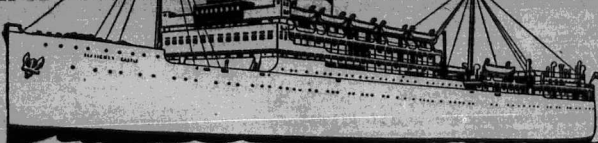

The Lake Rudolf Rift Valley Expedition.

EXPERIENCES IN TORRENTIAL RAINS IN TURKANA.

Early Man.

NEW LIGHT ON FORMATION OF THE GREAT RIFT: FORCES OF COMPRESSION?

The Lake Rudolf Rift Valley Expedition after spending three months in the field has returned to continue its civilisation in Kenya to prepare for the second part of their work—investigations in the South and East.

Torrential rains in Turkana threatened the Expedition with disaster and a midnight dash to high ground for safety provided an unaccountable variation in the programme of scientific enquiry.

Two members were huddled for three hours in a lake storm; others manhandled a car for forty miles through mud.

Evidence points to the formation of at least the Lake Rudolf part of the Rift Valley as having been caused by forces of compression, which, if established, will disprove the tectonic theory originally held.

Further discoveries suggest that man has occupied the Lake Rudolf basin from the earliest known "Homo sapiens" era till now.

Von Hohnel's Interest.

On May 20, the Lake Rudolf Rift Valley Expedition arrived in Nairobi to spend a few days at the residence of the British Consul, Mr. J. F. Hohnel. Later, news was received that a quarter of a mile of the road on the steep bank of the lake had fallen, and that the road was so ruined that this difficult task could be accomplished in only one or two days by the use of bulldozers and other heavy machinery.

MASTODON FOSSILS FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL OLD BOYS.

Discoveries in Kenya. Maboko Island.

May Fill Gaps in Elephant's Evolution.

Interesting fossil discoveries which may throw a new light on the evolution of the elephant are being made on Maboko Island in the Kenyan Gulf. The fossils, which are believed to be the remains of a mastodon, are of great scientific interest.

Maboko Island is about twelve miles from Kisumu and one mile from the north shore of the Kenyan Gulf. It is about a mile long and narrow. To the west of the island a saddle low between gently rising hills of the Kenyan coast is the saddle being twenty feet above lake level.

The mastodon fossils were discovered in the lower Oligocene strata of Maboko Island. The fossils include the lower jaw, the tusk, and the skull. The discovery is of great importance as it provides evidence for the evolution of the elephant.

More than 85 per cent. of accidents occurred in clear daylight and nearly two-thirds in day-light. Of more than 2,000 accidents occurring on roads, 1,254 were caused as occurring in built-up areas.

According to the worst day of the week for accidents, the average being twenty-five. The proportion of pedal cyclists under eighteen years of age involved in accidents is nearly one-third of the total, the number being 488.

Of the causes of accidents attributed to drivers the most frequent is that of excessive speed, having regard to the conditions. The next most frequent is failing to keep to the near side of the road. The figures suggest that, in the 6,67 cases where the estimate of speed was given, 1,300 of the drivers were exceeding twenty miles an hour, and 2,819 more than ten miles an hour, and the greatest number—4,189—occurred on roads carrying only a very light traffic at all times.

There were 93 persons killed in road accidents in Great Britain last week and 53 died from earlier accidents, a total of 126.

The figures for England alone were 70 and 39, a total of 112. People injured in accidents last week numbered 4,056 in England, 382 in Scotland and 177 in Wales. The total number of deaths in the previous week was 124, and in the week ended April 28 the total was 126.

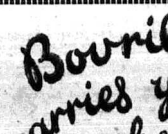

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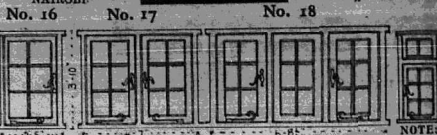

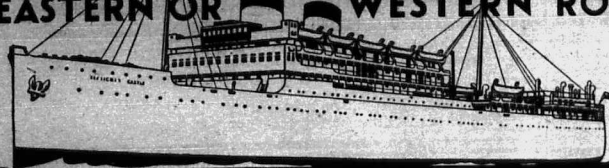

AN EMPHATIC NOTE SENT TO WASHINGTON.

That Britain will not pay the War Debt instalment of £47,000,000 due to the United States on June 15, is the gist of the British Note to Washington.

The Note states frankly that Britain is not prepared, by demanding payments from her own debtors, to throw the whole world back into a state of chaos again.

Referring to Britain's Budget surplus the Note stresses the fact that, after the long period of heavy taxation, it would be "a gross act of social injustice" to deny this relief.

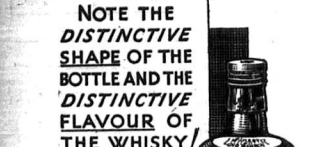

SOUTH AFRICAN SOCIETY'S DINNER IN NAIROBI. Prime Minister's Message. MAJOR GROGAN ON THE THREATENED ASIATIC MENACE IN AFRICA.

A distinguished gathering attended the annual dinner of the South African Society which took place on Thursday, Union Day. Both the Prime Ministers of the Union, General J. B. M. Hertzog and General J. C. Smuts sent good wishes.

Major E. S. Grogan proposed the toast of "South Africa" spoke of the peril threatening Africa from the East, and urged the putting by of petty bickerings so that Africa as a whole might be better equipped to face the dangerous times coming.

Pride of race and the responsibility resting on the younger generation in the task of creating a nation in this country, was the keynote of Capt. C. B. Anderson's speech in proposing the toast of "East Africa." Capt. Anderson paid a warm tribute to the Director of Education, who had brought to Kenya a wealth of experience gained in the Transvaal.

every day the lack of policy, and when it came to the question of strategic principle policy was entirely absent. Therefore it was absolutely essential that England should call into consultation the great statesmen of South Africa, who were born and bred amidst the conditions through which the Colonial Office had to make their way. They had practical experience behind them, and a little combination between the Colonial Office and these statesmen might, perhaps, afford immense advantages, both for the East African territories and for South Africa. South Africa was born out of stress and struggle, and in the many conflicts with the Natives there were horrible tragedies, none of which had been witnessed. The psychology of the South African people had doubtless been affected by these events, and it might be that South Africa had evolved a Native policy which the British would regard as a little harsh. On the other hand, however, the Native policy in Kenya, which was inspired from England, erred in the opposite direction. To his mind, therefore, a little collaboration between the two countries might result in the framing of policies that would be more satisfactory and more equitable. It was impossible to try to separate the two countries by the drawing of a line on a map. Their interests were too closely bound up in each other. Proceedings were being established in East Africa which were the exact opposite of the principles upon which South Africa was depending. It was so easy for a differentiation of policy to occur, and in the course of time it would become almost impossible of solution.

A Dangerous Precedent.
He indicated with alarm the tendency here to transfer to the Asiatic more and more authority. If there was one thing that mattered it was that the northern White flag should not admit any other voices into the sea and any other their politics. He was not suggesting that the views of the British should not be considered, or that they should not be consulted by certain matters, but when it came to the final year and when there is no other authority than that of the European. If anybody knowingly or unknowingly directly or indirectly lent himself to such a policy, which might lead to the establishment of a dangerous precedent, then he was either a fool or a traitor to his own race.

He did feel that the people of this country should take every possible opportunity of strengthening the ties with South Africa and of encouraging closer co-operation with that dominion. Moreover, he appealed to the people here to come out into the open and to endeavour to bring pressure to bear upon South Africa with a view to inducing it to take a part in the definition of the real strategic policies upon which it would ultimately be dependent.

President's Reply.
After "Sarie Marais" one of the most popular of the African plains songs, had been played by the band, the South Africans present joined in giving the Spring-bok war cry.

In responding to the toast, the President, Mr. H. J. May, thanked Major Grogan for his remarks. South Africans he said were very proud of their country—especially those who were born there. Their history, which went back several centuries, was full of heroic deeds of their ancestors. When they came up to East Africa they thought they were pioneers, but the hardships and trials they had to overcome were insignificant compared with those which the original pioneers of South Africa had to contend with. After referring to the immense material progress that had been

achieved in the Union, he went on to discuss the country's progress in the field of agriculture. He had learned well the lessons taught by the Mother Country. One of the main reasons for the establishment of the South African Society of East Africa was to try to foster a feeling of good fellowship with the representatives of other nations in East Africa. We all belonged to the same stock said Mr. May and there was no reason why we should be any other than in a spirit of comradeship.

If any of those present had not been to South East Africa, he would suggest that when they took their next leave they make a trip to the Union. In conclusion, he thanked His Excellency for the interest he had shown in the Society and for his presence at the dinner.

CAPT. C. B. ANDERSON.

If we are to sow the seeds of bitterness and repression,

The Colonial Spirit.

The reason for this characteristic of the European in Kenya was, he believed, that the Kenyan was still a colonist. He did not mean that the African was not the danger for a European population which was not with the colonial spirit rather than with the spirit of the pioneer. It was the spirit of the pioneer that was apt to forget the history of his parents' country. He found that the African was apt to forget which his fathers had struggled. 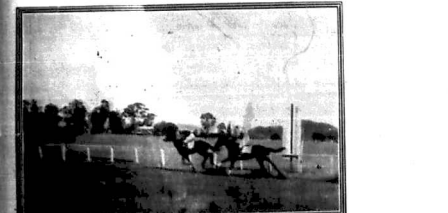

T. S. BRIERLEY'S FINE RUNNING GAINS HIM THREE OPENS.

Pieterse's Record in Open Half Mile.

IMPROVED TIMES ACHIEVED ON HEAVY GOING.

The Nairobi Railway Athletic Club, which was organized in 1898, held its fifth annual meeting, which was staged on the Railway ground on Monday. Quite apart from the really fine manner in which it was organized, the running was particularly good, and that despite the fact that the going was on the heavy side. Many of the times in the open events were improved upon. A notable success this year was Pieterse's victory in the open half mile, which till he related. He clipped almost seven seconds off his record time of last year—2 minutes 17.5 seconds. He did not defend his title in the open quarter, which he has held for the past three years. There were only two runners for this event, and the time, in consequence, was on the slow side.

For the Fourth Time.

The open high jump went to J. A. Niblock-Smuat for the fourth year in succession, but he failed to establish a new record, equalled in 1901, when he jumped 6 feet 6 inches.

Revival of German Colonial Ambitions.

"GREEN POLICE" WITH TRADITIONS OF TANGANYIKA BODY.

General Goering's Demand.

Colonial soil. The alternative to death by suffocation.

German-Colonial ambitions, with particular reference to Tanganyika, are again occupying the attention of British public opinion.

General Goering, Premier of Prussia and one of Herr Hitler's leading lieutenants, recently officially recognized a new military body, the "Green Police," created by him with the traditions of the former German East African Police Regiment.

The ceremony was carried out by General von Epp, president of the League of Colonial War Veterans and in the course of a speech General Goering said: "The German nation needs colonial soil if it is not to die of internal suffocation."

The "Morning Post," in a recent leading article, stresses the "peaceful penetration" of Tanganyika by subsidised Germans, points out that, because of Tanganyika, British trade in Kenya and Uganda cannot be adequately protected, and says abandonment of the "present policy of drift" is imperative.

"Penetration" in East Africa.

London, May 20. (By Air Mail.) The persistent character of the German Colonial propaganda has again attracted the attention of the British Press, and there are signs of a growing demand for a clear definition of policy.

An article contributed to the "Morning Post" by General von Epp, president of the League of Colonial War Veterans in Dar es Salaam is the subject of a leader in which the following is expressed: "The German challenge in East Africa."

Whatever charges the Nazis may level against their so-called "African" professions, they cannot escape them of renegades in the field of Colonial ambition. Unlike the Weimar Republic the return of East Colonial, and especially of Tanganyika, was a subject of incessant attacks. Paradoxically enough the Nazis, despite their avowed opposition, have generally applauded, at least in public, a considerable reform in this issue. Indeed, Herr Hitler has gone so far as to proclaim that whole policy of Colonial revisionism as an example of Imperial and Republican straightforwardness. In the last month or two, however, there appears to have been some revival of Colonial propaganda, and it is a reasonable assumption that the Nazis will be overheard to have published a message from Berlin, with a corresponding article in the "Daily Telegraph" extract— "The German challenge in East Africa." Under the heading of "peaceful penetration" into Tanganyika, the article speaks of a steady inflow of German immigrants, and in numerous parts of the country pockets are being organized by the German "Green Police" troops, which he has recognized as the "Green Police" of the former German East African Police Regiment. A FOREST DAIRY FARM.

In 1928 Mr. E. N. Millington decided to establish a dairy herd on the "Kivulini" farm, which had about five or six miles of forest in the midst of the forest hills overlooking the Kogal Valley, in the Department of Agriculture.

The first task was to clear the forest to create pastures by the planting of Kikuyu grass. The whole farm extends to about 200 acres, and is surrounded by a wire fence. The paddocks are divided into partly by post and rail fence. The herd consists of approximately 80 cows, of which 30 are pure-bred, and the remainder non-pedigree Ayrshires.

There are also two stone and brick milking sheds, in which a considerable quantity of cattle are milked each year from green maize.

In a nearby paddock 18 yearling heifers were grazing, and appeared to be in splendid condition. This paddock provided with excellent outside feeding stalls, and also a long shed with open pens in which the young heifers can shelter in bad weather.

Generally, the farm buildings are exceptionally well designed, the standings, and water laid on.

ANGORA WOOL INDUSTRY

Costs and Returns.

The following article is the second in a series continuing by Mr. S. W. Squire of the Kenya Angora Farm.

In these difficult times money is being hoarded and it is not surprising that the agricultural producer has sufficient capital available for large enterprises, and, accordingly, any farming activity which can rapidly be built up from small beginnings possesses a particular attraction.

The rabbit has long been authorized for its powers of multiplication. The adult Angora doe is ready for breeding at six months of age, and may be expected to produce a litter of young rabbits per year from three litters. In England the rabbit breeder is handicapped by the winter climate. The above figures will indicate that an Angora farm can be built up very quickly in Kenya from a few animals.

Breeding Stock.

Reliable breeding stock can be obtained in this country for about £2 per head. In common with the breeding of other forms of livestock, it is advisable to commence with a stock of good provender. Special care should be taken in the selection of the male, which should be chosen for the quality and quantity of his wool. Some people prefer to start by purchasing large quantities of stock, because they can thus obtain more stock for the limited capital available. It is, however, desirable to purchase small quantities of high quality stock.

Rate of Increase.

The following figures will give a fair idea of the rate of increase of Angora rabbits in Kenya. It has been assumed that five in a four average number of young are reared from each litter. The period of gestation is 30 days, and the young can be weaned at six weeks old, after which the does should be allowed about two weeks rest. A simple mathematical calculation, based on the above figures, will show that the rate of increase of the stock will be as follows:—
A single doe will produce an average output of 10 cubs per year from each mating in 12 weeks. This amount of 10 cubs may not seem a large figure. But with the use of the best provender, compared with the cheap cost of production, it will be found that a single doe will produce 10 cubs of wool worth providing the breeder with valuable income per acre.

BEANS AS A PIG FOOD.

To The Agricultural Editor, "East African Standard."

Sir,—In a somewhat recent publication in the "East African Standard" the Department of Agriculture on the subject of stock feeding, it was stated that the Heso Bean and Canadian Wonder were coupled together as animal which are being raised in smaller numbers than when a large number was kept together in one pen. Building pens of various sizes in type of construction throughout the Colony, on account of the fact that the material would be readily available. It is, therefore, not possible to state any definite figure as to building costs. It should, however, be possible to house Angora rabbits at a capital outlay of Sh. 150 per head.

Capital Investment.

On the figures quoted for purchase of stock and construction of buildings, it will be necessary to have approximately £20 capital available during the first year, if the breeder is to commence by buying two does and one male. This sum will be sufficient to provide for the housing of the rabbits and the stud buck, wages and food for the first year. The value of stock has reacted a figure justifying the employment of a capital should remain to purchase large quantities of plants and other material in the meantime. Even in the case of a small investment of £20 will return to the breeder from the first year.

Estimates of Income.

The returns which may be expected from Angora rabbits are very high in comparison with the capital invested. An adult rabbit can give up to 12 or 15 cubs per year per year, but it is usual to estimate on the basis of an average output of 10 cubs per year from each mating in 12 weeks. This amount of 10 cubs may not seem a large figure.
