Cooper Motors' 21st birthday shows service 'key to door of success'

By the time you are 21, people expect some sort of maturity from you. The mistakes of youth are not so easily forgiven. Some solidity is expected, to back up the wisdom and enthusiasm. This year, the Cooper Motor Corporation is 21, and has all the qualities you would expect. The kinks have been ironed out, but the enthusiasm remains.

The company has all the solid integrity you would expect from a prospering £1.5m. public company, yet ambition and drive makes sure there is no complacency.

The growth of the Cooper Motor Corporation in many ways reflects the growth of East Africa and, fittingly, it began with the vehicle which still symbolises the outdoor adventure of the three countries — the Land-Rover.

Formed originally to service the first 400 Land-Rovers sold to the ill-fated post-war ground-crew scheme in Tanganyika, it has grown from strength to strength adding Rover saloons, the very popular Volkswagen, Holden and Auto-Union Audi to its franchises. Now, too, there is the Triumph range.

But the prosperity which now surrounds the million pounds worth of buildings and plant — in Nairobi, Nakuru, Eldoret, Kisumu, Mombasa, Kisumu, Arusha, Moshi, Tanga, Dar es Salaam and Kampala — was not so apparent when the company, with great difficulty, found its first headquarters in a wooden hut in Jackson Road, Nairobi, 21 years ago.

The first step was taken in 1952.

All through the commercially dark days of the Emergency the company continued with well-justified confidence to plan and execute its growth. The new headquarters, Connaught House, was planned, built and occupied during a period when confidence and expansion were sadly lacking in other quarters. Beside it was built the first multi-storey used car "market" — the Autarama. Both these buildings will be expanded in the early 1970s.

That confidence — in the country, the people and the future — has paid handsome dividends, for more and more Africans have become shareholders in the Cooper Motor Corporation.

"We are completely East African," is the company's proud boast. Within the group structure are the three separate companies operating in Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania.

Indeed, the Land-Rover was so popular in Tanzania that it was incorporated into the design of a celebration kiloli when I.A.N.U. won the initial election and Tanganyika gained its independence.

The policy of tough selling (says the managing director, "Every car is for sale here — including mine") has always been geared to the efficient servicing of the products.

Training is always in progress and there is a full-scale school for mechanics in operation, with frequent visits by experts from the manufacturers to keep the training up to date.

In fact C.M.C. has become so popular with the Volkswagen manufacturers that this year they held their all-Africa conference at Nyeri.

Marine division is also in operation, handling the world-famous Del Quay Dory range of boats, Evinrude outboard engines and Zodiac rubber boats.

Kenya on claims long leave tricks' RETIREMENT FEAR

Some officers within the East African Community, particularly Kenyans, are said to be afraid to go on long leave for fear that if they return to find their jobs in the hands of African officers they would be "promoted by default".
This was alleged by the Railway Union before the East African Industrial Court, sitting in Nairobi yesterday.
The court, made up of the three members of the East African Industrial Court, sitting in Nairobi, the Chief Justice, the Attorney-General and the Minister for Labour, was asked to order the Railway Union to pay the cost of the hearing of the dispute and will give a verdict in Dar es Salaam next month.
The court was presided over by the President of the Uganda Industrial Court, Mr. Michael Kagame, sitting with Mr. Samuel Coaker, President of the Kenya Court, and Mr. Justice Cross, President of the Tanzanian court.
The dispute is over salary and allowances payable to officers of the category of workers and employees of the Railway Union, who are alleged to have been discriminated against on the grounds that they were African.
The Railway Union denied all accusations levelled against it by the court, but admitted that it is within its power, and it has a right to do so, to promote any of its officers who are not promoted by default.
No allowance would be given to any officer performing any of the duties so distributed.
However, the Railway Union agreed on this and told the court that this was one of the tricks used by a good number of European officers and non-African Africans to safeguard their own interests.
The fear was that if African officers in some posts long enough to gain experience this would give them a better chance of promotion than the European officers of these people.

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Patels fined £600 on Provident Fund charge

The four Patel brothers currently under detention in the United Kingdom were fined a total of £600, with the alternative of 40 months in prison, by a District Magistrate in Dar es Salaam yesterday.

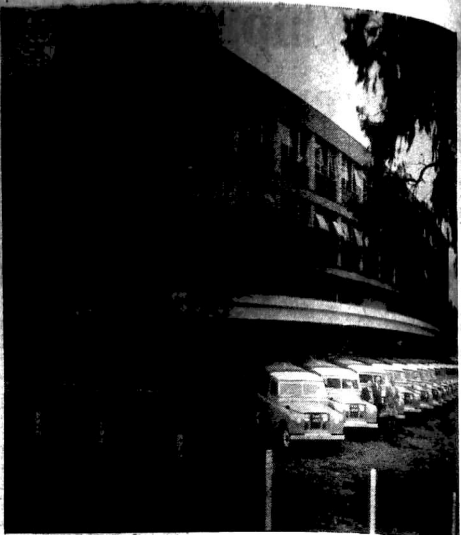

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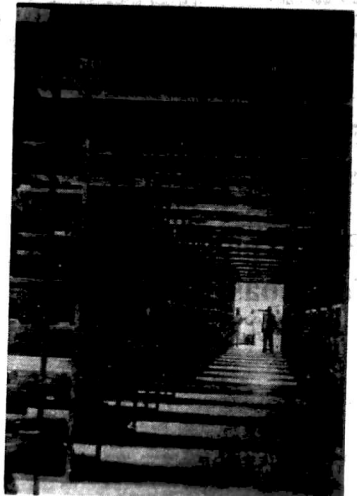

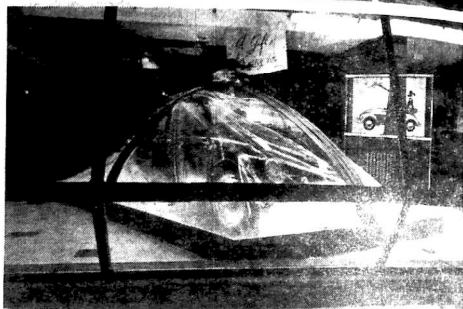

disturbed the simplicity and the beauty of the crater. A bumpy, 20-minute uphill drive from the township leads to the viewing base right on the rim of the extinct crater. At a height of 7,471 feet a panoramic view of the seven-mile-wide and 1,450-ft-deep volcanic crater can be obtained. A breathtaking view of the surrounding agricultural country can also be seen. Long wooden benches with tables are installed for those who wish to linger. Spacious, thatched huts have been constructed. Many more improvements are anticipated when the area, which is about 30 miles from the Equator, becomes a National Park. A better-known tourist site is the Lake Nakuru Bird Sanctuary which, too, has had some new features added since it was made a National Park. A newly-constructed observation post, 25 feet above the ground in the middle of a huge acacia tree, enables keen large-animal-lovers to watch and photograph from close quarters herds of hippo. The once-potholed road to Hippo Point is now in excellent condition. The aim of the authorities is to have a circuit road round the lake. At a point near Nderit the road will have to go through privately owned land in order to by-pass a swampy area and, as soon as permission is obtained from the owner, visitors are likely to have an opportunity to travel round the lake. All-weather bridges have made light-seeming easier during the rainy season. Apart from more than 400 different listed species of birds, the most famous being the lesser and

greater flamingoes, which at peak seasons may number up to 1,125,000, there is considerable large wildlife in the immediate vicinity of the alkaline lake. On the north-east corner of the lake, where the observation post is situated, hippo can be seen lurking under the coverings of a thick stand of reeds and papyrus. In the surrounding forest of thorny acacia trees especially near the "Baboon Escarpment" many common and some exceptionally rare species of monkeys are to be found. Small herds of impia, waterbuck, dik-dik, and other antelope are a common sight. Buffalo, zebra, and wildebeest can be seen further down the lake near Nderit. A recent discovery was the presence of leopard around the area. A dead leopard believed to have died after a fight with another of its kind, was skinned by the warden of the park. The field which remains to be exploited, however, is the plant life. The lake, a treasure-trove of interests of almost all naturalists, has an assortment of rare plants, the study of which may be of great botanical value. On the eastern outskirts of Nakuru, about half a mile from the main Nakuru-Narobi road, a prehistoric village of the Neolithic Age has been found at the foot of Hyrax Hill.

A generous grant from the Wenner-Gren Foundation has enabled the development of the third attraction, a site discovered in 1926 by the Kenya archaeologist, Dr. L. S. B. Leakey. The County Council of the Central Rift maintains a "museum-on-the-spot" where findings from Hyrax Hill and other parts of the Province are displayed. Visitors are given an opportunity to see all the features of Stone Age life as it existed over 250,000 years ago. A group of 13 sunken enclosures out of which one pit has been left open for the public to see, resembling in essence the present-day sunken houses of the Mbuti Tribe in Northern Tanzania, can be visited within about 100 yards from the museum. The "North-East Village", as the area is termed, is believed to have served the dual purpose of a dwelling and a stock enclosure. Pottery recovered and reconstructed is on display in the museum. At the "Neolithic Occupational Level" a total of some 1,350 potsherds, representing 28 simple pieces of pottery, was discovered. From the level implements of volcanic glass, pestles, stone platters and many other utensils were excavated. A more exciting part of the site is a cemetery in which 19 graves were discovered. On excavation each skeleton was found to be buried in a contracted position. The burial mounds were formed by large stones covered by a thick layer of soil and finally sealed by a huge capstone. The nine female skeletons were surrounded by grave goods, fat dishes, platters and pestles. Hyrax Hill also offers evidence

of early man's recreational activities. On a large flat rock about two yards square, representing the "board", scraped holes were found with some counters. This was presumably a forerunner of the modern "Mbau Game", now popular throughout Africa. Nakuru also possesses a 11-mile tarmac racing circuit which has been improved recently. It was built by the Municipal Council to a design approved by the Royal Automobile Club of Britain. The oldest motor racing track in East Africa is giving it an international-class hairpin bend just after the start. Over 25,000 racing enthusiasts attend quarterly meetings. Though Nakuru's significance as a tourist centre is maintained by these four attractions, some residents have further enriched its importance by catering for the demands of tourists. The most reputed "outage industry" of Nakuru and the pride of Nakuru — is the making of flamingo feather corages and flowers. Mrs Kellogg, an American

missionary with the World Gospel Mission, uses the feathers shed by flamingoes to make a variety of flamingo-feather flowers. A selection of flowers, lampshades, grating curts and many other hand-made varieties are on sale at the Bediary Bookshop. The feathers of other Kenya birds, such as the guinea fowl, are also being used in the industry. Some feathers are even exported to Taiwan for encasing in plastic for medallions and key rings. Mrs Kellogg's work is all the more important for all the proceeds from the sale of flowers goes to philanthropic missionary work. A local tanner, produces leather goods for residents and tourists. Two modern hotels with a total of 118 rooms and 173 beds, three cinemas with daily shows, and many smaller restaurants make the otherwise quiet town a lively place for tourists. The Nakuru Players Club keeps social and cultural activities always on the move with up to five theatrical productions a year. The Nakuru Sports Club, some excellent sports clubs having facilities for

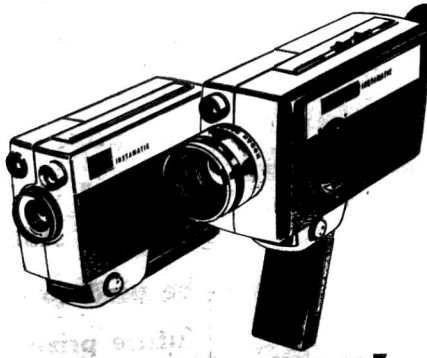
outdoor and indoor games, swimming pools, a golf club and a floodlit football pitch at Athika Stadium give the town a modern image. The town is served by all means of transport. Its railway station is one of the most attractive in East Africa and tarmac roads from most Kenya towns, including the capital, and an airstrip at Lane make Nakuru easily accessible.

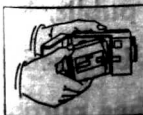

Time for a real 24-hour service

The other night while having a puncture repaired I noted the paucity of facilities offered by service stations after hours. During the day attendants swarm around keenly, perhaps too keenly, smearing unquaked, an immaculately polished windscreen with greasy water, and wiping it with a squeegee, leaving streaks and dribbles, smearing a transparent brake-fluid reservoir, with contents clearly visible from the outside, dipping their finger in and saying, "Look! You need more brake fluid, can we sell you a tin?"

The next day, when a mysterious sound mark the size of a finger-print appears on the mudguard wherein the paint has gone soft and is peeling away, the customer wishes he had stopped for petrol at the local old-fashioned duka instead.

However, after about six p.m. apart from the three liquids and air, the response to any request is simply *Hutana, hutana!* The puncture in question conveyed a one-inch tear in the tube which the small-size hot patch available barely covered. There was no patch or gaffer for the corresponding quarter-inch gash in the tyre, nor any rubber solution with which to stick it. These two items were tracked down in two separate service stations after some searching around.

Other items that might be required by a desperate motorist, a tube, a fan belt, a bulb, a length of flex, a screw-driver to make a small adjustment, are simply not

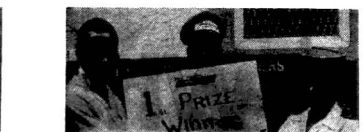

TRADE TIES WITH EAST AFRICA GROW STRONGER

Total trade between Australia and the East African Community increased by nearly 20 per cent last year — to a total value of 16,900,000 dollars in 1948/49. This is part of a continuing trend of increased trading between the two areas, and there is good evidence of an acceleration of the mutual trading activity.

The East African Community is an important source of supply for Australia of some specialised goods, particularly sisal, coffee, tea, cotton and pyrethrum extract. In fact Australian imports of sisal from the Community increased by 52 per cent in the past year, imports of cotton increased 13 per cent and imports of tea more than doubled.

Total Australian imports from the Community increased from 9,500,000 to 10,800,000 dollars — a rise of over 13 per cent. On the other hand, Australia's exports to the Community increased from 4,500,000 to 6,000,000 dollars — a rise of 33 per cent.

Australian businessmen are becoming increasingly aware of the trading opportunities available in Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania — particularly in view of the rapid economic development taking place in the Community.

Australian exports to the East African Community of a number of items have increased rapidly in the past few years. Exports of iron and steel to the area have risen by 300 per cent in the past four years. Sales of tallow have increased almost 22 per cent in the same time, and sales of paper have gone up by about 350 per cent.

In addition, substantial new markets in the Community are being developed by Australian

exporters for such things as pharmaceuticals, timber, carpets, clothing, petroleum products, batteries and canned and fresh fruit.

Altogether the value of Australian exports to the Community have increased by better than 60 per cent in the past four years — the biggest increase having taken place over the past 12 months. Australian exporters also see excellent prospects for expanding sales of other goods to the area — including agricultural machinery, live animals, building materials, hand tools and chemicals.

In this context Australia is taking very seriously its first participation in the Nairobi Show this month. Twenty-two Australian firms are participating in their country's exhibit at the Show, which will highlight Australian farm machinery, veterinary products, agricultural aircraft, pumps and irrigation equipment, motor vehicles and auto accessories.

Australia is one of the world's great agricultural producing and exporting countries — yet it is also one of the most sparsely populated. This has meant that Australia's farmers and graziers have to develop capital intensive production techniques. For a hundred years and more her farmers and engineers have earned an international reputation for the invention and design of trend-setting farm machinery.

Farming country in East Africa is very similar to that in parts of Australia — and for this reason in particular Australian farm machinery manufacturers exhibiting at the Nairobi Show expect keen interest in their products from local farmers and graziers.

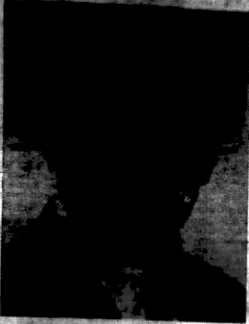
Australia is gaining a larger share of the market in the area because of the rapid expansion and increasing efficiency of its own manufacturing industry. Another factor generating mutual trade is the regular direct shipping service between the two areas.

Trade is a two-way relationship and in this regard Australia's unique system of tariff preferences on manufactured and semi-manufactured goods and handicraft products from developing countries is already providing new export opportunities for the expanding industries of the East African Community.

The Australian Government expanded the scope of the preferential tariff scheme early this year, with the addition of some 90 new items to the tariff schedule, and the value of quotas for goods imported into Australia under the scheme was increased by 150 per cent.

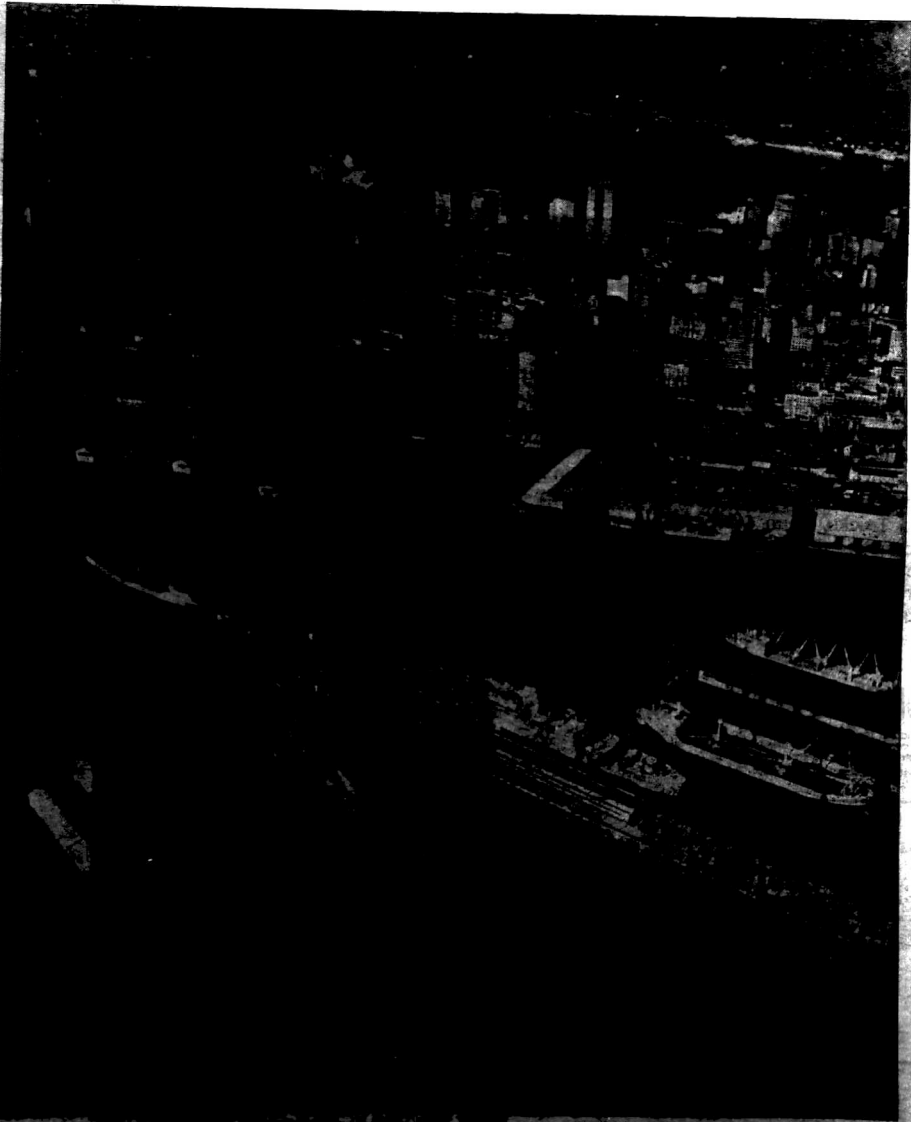
East African exporters are expected to take increasing advantage of the tariff preferences as the opportunities they offer become better appreciated (the Australian Trade Commission in Nairobi can provide additional details of the scheme).

The trade trends and emerging opportunities for a further cementing of economic ties between Australia and East Africa are extremely encouraging.

Australian processors and manufacturers have had some dramatic export successes. They are selling spaghetti to Italy, stainless steel cutlery to Sheffield in Britain, and photographic equipment to Japan and Germany. The products have proved themselves, the price is right, and the goods have been delivered. The wool has turned full circle and Australia now sells to other countries — cars, farm machinery, furniture, electrical equipment and heavy engineering products.

The growth of export income from manufactured goods has been doubly welcome. It has brought Australia much-needed diversity in its overseas earnings, and has added strength and fluidity to the economy. This in turn has made Australia an even more attractive proposition for overseas capital investment.

The soundness of the Australian economy also stems from newly-discovered resources that make it practically self-sufficient. Twentieth century industry is in a position to quench her own thirst. Valuable oil discoveries have been accompanied by natural gas finds that will revolutionize the nation's power supply and chemical industries. The most important oil and gas discoveries to date have

been made in the remote regions of Western Australia. The oil fields of the southern coast will come into full production next year. They will produce about 200,000 barrels a day, meeting about half the country's crude oil needs. Already smaller oil fields — in Western Australia and in the semi-tropical state of Queensland — are producing 10 per cent of oil requirements.

The off-shore oil and gas finds are a bonanza for Australia, saving millions of dollars in overseas funds. Geologists are still searching confidently in other areas. Overabundant oil fields have been a constant succession of mineral discoveries — iron ore, nickel, manganese, and the space-age beach-sand minerals, rutile and titanium. The proven iron ore and bauxite deposits are enormous.

Iron ore deposits in Western Australia are probably the biggest in the world. They are the basis for a new industry supplying iron ore and pellets to Japan, Europe, the United States and, of course, Australia's blast furnaces. The ore reserves are hundreds of miles from the nearest city (the West Australian capital, Perth), and their development has meant the establishment of towns, railways and ports in the remotest regions of the country.

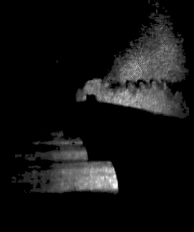
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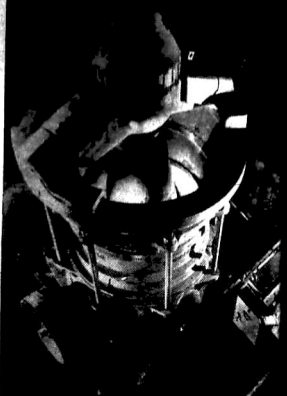
The country's biggest individual export market is at Mt. Isa in the lonely north of Queensland. The Mt. Isa mine produces lead (Australia is the world's biggest exporter), silver and zinc.

The mine management has started a development programme that will make Mt. Isa the largest individual producer of lead, silver and zinc, and the most important underground mine in the world. The target for this programme is 22,000 tons of ore a day by 1976.

Like so many other big projects Mt. Isa has been developed with both local and overseas capital. The rate of overseas capital inflow has been rising steadily and is now running at about \$A1,200 million a year. Overseas companies find a confident climate for investment. The raw materials are there, the country is a growing market for its own products, and it is stable politically. The developments of the past decade have given Australia a solid industrial base. The visible advances towards the 1970s with a marked degree of maturity in its financial structure, skill in the mobilization and use of its resources and capital and a new awareness of its position in the global context.

It can be fed from a 100-foot diameter and it reduces them to a minimum size of 10mm. Continuously, the crusher would be able to process 11,000 tons of ore a year. It was delivered from Melbourne to Darwin by the order.

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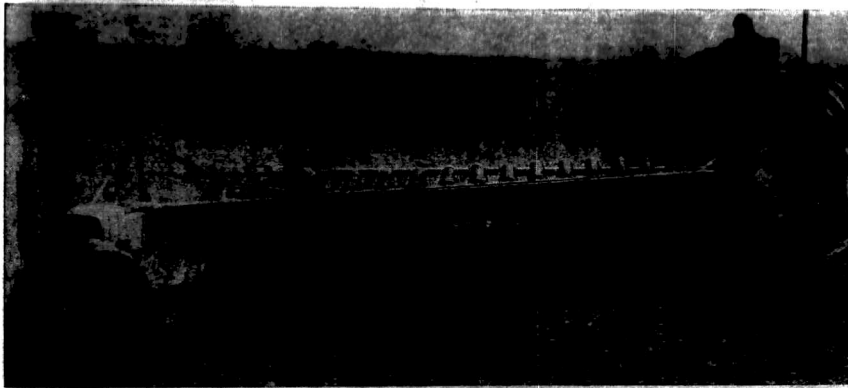

AUSTRALIAN SUPPLEMENT

The country's automotive industry started in the 1930s and has developed into a highly advanced multi-million dollar business. The car has become part of the Australian way of life and there is currently one vehicle for every three persons.

The industry broke all records last year in terms of the number of motor vehicles registered. In the 12 months ended June, 1968, the number of vehicles registered was 443,217. The previous year was in 1963 when the figure was 411,025.

Of the 12 companies manufacturing or assembling vehicles in Australia, half go beyond the assembly of C.K.D. (completely knocked down parts) to the manufacture of bodies and engines.

Australia's motor vehicles industry this year is geared for record sales of approximately 460,000 cars and commercial vehicles — a factor which reflects the healthy economy of the country.

The typical Australian car, made by the "Big Three" manufacturers — General Motors/Holden, Ford Australia and Chrysler Australia — has a six cylinder car/V8 engine of three to five litres capacity displacing 115 to 210 brake horsepower, and a six-seater body.

Market areas included East and West Africa, the Middle East, South-East Asia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands, the West Indies and South America. Holden cars are used as police vehicles in Thailand and Ford Falcons for taxi and hire car purposes in Japan.

General Motors/Holden's widespread

The Australian parts industry has come a long way since 1923 when there were only 75,000 vehicles on repair and more parts were imported. By the mid-1950s the motor vehicle industry had lifted its purchases of finished and component to \$437.8 annually.

In volume terms this included 249,000 tons of steel, 11,000,000 forgings, 9,285,000 sq. ft. of safety glass, 2,850,000 gallons of paint products, 72,000,000 sq. ft. of upholstery material, 44,000,000 pieces of rubber components and 1,991,994 tyres.

The industry comprises at least 4,000 suppliers with almost 200 major manufacturers and at the end of 1967 employed more than 20,000 people.

Estimates show that Australians spend more than \$42,200,000,000 annually on buying, operating and maintaining their vehicles. Not only do they constitute a highly sophisticated market but the extremely adverse conditions of some Australian roads combined with climatic conditions and service under which vehicles operate, impose quality requirements higher even than those for the United States and Europe. A product to win acceptance in Australia has to be tough, reliable and top quality.

In growing volume, exports of components and spare parts include such items as transmissions, engines, electrical systems, flywheel gears and brake and clutch parts.

There is also a whole range of accessories exported. They include garage equipment, such as hoists, lubrication equipment, jacks, air and wear hose reels, tyre gauges and external sun visors, heaters and demisters, windscreen washers and safety belts.

The new Australian-made range of Ford Falcon models incorporates a host of new features. Among these are more powerful engines, bigger, more effective air-cooled brakes, new safety radiators, air vents and a wider track for better and safer handling. New design features include wrap-around traffic lights, colour and parking lights, new grille, redesigned body panels and highly fashioned interior appointments. This is the Fairmont Sedan which will be one of the two 1969 models on display at the Nairobi Show by Hughes Limited.

New Falcons on display at Nairobi Show

The Ford Motor Company of Australia Limited will be represented at the Nairobi Show by Mr. Donald McI. Swan, overseas sales manager of the Overseas Marketing Office of Ford Australia.

Mr. Swan, a New Zealander by birth, has worked for Ford in New Zealand, Canada and lately Australia, where he was advertising and sales promotion manager before entering the export field in 1966.

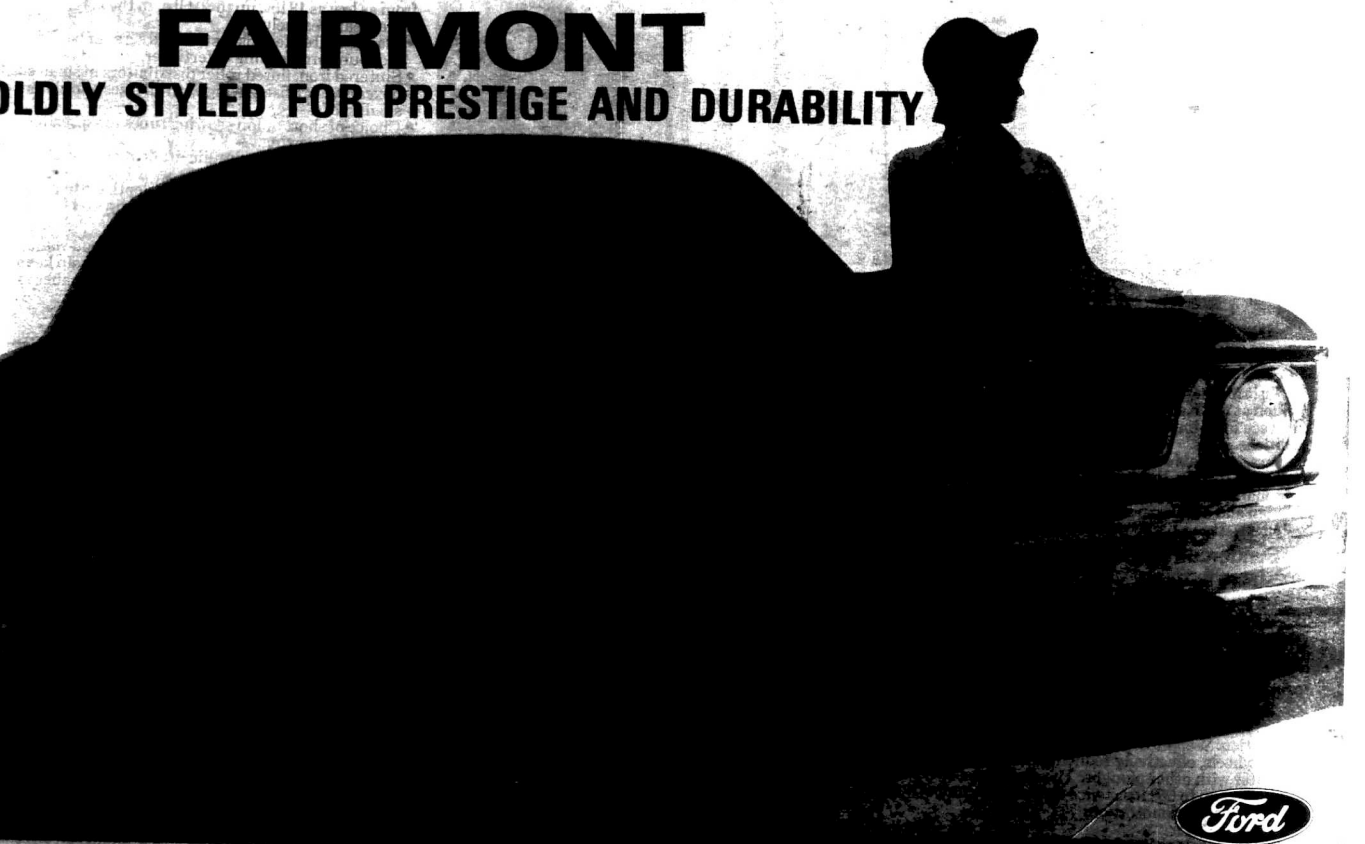
He has seen a dramatic annual rise in Ford vehicle exports from Australia from 2,255 vehicles in 1965 to 7,276 in 1968, the year in which Mr. Swan was awarded the Australian Institute of Sales

Management's Distinguished Export Salesman Award.

The award, made annually in conjunction with the Australian Department of Trade and Industry, is for outstanding sales of Australian products in export markets overseas.

Steel firm breaks into E.A. market

Australia's steel producer, The Broken Hill Proprietary Co. Ltd., which has mills in Newcastle, Port Kembla and Whyalla, has in the last six months broken into the East African market with the help of its agents, Mitchell Coats and Co. (E.A.) Ltd.

Orders for more than 4,000 tons of plates, light and heavy sections, rods and flats have been placed already and although the tonnages available for export are limited at the present time due to the world shortage of steel and the fact that Australian steel products are in great demand the world over, a bright future can be anticipated for this important industry when conditions return to normal.

East Africa will then be in a position to obtain its steel requirements in the shortest possible time to the benefit of its light industries.

BOOM IN MINERAL EXPORTS

The value of Australia's mineral exports is expected to exceed \$A1,000,000,000 per annum for the first time in the financial year 1970/71. This is three years sooner than indicated by estimates available only 12 months ago.

The main increases which occurred in that time were in the planned exports of coal, iron ore and potash, and alumina.

The value of exports of mineral products is expected to increase to \$A1,285,000,000 in 1973/74, according to information prepared by

the Australian Department of National Development. This is an increase of 137 per cent.

The projections are based mainly on signed contracts or definite plans by firms for expansion of their production facilities.

They will, therefore, need to be further reviewed as additional contracts for the export of mineral products are written, and as individual companies undertake further expansion to take advantage of the market outlook for individual commodities.

Car pile carpeting covers the floor, boot area and lower panels of all four doors. The carpet under-felt is one inch thick, to help reduce noise.

The instrument panel has been redesigned and now has two centrally located, deeply recessed circular clusters housed in a matt black non-reflective frame. A clock is fitted as standard equipment.

The horn bar on the energy absorbing steering column has been

enlarged and padded to improve driver protection.

Simulated woodgrain covers the glove compartment's lockable lid and is used on all four door panels.

The Australian designed and built 306 cc. in V6 engine develops 240 h.p. at 4,000 r.p.m. This lightweight V6 provides an excellent power-to-weight ratio. The engine is fitted with the four-barrel quadra-jet carburettor and has been proved in extensive dynamometer and road durability testing.

Power-assisted front disc brakes, dual hydraulic circuits, air standard equipment. Also standard

is Powerglide automatic transmission and power-assisted steering.

The track has been increased by one inch front and rear, further contributing to the handling and comfortable ride.

The 4-ply rating tubeless, double band white-wall tyres are mounted on 14 x 5.00JJ wheels with double-side safety rims.

Mechanical improvements combine with the extensive use of sound-insulating materials to minimise noise transmission from the road and mechanical components.

Rubber bushings have replaced the inner steel bushings in both the upper and lower control arms of the lower rear front suspension and a new V-frame engine cradle further improves the sound proofing by isolating the engine transmission assembly from the passenger compartment.

Power windows, a new wind-screen wiper system with an articulated right-hand wiper blade has been incorporated to provide greater visibility.

SYREN WITH A SIREN



This Australian siren, which is not for export, is demonstrated by an electronic alarm system, which triggers a piercing siren if a child falls into a swimming pool. It has been designed by an Australian engineer, Mr. Maxwell Strong.

This electronic siren is set in a metal box measuring only seven inches by six inches by five inches. Two antennae of unequal length are attached underneath the unit, which is placed alongside a swimming pool, the longer antenna reaching into the water. The second and shorter antenna extends to within a short distance of the water's surface.

When a child falls into the water, the disturbance causes waves to lag beyond the second antenna. This completes an electronic circuit which sets off the siren, which is sufficiently sensitive to set off the alarm if the child falling into the pool weighs 4lb. or more. Even a dog or cat could activate the system.

Irrigation brings new life to the driest continent

Australia is the driest continent in the world. An indication of how dry can be drawn is the fact that the total flow of Australian rivers is equal only about half the discharge of the world's great rivers — the Mississippi.

Australia's three million square miles only about 1,000,000 acres are irrigated. About 70 per cent of the total land surface has less than 10 inches of rain a year and 71 per cent has less than 20 inches. It is not surprising that Australia generally, and farmers particularly, are water-conscious. Irrigation farming holds a special place in the nation's agriculture.

For example, Australia is one of the countries in the world making the most of its water. It has a number of significant advances in irrigation water for pasture production. Since the water is a scarce commodity, it is made of a more useful use of its available supply. It is made of a more useful use of its available supply. When is the time they save in moving from one watering position to the next?

For farmers, who want to irrigate tall crops, such as sugar cane, maize, sorghum, grapes, citrus trees, or tobacco, a specially designed mobile spray boom (C) is available. This boom, which is 160 feet long, has a ground clearance of up to 7 feet. The boom is capable of watering two acres at a time, and being mounted on wheels the outfit is readily moved. Operating capacity is between 115 and 400 gallons a minute at 120 feet.

Components of the system are spring-loaded electrically released channel stops, specially designed channel outlet pipes, electric water sensing devices placed in the irrigation bays, and a torch battery to supply power.

Briefly, the system works carefully worked out. When watering is automatically opened, channel stops catch controlling a series of bays. The automatic channel stops are first manually closed when watering starts. When watering in the first group of bays has been in progress some time and reaches a certain pre-determined sensory device in the bay it completes an electric circuit. When this happens a switch is thrown on the channel stop and the gate is opened.

This allows the water to flow on to the next channel stop and start watering the next group of bays, and at the same time it lowers the level of water up to the point of the first channel stop.

When the system is perfected — it is nearly ready now — and the component parts have been patented this equipment will be available for general manufacture and export.

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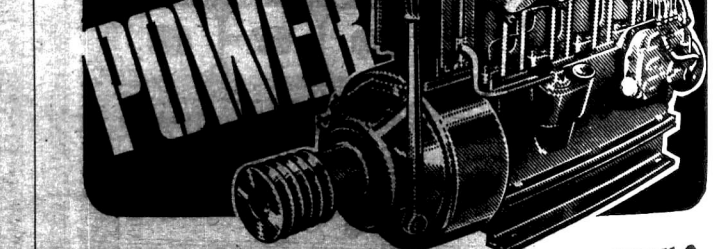

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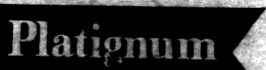

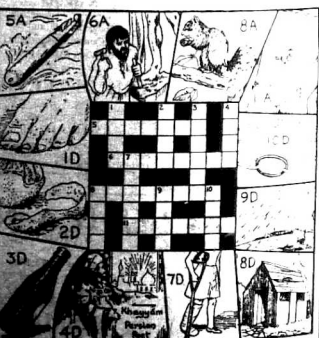

THE HOUSE THE JENSENS BUILT

The Jensens moved into their home at Langata on January 26 last. They bought the land, cut down the bush and put up the house themselves. It is a house that is highly recommended for Africa because it is cheap to build and a pleasure to live in.

The Jensens' home is the latest architectural style to come to Kenya. It is of a kind greatly used in Denmark but the 4,500,000 Danes got it from Finland - the land of forest and timber. The Jensens live by a big wood near a forest reserve. Next to the forest is a vale which is full of good grass that a Masai would envy for his herds.

The A-frame house, as it is called, has a stone wall of 45 inches high, 47 feet long and 21 feet broad, 2,000 square feet of shingle roofing with 1,500 square feet of living space. The ground floor living-room is 20 by 23 feet, plus a large kitchen, a dining section, a shower and a toilet. The ground floor has two double bedrooms, one single, a bath and built-in shelves.

The house is the product of an African carpenter and an African mason working under Mrs. Jensen's supervision and her husband's co-ordinated participation in the construction of an almost all-timber house.

Mr. Jensen is a head brewer and he worked on the house after four p.m. Mondays to Fridays and the whole day on Saturdays and Sundays.

The house took two years to complete. The stone came from Magadi and the timber and shingles from local timber traders. Apart from 30,000 nails for roofing everything originated in Kenya.

The house is well furnished with good, simple and comparatively cheap pieces of furniture. Mrs. Jensen, who is a painter, knows what piece of furniture goes with what and which colours make the house attractive.

The flowers surrounding the home came from neighbours' gardens and are an attraction in themselves.

The Jensens say it is a great fun to build one's own home. Mr. Jensen's mother and sister are visiting Kenya this month and will stay at the house.

The A-frame house plan took City Council officers five months to consider whether the roof was a good thing for Africa or whether it would eventually collapse. Mr. Jensen had to send for photographs from Denmark for the council officers to examine.

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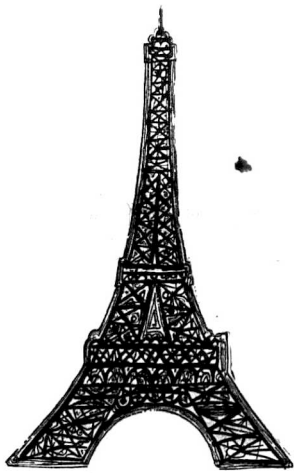

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FORESTRY SCHOOL ON MOUNT MERU

Standard Staff Reporter.
 Nestling at 5,500 feet on the lower, gentle slopes of Mount Meru, near Arusha, is the Olmou Forest Training School where young men from throughout Tanzania come to manage one of the country's most important natural resources — timber.

The school, surrounded by the Mount Meru Forest Reserve, is part of the Research, Training and Farmers' Education Division of the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Co-operatives and is headed by foresters, assistant foresters and beekeepers.

Since 1960, when it was first opened, the school has been greatly expanded to include lecture rooms, dormitories, dining hall, administrative offices, a library and museum and recreational hall.

Class room and practical work out in the thick forest go hand in hand and students learn all aspects of forestry, from preservation to exploitation and management of timber.

The school runs diploma courses for foresters, who will be capable of managing areas of up to 10,000 acres with the minimum supervision. Some former diploma students have quickly become regional forestry officers.

Other courses are for assistant foresters and beekeepers and the school also runs "refresher" courses of six months and vocational training for power saw operators and tractor drivers. Shortly diploma courses in beekeeping and horticulture are to be started.

The staff, under the Principal, Mr. C. S. Mbandao, consists of lecturers and practical instructors, including volunteer foresters.
