# BRITAIN'S BUDGET SURPLUS

## £31,148,000 in Hand on Year's Operations.

### CHANCELLOR LEARNS FIGURES ON FISHING HOLIDAY.

#### Revenue Sources Steady.

**FLOATING DEBT REDUCED BY £166,000,000.**

**Britain's financial year ended on Saturday with a surplus of over £31,000,000.**

This figure compared with an estimated surplus, when the Budget was framed a year ago, of only £11,300,000. The chief sources of revenue were well maintained and Estate and Customs Duties showed substantial increases.

The expenditure also includes provision made for sinking fund and the American Debt.

The country's floating debt has been decreased by £166,000,000.

## Sinking Fund and War Debt.

London, March 31. — To the Exchange Equalisation Account against which corresponding assets are held, so that apart from this item the floating debt was reduced by £166,000,000.

### Newspaper Comment.

London, April 2. The brightest London hopes for ten years is the gain of the Government's new budget, which has been welcomed by the Chamberlain.

The Press generally suggests that some relief will be given to all sections of the community who have the heaviest burden of the crisis in 1931.

### Effect on Stock Exchange.

London, April 2. The effect of the favourable revenue figures published on Monday was reflected in the strength of British Government stocks when the stock exchange opened after the holiday this morning, and War Loan at 103 advanced to 104.

## EMPLOYMENT IN BRITAIN.

### Figures Again on the Up-Grade.

#### Large Increase in One Month.

#### BUT OVER TWO MILLION STILL OUT OF WORK.

London, April 2. Employment of insured persons in Britain between 16 and 24 cent more on the up-grade. Rather over 10,000 more were employed at March 16, being 17,000 more than a month before, and 644,000 more than a year ago, but there are still 2,000,000 wholly or partly employed.

### Overseas Outlook.

London, April 4. The people in Britain have been given good cause for cheerfulness during the last few days. Following the announcement of the budget surplus on the financial year of over £31,000,000, has come the news of the further substantial decrease in unemployment, the figures being the best since 1929. The improvement, moreover, is shown to be general. It extends to practically all industries and to all parts of the country.

Although during the current month about 150,000 more young people than was the case at the same time last year will be leaving school to seek work, there is every prospect that the next month will see the beginning of a further agricultural development of the situation.

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## NEW PROJECTILE.

### Exceptional Armour Piercing Qualities.

London, March 29. Details of a new projectile with exceptional armour piercing qualities were given by Sir Robert Hadfield at Sheffield yesterday.

The projectile is 10 inches in diameter and weighs one ton. It is made of a special alloy of iron and nickel. It is perforated the plate, and then a half inch hole is made in the plate. The velocity was such that, after passing through the plate, it carried a further nine miles and was so little damaged that with some touching up it could be used again.

The damage is estimated at a million lire.

## A NEW BRITISH LOAN.

### Redemption Issue of £150,000,000.

#### At Three Per Cent.

#### TO MEET MATURING TREASURY BONDS.

London, April 2. A NEW £150,000,000 loan will be issued to-morrow at interest of three per cent, with the issue price of £1. It will mainly be used for the redemption of the four per cent Treasury Bonds totalling £105,000,000 maturing on April 15 and the balance will be used for funding the floating debt. The new loan is redeemable from 25 to 35 years.

### Favourable Markets.

London, April 4. This morning's stock exchange markets were very favourably impressed by the terms of the new loan, and the interest effect was a further appreciation of all the leading British stocks.

A distinguishing feature is that a cumulative sinking fund of one per cent will be attached to it. This will increase its attractiveness for few loans carry a specific sinking fund. At the close of each half year the Government will make a sum equal to two per cent of the nominal amount of the loan originally created. From this sum, say, £5,000,000, the amount required for redemption of the loan will be deducted and the balance applied to the purchase of Government securities.

## South Africa's Status in the Empire.

### MINISTER'S EXPLANATION OF NEW MEASURE.

#### The Citizenship Clause.

#### HIS MAJESTY ACT EXCLUSIVELY ON ADVICE OF UNION MINISTERS.

London, March 29. The Bill defining the status of the Union of South Africa in the Empire, which includes certain modifications of the Act of Union 1910, was explained in the House of Commons on moving the second reading, by Mr. Oswald Pirow, K.C., who introduced the measure on behalf of the Government.

The most important feature of the Bill is the provision that in future the King will act, in regard to purely South African matters, exclusively on the advice of his South African Ministers and not as hitherto on behalf of the Government.

The Bill also provides for the "sovereign independence" of the Union, but it is explained that no new principle is involved as this status of Dominions was accepted at the Imperial Conference.

Although clauses in the measure allow for a South African nationality, particularly in regard to qualifications for Parliament, it is emphasised that common British citizenship in the Union is not compromised and cannot be altered.

Legal Technicalities.
COURT INTERPRETER'S ERROR LEADS TO STRANGE SITUATION.

When the Greek Government decided a month ago that it was no longer tenable in the Country, Mr. Samuel Inoull, the American financier, who was wanted by the police in his own Country on a charge of fraud, left on a Greek ship to Constantinople, en route to Persia.

When the ship arrived in the Bosphorus, it was detained pending extensive negotiations, enquiries and investigations of international law, eventually, Mr. Inoull, despite his protests and those of the Greek Captain of the ship in which he had arrived, was instructed to appear, in person, before a Turkish Court.

Finally the mistake was discovered, and Mr. Inoull, on whose behalf lawyers, both Turkish and Greek, were making the greatest efforts, was arrested and informed that the request of the United States Government would be complied with, and he would be handed over to the American authorities for extradition.

Greek Captain's Protest.

The Government was asked to see a copy of the Istanbul march 30 arrest for Inoull, but will not send it until notified by the American authorities.

International Law.
The American Ambassador, Mr. Robert P. Shannon, has just received the report that under instructions from Washington he asked the Turkish Government to arrest Samuel Inoull who arrived at the Bosphorus aboard the steamer "Maiois."

It is believed that the request raises several important questions of international law, notably the question whether, if a foreign ship is lying in the Bosphorus, a part of the Straits is in Turkish territorial waters.

After presiding to the Turkish Police and the Greek Consul against the detention of his passenger, the Captain of the "Maiois" will not be kept up steam ready to sail at a moment's notice.

"Germans do not want Colonies, Germans do not want War, all that Germans want is Germany," declared Dr. Karl Hoerner, a high official of the Nazi Party after leaving for Berlin after attending an international student's Congress at Cambridge.

### A FRENCH CANARD.

Musser and Russian rifles, numbering 14,000 have been brought to France during the past fortnight in cases from Antwerp, according to the newspaper "Le Jour," and have been carried in lorries to Paris. The paper adds that after recent seizure of arms in Paris, an Algerian was arrested who stated that he was connected with an anarchist group.

# SENTENCE ON A SOLDIER.

## Echo of a Frontier Incident.

### "Undue Mildness."

### AUSTRIAN WHO SHOT A GERMAN.

(THROUGH REUTERS' AGENCY.) London, March 31.

On the ground of "undue mildness" the State Prosecutor has appealed against the sentence passed yesterday on the Austrian Auxiliary Force soldier, Steinhilber, on a charge of negligently causing death to a German Reichwehr soldier, Schumacher, who was shot dead on the frontier between the Tyrol and Bavaria on November 23.

Steinhilber was given a suspended sentence of two months' imprisonment and two years' probation, which means that he is substantially free.

It is understood that the Austrian Government paid £500 as compensation to the relatives of Schumacher.

### Austrian Version.

"An Austrian version of the incident published in the "Mitte Zeitung" two days after the event, and that a group of Austrian border police were suddenly surrounded by 200 Nazi storm troops on Austrian soil. Fearing that an attempt was being made to take them prisoner, the soldiers fired and one of the Germans was killed.

### Further Strikes in Spain.

(THROUGH REUTERS' AGENCY.) Madrid, March 30.

The Home Office states that a revolutionary general strike has been started at Malaga by anarchist trade unions. During the course of the strike three strikers were injured. An illegal transport strike prevails at Saragossa where the socialists have joined the anarchists.

### THE SUGAR INDUSTRY IN BRITAIN.

### Committee to Enquire into Condition.

(THROUGH REUTERS' AGENCY.) London, April 5.

A Government Committee has been appointed under the chairmanship of Mr. Wilfrid A. Greno, K.C., to enquire into the condition of the sugar industry in the United Kingdom, including home-grown beet and imported sugar. The committee will participate in the usual recommendations in regard to the application of State aid in the event of reorganisation.

Mr. A. Greno, K.C., has been a barrister since 1908, taking silk in 1922. He has been standing Counsel to Oxford University since 1920.

# FUTURE OF PEMBA ISLAND.

## The Clove and Copra Industries.

### RELIEF OF INDENTEDNESS.

### British Resident's Visit to England.

During his visit to Pemba, the Acting British Resident at Zanzibar, Mr. G. D. Kewp, held business at Wete, Chaka Chaka, and Mikuu, where he met and addressed from the Arab and Indian communities.

In reply to an address by Mr. Bhumji Jiva, President of the Young National Association at Wete, His Excellency the Acting British Resident said that with regard to the measures under consideration for the relief of indentness, Sir Richard Buxton had gone to England determined to do his best to explain the position to the Secretary of State and to induce the co-operation of the Home Government. But there were obvious difficulties in the way of obtaining assistance which must involve some financial risk to the already heavily burdened British taxpayer, while to place additional burthen on the solvent members of the Protectorate community in order to improve the condition of the indentured, would be undesirable and in any case would tend to increase the numbers of the indentured.

### Cloves.

As regards relief of the price of cloves, His Excellency explained that the efforts of the Government to reduce the price of cloves were being maintained, but they must not expect the former high level of prices. For the use of cloves in cigarette and vanilla manufacture could only be secured if the price did not rise too high. It was hoped, however, that a price of one or two rupees above present prices might be secured and maintained.

As to copra, His Excellency stated that the Protectorate's copra had a very bad reputation due to the fact that many of the nuts were unripe when picked and much of the copra was not properly dried. The fault lay both with the producers who had unrigidly inspected them, and with the system of inspection of copra on January 1 next, under which the export of unripe and unproperly dried copra would be prohibited.

### Copra.

It was hoped that in time this measure would raise the reputation and the price of Zanzibar copra.

### Administration.

His Excellency also explained that it was the intention of Pemba a single Administrative District with a District Officer and one or two Assistant District Officers as might prove necessary. A reduction of correspondence and a reduction of correspondence to visit outlying portions of their districts was proposed.

# UNEMPLOYMENT IN NAIROBI.

## Proposal to Provide Relief Works.

### A QUARRY SCHEME.

### Proposed by Councillor as Unemployment.

The Nairobi Municipal Finance Committee has reported to the Council the following minutes: "The various suggestions were considered as to what works could be instituted for the relief of unemployment. It was eventually resolved that the Municipal Engineer be instructed to make arrangements for the opening of a Quarry on Crown Land at Eastleigh for which the permission of the Hon. Commissioner for Local Government had been obtained for the purpose of providing work for unemployed workmen in preparing building stone in connection with the construction of anti-malarial drains to be carried out as soon as possible, and that the workmen employed on this work be paid on the basis of piece-work."

### Unemployment Provision.

Councillor Bhowra wanted the whole minute debated, for he said, in connection with his contract for building the Law Courts he had placed sufficient work for 6000 men which would occupy them for the next four months. It was therefore quite unnecessary to open up this quarry. His deletion of the minute was voted by Council for Newark for purposes of discussion only.

In subsequent discussion Councillor Bhowra also stated that his firm was accepting stone from any quarry up to 200,000 running feet, provided it was of sufficient quality. Very shortly, the new Municipal Offices were to be built, and probably the Central Offices, so that there was absolutely no need for relief work of this nature.

### Copra.

This minute was proposed by several members, and eventually ratified, but the proposal to open up the quarry is to be left over until the next meeting of the Works Committee.

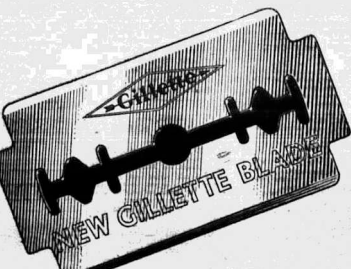

## THE LONELY ISLAND OF IBO OFF MOZAMBIQUE.

### Relics of By-Gone Days.

#### PERIOD OF ROMANTIC HISTORY DATING FROM THE SEVENTEENTH CENTURY.

Full of romantic interest, and bearing the marks of stern struggles long back in its history, the island of Ibo, 370 miles south of Dar es Salaam, is to-day almost a forgotten town, nearly all its houses empty. In sun and in shadow, its streets lie hushed and the scores who thronged them are but a memory.

Chief of the three fortresses which guard Ibo—a Jesuit outpost and later a slave-trading centre—is that of San Joao, which holds a group of Portuguese political prisoners under sentence of exile by the Republic. ### Settled by Jesuits.

[FROM A CORRESPONDENT.]

Dar es Salaam (by mail). —Jesuits and settlers of the early days may be seen in East Africa without the opportunity to study or even to see lands and peoples under the administration of other Powers. The fort of defence was centred in a developing plan of three fortresses, continuing the points of possible attack.

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# Scientific Research in Lake Rudolf Area.

## EVIDENCE OF PRE-NEOLITHIC CULTURES FOUND.

### New Arid Period Beginning?

#### NORTHERN SHORE OF LAKE SON TO BE IN KENYA TERRITORY.

Much valuable work has already been accomplished by the Lake Rudolf Rift Valley Expedition, under the leadership of Mr. V. E. Fuchs. The members of the Expedition, six in number, are carrying out topographical and geological researches in the vicinity of Lake Rudolf.

Geological research, carried out by the leader of the Expedition, reveals that the Lake is retreating with marked rapidity, and if the same rate is maintained, it is expected that within the next few years the northern shore of the Lake will be in Kenya Territory. Mr. Fuchs believes that another arid period is approaching similar to those in the past when the Lake was probably completely dry.

Both archaeological and palaeontological evidence collected by members of the Expedition has tended to corroborate researches carried out in other parts of East Africa. For the first time evidence of a culture, earlier than Neolithic, has been found in the basin of the Lake, for the archaeologist of the Expedition has discovered stone implements of Chellean-Acheulean times.

### Correlating Surveys.

[Special to 'The East African Standard' by Mr. V. E. Fuchs, leader of the Lake Rudolf Rift Valley Expedition, 1934.]

On February 10 the Lake Rudolf Rift Valley Expedition left Nairobi en route for Lodwar and Lake Rudolf. Travelling by air and lorry the expedition was able to reach the barrier which marks the closed areas of the Turkana Province, but it was not till we descended the appearance of the country changed to any marked degree. ### Survey Work.

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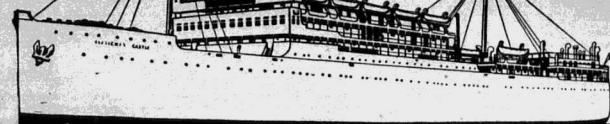

# GERMANY'S DEFENCE SERVICES.

**Britain's Uneasiness at Military Estimates.**

**DIPLOMATIC REPRESENTATIONS MADE IN BERLIN.**

**Increase in All Branches.**

**THE LEAGUE AND CONTEMPLATED BREACHES OF THE PEACE TREATY.**

The British Government in London is taking up the matter of the German Military Estimates which were made public a short time ago. These Estimates, it will be recalled, show a very marked increase not only for the Army and Navy but also for the Air Ministry.

Sir John Simon informed the House of Commons on Monday that he had instructed the Ambassador at Berlin, Sir E. C. E. Phipps, to make an official enquiry concerning these increased Estimates.

As the League of Nations retains the right to exercise a supervision of armaments, the British Government is entitled to demand an explanation of this apparent breach by Germany of the Treaty of Versailles.

A later message from Berlin states that a German Official explains the increased Estimates as being merely for re-organisation and renewal purposes. He denied that in any way violated the Treaty of Versailles.

## An Official Explanation.

London, April 10. Sir John Simon referred in the House of Commons to the increased German Armament Estimates shown in the 1930 Budget as concerning the Army, the Navy and the Air Force.

He remarked on the increased estimates for the Navy by £20,000,000 marks, for the Army by 175,000,000 marks, and for the Air Force by 100,000,000 marks. He added that the Government was giving the greatest attention to this matter. "I have requested," he said, "the Ambassador at Berlin to make inquiries of the German Government concerning them, and I hope to receive some information during the present week."

## Long Been Suspected.

The action of the British Government in officially enquiring from Berlin as to the meaning of the increased defence estimates is based on the fact that the League of Nations retains the power of supervision and it is open to the British Government to call the League to its attention on any contemplated breach of the Peace Treaty. German budgets have long been suspected of violating the Treaty in the matter of armaments and the new estimates are confined in some quarters to a question of the 1930 Budget as concerning the Army, the Navy and the Air Force.

**CIVIL SERVANTS UNION CALLING A STRIKE.**

Paris, April 9. M. Doumergue's letter to President Lebrun emphasizes that the most striking abuse is pluralism among Civil Servants, which hereafter will be forbidden likewise the receipt of salaries along with pensions.

Civil Servants' salaries will be reduced 10 per cent. in the case of smaller salaries and 30 per cent. in the case of larger salaries.

The President of the Republic has volunteered a reduction 20 per cent. and Ministers 15 per cent. Governmental employees a reduction of interest rates, thus facilitating the plan of national equipment by reducing unemployment.

The Civil Servants Union has called on its members, including employees of public transport services to declare a general strike on May 1, to be carried on till the Government's message are withdrawn.

He is expected to be in a position to restore the unemployment benefits which were suspended in 1931.

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## GERMAN DEBT PAYMENTS.

**Trustee Account Suggested.**

**A Hint to Creditors.**

**FOR REDUCTION IN RATE OF INTEREST.**

London, April 7. The creation of a trustee account for the receipt of annuities due by Germany's debtors to be used to pay Germany's creditors according to the amount available, was envisaged by Dr. Schacht's address to the press on Germany's financial position.

He stressed the impossibility of reducing the present transfer payments and expressed the hope that creditors in their own interests would suggest reduction in the present rate of interest which was still too high.

A Denial.

Dr. Schacht denied that Germany had asked for further credits from the foreign exchange was essential. He was convinced Germany would pay all her foreign debts and it was not a question of willingness but of capacity.

London, April 10. The House of Commons re-assembles to-day after the Easter recess and an important legislative programme has been introduced in the next few weeks.

An outstanding event will be the introduction of a Budget by the Chancellor of the Exchequer on the 17th inst. It is expected that Budget resolutions will occupy a considerable number of sittings.

The opening of the Budget is awaited with keen interest and, in view of the satisfactory returns returned for the past year, substantial reductions in burdens imposed to meet the 1931 crisis are anticipated.

Other measures which will come before Parliament will include the Road Traffic Bill, which the second reading will be moved in the House of Commons to-morrow when Major Oliver Stanley, the Transport Minister, will introduce the measures which are proposed to meet the demand that road permits should be issued to all motor vehicles.

To avoid congestion of business in the House of Commons, the important is the Betting and Lotteries Bill, which will be introduced in the House of Lords. This measure will reach the House of Commons in a later stage of the Session.

America and Supervision.

British note scruple about a greater comprehension of France's insistent need for security.

Reply Received.

The French reply to the latest British inquiry on disarmament has been received at the Foreign Office. It is understood it is a brief document containing no definite proposals, pending the other consideration by the French Government of the question of guaranteeing the results of any international system based upon armaments control.

A general guarantee of security must be directed to the crossing of a frontier, or to some other form of overt aggression. There must also be some machinery for the maintenance of the State gradually with aggression was, or was, justifiable, and it may not be in doubt whether, to fact, its action may properly be held to have constituted an aggression. In guaranteeing armaments conventions these doubts are unavailing to arise.

Promises of Progress.

The Times' Paris correspondent says this should be regarded as a sign that the French Government are now prepared to face a momentous decision that will profoundly influence international relations.

Note Under Examination.

The French note was subjected to a preliminary examination by Sir John Simon and his advisers at the Foreign Office this morning—British Official Wireless.

France and the Conference.

A New Attitude.

Sir John Simon is studying very closely the French note, which he understands states that the British memorandum of the Bureau of Disarmament, which the British Foreign Secretary recognises as a considerable step in the direction of disarmament. France hitherto has refused to countenance even the present degree of German armaments, but now shows her readiness to discuss a system of armaments control, although the details that the ultimate decision lies with the Disarmament Convention, and not with the British Government of the day.

Change of Attitude by France.

The Council of Ministers has unanimously approved of the reply to Britain's question regarding the disarmament guarantee which France requires in order to accept the Disarmament Convention.

Brighter Hopes.

There are hopes according to reliable reports, that the Disarmament Convention will be revived.

The French reply to Britain's proposal is reported to be in agreement with Britain with regard to the Disarmament Convention, which is a measure of German disarmament will be recognized, provided the armaments in limited and its limitations applied to full information that should be given to that imposed on every other signatory.

It is understood that the reply welcomes the implication of the British guarantee, but the British Government is not willing to discuss further guarantees of execution. The French Government proposes a fuller amount of information than that now available suggests further discussion with a view to Tuesday's meeting at Geneva.

The immediate effect on British policy is reported to be that it may now be possible to explore the possibility of a Disarmament Convention, which would include the whole of Europe, including Russia, with possibly a further extension to Russia, freedom in armaments for Far Eastern use in the event of a treaty with Japan to sign the relevant treaty. Another treaty, to which the United States has a like signatory, would institute a system of general control and supervision of armaments.

Germany Suspicious.

Meanwhile the German Press complains that France is surreptitiously preparing to begin. New York reports indicate that American public opinion is unchanged, namely that America is prepared to join in any agreement with regard to treaty.

The Bureau Meeting.

## THIRTY-THREE OF THE MGERA AREA OF THE HANDELI DISTRICT OF TANGANYIKA HAVE LOST THEIR LIVES IN A FLOOD DISASTER.

According to an official account, which is published in the Official Gazette, published in the Tanganyika Official Gazette, the flood disaster in the Mgera area of the Handeli District of Tanganyika, has cost the lives of thirty-three natives and six Europeans in the evening.

A wall of water over six feet high descended on the shallow Likuyu valley from the direction of Kilimanjaro. The water covered the banks and banks in its path, and destroyed 11 people at Mgera, and 22 at the village of Kungu near Kivulima Hills.

These people had been following their usual practice of sleeping in bandas and similar temporary structures on the wide valley floor, in order to protect from pig and baboon the crop of molins and bananas which they recent above had brought forward.

## Wanted to Safely.

At Mgera, where the main flow of water was localized to the river and a few natives managed to wade safely, but at Kungu there they were only two survivors.

Five bodies have been recovered at Mgera, and 11 at Kungu—some as far as four miles away from the main flow of water, and caught up by the water.

Search for the missing bodies is being continued by relatives on the Native Authority, but it is thought they have been buried beneath the many new sand banks which have been left by the flood.

## Without Precedent.

# The Locust Campaign in East Africa.

## HOPPERS REPORTED FROM MANY AREAS.

### Situation Well in Hand.

## CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE TO CROPS AT THE COAST.

Locust flying swarms and hoppers are reported from a large number of districts in East Africa, according to the Kenya and Tanganyika Departments of Agriculture. Emergent insects are, however, being taken to deal with the situation, which is well in hand, although further heavy hatchings are expected in some areas during the next few weeks.

There has been some opposition by the natives in the Masai-Machakos area to the use of poison, owing to a rumor of serious cattle losses. This opposition was overcome as a result of demonstrations carried out in the presence of certain chiefs, who agreed that there was no danger to cattle.

A flying swarm in the coast area destroyed young maize and stripped banana trees. Little damage to crops has occurred elsewhere in East Africa.

## Natives' Suspicion of Poison.

The following reports on the locust position in East Africa have been issued by the Departments of Agriculture of Kenya and Tanganyika, the former reports being dated April 12 and the latter April 13.

### KENYA

#### The Red Coast.

CAHNT PROVINCE.—Scattered swarms of locusts were reported from the Ngao-Ko neighborhood, while the principal infestation is at Bahiluh, where the locusts have remained for a month and are reported to be laying. Though this infestation is of a general nature, the conditions prevail, be flooded in April the hatchings will probably be more extensive than in previous years, but it is anticipated that any reasonable steps taken will destroy the eggs.

It is reported that during the north-easterly gales from Kari to Garom, previously reported, swarms were young and, although stripped, of at least the tassels of the maize have been consumed and bananas stripped.

From the Voi Taveta region it is reported that there are thick swarms of locusts at the moment in Western Taveta and that many are on the laying stage. Some of the earlier hatchings have failed to hatch out, though emergence have occurred on a small scale. The hopper destroyed by flying systematically, but being beaten and burnt.

#### Native Opposition to Poison.

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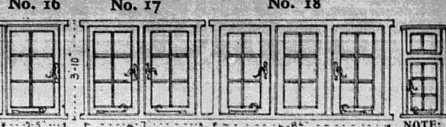
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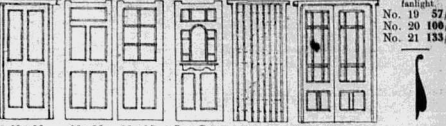
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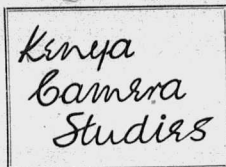
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
