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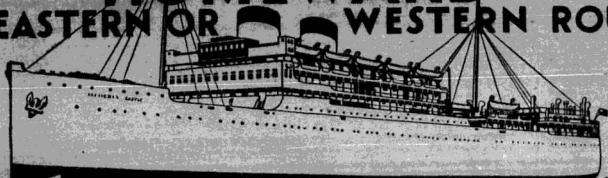

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# Hope for Disarmament Not Yet Abandoned.

## FURTHER EFFORT TO MEET FRENCH DEMANDS.

### Negotiations in Paris.

#### GENERAL COMMISSION OF CONFERENCE TO MEET THIS MONTH.

Mr. Arthur Henderson, the President of the Disarmament Conference has returned to London after holding conversations with Mr. Barthou, the French Foreign Minister, on the question of disarmament. These negotiations will be continued by Mr. Anthony Eden at Geneva during the coming week.

It is stated to be very doubtful if Britain will be able to offer the security and guarantees upon which France insists, but hope of a successful issue has not yet been abandoned.

It has been decided that the General Commission of the Disarmament Conference shall be convened on May 29 at Geneva, and that the Bureau will meet on the previous day for preparatory work.

Mr. Ramsay MacDonald in an address to a women's demonstration maintained that the British draft convention was the only practical and concrete scheme in existence which provided any hope of general acceptance. No Government was more devoted to the cause of peace than Britain.

### Doubtful Prospects.

Mr. Arthur Henderson M.P., President of the Disarmament Conference, returned to London today from Paris where he has had one-to-one conversations with the French Foreign Minister, Mr. Barthou, as well as with the Greek Minister, Mr. Edouard, and vice-chairman of the Disarmament Conference.

This evening he will meet Mr. Anthony Eden who is leaving London tomorrow for Geneva to attend Monday's meeting of the Council of the League of Nations. Mr. Eden will fly to Paris and from there will travel by rail in the company of Mr. Barthou.

It was anticipated that Sir John Simon would proceed to Geneva, merely confined to putting it off until fulfilling a long outstanding legal commitment on Wednesday, but that of an international agreement on the debate on foreign affairs is to be held on the House of Commons on Friday and this may necessitate the Foreign Secretary remaining in London.

The disarmament situation will be further complicated by the meeting of the Cabinet sub-committee on the 21st. It is said to be a very important meeting of the system of Mr. Eden from Geneva if the agreement arrives at the meeting of the Council of the League of Nations.

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# GAS EXPLOSION IN HONG KONG.

## Heavy Loss of Life Reported.

### Three Blocks of Buildings Destroyed.

#### SERIOUS FIRE FOLLOWS BURST OF GASOMETER

Hong Kong, May 14. Many are believed to have been killed in a huge gas explosion at West Point. Two gas tanks blew up, raising a cloud of gas and shrapnel in the vicinity, while numerous fires were started.

There seems a feeling here that something may emerge from the conversation between Mr. Barthou and Mr. Anthony Eden next week in Geneva, but it is very doubtful if Mr. Eden will be able to offer the security and guarantees upon which France insists.

### State of Alarm.

Feelings bordering on alarm are betrayed by the London Press at the prospect of the Disarmament Conference leading for imminent shipwreck.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, on behalf of the leaders of Christian churches, has issued a statement stating that the failure of the Conference would increasingly betray the hopes and wishes of millions.

Sir John Simon in a speech in London today announced that he was going to Geneva to do his very best to bring about the success of this tangled and complicated situation. This is interpreted to mean that though the Disarmament Conference is dead, Britain will continue to support the League of Nations.

## Statement by Minister for External Affairs.

### Not Affected by Home Policy.

#### OBJECTIONS VOICED BY JAPAN AGAINST LEAGUE'S ATTITUDE IN THE FAR EAST.

The League of Nations' recommendations concerning reconstruction and financial aid in China have given rise to a fresh outbreak by Japan, on the grounds that China is already heavily in debt and further action by the League is likely to militate against peace in the Far East.

A further message from Tokio reports that the Australian Minister for External Affairs, who is present in Japan, has stated that his Country will not be affected by the trade policy recently announced by Britain.

### Reconstruction in China.

Lisbon, May 13. The worst storm in living memory has rendered homeless over 2,000 peasants living on the slopes of the Sierra d'Estrella. Several villages have been destroyed, and many acres of vineyards and olive groves have been reduced to desolation by hailstones as big as pigeon eggs. Many peasants have been killed and thousands of sheep, the bodies of which floated down the mountain torrents.

Communications have been cut off and the Government is doing its utmost to rush aid to the distressed area.

EACH DISTRICT TO VOTE SEPARATELY.

A Commission of Neutrals.

AN INTERIM REPORT BY LEAGUE OF NATIONS SPECIAL COMMISSION.

Recommendations for the holding of next year's plebiscite in the Saar Basin have now been made in an interim report of a special committee appointed by the League of Nations.

To be Instituted by Kenya Government.

FUNCTIONS AND PERSONNEL NOT YET DECIDED.

Important Announcement by His Excellency.

WELCOMED BY ELECTED MEMBERS AS FURTHER MEANS OF CO-OPERATION.

A Standing Finance Committee of the Kenya Legislative Council, will be appointed by His Excellency the Governor, and provision for such an appointment will be included in the Council's Rules and Standing Orders.

This announcement was made at Friday's sitting of Council by His Excellency, who added that a motion establishing the Committee would be moved at the next session.

The personnel of the Committee and its actual functions had not yet been decided upon, but His Excellency said that he made this announcement following consultation with the European, Indian and Arab Elected Members, in general terms for information of Members.

Lord Francis Scott, on behalf of the Elected Members thanked His Excellency for his statement and said that Government would not regret the decision to take the unofficial committee more into co-operation.

A Permanent Body.

An important announcement was made by His Excellency the Governor at Friday's sitting of the Kenya Legislative Council, that he would appoint a Standing Finance Committee on estimates, and the necessary instructions would be given to the Select Committee to revise the Rules and Standing Orders, to incorporate provision for an appointment of such a Standing Finance Committee.

His Excellency said the appointment of the Committee was made after consultation with the European, Indian and Arab Elected Members, and that he made the announcement in general terms.

As present, he could say no more, because the personnel of the Committee had not yet been decided upon, but a motion would be submitted for the appointment of the Council at the next session.

During the recent general election, the Government may have some effect on the method of dealing with supplies.

He went on to say that he would ask the Attorney-General, as Chairman of the Select Committee, to have to revise the Standing Orders and Rules of the House, to make provision in those regulations for the appointment of this committee.

For the moment, he concluded, he would say no more, and he did not want anyone to infer anything. He would leave it to next until it was seen what the actual functions of the proposed committee would be.

SECOND VICTIM SEVERELY INJURED.

She waded down and stretched out her arms to fill with water the vessel that she was carrying.

Judging by the condition of the body when found, it would appear that she was seized by the right arm by a crocodile and dragged beneath the surface and drowned, as is the manner of crocodiles with their victims.

Body Found.

For some time, the absence of the girl was unnoticed, but later her parents became alarmed at her failure to return and a search was instituted. The men of the locality continued to look for the missing girl from shortly after 11.00 a.m. until about 1.00 p.m. when her body was discovered at the bottom of the river. It was while efforts to recover the body of the dead girl were proceeding that the crocodile again appeared on the scene and seized the girl.

### 2,629 SQUARE MILES TO BE ADDED TO NATIVE LANDS.

#### The White Highlands.

### TO BE RESERVED AND SECURED TO EUROPEAN SETTLEMENT.

### "Highlands" Increased by 200 Sq. Miles.

The Report of the Carter Land Commission was issued in Nairobi on Monday morning, comprising four volumes. It is at once the longest and the most important document issued in the history of Kenya.

For the purposes of its investigation, the Commission divided the country into a series of new land classifications the key to this classification, which must be understood to understand the proposals, is given elsewhere.

The present area of Native Reserves is given as 49,406 square miles. The Commission proposes that there be added:

- In satisfaction of historical claims, 1,474 sq. miles.
- To meet permanent economic needs, 896 sq. miles.
- As "Provisional" Reserves, to fulfil needs of a temporary character, 259 sq. miles.

These additions amount to 2,629 square miles and bring the total area of the Native Lands, permanent and provisional, to 52,035 square miles.

The Commission further proposes that special leasehold areas be set aside for the exclusive use of detached individuals, returned squatters and other classes of Africans. These areas, of which there are three, total 939 square miles, one being part of the Vatta Plateau, another adjoining Nairobi and the third 700 square miles of the Northern Frontier.

#### Security for the Settler.

The White Highlands are reserved in principle for the European community. The effect of the recommendations is to exclude from the area designated as the European Highlands a total area of 710 square miles, of which is actually in Native use by such tribes as the Uasin Gishu Masai, the Mukogodo, the Njemp and the East Suk.

As against these exclusions, however, there are large additions to the geographical area of the Highlands, mainly 870 square miles of Mount Kenya and Mount Elgon Forests and a number of smaller exchanges of farm and forests.

The result is that the geographical area of White Highlands is increased from its present approximate total of 16,390 square miles to 16,790 square miles. Of this area, 3,539 square miles are forest, to the use of which Europeans are to have prior claims if they cease to be forests.

To provide complete security for white settlement, the Report proposes that a special Order in Council be issued defining the status of the European Highlands.

The whole of the remainder of the country, to be known as Class D. land, is then to be thrown open to land-holding on a non-racial basis of individual tenure and free transfer between races.

It is considered that by such an arrangement we should be able to provide for the needs of native reserves, and to provide safeguards which are sufficient to secure, while at the same time, preserving a reasonable balance.

The Commission first addressed themselves to the tribal aspect of the problem, in respect of which, principally by the lack of dealing:

- (a) What land the several tribes could claim as historical grounds, and
- (b) what land is necessary for them in the present for such future requirements as can be clearly foreseen.

In so far as tribal claims of right are concerned, the Commission made a detailed examination in such cases and have made recommendations which are set out in the following sections:

The New Land Classifications.

The classifications of land referred to by the Carter Commission:

**CLASS A.** The present Native Reserves plus modifications and additions proposed to meet "claims of right."

**CLASS B.** Areas proposed to be added to the Reserves to meet economic needs of present and future. This Class is subdivided into:

**CLASS B1.** Permanent additions to economic grounds.

**CLASS B2.** Areas proposed to meet a temporary need.

**CLASS C.** Land set apart for alienation on lease to individuals or groups, families or individuals.

**CLASS D.** The rest of the country, to be thrown open to land rights with all other races. No racial distinction whatever in this category, and by modification, inter-tribal losses or otherwise.

Such claims amount (on balance, after allowing for exchanges) to approximately 1,914 square miles, or three per cent. of the present total area of the native reserves.

**Future Needs.**

In order to make an estimate of the needs of the various tribes in respect of land, the Commission has endeavoured to compile a list of the land at the disposal of each tribe and to estimate the degree of advancement of the people. We found that the requirements of a tribe as a whole, rarely be able to support the total population which lives in them, the general density being 60 to the square mile, but there is a very wide distribution.

**Kikuyu Contention.**

The Commission found that in the three Kikuyu districts some degree of contention exists, but with no general conception; "that if only a large measure be given to the tribes of better methods of agriculture and animal husbandry, and modifications in the system of land tenure designed to promote a greater degree of subdivision, by the leasing of these lessons would be a slow process, and that an addition of land was required in order to reduce the population to the point of which active land could be made available to the tribes."

At Kenia, Kenya, the property of Mr. H. V. C. Carr, is situated at Limuru, at an altitude of approximately 7,500 feet. The origin of the word "Dog" is a matter of considerable interest to etymologists, who endeavour to prove its derivation from many sources. It is probably the most agreeing with so many notable words. 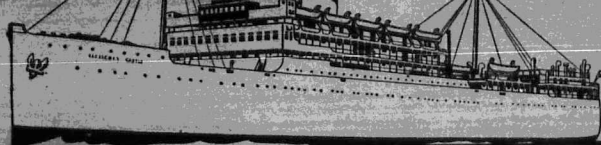

# A COUP D'ETAT IN BULGARIA.

## Army Officers Establish Non-Party Government.

### VIRTUAL DICTATORSHIP NOW FORMED.

#### Sweeping Reforms Promised.

#### NO TRUTH IN THE RUMOURED ASSASSINATION OF KING BORIS.

As a result of action by army officers in Bulgaria, a Coup d'Etat has taken place and a non-Party Government, pledged to guarantee the peace of the Country, has been established.

A virtual dictatorship has been established as a result of the deadlock that had been reached in Party Government owing to the exceptional number of political groups and internal dissensions caused thereby.

The most important repercussion of the "Coup d'Etat" is likely to be felt internationally. It is believed that the Foreign Policy of the new government will tend to bring Bulgaria under French influence.

Once the difficulties concerning the Macedonian Terrorist Association that exist between Bulgaria and Yugoslavia have been cleared away, it is believed that the way will be open for an alliance between the two countries.

As a move is viewed with alarm in Italy who has hitherto regarded Bulgaria as a potential ally, and the Italian press emphasize the fact that the Queen of Bulgaria is the daughter of the King of Italy, Berlin quarters, on the other hand, are jubilant.

Owing to the cutting off of telegraphic and telephonic communication, wild rumours have been circulating in Europe. It was believed at one time that King Boris and his family had been killed by bombs.

### Wild Rumours.

Several disturbances are believed to have broken out in Bulgaria. It is reported that the Army is blockading Sofia. All telephonic and telegraphic communications have been interrupted.

Government Resigns. Sofia, May 19. After a secret meeting following the resignation of the Government, 80 army officers of high rank have petitioned the King to appoint a non-Party Government. In consequence a Government of National Union has been formed by the Prince Michael, King George, assisted by General Mileff, the Vice-President of the Union and other army officers.

Virtual Dictatorship. Sofia, May 19. It is reported here that the formation of the new Government in Bulgaria amounts to a virtual dictatorship. It is stated that Government has issued a manifesto declaring that it aims at guaranteeing peace and contentment and doing everything possible to surmount the serious economic and social crisis.

Assassination Rumours. Wild rumours concerning Bulgaria are circulating in the various European capitals in consequence of the suspension of communication between Sofia and Vienna report that King Boris, with the Royal Family, had been killed in a bomb explosion. ### Friction Between Nazis and Stahlhelm.

#### Increased Anti-Jewish Activity.

#### OPPOSITION TO HITLER REGIME IN THE EVANGELICAL CHURCH.

Germany, at the present time, appears to be passing through a period of grave unrest and depression and the Nazi regime is not finding it an easy task to retain the popular support which returned it to power last year.

It is stated that friction is growing between the Nazis and the Stahlhelm, the militarist organisation of the Nationalist party, which last year was coerced into surrendering its independent existence and joining up with the Nazi "Storm Troops."

The opposition to Nazi control in the Evangelical Church is also causing uneasiness to the authorities, as the dissidents are now in a majority in the Church. Newspapers have been forbidden to publish church news for three months.

A further fall in the Reichsbank gold coverage for notes has also been reported, and is now at the low figure of 4.8 per cent. Financial circles in Berlin are becoming alarmed at the position. The shipping lines serving the African coast have also shown heavy losses for last year.

A further wave of anti-Jewish activity is reported, following a violent speech by Dr. Goebbels.

#### The E.A. Shipping Lines.

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# BRITAIN TO DOUBLE HER AIR FORCE FOR

## If the Disarmament Conference Fails.

SIGNIFICANT STATEMENT BY MR. STANLEY BALDWIN.

Preliminary Work Already Done.

TO ENSURE THAT AIR PARITY BE OBTAINED WITHOUT LOSS OF ANY TIME.

That Britain is prepared to double her Air Force, and leap from fifth to first place in world air power, as by the pressing of a button.

Such is the meaning put by the British Press on Mr. Baldwin's speech in the House of Commons winding up the debate on foreign affairs prior to the adjournment.

Should the fears of the failure of forthcoming disarmament discussions be realised, said Mr. Baldwin, in this speech, then Britain would take immediate steps to ensure parity in air power, and, added Mr. Baldwin, preliminary work to this end was already being done.

### What Will France Do?

London, May 28. (The Associated Press.)—Parliament has adjourned without word from France's 1,100.

Mr. Stanley Baldwin winding up the Foreign Affairs debate, largely dealing with disarmament, revealed that the Government was taking time for the fore-mentioned speech in the Air defence. He reiterated the recent pledges that if no Air limitation agreement was reached, the Government would seek parity in the air and he added that preliminary work was being done so that if the Government were to take any steps with regard to this achievement of the forthcoming disarmament discussions at Geneva are realised and it should be necessary to implement the pledges, not a single day will be lost.

Mr. Baldwin thought that the limitation was the only practicable form of disarmament. If it is difficult to see how we could avoid sanctions against management. The measures proposed to group against sanctions were not faced with work. Mr. Baldwin expressed the view that no sanction would work which did not mean war, if they were going to be prepared for war.

[TRINIDAD NEWS SERVICE.] Geneva, May 18. The arrival of M. Livitoff, formerly primarily connected with the question of disarmament has revived interest in the possibility of Russia's admission to the League which will be discussed by the League.

It is understood that Russia is not likely to be invited to join the League in time for the meeting of the Council if one is given to the Soviet.

The League Council has adjourned till May 30 notwithstanding the fact that the question on the agenda has not yet been disposed of.

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## Deplorable Conditions in Liberia.

BRITAIN'S APPEAL TO THE LEAGUE FOR DRASTIC ACTION.

Liberia, the Negro Republic of West Africa which was founded in 1820 by freed slaves from America, has been brought into the limelight as a result of further allegations of her gross failure to carry out her obligations as a member of the League of Nations.

It is stated that the negro immigrants from America who have become a governmental aristocracy, have used their power to reduce the natives of the territory to the slavery from which they themselves had been freed.

A League Commission appointed some little time ago enquired into conditions in Liberia and reported their oppression seemed to be increasing rather than decreasing. The Liberian Government, however, proposed a number of amendments to the League plan for strengthening the position which had the effect of ruining the whole scheme.

An Immigrant Aristocracy. (TRINIDAD NEWS SERVICE.) Geneva, May 19. An appalling example of misgovernment was the description given by Mr. Anthony Eden of the situation in Liberia in the course of a speech to the League Council.

Liberia's gross failure to observe her obligations to the League was further expounded by Mr. Anthony Eden. He suggested that the League should not assist the solution of the problem, therefore a view to consider the League's attitude towards Liberia as a whole.

After a year or two the fierce and unscrupulous methods of the negro aristocracy were so well established that at last the Liberian Government was compelled to propose an amendment to the League plan for strengthening the position which had the effect of ruining the whole scheme.

Concern in Britain. (BY WIRELESS.) London, May 27. The situation in Liberia is causing grave concern in Britain. The Government is interested in the subject. It will be remembered that two successive International Commissions have reported upon the deplorable conditions which prevail in the Black Republic in West Africa—confirming in every detail the charges made by Lady Simon in her book "Slavery."

The Committee appointed by the League of Nations prepared a plan for the economic and social administration of Liberia, which was approved by the League Council. The plan was based on the assumption that the Liberian Government would carry out its obligations to the League.

Unfortunately, the Liberian Government, which represents a minority of the 12,000 American natives, has demonstrated its complete failure to carry out its obligations to the League, which will certainly prevent its application.

Deplorable Conditions. The following article entitled "Liberia in Liberia" was recently published by Mr. Anthony Eden, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in the course of a speech to the League of Nations Council.

The debate on Liberia in the British House of Lords shows a number of interesting points. COTTON SEED RATES OF THE RAILWAY DISCUSSED BY THE MOMBASA CHAMBER.

ADVANTAGES OF A REDUCTION IN CHARGES.

Effect on Coast Trade.

The Mombasa Chamber of Commerce last week discussed the question of railway policy with particular reference to the rates charged for the transport of cotton seed from Uganda to the coast.

It was stated during the discussion that a clear case had been made out for a reduction of the present rates, the result of which would benefit both the railway and the farmers.

It was also pointed out that shippers to the United Kingdom had reduced their rate on cotton seed by 50 per cent. in order to keep the trade alive, and it was suggested that the railway could do the same thing, and thus allow the export of an additional 20,000 tons.

Speakers emphasized that the question was purely a commercial one and entirely divorced from political issues, and expressed regret that the railway authorities confused the issue with questions of inter-territorial policy.

Colonel W. K. Tucker, who was present at the meeting, stated that he would place the figures quoted in regard to costs, before the Railway Advisory Council.

Memorandum to be Prepared.

At Thursday's meeting, attention was drawn to the fact that the Chamber had not yet received the memorandum which it had requested from the railway authorities.

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It was suggested that the Chamber should prepare a memorandum for the railway authorities, setting out the reasons for a reduction in rates.

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BEAUTIFYING NAIROBI.

Proposals Under Consideration. Flowers and Trees.

BRIGHTENING APPEARANCE OF STREETS.

What can be done to beautify Nairobi? This question was raised yesterday by Mr. H. Mountford, the Municipal Parks Superintendent, by a representative of the "East African Standard" who sought to discover what schemes the Municipality had in view for the beautification of the town.

In replying, Mr. Mountford outlined several schemes which were under consideration, and also suggested various ways in which the appearance of the town could be improved. One way he had to make was that people should be encouraged to have window boxes in their window sills, for which purpose leaf geranium would probably be the most suitable plant. This, he considered, would brighten the streets a great deal. There were even now to be seen in several local buildings.

It is Mr. Mountford's intention to construct a Dutch garden on the centre island in the square in front of the Railway offices. Referring to the dangerous condition of the old water main in Old Market Road, he stated that his idea was that three lamp posts should be lopped off to a height of 30 ft. and the water main replaced by Mr. Jejeebhoy, however, his consent would first have to be obtained.

In Sixth Avenue.

Because of their shabby appearance, it is hoped one day to remove the clock in Sixth Avenue and to replace them with flowering shrubs. This work is being carried out until the reconstruction of the side roads in Sixth Avenue has been completed, for at present there is too much dust.

Now that good rains had fallen, Mr. Mountford stated, the red gums and palms in Lansdowne Road looked so fresh. He mentioned that the nature of the soil would change with the manufacturing of the side roads as the rain water would run off instead of soaking into the ground.

The effect of the vegetation in Sixth Avenue, he said, could be greatly enhanced if a fountain could be erected on the west side of the New Stanley Hotel. Owing to the paucity of the town's water supply, however, this was not a question until such time as the new Ruiru supply scheme materialises.

With regard to the fountains that the fountains might provide, Mr. Mountford remarked that this danger could be eliminated by introducing a species of fish and water lilies. The lilies would also serve to provide shade for the fish. Species of tropical fish which eat mosquito larvae could be introduced with little difficulty and expense.

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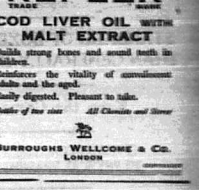

## A Local Case in the Appeal Court.

### JUDICIAL RESERVE.

### Was Appellant Really the Employer?

Judgment was reserved by the Appeal Court on Monday morning after argument had been heard on the appeal by Mr. Justice Newark against his conviction in the second case magistrate's court, Nairobi, on April 9 for willfully holding wages from two Kikuyu employed at the Avondale Hotel at a period when he is alleged to have been responsible for its financial affairs.

It will be recalled that the appellant was sentenced by the District Officer to a fine of Shs. 200/-, and, in default of payment, to undergo one and a half years of hard labour. In addition, he was ordered to pay the Native the wages due to him, or, failing payment, to find security for the order. In default of payment and security for payment, the order was that he should undergo three months' hard labour.

The Acting Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Harnon were present in bench. Mr. A. Lewy conducted the Crown case, and Capt. H. H. Schwartz appeared on behalf of the appellant, who was in court on a standing order. Capt. Schwartz declared that the whole question was whether the appellant had come within the definition of "employer." In his mind the appellant could not be held to be the employer in this case, and he therefore did not feel bound for the payment of the wages owing to the Native.

### Was a Case Established?

At the outset of his address he raised the point of whether any case was established by the evidence in the case for the prosecution was that the first meeting, at that stage, he admitted, there was no evidence whatever which would justify the assumption that the appellant in connection with the case had then been made out by the Crown, but the only conclusion that could be drawn was that the conviction had been based on the evidence given subsequently by Miss Jive Jiro Jirett, the proprietress of the hotel. If no case had been made out at the time of the first meeting, then the appellant should have been discharged.

Proceeding he pointed out that the appellant, who had been handed in in respect of the first Native case, had been arrested on the same occasion, and argued that there was no evidence of any sort that he should have been discharged when the Crown case was closed.

### Outside Factors.

The person whose signature appeared on a contract, he argued, was not to be held responsible in terms of that contract, and as the appellant had signed the contract of the first Native he could not be held liable for the wages owing to the Native. With this he did not suggest that the magistrate had wrongly or knowingly done as he thought that the magistrate might possibly have been in-

fluenced in his judgment by outside factors connected with the circumstances of Miss Jirett, for in his judgment he would be likely to criticise the manner in which the accused had treated Miss Jirett, who was in financial difficulties.

Except for the evidence of the appellant, the only evidence in evidence, there was no evidence to show that the appellant had ever proved or paid on any boys. As a matter of fact the first boy who was named in the evidence was Mr. Newark because financially embarrassed there was no payment to the accused's sworn evidence, that he had never paid any boy. In spite of all this, Mr. Justice Newark gave the magistrate had convicted and sentenced the appellant accordingly. The question of the penalty imposed was a very minor matter compared with the question of whether the accused was guilty or not.

### Crown Case.

Mr. Lewy, in his address, remarked that in many cases where Native were engaged only verbally to undertake one and a half years of hard labour and the boys are provided with the wages and the provision was made for a statement as to whether the agreement was in writing or not. The agreement was a verbal or a written contract, and he suggested that the boys, who signed on the boys in this case.

In a business of any magnitude, at all, he pointed out, there was never any suggestion of the head of the enterprise being a casual or making staff. This function was performed by the staff who were employed. It was never intended that the responsibility of the enterprise should be carried out by the employees. The case before the court was that the appellant had had no employees. The second had had no employees. The appellant was not to be held responsible for the wages owing to the Native.

### A Test Case.

Counsel then asked that if the court decided to uphold the conviction, it was essential that the appellant be given to the fact that the case was merely in the nature of a test case, and that the appellant was to be held responsible for the payment of the wages of only one of the boys, then he asked that the sentence passed by the District Officer be reduced accordingly.

### Mr. Justice Harnon observed that in his mind there was a case to be answered when the case for the prosecution had been closed in the appellant's favour.
