

JERMAN DENIED TO DEATH did not commit this offence': Appeal likely

Nabshon Isaac Njenga Njoroge was yesterday sentenced to hang for the murder of Mr. Tom Mboya. He was found "Guilty as charged", Mr. Justice Simpson told him: "You have been found 'Guilty' of murder, and there is only one penalty provided by law."

Smile and a wave handcuffs go on

When advised of his right to appeal, he said: "Will I appeal today?" A minute later Njenga was handcuffed and led downstairs. As the handcuffs were placed on him he raised one arm and smiling, waved across the court. His wife and a companion returned the gesture.

The massive security precautions taken at the start of the case, which had become a common sight around the Law Courts, were stepped up for the last stages. More police went on duty and the crowd, split into groups, encircled the buildings. At the back entrance several prison lorries, police cars and motor-cycles were parked.

Sevens of police kept reporters away from the court. His wife and a companion returned the gesture. The court was crammed with on-lookers. Then the prison lorry moved to a side-door, flanked by cameramen and police. Njenga, still handcuffed, was rushed down a flight of steps into the back of a prison lorry which immediately was driven towards Eg. Ellis Avenue. Police officers, accompanied the lorry to an unmarked destination.

President urges Nigerian leader: 'Work for unity'

President Kenyatta expressed the hope yesterday that Nigerian would work for unity and would be able to solve the problems they were experiencing at present. He was speaking after a meeting with the Federal Nigerian leader, Major-General Gowon, at State House, Mombasa.

President Kenyatta told the Nigerian leader that he was delighted to welcome him. Kenyatta was fully informed by the Nigerian envoy on the situation in the West African State.

He hoped a peaceful settlement would be reached in Nigeria because in such a way many innocent people became victims.

The President said he had had a long association with the Nigerians from his early days in politics in Europe. "Being that time used to discuss politics with Gold Coast which is today known as Ghana."

The Nigerian leader told the President that his visit was purely a courtesy call on a man who was an elder and a leading nationalist not only in Kenya but also in Africa.

His visit to Kenya and Addis Ababa was his first and he was greatly impressed by the way the O.A.U. meeting was conducted.

Speaking to the Press on his arrival at State House, Mombasa, the Nigerian leader said that he was prepared to order a ceasefire with Biafran once he was convinced the Biafran leader, Col. Odia, meant business and not "big words tricks".

He was even prepared to send a team of negotiators to meet the Biafran side anywhere in Africa except on the soil of the four African States which had recognised Biafra.

According to the Nigerian Constitution, the former Biafran State would, on return to the fold of the federation, enjoy a degree of autonomy in such fields as health services, education and regional development. Security and foreign affairs would, however, remain a Federal responsibility.

Major-General Gowon said the O.A.U. meeting had been a great success. Gen. Gowon landed at Embassies Airport, Nairobi, at 10.30 yesterday morning and after a short stay left for Mombasa. He was met at the airport by the Minister for Housing, Mr. Njoroge, the Minister for Defence, Dr. Mungai, the Minister for Labour, Mr. Mwendwa, the Minister for Commerce and Industry, Mr. Kibaki, and the Minister for Economic Planning and Development, Mr. Oduro-Jowi, and other dignitaries including the Nigerian Ambassador to Kenya, Mr. Harriman.

The Vice-President and the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Mr. Maiti and Mr. Kolnagor, arrived from Addis Ababa about an hour and a half later and within two minutes left in a Police Air Wing plane for Mombasa.

The Tanzania President, Dr. Nyerere, arrived in the same aircraft with Mr. Maiti and Mr. Kolnagor and Mr. Maiti and Mr. Kolnagor were to join an aircraft for Lagos. He was seen off by the President, Mr. Njenga Kenyatta, several Cabinet Ministers, senior Government officials, the Mayor of Mombasa, Coun. Kombu, councillors and Kanu officials.

Israeli jets pound Egyptians again

Israeli warplanes yesterday attacked the Egyptian positions yesterday on the western shore of the Gulf of Suez in the same area where Israeli aircraft on Tuesday staged their biggest raid since the June 1967 war.

The planes destroyed an unarmoured Egyptian tank and a number of Egyptian vehicles near Abu Daras and Ras Zafrana, two of the principal points hit on Tuesday.

The new attack was made in answer to further Egyptian cease-fire "violations" along the Suez Canal, an Israeli spokesman said. He gave no details of the alleged violations.

An Israeli military spokesman reported that there had been a marked reduction in artillery duelling over the Suez Canal since Tuesday.

Military observers regarded the drop in activity as indicative of the fact that the Egyptian military was not yet ready to apply for the rights of the Palestinian refugees to be respected.

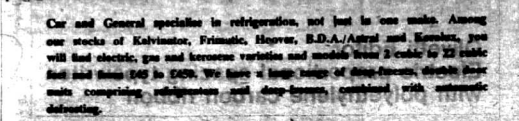

Brazil guerillas face death penalty

Brazil's three-man military junta has amended the constitution to permit the death sentence for subversive or revolutionary activities.

It was the Government's second tough measure since the kidnapping of the U.S. Ambassador, Mr. C. Burke Elbrick, and its warning that it would persevere until "all" were freed.

On Tuesday it issued a decree granting itself powers to banish from the country anyone found guilty of subversion and also giving it 15 political prisoners exchanged for Mr. Elbrick's safe return.

The decision to introduce the death sentence for subversion was a dramatic indication of the seriousness with which the three-man ruling junta of Armed Forces Brigades views the current wave of urban guerilla operations.

Brazilians have for long opposed the death sentence. It previously had only been applicable for treason or espionage during the Second World War and was never carried out.

Mr. Elbrick on Tuesday night gave a cocktail party for the 120-odd guests who were his kidnappers had freed him on Tuesday night.

The driver, Mr. Jose Manoel de Sousa, recognized the 61-year-old envoy as he sat on the floor of his kidnappers' suburban street.

"Are you the American Ambassador?" he asked. When Mr. Elbrick, apparently still shaken by his recent freedom, did not reply, Mr. de Sousa said: "You poor thing."

Interlocked afterwards, Mr. de Sousa said: "The only thing I could do was what I did. I took the Ambassador home. He was a passenger and I was a taxi-driver. That was all."

Che aide killed

Guido "Infi" Peredo — Che Guevara's top Bolivian aide — was killed at La Paz on Tuesday when a grenade failed to burst at police exploded in his hand.

A Government Minister, Col. Enrique Padilla, told a Press conference that Peredo and three other men opened fire on police leading a house in central La Paz after a tip-off that Peredo was hiding there.

Two of the other three men — including a correspondent of Cuba's Press Latina news agency, Mr. Fernando Martinez — were wounded in the gun battle with police, Col. Padilla said.

Peredo, a Communist since childhood, was one of only two Bolivian guerillas to survive the campaign which ended with the capture and death of Guevara in south-east Bolivia in October, 1967. He was married and the father of four children.

Peredo, whose brother was killed in the early stages of Guevara's seven-month campaign, was the Cuban revolutionary's top adviser on Bolivian affairs. He was reported to have been planning another guerilla outbreak in the country. His new-style "urban guerillas" were believed responsible for at least 13 terrorist attacks this month. — Reuter

65 injured, 130 arrested in soccer relegation riots

Police reinforcements from surrounding towns moved early yesterday into the riot-torn streets of Caserta, rocked by two days of violence because of the local soccer team's disciplinary relegation.

Police described the situation as tense but under control after rioting by angry soccer fans which officially left 41 policemen and 23 civilians injured. About 80 people have been arrested and charged with rioting and 50 others detained for questioning.

Many more demonstrators were believed injured but it was believed they were afraid to seek hospital treatment in case they might be arrested.

The riot erupted on Monday after the Italian Soccer Federation announced it was suspending Caserta's football side, Casertana, over a bribery incident.

The extent of the violence aroused Press speculation that political extremists were behind it, but the former police chief, Dr. Pasquale Colombo, said it was an outbreak of spontaneous fanaticism. There were no political motives involved.

He said there did not appear to be any leaders — just a spontaneous protest movement.

Police present in Caserta stormed the railway station and dispersed a large crowd of soccer fans. Police drove them back with tear gas but the red-brick station was destroyed in the Second World War looked as though it had been bombed.

As a result of shattering glass and falling bricks and other debris, demonstrators tore down power lines and set up a barricade of burning chairs. A truck full of burning chairs lorry in front.

On Tuesday night, as the rioting continued, the town's council deplored the "unacceptable" condemnation of the Casertana team and demanded that all arrested demonstrators should be released immediately.

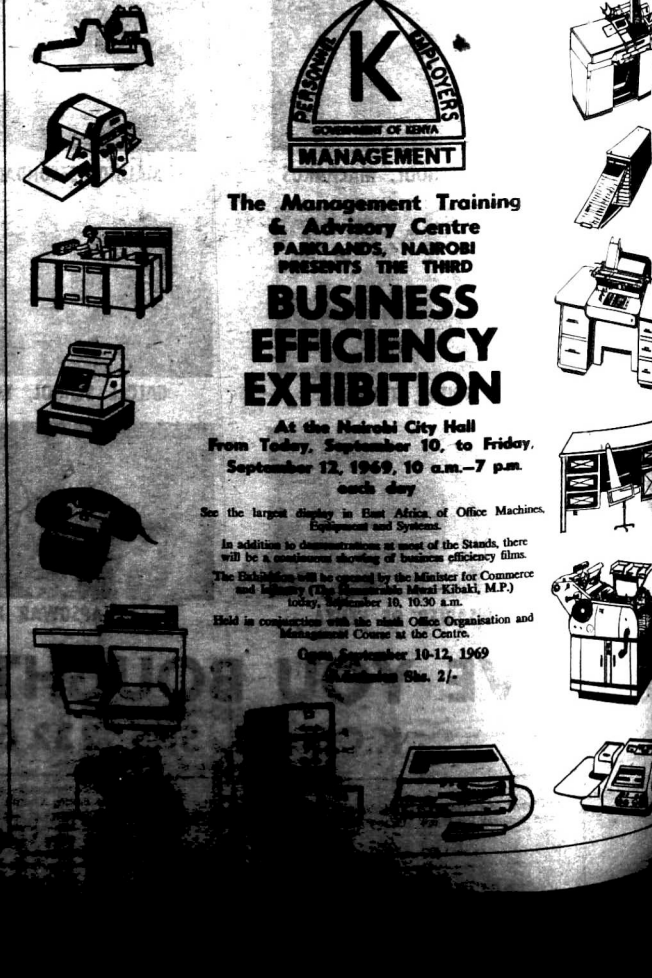

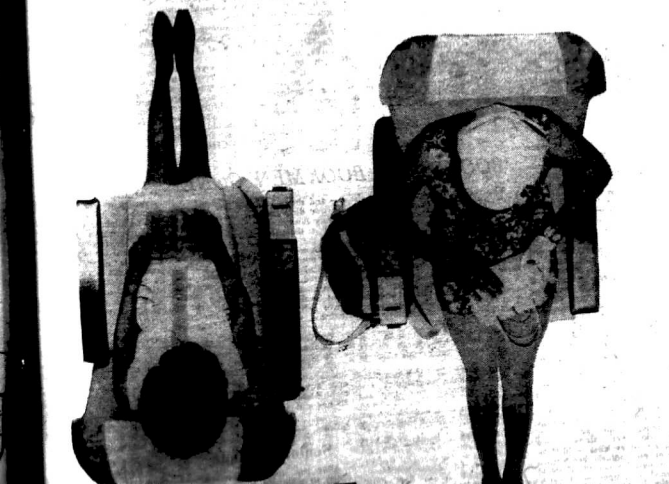

S. AFRICAN PREMIER IN RACE ROW

A furious row over coloured sportsmen coming to South Africa on touring teams has caused the decisive split in the Nationalist Party, which has been running South Africa for over two decades. The row burst into the open at the annual congress of the Transvaal National Party in Pretoria when the Prime Minister, Mr. B. J. Vorster, repeated forcefully that he was sticking by the ruling on coloured sportsmen.

This ruling, made in 1967, is that they can tour South Africa on apartheid grounds — as members of visiting teams. Mr. Vorster's statement drew an immediate and angry riposte from Dr. Albert Herzog, who was ousted from the Cabinet a year ago for his extreme views. Dr. Herzog is the leader of the hard-line nationalists who in a bid stand on the racial question have become known as the *verreugers* (narrow-minded ones). The moderate group of the party are known as the *verligtes* (enlightened ones). The Marris will sit at table with our young men and girls and they will share with our girls. They will take part in social activities with White South Africans", said Dr. Herzog. "If you have that wedge once in the door you can never close it again," he told the congress. The former Minister, followed by 11 other hard-line delegates and indirectly supported by seven abstentionists, refused to sign the resolution asking the congress to endorse the Government's policy in sport. — AFP

20 killed in Ghana tribal riot

Troops and police were yesterday hunting fleeing tribesmen after an eruption of violence at Yendi in Northern Ghana in which, according to an official statement, 20 people were killed. Other sources put the death toll at 23 in Yendi, now in the grip of a dusk-to-dawn curfew after a bloody clash between Dagomba tribesmen and police and troops. Several other people were injured and hospitalised, these sources added.

Two leaders of rival tribesmen in the town, 43½ miles north of Accra were bound over to keep the peace and 64 curfew breakers were given fines when they appeared in court yesterday. The situation in Yendi, said last night by official sources to be calm, is being worsened by severe food shortages, reports reaching Accra said. All shops are closed and market stalls deserted. Earlier reports said police and troops opened fire when the palace of the Dagomba Paramount Chief's palace as they tried to enter it to look for arms. Yesterday, security forces were stepping up their search for hidden arms. Yendi, 50 miles west of the Northern Region capital of Tamale, was later reported quiet. The dusk-to-dawn curfew was imposed on an area 25 miles around the town at the choice of a local chief. The Ghana News Agency said soldiers and police who went to the palace of the Dagomba Paramount Chief to search for hidden weapons came under fire from inside the building. The military returned the fire and stormed the palace. Police and troops have rounded up about 1,000 Dagomba tribesmen, including elders. They are held for questioning. The agency reported on Saturday that the two rival factions had begun fighting over the choice of the chief. Troops made house-to-house searches for weapons kept in defiance of a Government order. The change has not been an easy operation. It entailed re-arranging the newspaper departments with the result that within most of the reports work from the city centre, the rest of editorial staff, the librarians and printing works operate from the Industrial Area.

The building in York Street, which had been the home of the East Africa Standard printing section since 1929, has been drastically renovated and the ground floor which once housed machinery has been transformed into a series of attractive shops.

Internally it now ranks as one of the most modern office blocks in the city centre. Office space has been let by Tysons Ltd. to a wide variety of concerns ranging from a supermarket to an antique shop.

Tenants include Craig's Sports House, one of the city's longest-established sporting equipment suppliers, Radio Arts Co., Decor Ltd., the Superette and the Peck and Barber accounts department.

Other occupants are S. and O. Supplies, the Gallery Watatu, the Antique Gallery, African Tours and Hotels, Stationery and Office Supplies, Insurance Brokers of East Africa Ltd. (Rogg Robinson)

Transformation scene

and the East Africa Women's League office, library and rest room.

So Consolidated House now caters for a variety of tastes ranging from tourist attractions like curio, furniture and furnishings, office machinery and equipment to grocery and food for the gourmet.

Plans to convert the godown which formerly housed the printing press are in hand. The reporter, advertising and circulation staff who are now based at Rukhshan House will move to these premises after their conversion. Their offices will be on the ground floor and will be more convenient for members of the public.

Before the newspaper's move to "Limnrock Road in March — a marathon operation involving the transport of more than 200 tons of printing equipment in 36 hours — Consolidated House was wholly occupied by the East Africa Standard and associate companies.

The transfer was a landmark in the history of the East Africa Standard which had been produced in the centre of Nairobi for 56 years. Carried out by the Express Transport Co., the move was a non-stop operation with the removal gangs shifting the heavy machines and re-erecting them in the new premises.

No issue missed

The success of the operation was illustrated by the fact that no issue of the paper was missed by the readers.

The now empty godown was purchased by the East Africa Standard in 1936 and the adjoining building was bought in 1929. It was a single-storey building but was rebuilt in 1942 when two storeys were added.

Up to that time the editorial staff, advertising department, accounts and other sections of the firm operated under the Standard Clock at the junction of Kenyatta Avenue and Webber Street.

A spokesman for the contractors, Eastern Builders, said the alterations to the building consisted of putting in entrance halls, staircases, handrails, partitions, terrazzo floors, new toilets and lighting equipment, and then painting the building inside and out.

Mr. Gillies Turle of the Antique Gallery, one of the new tenants, commented: "The premises here are much better than our former shop. We came here in mid-July but some of our customers have yet to locate us."

The ground floor has already been occupied by the Superette, Craig's Sports House and the Antique Gallery.

Companies including Insurance Brokers of East Africa, Peck and Barber, and Gallery Watatu, have moved into the first floor while the second floor is occupied by African Tours and Hotels Ltd., Bunton Travel Service, and the East Africa Women's League.

The Gallery Watatu is a new venture by two artists, Robin Anderson and Jony Waite, and an exhibition designer, David Hart. In addition to displaying their own work and that of other East African artists, the directors hope to stage exhibitions from other parts of Africa, including Nigeria, Sudan and Mozambique.

S. and O. Supplies have taken accommodation on the ground and second floors and so have returned

to their old home. On the first floor they have opened the S. and O. Supply Centre, where accessories and supplies for business machinery can be obtained. Drawing office equipment is also available.

On the second floor a Display Centre is being arranged for office equipment and furniture.

The S. and O. sales department and workshops remain at Gilliland House in Kenyatta Avenue.

The East Africa Standard has not severed its links completely with its former home. The newspaper is still keeping its switchboard at Consolidated House although this arrangement is only temporary.

Tysons Ltd., which has been letting the premises, reports a big demand for office space in the building. In fact the demand for office space business accommodation has far exceeded the available space and some potential tenants have had to be disappointed.

Consolidated House is part of the current building boom in the country. It is also a clear harbinger for judging the confidence both overseas and local investors have in Kenya's political stability and in the complementary sectors of the public and private sectors in the development of the economy.

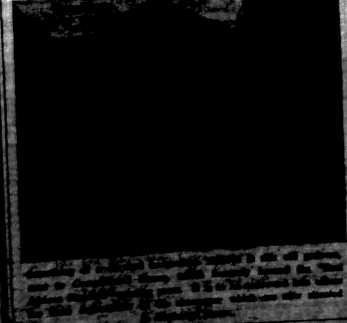

The trial reached a pinch of tension just before 3 p.m. on Wednesday when Nienga was asked if he had anything to say. From the dock he said, in Kisumu: "I only know I did not commit this offence."
Then Mr. Justice Simpson, who had just concluded a long judgment, told him: "You have been found guilty of murder for which there is only one penalty provided by law. I sentence you to suffer death in the manner authorized by law. You have the right to appeal within seven days."
Nienga promptly asked: "Will I appeal today?"
Monsieur Justice then he was being handcuffed and led from the dock to a prison van for transfer to a jail where he will remain until his appeal.
The trial, which had lasted eight days, took place amid the strictest security precautions seen for years in Nairobi. Armed police patrolled the corridors of the law courts and everyone entering the sombre courtroom was thoroughly searched.
Outside police kept passers-by from loitering and batted motorists from using the City Council car park beside the court building. Each day after the case, Nienga was taken to prison accompanied by a massive police escort.
Mrs. Pamela Mboya, the murdered Minister's wife, was an occasional visitor to the court. Other personalities including M.P.s were among the public. Nienga's young wife, Grace, sat through every minute of it and, like her husband, was outwardly impassive when the death sentence was passed.
The death of Mr. Mboya had given rise to tribal feelings and was aggravated by a series of reports on snatching by Kikuyu church leaders this week condemned Nienga and pledged loyalty to President Kenyatta.
A National Government was drawn up by the Baptist Church in Nairobi and more than 100 people signed it imploringly more support was sought and the individual being an African leader though issued a statement pledging their backing to the move. For Anglicans the Archbishop of East Africa, in December, described such a move as "regrettable and unacceptable."

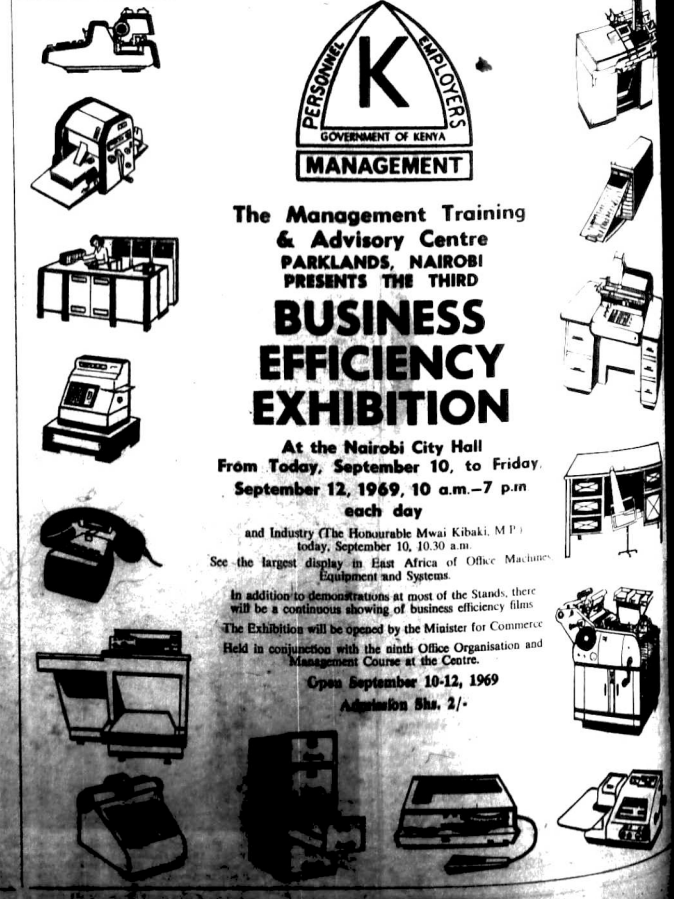

Mathari, the shanty town with a heart

In his series on what it is like to be poor in Kenya, MICHAEL DELL visited the complex shanty town of Mathari on the fringe of Nairobi. Among other things he found that Mathari was more than just a place for workers seeking a better life in the big city. Here is his report.

Mathari is a shanty town in Nairobi which is not only five times the size of the valley, but also 20,000 people. Although its name is synonymous with shanty conditions, most of the houses are in fact better than those in any other shanty town in Nairobi. only five huts in the entire valley. Today the valley accommodates between 15,000 and 20,000 people. Partly because it has achieved a sort of grading recognition, Mathari is also one of the few shanty towns which receive much attention. Much of the responsibility for Mathari's contact with the outside world lies in the hands of the Director of the Eastleigh Community Centre, Mr. Edward Njenga, in whose area the township lies. He paid tribute to the community spirit at Mathari, which he said was due to the fact that hardship was shared. "When they replaced the shanty town at Karibongi with permanent dwellings, this spirit disappeared and it was every man for himself," he said. A view of Mathari Valley from some high ground nearby shows it to be a long sprawl of tin roofs interspersed here and there with more modern, wooden hut-like dwellings, stretching for 21 miles along the Gelathuru River between Eastleigh K.A.F. station and St. Teresa's School. But in fact Mathari really consists of four villages divided by barriers such as quarries or roads. Mathari 1 is the oldest and most organised. Mathari 2 and 3 to Mathari 4, the newest, consists of squatters who have been moved there from other areas where they were not allowed to stay. Although there is no ill-will between the four communities, they are quite separate, and some- times jealous. As a result, Mr. Njenga has to be meticulous in his fairness in distributing help which he receives from voluntary bodies. That is why his latest project

for a workshop will be built for members of all four villages. Although a major activity in the valley, as at Kariburi, is the brewing of illicit liquor, there is a higher regular employment rate (about 20 per cent of those eligible have jobs). As at Kariburi, the people represent a cross-section of the community in both good and evil. One of the biggest differences between Mathari and Kariburi is the greater privacy. At Mathari most of the houses have locks. Apart from the shops, there are no other shops, including carpentry, tailoring and puppetry. They are encouraged by the Mathari Valley River Project, an offshoot of the National Christian Council of Kenya, which works closely with Mr. Njenga. An internal "police force", run by "youth wingers", who are responsible for the maintenance of discipline. Each village has its own chairman or headman who supervises welfare efforts. An example of community spirit was seen when I visited Mathari 1 — the reconstruction of the houses destroyed in a fire a fortnight ago, with everyone joining in with materials, cash and labour. Each village has its own social hall and nursery school. The school is staffed by younger people who for some reason or other, usually financial, fail to complete their schooling. Quite the most remarkable testimony to the development of community spirit in the Mathari Valley is the Mathari United Traders and Farmers' Company. Consisting of 125 members, this body has recently bought about 15 acres of adjoining land for £25,000, which it is paying for over five years. I was shown the ambitious scheme to build 100 houses on the site, together with a shopping centre, hotel and bar. The members of the company planned to build the central buildings to house the shops and the houses later. Showing me the plans, the chairman of the company, Mr. Muturi Kanini, a much-respected man in Mathari, said: "We are doing this to show the Government we are not helpless and can do things for ourselves." Given the acute housing shortage in Nairobi, to which testimony is the Mathari Valley Settlement is testimony, the company should have no trouble letting them.

Not all the houses in Mathari Valley are owner occupied. Some residents have built more rooms than they need for themselves, and let the remainder, usually for 40/- a month per room. A room in more modern lines of timber, but, can cost 60/- a month. The authorities have been quick to stop boarders building in Mathari and thus putting the houses, although many of them, in a danger of being abandoned. In the minds of all these hopeful residents in Mathari, it is easy to overlook the hardship. As in Kariburi, the area is a sea of mud during the rains, but mercifully the roofs usually do not leak. There is always a need for food. There is always a need for clothing and warm clothing, donations of which Mr. Njenga is glad to receive. Among the worst sufferers are the children. Although most of them attend the nursery schools in

the village, only about half go on to any further formal education. As a result, the village nursery schools play an important role in the life of the community. They are completely unofficial and the unqualified staff struggle as best they can to teach the young children English, arithmetic and Swahili. Two examples of the teachers at the schools showed how promises had run out and they had had to leave. They were now teaching at schools in Mathari 1 and 2 respectively for 60/- a month. "If anyone wants to do something really worthwhile, they could do no better than sponsor such a child for education," said Mr. Njenga. Mathari Valley is different from other shanty towns in Nairobi in its long-term needs. Although some of the people would willingly move out and settle in the countryside, Mr. Njenga thinks that a community about half the size in permanent buildings would be the answer, but the go-ahead on site and service schemes such as had been completed at Karibongi was delayed because of the experience there where the new owners simply sold the houses and moved out to a different shanty town. Already the signs of improvement are on the way. There is now a supply of water to a standpost in each of the villages and garbage is collected from a central point. Perhaps most significant of all, electricity is to be installed at a social hall in Mathari 1. (One of the ironies of Mathari Valley is that a power cable runs down

the valley over the power-less houses below.) Mathari Valley has not been developed before because of the unsuitability of the site. But, undoubtedly, change is on the way. 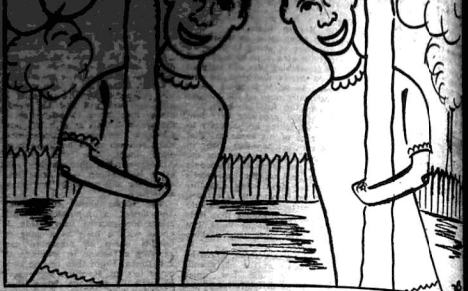

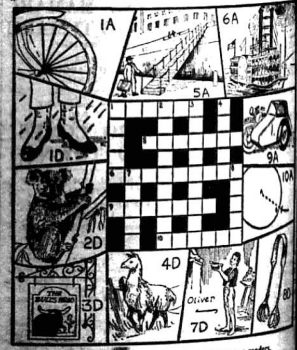

Ver the book has seen the publication of his second book, *The People's War*, and it has already received a high commendation in the *Observer*. The *Statesman* has called it "a brilliant study... the only comprehensive and critical book on this life in the Second World War."

The book received the lead reviews in the *London Sunday Times* and *The Observer* last

month, and *The Observer* is again commending it in its second issue.

Angus Calder was the first to give a review. During this time, he says, the British came closer to social conditions than at any other period in our history. The Republic's higher taxation made the rich poorer; the poor benefited from new welfare legislation. Most Israeli newspapers said yesterday that Cairo would not be satisfied by its air attacks on Thursday, particularly since a part of the Arab world no longer believed Cairo's victory communique. The state of alert among Israeli forces did not prevent the Egyptian population from feverishly preparing for the Jewish New Year, which began yesterday. Shops were full of people, and extra trains and buses were put into service to carry the hundreds of thousands of Israelis who plan to spend the New Year holidays in the Sinai. An Israeli Army spokesman announced that eight Arab "saboteurs" were killed on Thursday night by an Israeli Army patrol in the Jordan Valley, three miles north of the Gaza Strip. There were no Israeli casualties. One of the four Israeli soldiers wounded by Egyptian bombing on Thursday's air battles has died, an Israeli military spokesman has announced. The Egyptian Information Minister, Mostafa Fayed, accused Israel of falsifying the figures of its military losses for the sake of a "propaganda war".

He said Israel admitted the loss of the plane only after Egypt had announced that it had been shot down. An Israeli military spokesman said in Tel Aviv yesterday that 62 Arab planes had been shot down during the three-day war in June, 1967. Fourteen Israeli jets were in the same period, he added. The Arab planes downed 51 Egyptian and 17 Israeli planes. Thirty-eight of the planes were MiG-17s and 17 were Sukhoi-7s. The Arab planes shot 276 missiles were arrested in encounters with Israeli forces. 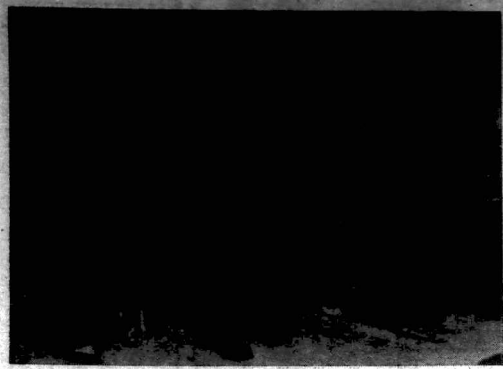

U.D.C. has year of marked expansion

Standard Steel Reporters, Kampala.

An upturn in profits of the Uganda Development Corporation and a year of "marked expansion" was reported by the U.D.C. chairman, Mr. Joseph Nyang'ali, at a meeting in Kampala.

He was addressing the U.D.C.'s annual meeting at which the Finance Minister, Mr. Kalubetsiba, represented the Uganda Government, who own U.D.C.

Mr. Nyang'ali said consolidated trading profit for 1968 was 43,765,340/- against 37,093,920/- in 1967. In spite of unfavorable trading conditions, the U.D.C. spent 7,000,000/- last year on new projects.

Even better results would have been obtained if difficulties encountered in 1967 had not continued. The main difficulties were transfer of exports to Tanzania and the general fall in world tea prices.

Further difficulty came from the imposition of sales tax and higher import duties, which raised the price of many products and hit home demand.

Mr. Nyang'ali said Uganda Cement and Industry and Uganda Hotels achieved record trading results last year.

The U.D.C.'s group profit before tax rose from 10,500,000/- at the end of 1967 to 15,800,000/- in 1968. But corporation tax took more than 11,000,000/-. Because the corporation had built up large reserves of unappropriated profit it was able to transfer more than 8,000,000/- to capital and revenue reserves, leaving an unappropriated profit of 25,800,000/- to carry forward.

Fixed assets of the U.D.C. companies rose from 444,000,000/- at the end of 1967 to 541,000,000/- at the end of 1968. The number of employees rose from 21,184 to 23,253 and salaries paid rose from 87,000,000/- to 95,000,000/-.

New projects are now in hand, involving a total investment of 133,000,000/-. Of this, 75,000,000/- is to come from loans and equity investment and the balance in counterpart finance to meet local cost.

MOVES TO IMPROVE MAIZE

The development of better quality maize is more important than the increase in yield in the areas where maize is a staple food, said the acting director of the East African Agriculture and Forestry Research Organisation, Dr. B. N. Majusi.

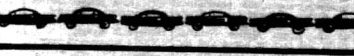
In his September monthly newsletter, Dr. Majusi says improvements in quality of maize is now being combined with increases in yield by incorporating into maize breeding populations varieties that are capable of providing a greater protein content.

Dr. Majusi also reports that the current trend in maize breeding in East Africa is the exploitation of a South American variety by effective breeding techniques. The E.A. Agriculture and Forestry Research Organisation is assembling germ plasma material and developing efficient techniques of utilizing and selecting plant breeding experts in East Africa on the new development.

Strong links with research workers in other Eastern African countries, including Zambia, Malawi and Ethiopia, had developed informally in this programme. — E.N.A.

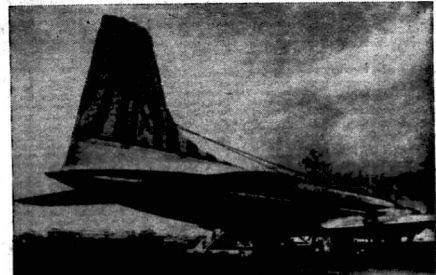

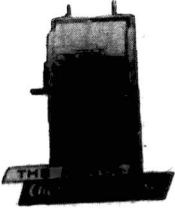

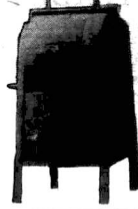

The grounding of the giant bombers came two days after the end of a 72-hour Vietcong truce mourning the death of the North Vietnamese President, Ho Chi Minh. American troops tacitly observed the ceasefire, although South Vietnam continued operations as usual.

No strikes by the giant bombers were reported during the Vietcong truce period.

The command's announcement, which simply said B-52s had made no strikes since 2 a.m. local time on Thursday, was apparently intended to signal to Hanoi that the U.S. was willing to scale down its level of fighting if North Vietnam did the same.

Asked whether the announcement represented a new peace initiative, a U.S. mission spokesman said:

"I know of nothing beyond the various offers that have been made repeatedly by South Vietnam over the past three months."

There were hopes the truce might be quietly extended into an "open-ended" ceasefire. But when fighting resumed on Thursday it was on the same moderate scale as before.

STRONGER CIVIL RIGHTS STAND URGED BY NEGROES

The first conference of elected American Negro officials has begun in Washington with leaders urging the Government to take a stronger stand on civil rights.

The four-day conference of the Institute for Black Elected Officials brought together for the first time elected Negro officials from all parts of the country.

About 400 of the 1,200 Negroes who hold offices ranging from United States Senator to Justice of the Peace are attending.

There is one Negro, Sen. Edward Brooke, a Republican from Massachusetts, in the U.S. Senate and nine—all from big northern or western cities—in the House of Representatives.

Several are mayors of major or medium-sized cities.

The conference will discuss a Government's domestic program and other subjects to be discussed are law enforcement and its relationship to the Black community, and the problems of getting young Negro militants to take part in politics.

At a Press briefing before the conference the co-chairmen, Mr. Marvin Dymally and Mr. Philip Row Wilson, attacked the administration's proposal to extend the 1965 Voting Rights Act to cover the whole country.

Proposal on Nigerian arms ban rejected

The International Red Cross conference meeting in Istanbul has rejected a proposal that it take a stand on the issue of arms deliveries to Nigeria.

The decision was taken yesterday in committee stage by a vote of 75 to 12 with 11 absentions. Voting was on a resolution sponsored by the Red Cross societies of West Germany and Benegal calling on the Red Cross administration to advise their Governments to abstain or stop arms deliveries to parties in internal conflicts.

The committee on international human rights rejected the resolution, which called for a complete and inalienable ban on the sale of arms in armed conflicts of all kinds.

This resolution was sponsored by the Swiss Government and the Red Cross societies of the Netherlands, Sweden and Switzerland.

Another resolution adopted by the committee called for an international agreement banning the production and stocking of chemical or bacteriological weapons. The proposal came from the delegations of Algeria, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Rumania, and West Germany.

Also adopted was a resolution sponsored by the Algerian, Danish and Swedish Red Crosses stating that persons involved in non-international armed conflicts should receive, when captured, the same treatment accorded to prisoners of war under the Geneva Convention.

Italy - Libya airlink open

Air traffic between Italy and Libya re-started yesterday with an Alitalia DC-9 taking 41 Libyans from Rome to Tripoli.

The 41 passengers had been stranded in Italy since the September 1 coup d'etat.

Another DC-9 left for Tripoli to pick up Italian tourists.

Young officers behind the coup felt they were too isolated from Palestine's struggle until the King Idris fled, Mr. Mideh Hassanin Haykal said yesterday in Cairo.

Death toll 19 as bus and lorry blaze

Standard Staff Reporter, Arusha.

Nineteen people were killed and about 20 injured, some seriously, when a 24-seater bus travelling from Arusha to Mwanza was involved in a crash with an Army lorry at Kisungu, 16 miles from Arusha, on Saturday night.

Both vehicles burst into flames and 17 people died instantly from burns. Another two died in hospital, where nine people were admitted with serious injuries, mainly burns.

The death toll includes two soldiers, Pui Tembe from Mara, and Ernest Bulamaji, of Kigoma, who were travelling in a Bedford lorry belonging to the Tanzania People's Defence Forces with four other soldiers.

After the crash, it was understood, the driver of the Army vehicle, who was not injured, saw several miles to Manduli Army camp to raise the alarm. Nearly 100 soldiers raced to the scene to find the coach completely engulfed in flames.

Soldiers joined by some villagers fought the blaze until Arusha Fire Brigade and police arrived, but it was not until early on Sunday morning, some six hours after the accident, that rescue workers could reach the coach.

Convoy of vehicles took the dead, who included the driver of the bus, and seriously injured to Arusha.

The accident happened on a stretch of level stretch of road, some miles from Arusha on the Dodoma road, at about 11 p.m. Twelve hours later wreckage from the bus and lorry was still smouldering by the roadside.

The Army truck had crossed into several pieces, with its front axle some 60 feet in front of the cab. The metal body of the lorry had sheared away from the chassis.

The green-and-white Albion coach, belonging to Tanzania Transport Bus Service of Moshi, was completely burnt out. It was licensed to carry 54 passengers and it is estimated that when the accident took place there were about 50 people, but the number has not yet been confirmed.

Vegetables, clothes and personal effects of the travellers were strewn around the vehicle.

Wreckage from both bus and lorry stretched for 100 yards along the roadside. The point of impact on the road was blackened and charred.

Yesterday Arusha Hospital was strained by dozens of people anxiously waiting to see if their relatives and friends were among the dead.

So far it has been impossible to identify any of the bus passengers. A hospital spokesman said identification in many cases would be almost impossible because of the degree of burns.

The Arusha Regional Police Commander, Mr. A. Shungu, appealed yesterday to members of the public who had relatives travelling to Mwanza from Moshi, at where the bus started its journey on Saturday afternoon, to go to regional police headquarters to help police in identification.

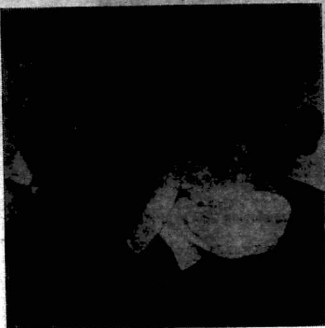

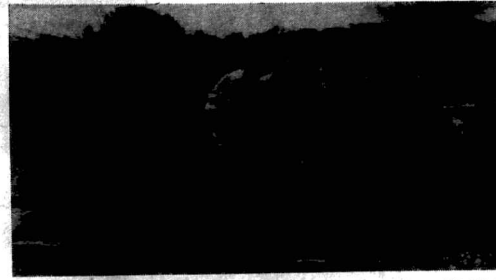

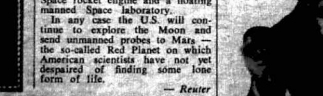

 An unprecedented week of wildcat strikes left West Germany at the weekend with a stack of new pay claims and an outgoing coalition Government increasingly divided by charges of economic negligence.
 Widespread industrial unrest, also affecting Bonn's European Common Market partners, France and Italy, has been checked for the moment by a series of quick settlements negotiated by the trade unions.
 Yesterday, after a rash of stoppages that spread from the Ruhr steelmills to the coalmines and metal works, only 7,000 shipbuilders in Kiel were still on strike.
 But the handsome pay increases of up to 15 per cent and fringe benefits granted to the strikers have spurred millions of workers — civil servants, railwaymen, teachers, nurses and others — to new union contracts.
 The chairman of the German Trade Union Federation, Hans-Joachim Lauth, said that he would be negotiating wildcat stoppages now, before the end of the year.
 With a fortnight to the next German election, the Social Democrats in Bonn have urged members of lack of confidence at each level.
 Prof. Karl Schiller, Democrat Economics Minister, stepped just short of the Christian Democrats' refusal to support the Federal Government's new advice — a move which the Federal Finance Minister, Dr. Scheuermann, said would be a disaster for the fourth time in a row in the face of the present majority led by the Christian Democrats.

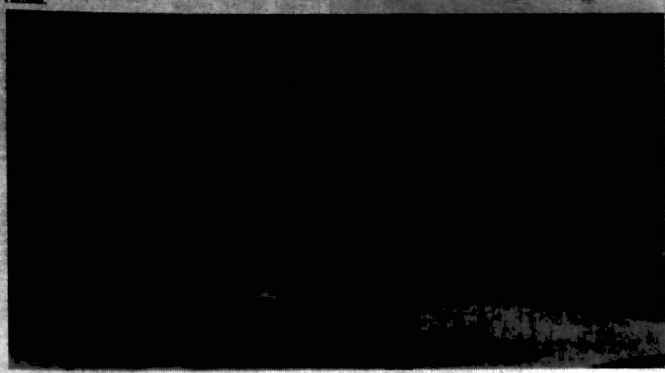

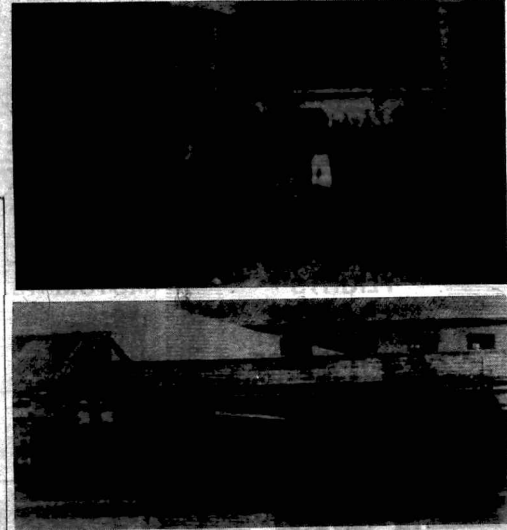

Prisoned in Plymouth
The British Minister of State at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, Lord Shepherd, has left London for the Seychelles Islands to discuss the small colony's constitutional future. Travelling via Mombasa, he is to make an official visit to the Indian Ocean Islands from tomorrow until September 26.

The vessel, accompanied by five Norwegian shipbrokers, was scheduled to sail at the weekend, but departure was delayed after an air attack on board, in which Mr. Shepherd was injured. He was taken to hospital with cuts and bruises, but is recovering.

Seychelles talks

The British Minister of State at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, Lord Shepherd, has left London for the Seychelles Islands to discuss the small colony's constitutional future. Travelling via Mombasa, he is to make an official visit to the Indian Ocean Islands from tomorrow until September 26.

He will have discussions with the Governor, members of the Governing Council and other civic leaders in the islands, the home of about 50,000 people.

Britain wants to take into account the wishes of the islanders when deciding on the Seychelles constitutional future. The islanders do not want independence. The Democratic Party, which holds the majority in the Council, wants integration with Britain, a solution unacceptable to London. The United People's Party wants the status of an associated State similar to that held by some Caribbean territories. — A.P.F.

Amnesty deplores curbs on freedom

Amnesty International yesterday deplored "the increasing inhumanity and intolerance which mark this era, in particular curbs to freedom of opinion, belief and expression".

In a general declaration adopted at the close of its council meeting in Geneva, the organization said this situation existed in all regions of the world.

"In Greece thousands of thousands of people have been arrested and some 117,000 will remain imprisoned because they belong to an ethnic or political minority. Their release and rehabilitation pose an international problem.

"In Greece large numbers of people from every sphere of life — intellectuals, trade unionists, members of the Armed Forces — are in prison and in some cases have been brutally tortured because they oppose the military régime which has usurped power and shows no sign of relinquishing it.

"In the U.S.S.R., members of religious groups, ethnic minorities, such as Tartars, writers claiming freedom of expression and others who dare to protest at the denial of the civil liberties of the Soviet citizen, are ruthlessly silenced by more subtle forms of restriction.

"Within the last nine months in Iraq 44 persons were tried by special military courts and executed within hours. The manner in which these trials and executions were carried out disturbs the conscience of humanity.

"In Tunisia those who have shown any form of opposition to the government have been sentenced to long periods of imprisonment after a trial in which they were not permitted to present their defence freely and are now reported to be imprisoned in conditions which are damaging to their health". — A.P.F.

ADEN ASKED TO FREE PASSENGERS

The Ethiopian Government has sent a formal request to the Southern Yemeni Government to release eight people detained in Aden in connection with the hijacking of an Ethiopian Airlines DC-6B last week.

The detainees include three air-traffic controllers, two passengers — one British and one French national — one Ethiopian security officer and the two hijackers.

The pilot has refused to leave Aden until all the members of his crew are released.

Thirty-three of the 39 passengers, who landed in Aden after the plane was hijacked while on a regular flight from Addis Ababa to Djibouti, returned to a special plane. One passenger, a Malagasy diplomat, was allowed to fly to Djibouti earlier.

The Ethiopian Government's request for the release of the detainees was contained in a message by the Foreign Minister, Mr. Miru, to his Southern Yemeni counterpart.

Three Ethiopian officials — the Attorney-General, Mr. Michael, the Foreign Affairs Assistant Minister, Mr. Desta, and the civil aviation chief administrator, Mr. Hailu Alemayehu — have been in Aden since early on Sunday to negotiate the release of the passengers of the plane and its crew. They were also discussing legal problems involving the Ethiopian security officer who shot and wounded one of the hijackers when the man tried to place a hand-grenade in the plane.

The plane will be returned to Aden after the repair of holes made by stray bullets during the shooting, officials said in Addis Ababa.

The Damascus-based Eritrean Liberation Front, which groups Masien separatists seeking the secession of Eritrea from Ethiopia, has said it ordered the two armed men to hijack the plane.

The passengers were maltreated while the hijackers were given a heroes' welcome when they landed at Aden, according to some of the passengers. — A.P.F.

U.N. CAN DO MORE, SAY RUSSIANS

The Soviet Foreign Minister, Mr. Gromyko, said on his arrival in New York on Monday night for the 24th United Nations General Assembly session that the U.N. "has not yet utilized all possibilities open to it."

"The peoples of the world are looking in the United Nations to take new steps designed to promote peace. We should like to express the hope that the decisions of this session of the United Nations General Assembly will pursue precisely this end," he said in a prepared statement.

He refused to answer questions on his arrival.


In the statement he said that "The U.S.S.R. delegation has come to the 24th session of the United Nations General Assembly with firm intention and determination to seek such solutions to the important problems facing the world and the United Nations as would meet the aspirations of all nations." — A.P.F.

Rhodesian President 'powerful as Hitler'

The Rhodesian President will become as powerful as Hitler under the proposed new constitution, Mr. Ian Smith, chairman of the moderate Centre Party, said yesterday.

He told a meeting in a Salisbury African township: "I can say this now. But after the enactment of the new constitution, to do so might cost me £1,000 or five years in jail."

Mr. Shafto said that the President would be able to declare an emergency if he so little as thought there might be trouble brewing. Once this had taken place, the Declaration of Rights was virtually in suspension.

"Perhaps the most honest thing about the new constitution is the swear an oath of allegiance to Rhodesia without saying 'So help me God'."

"The Goddess bunch have given the Government so much power that they no longer need the intercession of the Almighty."

Economic sanctions, far from damaging the Rhodesian economy enough to make the Rhodesian Front Government capitulate had hardened its resistance, and those responsible for the policy of sanctions carried an enormous moral responsibility.

Libya opens her ports again

Foreigners whose work contracts have ended can now leave Libya under a decree issued by the Revolutionary Command Council yesterday.

The Interior Ministry at the weekend allowed foreigners with exit and entry visas and valid residence permits to enter Libya.

Another decree yesterday gave the people one more week to hand in arms. The Council last week ordered all citizens possessing licensed arms or sports guns to deliver them to the Army.

Colonel Muammar al Khadafi, president of the Revolutionary

Council, disclosed yesterday that civilians had helped in the supply of King Idris, Libyan Radio reported.

It quoted the young Army Chief of Staff as saying that a "group of free civilians" prepared the September 1 coup in liaison with a "group of free officers."

He did not disclose whether those civilians were members of the Revolutionary Council. The names of Council members remain secret.

The disclosures came as the Revolutionary Council acted to pull the country back to normal.

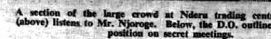

After the coup in Sudan and Libya, Tunisia is more exposed than ever. RICHARD HALL was recently in the country and writes the following account.

A span of anxiety has swept through Tunisia this week. The smallest country in North Africa watches the upheavals in neighbouring Libya as gauges how much more lonely its own future will be.

Tunisia has always been the odd man-out of the Maghreb. President Habib Bourguiba has been in conflict with Egypt's President Nasser and Algeria's President Boumedienne since 1965 over the Arab League's policy towards Israel.

If the new regime in Libya turns out to be more militant than the old about the Middle East confrontation, the Tunisians will find their borders ringed by uncertainty. So far they have been using all their diplomatic finesse, while hoping for the best.

Unlike Cairo, Khartoum and Algiers, the Tunis Government has not given official recognition to the men who moved against King Idris. Instead, it has offered the hope that relations with Libya will remain "friendly and co-operative".

Insecurity in the would-be Switzerland of North Africa increased with the continuing illness of President Bourguiba; he is only 66, but the strains of leadership for 15 years have made him prematurely aged. He has had several heart attacks.

In June and July the President was in bed for six weeks. At the

start of September his doctors again advised him to rest.

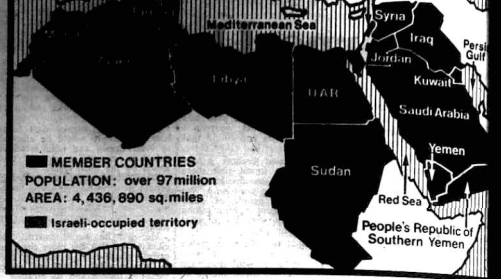
The latest reports on the Libyan coup are being taken in his bedside at the presidential palace in Monastir, the seaside resort south of Tunis. His Ministers are in regular consultation with him.

Closest to President Bourguiba these days is the Minister of Planning and Economic Affairs, Mr. Ahmed Ben Salah. Behind a witty informality, Mr. Ben Salah conceals a tough political mind and he is tipped to take over when Bourguiba goes.

This provides another question mark for Tunisia. The congress of the all-powerful Democratic Socialist Party will be held on October 12. Then Bourguiba will reveal whether he plans to stand for another term of office.

If he does he will have no opposition. For Tunisia's 4,500,000 people, the Paris-educated lawyer who won independence for them in 1956 is a hero beyond comparison. Every year there are hectic national celebrations on June 1, the day in 1955 when he returned in triumph from France with a promise of autonomy.

Now President Bourguiba may decide he has had enough, that the country cannot be led by sick men. If so, the presidency would be assumed by Mr. Bahi Ladgham, the 56-year-old vice-president. But Mr. Ladgham is quiet, intensely



religious and lacking in popular appeal.

By contrast, the younger and more ebullient Mr. Ben Salah is a keen socialist. He has pushed ahead with land reform in the face of conservative opposition from some of Tunisia's peasants. He has his followers well placed throughout the Government and clearly has his sights set high.

One man who might aim to follow his progress is the son of the ruling President, Mr. Habib Bourguiba, who is also Foreign Minister. It is whispered in Tunisia that the

young Bourguiba is not too warm towards Mr. Ben Salah's radicalism. But whatever strains there may be in Tunisia over the succession, the party leaders are all agreed on keeping the country out of military involvement along the Suez Canal.

French uneasy about role in Chad

For some weeks past the French press, both Left and Right, has been worried about the possible consequences of French military intervention in Chad. The intervention began in the summer in 1968 at the request of the Chad Government, paralysed by guerrilla action.

Spread of the Press criticism comes from the Right-wing opposition L'Aurore, which writes: "Once again French soldiers are committed abroad. We are going to send more reinforcements to Chad. You do not need to be strategic to understand that this means involvement from now on".

It asks: "Is it necessary to die for Fort Lamy?"

The weekly *Express* and *Nouvel Observateur* have just published stories on Chad which show the same uneasiness.

Rebellion which started in the East, near Sudan, has spread to the centre and North. Main stronghold is Guera Province, about 190 miles from the capital, Fort Lamy.

Originally it was the people's reaction against the arbitrary administration, but the tendency now is for it to be co-ordinated by Frolina, the Chadian National Liberation Front.

Frolina was founded in Khartoum in 1966 by Ibrahim Abatcha. In January 1968 it was responsible for the bush murder of two members of the French technical assistance team, Dr. Lievre and Dr. Berthomieu, a veterinarian.

Abatcha was killed by Chad troops and a former Government

Minister, Dr. Abba Siddick, took his place as the movement's leader.

The latter journal wonders whether the Defence Minister, M. Debre, and the Foreign Minister, M. Maurice Schumann, are leading France into a "hornet's nest".

Chad is the crossroads of Central Africa, twice the size of France, but with a population of only 3,500,000. It now finds itself in an extremely tricky position after three years of increasing incidents.

At the beginning, there was talk of racial friction between the Christian or Animistic people of the South, the Sara, and the Arabised Muslims of the North.

But observers consider that the real causes of the trouble, which has been getting worse for a year past, lie in the weak administration of a territory which is too big in the arbitrary ways of the local authorities and in the weakness and brutality of the Army numbering about 5,000 men.

It is still difficult to tell exactly how Frolina really operates. In any event, it was in August 1968 that President Francois Tombalbaye first called for French help in putting down a revolt by the Touabou tribes in the Northern District of Tibesti. A company of French paratroopers did the job quickly enough, a very local operation.

But the overall situation was by no means in hand and central authority was being flouted more and more openly. Taxes were not being paid and security was no longer guaranteed outside Fort Lamy.

At the beginning of this year France intervened for a second time at the Chad Government's request. Two companies of the Foreign Legion moved in and two senior officers — Governor Pierre Lami and General Arnaud — were made available to reorganise Chad's administration and army.

The *Express* has a theory: "To allow disorder to spread in Chad is to compromise the independence of French-speaking Africa, where the silent struggle goes on between the Russian, Chinese and American secret services."

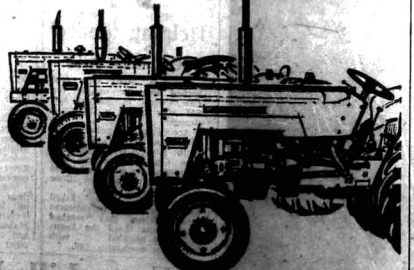

A span of anxiety has swept through Libya this week. The smallest country in North Africa watches the upheavals in neighbouring Libya to gauge how much more keenly its own future will be.

Tunisia has always been the odd man out of the Maghreb. President Habib Bourguiba has been in conflict with Egypt's President Nasser and Algeria's President Boumedienne since 1965 over the Arab League's policy towards Israel.

If the new regime in Libya turns out to be more militant than the old, about the Middle East conflict, the Tunisians will find their borders ringed by uncertainty. So far they have been using all their diplomatic finesse, while hoping for the best.

Unlike Cairo, Khartoum and Algiers, the Tunis Government has not given official recognition to the new régime. It has offered the hope that relations with Libya will be improved "friendly and cooperative".

Insecurity in the would-be Switzerland of North Africa increased with the continuing illness of President Bourguiba; he is only 66, but the strains of leadership for 15 years have made him prematurely aged. He has had several heart attacks.

In June and July the President was in bed for six weeks. At the

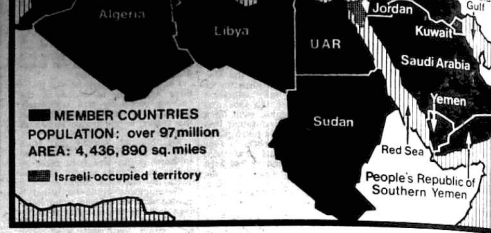
The latest reports on the Libya coup are being taken to his bedside at the presidential palace in Monastir, the seaside resort south of Tunis. His Ministers are in regular consultation with him.

Closest to President Bourguiba these days is the Minister of Planning and Economic Affairs, Mr. Ahmed Ben Salah. Behind a witty informality, Mr. Ben Salah conceals a tough political mind and he is tipped to take over when Bourguiba goes.

This provides another question mark for Tunisia. The congress of the all-powerful Destourian Socialist Party will be held on October 9-12. Then Bourguiba will reveal whether he plans to stand for another term of office.

If he does, he will have no opposition. For Tunisia's 4,500,000 people, the Paris-educated lawyer who won independence for Tunisia in 1956 is a hero beyond comparison. Every year there are hectic national celebrations on June 1, the day in 1955 when he returned in triumph from France with a promise of autonomy.

Now President Bourguiba may decide he has had enough, that the country cannot be led by a sick man. If so, the presidency would be assumed by Mr. Bahl Ladgham, the 56-year-old vice-president. But Mr. Ladgham is quiet, intensely



religions and lacking in popular appeal.

By contrast, the younger and more ebullient Mr. Ben Salah is a true socialist. He has pushed ahead with land reform in the face of conservative opposition from some of Tunisia's peasants. He has his followers well placed throughout the Government and clearly has his sights set high.

One man who might aim to slow his progress is the son of the ailing President, Mr. Habib Bourguiba, who is also Foreign Minister. He is whispered in Tunisia that the

younger Bourguiba is not too warm towards Mr. Ben Salah's radicalism.

But whatever strains there may be in Tunisia over the succession, the party leaders are all agreed on keeping the country out of military involvement along the Suez Canal. The armed forces in Tunisia are far from clear intent. It has always been President Bourguiba's argument that money for tanks and jet planes can be better spent in raising living standards.

This is in sharp contrast with the powerful military back in the Algerian and Libyan administration. President Boumedienne has been

pressing Tunisia and Libya to allow the United States to ship military materials southward along the Mediterranean coast to help the Mo against Israel.

Both have refused until now. If the United States were to agree, Tunisia would be the only country in the Arab world to do so. The United States would also be the only one to supply the tanks and jet planes that the troops of Britain and America

It has been the calculated neutrality of Bourguiba that has neutralized the military and international aid funds. Tunisia has been getting worse for a year past, lie in the weak administration of a territory which is too big, in the arbitrary ways of the local authorities and in the weakness and brutality of the Army mustering about 5,000 men.

It is still difficult to tell exactly how Frolina really operates. In any event, it was in August 1968 that President Frolina Tombalbaye first called for French help in putting down a revolt by the Toucoures in the Northern District of Tibesti. A company of French paratroopers did the job quickly enough, a very local operation.

But the overall situation was by no means in hand and central authority was being flouted more and more openly. Taxes were not being paid and security was no longer guaranteed outside Fort Lamy.

At the beginning of this year France intervened for a second time at the Chad Government's request. Two companies of the Foreign Legion moved in and two senior officers - Governor Pierre Lami and General Arnould - were made available to reorganize Chad's administration and Army.

The Express has a theory: "To allow disorder to spread in Chad is to compromise the independence of French-speaking Africa, where the silent struggle goes on between the Russian, Chinese and American secret services."

For some weeks past the French Press, both Left and Right, has been worried about the possible consequences of French military intervention in Chad. The intervention began in the summer in 1968 at the request of the Chad Government, paralysed by guerrilla action.

Spearhead of the Press criticism comes from the Right-wing opposition *L'Express*, which writes: "Once again French soldiers are committed abroad. We are going to send more reinforcements to Chad. You do not need to be strategic to understand that this means involvement from now on."

It asks: "Is it necessary to die for Fort Lamy?"

The weekly *Express* and *Nouvel Observateur* have just published stories on Chad which show the same uneasiness.

Rebellion which started in the East, near Sudan, has spread to the centre and North. Main stronghold is Ouera Province, about 150 miles from the capital, Fort Lamy.

Originally it was the people's reaction against the arbitrary administration, but the tendency now is for it to be co-ordinated by Frolina, the Chadian National Liberation Front.

Frolina was founded in Khartoum in 1966 by Ibrahim Abatcha. In January 1968 it was responsible for the bush murder of two members of the French technical assistance team, Dr. Lieve and Dr. Bertomieu, a veterinarian.

Abatcha was killed by Chad troops and a former Government

Minister, Dr. Abba Siddick, took his place as the movement's leader.

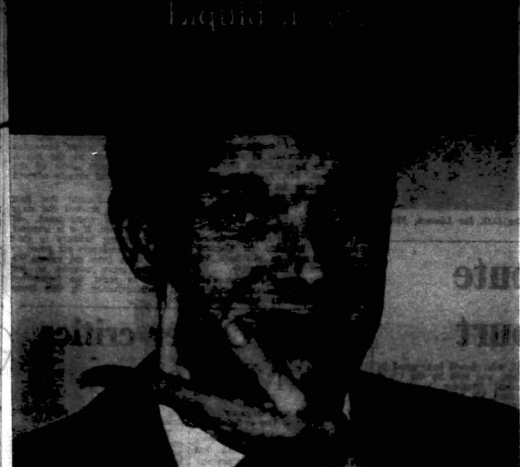

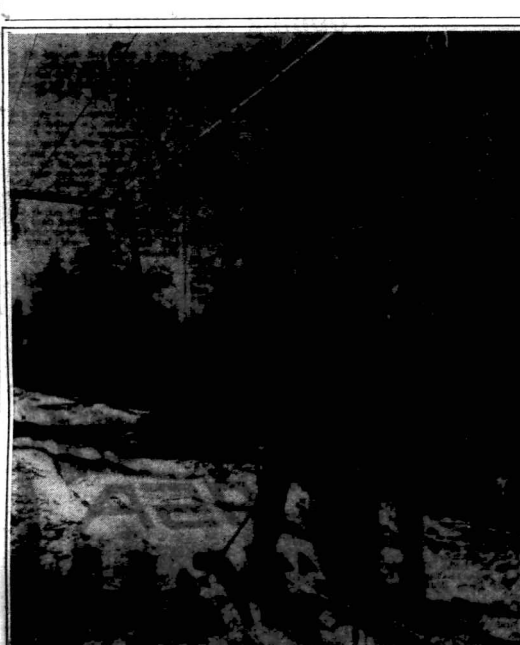

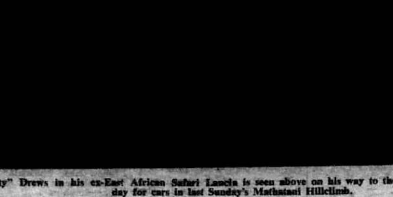
