BRITAIN'S FOOD ECONOMY EXPLAINED

Subsidies Which Keep Down Living Costs

The scheme by which the British Government is keeping down the costs of certain foodstuffs by granting subsidies totalling one million pounds a week was explained to the House of Commons by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir John Simon, and the Minister of Food, Mr. W. S. Morrison.

Information regarding the working of the scheme had been asked by the Labour Member Mr. Mackintosh, who pointed out that although the taxpayer has provided six million pounds a year for extra duties on sugar and tea and yet not being asked to vote £21 million more to subsidise food.

In his reply, Sir John Simon said he did not claim that his policy was complete one in itself, but it was complete in the nature of an instalment. He then, in some thirty minutes, explained how the subsidy was kept down to the £1 million mark. He said that for the subsidy of £25 million on wheat the £4,750,000 paid to the farmer was costing £14,250,000 of wheat at 14s. 6d. per bushel of 212 million.

431 British Merchant Seamen Killed

LONDON, February 9.—The war began 431 British merchant seamen have lost their lives and 238 more have been injured by enemy action.

Policy of Economic And Moral Excommunication

Dag Liddell Hart, whose predictions of the course of a major European war are being well borne out by events, thinks that both the Allies and Germany would make a mistake in launching the offensive on the Western Front.

His first conclusion was that while the weapons give an aggressive power a greater advantage than ever before, a defensive power can be equipped with such equipment as defence has become master of the attack where two well-equipped nations are concerned. That is, because of this modern advantage of defence, it is possible to make a blockade of any German air-land or sea base. LOCUST MOVEMENTS

Young Fliers Infected

The Department of Agriculture supplies the following locust expert on the situation in Kenya to February 7.

West-Small gravid swarms are circulating in N. Kavirondo. They are doing little or no damage. They fall from the east and appear at Ngiloi to the east of Pakenia on February 7.

A large swarm on February 7 followed between 10 Kalou and 10 Kalou and the next day flew towards the Sabaki-Nandi Valley. Centre—Last week two swarms were seen in North Kenya flying southwards. One swarm was very large. Large flocks of birds were commencing the swarms. In the Lewa area (50 miles northwest of Marsabit) a large mine crop was eaten out.

Mere—as a result of the visit of the Entomologist, it is believed that locust infestation is severe as the main breeding has been in the uninhabited grassland country on the edge of the Reserve.

Damage to crops in the Reserve by hoppers was prevented almost entirely by destruction of the hoppers, but swarms of young flying locusts from the uninhabited wild districts are now in the Reserve and the natives have been harvesting much of their grain before it is ripe in the hope of saving something. Considerable damage has occurred in most areas to be expected.

Entomologist's report from British stores that few swarms will occur from hoppers hatched there.

Things—The situation in Malaya is well under control. All settlers with hoppers on their land are cooperating.

Nairobi—Numerous young flying locust swarms have been seen in many open spaces to the north and west of Nairobi during the last ten days and similar stragglers were seen in Embu by the Entomologist recently. Fourteen were caught near the Scott's Agricultural Laboratories and all were infected externally with the small yellow Lecanatorius mite and one internally. The abundance of mites in such young adults is unusual. A small swarm was seen in Nairobi this week; the direction appeared westerly. On 7th a very big swarm was seen flying to the east. It was observed about two miles to the east of the Scott's Agricultural Laboratories.

Cost—

Tolia—All hoppers have now taken wing and a big swarm flew the district in a southerly direction. Much damage to maize in the lower parts of Deth is reported.

One malinfested and one very small swarm of young flies are circling in the Taveta area with a tendency to go southwards.

Maito—A fairly large hopper band near Maito. Andri developed wings early in February and flew towards the Yatta Plains to the northward.

Unfortunately, this band was only seen shortly before it flew. Information came too late for the hoppers to be killed.

BIRTH OF THE R. A. F.

First Demonstration Recalled

The birth of the R.A.F. is graphically recalled by the retirement of Mr. M. H. Henson, who in May, 1911, organized on behalf of the British Empire the first demonstration of the formation of the Royal Flying Corps, writes our London Correspondent. In an interview Mr. Henson recalled that he attended Mr. Claude Grahame White at the demonstration which was assisted by Lord Roberts, Mr. Winston Churchill, Lord Charles Berkeford, Mr. Lloyd George, Mr. Agnew and Lord Halsall among others.

"Colonel Seely, who was Minister of War at the time, asked me my 'lowest interest in aviation until he was satisfied that it was not to be dropped effectively from the air,' said Mr. Henson. 'For his benefit a week before the demonstration which was held at Duxford, I had a bag of seed brought by Grahame White to crash directly he had released his load, but he was so busy that he did not do so until the day after the demonstration itself were Col. Duxford, Grahame White, and of course, Grahame White himself.

Dummy Bombs—

"We chatted the outline of a 'battleship on the ground and drop' on it dummy bombs which were friendly bombs made out of plaster of Paris filled with chalk."

As a lad Mr. Henson rode on the earliest 'pneumatic tyre' motor cycles. In those days pictures were much more frequent than now, and on one occasion Mr. Henson and a companion picked up 57 in the 100 miles between Waterford and Dublin. They managed them with plastic lenses. He had a motor house for his 'winging petrol' from France in 1902. Mr. Henson's house No. 26 of the London House, Cavendish Square, W.1B, he keeps a museum to Howard's Health for driving at more than 29 miles an hour in 1905.

NAZI OFFICERS' GLOOM

Travel Trials in Germany

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT] London.

Travel in wartime Germany is no joke, according to a Swiss journalist who has returned from four days in the Tapes-Ansger. On crossing the frontier at Berlin he was given his traveller's ration-card. This entitled him in all to 2 1/2 of bread, 1 lb. meat and 31 oz. of butter or fat. The separate coupons were for 2 drachmas and 1 oz. of butter or fat and 1 1/2 of meat or bread.

At Frankfurt the first two of its importance behind the frontier, the train quickly filled up with men returning home on leave from the Western Front. All were East Prussians. They spoke freely of the western front, but not of the war in general or its aims. 'Frankfurt was passed in the other direction carrying me to the Siegfried Line. No civilian seemed to be travelling at all.

In Frankfurt-on-Main the writer found neither porters nor taxis. Shouldering his luggage he made his way through the black-out to the hotel. There nearly all the few guests were officers. All bore the same gloomy, grim expression, the smile which have forgotten how to smile.

Undrinkable Coffee—

The first real shock was the coffee. The writer ordered on arriving. It was an undrinkable brew of cocoa, barley and a drop of synthetic caffeine. At breakfast he tried his luck with the tea, only to find it worse. The bread contained only a trace of white flour. Eggs were so scarce that a hen's egg was given a frankfurter instead of one. For one of his troops he was given a frankfurter. In the daytime the streets were almost deserted. A taxi car, here and there a taxi, and a few buses comprised the entire traffic.

The quality of amusement were open, but the audiences were scanty, owing to lack of money. Everywhere the writer noted the signs of privation he had seen in the officers' faces.

At Wiesbaden was a "master's day" — he had a choice of three dishes—fried herrings and potatoes, mixed vegetables and potatoes, boiled vegetables and potatoes, boiled and potatoes.

The soap shortage is acute. The monthly ration per head is one small tablet, with one miniature shaving-stick for the men.

RELIC OF A LOST CAUSE

Among the records received by the Malayan Memorial Library, Nairobi, in response to its recent appeal for historical East African archives, are two documents of German origin dating from the first months of the last war. Each of its way holds special interest for the reader of today.

The first is German, is a programme for a show to be held at Dar es Salaam on August 17, 1914 to show which, whether to say, did not proceed beyond the programme stage.

The second is the British, and in form and nature provides a striking comparison with current German propaganda methods, and an equally evident contrast with the straightforward presentation of fact characterizing the work of the East African Information Office during the present war.

Issued by the Governor of German East Africa at Mombasa in February, 1915—Herr Schone, "the Kaiser's Viceroy"—it takes the form of a broadcast announcing the Sultan of Zanzibar's proclamation of a holy war against the September of Islam, the English, the Belgians and the Berbers.

On Dual Wars—

Just how deaf were Malaya ears to this crude appeal the history of the Great War clearly showed. Nothing but subtle play on the emotions, fear and religious fanaticism of the interested reader, the reckless blasphemy and profanity of invective thrust and gibe, are typical of German methods, past and present, in such matters.

But the reader in this particular case was Mr. Beales residing at Avenue House, Nairobi, and the perspective in which he has now placed it makes of the pamphlet as pathetic a relic of a lost cause as any of Dr. Goebbels' outpourings will eventually become in the museums of the future.

How many of the "proclamations" were printed and distributed is not very known, but Mr. Beales records a very large number lying by the Magati Railway, where the Germans had just blown up the track. It was pouring with rain and the men and the others were probably all soaked to destruction.

RECLAMATION OF WASTE Progress In Recent Years

Much progress (states the Economist) has been made in recent years in the reclamation of waste by the utilization of by-products and by the recovery of scrap arising in the process of manufacture and consumption or through obsolescence.

The proportion in which scrap and virgin materials are used depends largely on their relative price and, consequently, their cost of production during the year to year. When the price of virgin materials is high, the proportion of scrap used in their production is high. Conversely, in times of rising prices the proportion of scrap used is small. In fact, indeed, several attempts of raw materials have failed to restrict the consumer's demand to such an extent as to make the supply of reclaimed materials.

Waste is a resource of hitherto wasted by-products and scrap has been recovered more and more, especially if, as in the case of Germany, imports are severely restricted by blockade and lack of foreign exchange. It is therefore surprising that the Ministry of Supply has set up a special salvage department to coordinate the work, in co-operation with other Government departments of interesting the reclamation of waste and scrap. The Ministry has indicated that it is an appeal to householders, hotels, shops and industries to prevent waste. 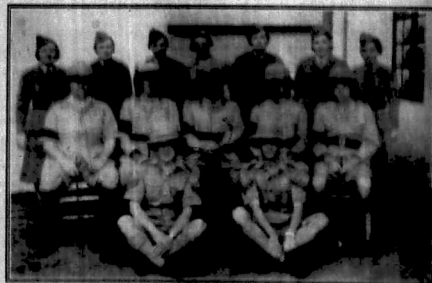

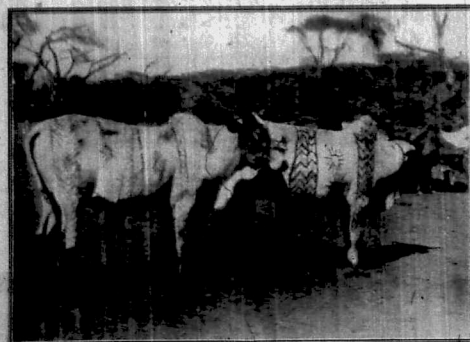

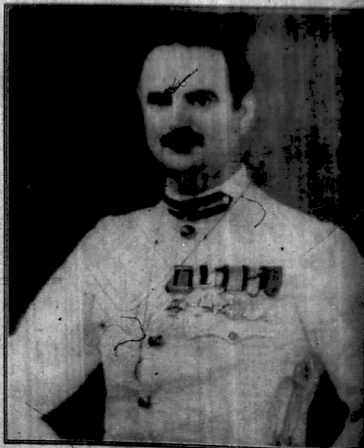

The Book Of Hore-Belisha At The War Office

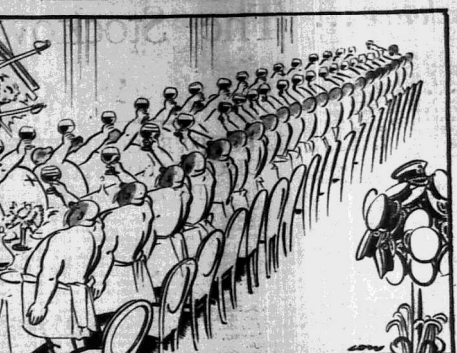

which have always arisen, when there was no co-operation, between the interests of the pig-grower and those of the pig-breeder, would be approached or solved harmoniously. No need the producers be concerned with the purely commercial problems of marketing. Indeed, all experience shows that the business side is best left to commercial houses who know the market. But time is an important factor. The reports published lately show clearly enough that if Kenya is to share these new markets, and establish connections which will remain after the war is over, decisions must be taken early and wisely, therefore, that while the meetings at Nakuru will be full and frank, they will at least be decisive one way or the other.

The pig production for the local markets is about 14,000. For the ordinary needs of the market another 20,000 pigs per annum are needed and if the civil markets are to be shared, the output must be still greater. That entails a rapid expansion of factory facilities and unless the pigs are to be ready before the war ends, it is clear that mass clear-ship and quick action, as part of a comprehensive, long-term breeding stock, is the right kind needed, and if Kenya is ready with a cut and dried product every effort can then be made to expedite the importation of new stock.

They will one day have to take up again. They have been cut off from the civil life to which they are entitled. It is our duty to induce us to remember, both Government and people, that there lies on the shoulders of each of us an even heavier responsibility than before to ensure that we do not neglect in any manner where it is offered for sale. The Colony can only make a success of this industry if it starts properly and continues along the same lines. But if it is going to start it should do so soon before other people, already busy expanding, can take the lead.

Subsidies Which Keep Down Living Costs

The scheme by which the British Government is keeping down the costs of certain foodstuffs by granting subsidies totalling one million pounds a week was explained to the House of Commons by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir John Simon, and the Minister of Food, Mr. W. Morrison...

Information regarding the working of the scheme had been asked by the Labour Member, Mr. Alexander, who pointed out that at least £2,000 million had been provided for £400 million pounds a year from the extra duties on sugar and fat and was now being asked to cost £50 million more to subsidise food prices.

In his reply, Sir John Simon said he did not claim that his policy was a complete one in itself, but it was rather the nature of an instalment. He then gave some illustrations of how the subsidies were being worked down food prices. He said that for the subsidy of £20 million a year that the £40 million sold at 18d would be costing 14d, but the full subsidy of £10 million a year was keeping the cost of a quart of milk at 1d, which otherwise would have been 1d 3/4.

A Warning The Chancellor warned the House that the necessity of certain commodities must inevitably be reduced if it were to carry on the struggle to success. Fifty millions a year was being spent to prevent what would be a further rise in the food index of 12 points.
