CRIPPS' BUDGET AIM IS RECORD SURPLUS

Britons have to find less in taxes: smokes and drinks up

BRITONS pay Income-Tax, purchase-tax and entertainment tax, which will not have to pay more for their cigarettes, beer, whisky, wine and port, and wines, and with income from savings, which will have to pay less tax, under the 1946-49 Budget, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Stafford Cripps, said in his speech on the surplus of £200-million.

The surplus is the largest since the war, Sir Stafford said, and will be used to cover the Government's extra-budgetary expenditure.

At the beginning of his long speech to the Commons, Sir Stafford set his new task, not merely to balance the Budget, but to match resources against needs as part of the reconstruction programme.

The financial situation was now dominated, he said, by the difficulty of paying for essential imports following the unprecedented drain on gold reserves—imports had to buy more food and raw materials essential to manufacture and to pay the minimum to countries demanding gold or dollars in payment.

Surplus is to combat inflation

He warned Britons that she cannot rely on the Recovery Programme for her salvation. But it gives us time to work out a policy of cooperation with the Dominion and other sterling countries similar to that achieved between the countries of western Europe.

The balance of payments depends largely on our external situation and our currency must be checked on our national resources including imports, exports, capital and private consumption, and the Budget must be balanced.

Sir Stafford said his Budget must have two main objectives:

FIRST: to obtain, with an equitable distribution of the available surplus, a general surplus which exceeds that provided for all Governmental purposes.

SECOND: so as to encourage production as to encourage production by providing a better incentive to producers.

The first objective is to the size of the realised surplus in the 1946-47 Budget—£200-million, the measure of the inflationary situation.

The second objective is that the revenue for 1947-48 should be £242-million, revenue from taxation, £100-million, and of the amount expected to come in from the Inland Revenue, £244-million.
