VIEW THAT RETURN IS ESSENTIAL TO SECURITY

The visit to London of M. Laval and M. Flandin for conversation with British Ministers takes place to-day, the talks will open on Tuesday.

The conversation, it is stated, will be mainly concerned with a general review of the European situation, the attitude of Germany to the League and the problems of disarmament and the security of the European Powers.

Germany and Equality

Complete parity of security can become negotiable.

Nineteen Cases Last Year

MEMORANDUM OF THE SAGGAL

The Following Tables Progress Report has been issued by the Chief Veterinary Officer.

Disease Obituary

One case of positive rabies is reported since the publication of our last report on the 15th November. The case occurred in a dog on the 15th of the month and was about 20 miles from Eldoret. One of the last five more recent cases occurred in the Ticho-Bogobito district and it would seem probable that the incidence of rabies is mostly confined around this area, which during the course of a year, has been thoroughly treated. From the particulars furnished in this memorandum it is ascertained that the dog may have been infected and it is again urged that all dog owners and visitors resident in this region should be advised to exercise the greatest care against carrying of rabies infection.

Waporia Province Central Highlands

Waporia Province

Plague began in North and North-West Waporia was contained during 1932. A mortality of 100 cases. On 20th January it was reported that a suspicion was reported in the district. It was found to be a case of bubonic plague. The illness, however, was confined to the district. It has been killed by a dog and it is believed that the disease was introduced by a further suspicion on 15th January. 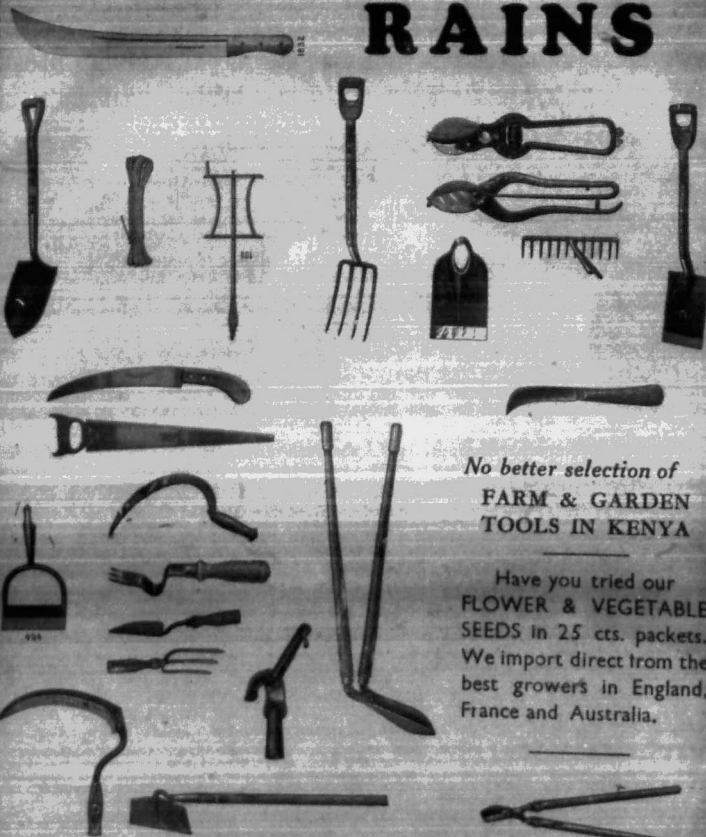

The most important proposal emerging from a meeting of French and British statesmen held in London this week is that of an Air Convention, between the Great Powers of Europe, under which, in the event of an unprovoked attack by air by any one of the signatories, the Air Forces of other nations would go to the assistance of the victim.

A general settlement among the European Powers for the promotion of peace is suggested by means of regional Pacts. Under such a settlement Germany would return to the League of Nations.

The members of the Board considered this cost was higher than the actual cost of production and of these figures should be added 17 per cent. for the cost of transport, and an average interest charge was given as 150 per cent of coffee price. The cost of transport is regarded as open to qualification. On the whole however the Minority Report considers that the position disclosed the great necessity for the most favourable interest rate to be offered to the sisal farmer, for loans of such a nature to be repaid in such a manner as to be satisfactory to the borrower with the minimum of interest charges.

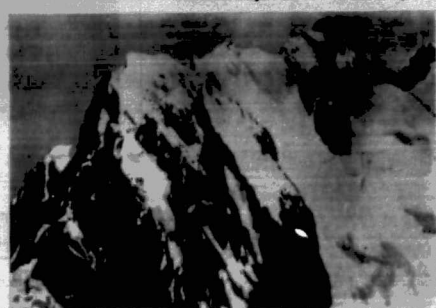

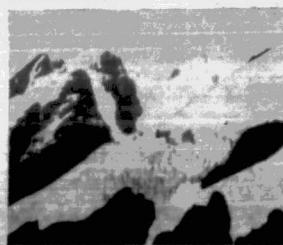

Disastrous Collapse in World Prices

HOW KENYA AGRICULTURE HAS BEEN HIT

Striking Comparisons

SERIOUS POSITION OF WHEAT, DAIRY PRODUCE AND NATIVE CROPS

The Minority Report of the Kenya Economic Development Committee continues its examination of the state of the agricultural industries as a result of the disastrous fall in export prices since 1929.

A table included in this article (the tenth in the series) sets out at a glance the percentage fall in commodity values that are used by the Minority Report to give point to their argument that to urge a policy of increased production, even for Africans, is not a solution of the Colony's economic problems at present prices.

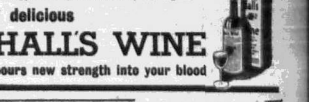
