves are not above communalism of one kind or another. They often ignore communal clashes or even encourage the majority community to menace the minority community.

Muslim police

That is why several leaders have suggested that police officers should be held personally responsible for communal rioting. The Government so far has not enhanced punishment for communal offences, not instituted summary trials of the guilty, and not fixed the responsibility of police officials.

The late Prime Minister, Indira Gandhi, made a serious suggestion to the State Governments to recruit more Muslim policemen. A mixed police cadre, he felt, would inspire confidence in the Muslims.

Communal virus

About this time last year when the nation was perturbed by the spreading communal virus, the Prime Minister, Mrs. Indira Gandhi, called a conference of the National Integration Council in Shimla and impressed on the leaders of all parties the need for permanent vigilance against the dark forces of communalism.

"We lamented that the communal problem was very much there even after 20 years of freedom," she said. "It is a shame that Indian nationalists should feel insecure in their own homes."

The Home Minister, Mr. Y. B. Chavan, declared "Communalism and regionalism are the very antitheses of national integration."

Mrs. Gandhi and Mr. Chavan set full marks for defining the problem clearly. As for follow-up action, that is another matter.

COPPER EXPORTERS PLAN DEFENCES

The Peruvian Mines and Energy Minister, General Jorge Fernandez Maldonado, told reporters: "This is the first time the 17 main copper-exporting countries have met to discuss matters related to the world copper market and the defence of this industry, as well as policies of the countries."

Lebanon to buy French missiles

Lebanon has ordered an unspecified amount of French anti-air missiles from France under a contract, signed several months ago, reliable sources said in Paris.

The missiles will not start before the end of 1971.

Paris sources underlined that the missiles are not a French military weapon, but that it is being manufactured in France for the South African Government, which is financing its development.

The Lebanese order was placed with the full agreement of South Africa, the sources said. Its value was not stated.

Cactus, which is being developed by two French firms — Thomson-CSF and Matra — is a low-altitude anti-aircraft defence missile. Its range is 6.25 miles.

It is launched from a military vehicle which is accompanied by a second vehicle equipped with radar. The warhead weighs about 300 lb.

The first Cactus missiles will be delivered to South Africa next year. Tests were carried out in France in July in the presence of Mr. P. W. Botha, South Africa's Defence Minister.

According to the two French firms, Cactus has hit a target at 175 miles away and at an altitude of 200 yards.

An attack by Puerto Ricans and Negroes on a fire station started the violence in Hartford on Monday night. Scores of civilians and five policemen were injured, 160 people arrested and 60 businesses damaged.

The attack on the fire station came after several months of friction between firemen, who claim they were paid with stones and bottles in slum districts, and Puerto Ricans and Negroes, who charged that firemen used racial slurs against them.

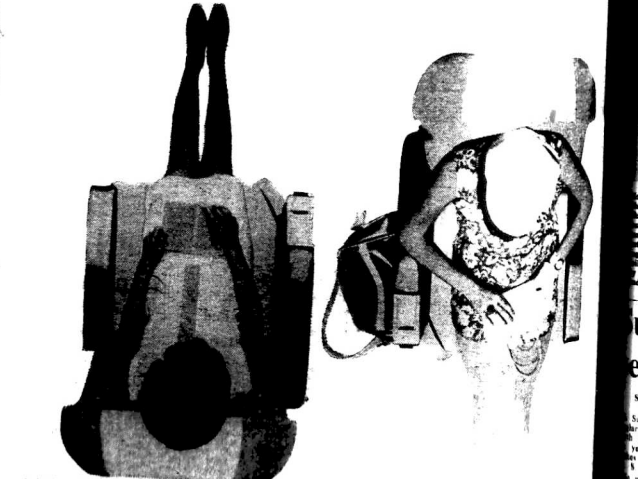

The political committee agreed on only two resolutions covering non-controversial subjects — increased African representation at the World Court and the settlement of refugees.

Whatever recommendations emerge would be submitted to the O.A.U. Summit Conference opening on Saturday. The first Heads of State and Governments are expected in Addis Ababa today.

Gowon to his field commanders on the eve of the Lagos letter's visit to Monrovia to meet President Tubman and Dr. Azikiwe (a former Nigerian President and one-time secessionist supporter).

According to the statement, the message said "Biafran leader Ojukwu's empire must not be allowed to appear on the world map."

The message allegedly continued: "The word 'Biafra' must be erased at all costs to avoid Nigeria's economic doom. Nigeria's hope for survival as a nation lies in the area now carved out by Ojukwu as his Empire."

A team of Biafran representatives was yesterday seeking support for the secessionist cause in O.A.U. members.

The Biafrans, led by the Agricul-

ture Commissioner, Professor Eyo Udien, arrived in the Ethiopian capital to be on hand for the sixth African summit which opens tomorrow.

During the summit the O.A.U.'s executive committee in Nigeria will meet in an effort to end the Nigerian civil war.

They have to be available to the committee which will report to Heads of State and Government on the progress towards a peaceful solution of the civil war in Nigeria.

The Biafrans have so far declined to make any statement, but it is believed they are in contact with the missions of the four O.A.U. members that have recognised Biafra — Gabon, the Ivory Coast, Tanzania and Zambia.

We waited in front of the Tanzanian immigration counter at the Namanga border post, and the official, holding Bill's passport, peered at us. "Is there any reason you can give me for not declaring you a Probationary Immigrant?" he asked.

We could think of several, but not one of them would convince and headed for the door to return to Kenya.

We had set off from Nairobi to go to Moshi to climb Kilimanjaro on motor cycle and this border end to all of our well-laid plans. Our spirits were low, and our chances of making it to the top looked very gloomy.

We walked outside to our small school. Inside it we had managed to pack two B.S.A. Bushman 175 cc. cycles, food for eight days, spare parts, sleeping bags, and all sorts of kit we would need for a week on a mountain, so there was little room left for the two passengers.

The two of us had long been interested in riding a motor cycle up to the top of Kilimanjaro. We were positive machinery could conquer the tallest mountain in Africa. As racers, we knew that motor cycles could almost anywhere a person could scramble.

Two weeks had been spent on preparing our machines, and knew they would pass the test. Kilimanjaro was no easy challenge, but we thought we could make it to the top.

Suddenly the border contraband seemed to have put an end to all our dreams. Instead, we decided quickly to go to Lolitokit to climb Kilimanjaro from the Kenya side. We would not have to pass through any immigration officials. If we began our climb from there.

Several motor-cycle attempts had been made from Lolitokit, but none had been successful in even getting to the saddle of the mountain. All the successful climbs had been made from Moshi, Tanzania, and now our chances of success looked unpromising.

As we drove to Lolitokit through the Amboseli Game Reserve we could see the top of Kilimanjaro clearly silhouetted against the blue sky. It looked friendly and inviting. The slopes did not look especially steep, and our spirits rose as the morning passed.

We drove into the dusty township and inquired where we could hire porters and a guide. We were directed to Dawa Singh, and he immediately set about making four porters and making arrangements for the long ride.

On the main street we began unloading the gear. The people were amazed at the number of things we had packed inside the small VW, and they continued to gaze as we assembled the two Bushman. We noted the machines, filled them with petrol, and backed up for the long trek up the mountain.

As soon as we started to move our spirits were buoyed up by the knowledge that we were moving nearer our goal.

Our first obstacle was the rain-forest, which was littered with large fallen logs up to three feet in diameter. We fitted the two cycles over each large log but tried of this labour quickly. By sitting far back on the seat of the motor cycle and ramming the log with the handlebars, Larry soon found he could ride over extremely large logs. Bill quickly followed this lead, and we both were soon bouncing over large rocks and logs in our way up the mountain.

One incident marred this otherwise successful day. Bill's cycle developed ignition trouble, and since we did not have a replacement electrical coil with us, we decided to leave it and proceed with only one motorcycle, shared between two people. The defective bike was pushed, and up the mountain we continued. We passed through the entire rainforest before dark, and when the night in the grasslands higher up.

Our second day on the mountain began on the difficult level snow.

The trail itself was fairly firm, but as soon as the cycle ground into the loose scree. At places we had to push the cycle, but most the way we were able to ride it in comfort.

As we neared the Mountain School Hut, the snow became steeper and the path very loose. Here we got our first taste of what our life would be like for the next few days. The effort used in pushing the motorcycle up the loose scree left us incredibly exhausted, and we followed the same sequence each time we moved upwards.

Since one usually had the cycle down after a turn at pushing, the rest of us would lift the cycle upright and start the engine. It usually started with one kick, and if we were tired, it was equally easy to start it with our hands by reaching over and pushing down on the kickstart. The easy starting was a blessing, for the slightest exertion at that altitude left us breathless.

After starting the engine, we would look round to be sure that either the guide or a porter was ready to help, and then slowly let the clutch out. The cycle would move upwards slowly, and when the rear wheel started to spin, you had to push to keep the machine moving. After moving fifty feet you were left breathless because of the altitude, so you just fished the cycle down and waited for the other person to catch up to take his turn in pushing the cycle.

Occasionally there were level lava flows, or stretches of firm snow where you could ride for over one hundred feet, but these became fewer and fewer as we climbed upwards.

Exhaustion at high altitudes comes very rapidly, so we left the cycle and, with our guide, set out to survey the possible routes to the top of the mountain. We looked over several possibilities, and decided on a route of fairly firm scree that had almost to the rim of the crater.

A climb with the next morning took us back to the place where we had left the cycle. The B.S.A. had not got out and left at over 16,000ft, but remarkably it started on the third kick. It was a relief to have the cycle up to the saddle of the crater, and we were completely exhausted, and was unable to continue. The next morning we began the descent to Lolitokit, where he could recover his but was small relief from our labour, for we knew a meal had to be prepared after which we could crawl into our cold sleeping bags.

Sleep is difficult at high altitudes and we never fully recovered from the previous day's hard work.

On Sunday morning we again marched up to where we had left the cycle at 17,500ft, and then quick kicks brought the engine to life. That day we pushed our hearts out. With our goal in sight we worked with renewed energy. Finally we made it to the rim and inside the crater.

We had climbed Kilimanjaro, and we had ridden a motor cycle higher than anyone else in the world. Our Bushman ran perfectly at that height, but as riders were too exhausted to see straight and too tired to feel cold. Leaving the cycle in the snow we stumbled down the mountain to 15,000ft, where we spent the night.

Our aim was to take the machine as high as it could be ridden, so we crawled up the path to the crater the next morning. It took six hours of climbing before we reached the rim where we had not begun.

We fitted a rear wheel suddenly with spikes which we hoped would give traction in the ice. This experiment was a dismal failure, and an hour was wasted putting the knobly tyre back on the rear of the motor cycle.

Then we rode the cycle around in the crater and up toward the

opposite rim of the crater. It was tricky at first riding on the snow and ice, but we soon got the hang of it and quite enjoyed this unusual experience for tropical Africa.

Again we left the cycle at the top, and staggered down to the bus. Larry set out on a slow eight-hour hike up to the top. When he arrived at the machine he was exhausted, but he set out to find a route to the top. He tried two routes to the highest point on the rim only to find sheer cliffs and ice crevasses blocked the way.

Bill rode to the top of the north rim, which is the highest point in Africa to which one can ride a motor cycle. Kilimanjaro had been beaten, and a new world

altitude record had been set. A motorcycle had been ridden to over 19,000ft. above sea level.

We believe there is no other place in the world where a motor cycle can be ridden that high, so it is a record that will probably never be broken.

Climbing the mountain was extremely hard, but going down was not much easier. The engine was shut off, and the clutch acted like a brake. With the front and rear brakes applied the cycle would still slide down the scree.

In dangerous places a rope was tied to the cycle and a porter held on to it to keep the machine from sliding too fast. The descent was slow and bring, and it was not till after dark that the hut was reached. Here Larry got a good sleep, for he could rest easy now that he had won the battle against

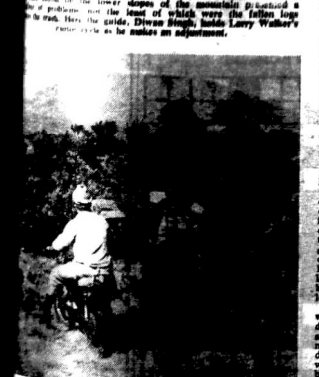
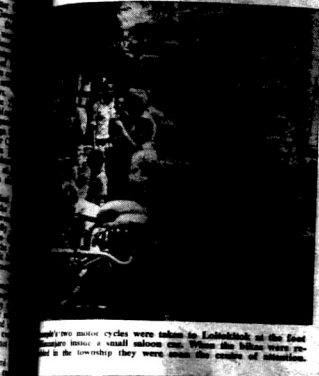
the mountain, after so many other motor-cycle attempts had failed.

We were thankful we had hired a guide, for Dawa Singh was excellent, showing us routes that no one else knew about, but which were easier for the cycle. The Bushman was ideally suited for the task. It gave no trouble for whole way up, started easily every day, and needed only minor carburettor adjustment to stay in perfect condition.

When we got down from the mountain we had set a new record, but the feeling of elation that should have gone with it was missing. Kilimanjaro had sapped us of all energy, and both of us longed for a hot bath, good food and warm bed.

Returning to Nairobi was the greatest feeling after coming down from the connoise of Kilimanjaro.

"We've made it!" A jubilant yell from Larry Walker as he rode round the rim of the crater on the B.S.A. Bushman, the twin peak of Kilimanjaro.


