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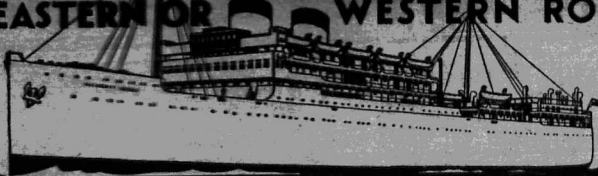

## FASCISTS and COMMUNISTS COME TO BLOWS.

### "Black Shirts" Demonstration.

## FISTS, CHAIRS and BOOTS USED AT OLYMPIA MEETING.

A demonstration by British Fascists at Olympia, London, led to fierce fighting in the neighbourhood of the building between the "Black Shirts" and Communists. Thousands of people gathered in the vicinity during the course of the fray.

Inside the hall there were equally lively scenes, where fists, chairs and boots were used during the fray. One man only reached the door after every stick of clothing had been torn off him.

The situation necessitated the presence of hundreds of police, who on one occasion had to make a baton charge. At the close of the meeting the Fascists marched away under the protection of mounted police.

Women Fascists took part in the skirmishes and assisted the stewards in the forcible removal from the hall of male interrupters of Sir Oswald Mosley.

### Police Baton Charge.

Thousands of people gathered in the neighbourhood of Olympia, London, where a demonstration by the British Union of Fascists took place in circumstances which caused Fascists and their opponents, chiefly Communists, to use fists, chairs and boots. While sporadic fighting was continuing, the building was surrounded by the police, necessitating the presence of hundreds of police.

The Oswald Mosley, speaking inside the vast hall, was repeatedly interrupted by several bodies of men who threw stones at the speaker, including women. Police after some cast of arms, fighting with fists, chairs and boots, one man reached the door with every stick of his clothing torn off. Another climbed the stairs leading to the "back-hall" and was pulled down by the police.

Several ministers in public speeches during the week-end repeated vigorously against the methods adopted to silence interruptions at the Mosley meeting.

Mr. Walter Elliot, the Minister of Agriculture, said he was deeply troubled by the reports of the mounted police.

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# U.S.A. Replies to Britain on War Debts Question.

It is also alleged that the present position appears to be that Britain does not intend to pay till her debts are scaled down to an unassured sum to which Britain might agree.

### Other Countries.

**[BRUSSELS REVIEW'S AGENCY.]** Belgium and Czechoslovakia have officially informed the United States that they intend settling their war debt payments on June 15.

**And France.** Paris, June 12. The cabinet has decided not to pay the debt instalment due on June 15.

**America's Reply.** Washington, June 12. "If Britain pays on June 15 the instalment of \$6,570,000 dollars, the United States will remain outside the provisions of the Johnson Act," says the American reply to the British note.

Should Britain submit proposals for a suspension of payments, the United States would gladly discuss them, and the reply says that no proposal has yet been presented for payments in kind so a report that might be found mutually profitable, made would naturally be considered.

**Debts Owing to Britain.** The reply reflects the complete independence of the United States and the British debts to the United States.

Repayment of the latter was not made contingent on the fulfilment of debts due to Britain, and adds that the position seems to be that Britain does not intend to pay further till her debts are scaled down to an unassured sum to which Britain might agree.

**French Attitude.** Paris, June 12. The reply notes that Britain does not intend to repay her debts and concludes by stating that the American people are not disposed to place an impossible burden on debtors.

**Opinion in America.** (By wireless.) The passage in the United States note regarding payments in kind attracts the most attention, both in America and in Britain, since it is the first occasion on which the United States Government has indicated its willingness to accept payments in kind, not incidentally by so doing recognizing the transfer process.

The French note on Washington record varied opinions of Congressmen on the suggestion that the United States should accept payments in kind.

The British note of June 4 on which the United States reply is based is not in a position to pay the instalment due on June 15, and it remains willing to discuss any settlement which takes into account present circumstances.

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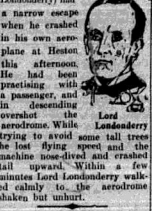
# AIR MINISTER IN CRASH.

## A Narrow Escape at Heston.

### While Flying Own Machine.

**OVERLOOKS AIRBORNE IN LANDING.**

**[LONDON REVIEW'S AGENCY.]** London, June 8. The Secretary for Air (Lord Londonderry) had a narrow escape when he was flying his own aeroplane at Heston, this afternoon.

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# DEVALUATION IN GERMANY.

## Currency Rumour from Paris.

### Berlin Statement.

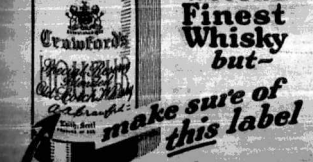

Fusion of Political Parties in South Africa.

EFFECT OF AGREEMENT BY THE LEADERS.

Basis of New Organisation.

INAUGURAL CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN DECEMBER.

Following on the announcement published last week that an agreement had been signed providing for the fusion of the two major political parties in South Africa, it is now stated that the inaugural conference of the new organisation will be held in December.

In the meantime, the provincial and federal congresses of the existing parties will take place, when these meetings will be requested to endorse the basis of the new party. The parties will then formally be dissolved and the membership list will be opened for the new party.

The attitude towards fusion of Dr. D. F. Malan, the leader of the Cape Nationalist and of the extreme wing of that party, has not yet been announced. It is stated, however, that, even if he, himself, throws in his lot with the fusionists, there will be no prominent Nationalist M.P.'s who will not cooperate.

The present agreement makes no reference to certain controversial issues regarding the status of the Union in the Empire, and leaves these subjects to be dealt with by the congress in December.

The Position of Dr. Malan.

A cable message from Pretoria by which was published the "Eas African Standard" last week announcing that Dr. Malan had been signed by General J. B. M. Hertzog, the Premier and the Nationalist Party, and General J. C. Smuts, the leader of the South African Party, provided for the fusion of the two major parties in the Union, which parties are at present independent political governments.

Commenting on the present political situation in the Union, the Johannesburg "Sunday Times" states that fusion will be an accomplished fact before the end of this year. According to the arrangements made by the two parties, the inauguration of the new party will be held some time during the summer, but before that the Provincial and Federal Congresses of the South African Party, as well as the Federal gathering in Bloemfontein will all be held in December.

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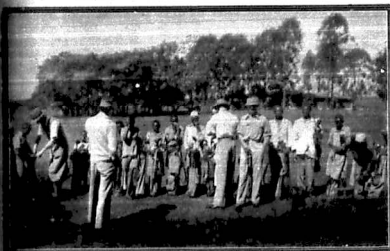

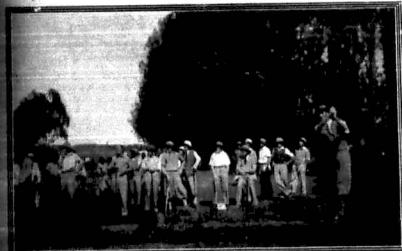

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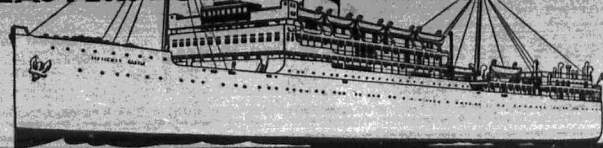

In 1931 its undertaking carried 3,600,000,000 passengers which is equal to conveying every day as many people as there are in the whole of Canada and more than the combined populations of Scotland and Ireland.

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SCALE OF RATINGS IN KENYA PRISONS.

Criticised as Unduly Generous. DIET SCALES REVISED.

Appreciable Saving in Expenditure.

Quoting from the Kenya Prisons Department Report for 1963, it says—

... Paragraph 82 of the report of the Expenditure Advisory Committee reads as follows:—

... It appears to us that the scale of ratings as provided in the prisons of the Colony is unduly generous and frequently results in waste, and that without detriment to the general health of the inmates of the prisons an appreciable saving in expenditure could be effected by reducing the scale of ratings provided.

... After consultation with the medical authorities the following alterations in the diet scales for the prisons were recommended:—

... The portion ration of 10 ounces daily and the long-term prisoners was reduced to 8 ounces daily and the daily diet of short-term prisoners was changed by the reduction of the maize from 2 to 1 1/2 lb, an increase in the beans ration from 5 to 6 ounces, and an increase of 4 ounces of potatoes.

... The above diet scales were introduced into the three first-class prisons only towards the effect (if any) of the change being made.

... It is to be noted that the effect of the change was not to trouble and worry the prisoners, but to give them a better diet.

... The estimated annual saving from the three first-class prisons is about £200.

... A disciplinary weapon. This provision constitutes a valuable disciplinary weapon in the hands of Superintendents.

... The provision of a punishment privilege is indicated rather than the infliction of a punishment.

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# Brutal Attack on Naivasha Farmer.

## DESPERATE FIGHT WITH GANG OF LUMBWA.

### Many Wounds Received.

#### GRAPHIC DESCRIPTION OF THE OUTRAGE GIVEN BY MR. SEMINI.

Mr. A. Semini, a Kinangop farmer, was the victim of a brutal assault by Lumbwa at Naivasha on Thursday evening, but is now recovering in his room at Nairobi Hospital. On Saturday he was able to give a graphic account of the attack to a representative of the "East African Standard."

In the course of the fight, Mr. Semini, who was unarmed, received wounds from both stims and ruzungus and was also bitten and kicked. He defended himself with a petrol lamp which he used as a weapon, and when this was wrested from him, he used his fists.

The assailants, having knocked Mr. Semini almost unconscious, demanded money from his wife, which they were given and finally left the farm. With the greatest difficulty Mr. and Mrs. Semini were able to get to a nearby house and eventually to a doctor.

Intensive police investigations followed as soon as possible and already the police have issued the description of a man wanted in connection with the affair. He is a Lumbwa herd who was formerly employed by Mr. Semini and who has a prison record for cattle theft.

#### Recuest by the Police.

News was received in Nairobi on Friday of an attack, by a band of natives, on a farmer at Naivasha. Mr. Semini, who was the Kinangop, was wounded and money was stolen from his wife.

It is reported that Mr. Semini was attacked while standing on the veranda of his house after receiving Mr. Semini, the native was alleged to have gone away that later returned and demanded money from Mrs. Semini. It is understood that she 60/- was stolen and also some clothes.

#### One Native Known.

One of the gang of Lumbwa natives. He is Kikuyu and Hangei, and was formerly employed by Mr. Semini. It is expected that an early arrest will be made. Fortunately the wounds sustained by Mr. Semini, although extensive, were not very serious. He was conveyed by ambulance on Friday to the European Hospital in Nairobi, where his condition was reported on Saturday morning to be very satisfactory. He passed a good night, and on Sunday he was able to get up. He was not injured, but suffered from shock.

#### The Assault Described.

Interviewed in hospital by a representative of the "East African Standard," Mr. Semini gave a graphic account of the assault. He was alone half past eight on Thursday evening, he said, and he and his wife were walking along the front veranda of the house towards their bedroom, with the intention of retiring for the night, when five Lumbwa natives came running up from the lawn.

Believing them to be boys in his employ who wished to report about his work, he stopped and waited for them to come up to him. Without warning, however, they proceeded to attack him. Others joined them. While he could not see them, he decided that there were about seven altogether, some went to knock in his door.

Meanwhile his wife, left alone for a moment while all the boys were being kept, which he had in his hand, but this was wrested from

She did not know how to use it herself, and as she was bringing it to her husband, two of the boys wrested it from her grasp. They then demanded to know from her where the money was hidden.

#### Money Taken.

Realizing that any resistance on her part would be futile, she stretched her legs and opened the drawer in which her husband was kept. They took all the money in it, but left Mr. Semini's watch untouched. Mr. Semini does not know whether they stole any of his clothes. The assault, he estimates, occupied the best part of an hour. At the end of it he was on the verge of collapse, and his wife was in an equally distressed condition.

Having obtained the money and ransomed the house, the small amount dumped, after administering a few departing blows may have been taken by Mr. Semini as he lay exhausted on the ground. When they had left, Mr. Semini heard his wife crying, and dragged him into the house to see what had happened to her. He found her suffering from severe shock, but otherwise unharmed.

She asked him if he could drive their car to his brother's house, and he did so, but he was unable to do so, but that he drove to the best. Together they drove to the home of his brother, Mr. John Semini, who also farms in the Naivasha district. They then received medical attention and were so comatose for the night.

The assailants, Mr. John Semini, was so overcome by shock that she also had to be brought to the hospital. Her condition was not serious, and she was discharged on Saturday.

It is understood that Mr. Semini is also making good progress towards recovery. The police are making good progress in their search for the man who was the victim of the attack.

One of the assailants, Mr. Semini was recognized by his wife as a bad boy who had been in their employ for over a year, and who had been arrested and imprisoned on a conviction for stealing sheep. On his discharge from prison, he had returned to Mr. Semini with a request that he be re-employed, but in view of the crime he had committed Mr. Semini deemed it advisable not to employ him.

Whether it was revenge because of his refusal to re-engage the boy, or whether it was robbery that provided the motive for the crime, Mr. Semini does not know, although he is naturally inclined to believe the latter.

#### Wounds on the Head.

Mr. Semini was also used, and one hand with a native medicine. He was extremely cut and bruised by blows, as lacerations and abrasions all over his head, body and limbs. The natives, infuriated by the determined resistance he was putting up, even resorted to kicking and kicking in an effort to subdue him.

#### Information Wanted.

The police believe that a gang of seven Lumbwa took part in the raid at a band of that number was seen in the vicinity of the house about an hour before the assault. All the natives are known to have been wearing shukas, and one of them, Kibwa, was known to be a member of the Lumbwa.

He was mentioned at Naivasha on October 23 of last year to four months had labour on the charge of stock theft referred to by Mr. Semini.

The police authorities request that all employers of labour should report to the police at Naivasha, or the C.I.D. at Nairobi, or at any police station the arrival on their farms of any strange Lumbwa native or any Lumbwa answering to the following description: Name, LBW. 1517205 Kibwa and

Burungi; Lumbwa; formerly NKU. 2410784; district Kericho; location Kericho; sub-location Chigagga; group Chigagga; clan Chigagga; child. Arap Masingi; complexion dark; height 5ft. 6in.; head and face round; forehead large; eyes black; eyebrows thick; nose wide; mouth open; lips light; two teeth missing in lower jaw; chin large; breast muscular; one scar on right side of stomach.

#### An Intensive Search.

An intensive comb out of a very large area of country is in progress. It commenced at Kinangop, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Semini, and covers the country lying between Kericho, Naok and Kapido.

There is every hope that within a short time the gang of seven natives will have been rounded up, for in the case of several identifications is positive. Members of the Lumbwa tribe, they were seen as roads to the residences of Mr. and Mrs. Semini, who live on the Kinangop about 14 miles above Naivasha. Mr. Semini, after the affair, was able to give the police the names of one whose description has been transmitted, and this was subsequently corroborated by an employee.

#### A Disturbing Rumour.

At the moment the police are very reticent, particularly in regard to widespread rumours that the assault on Mr. Semini took a more serious form than was at first stated.

Mr. Semini is still in the care of Dr. Wetters at Naivasha. Mr. Semini was subsequently brought in to a Nairobi nursing home, in a statement made in the "East African Standard" by the doctor in charge, he said that he was not assaulted as alleged, and he repeated this statement on Monday.

Although still weak, Mr. Semini is making favourable progress. He is making a still very painful, and the sleep is still somewhat disturbed, but he is making good progress towards recovery. It was found necessary to give some of the most serious cases. The rest on his forehead is healed.

His sister-in-law, Mrs. John Semini, who was brought to Nairobi on Friday suffering from shock, returned to Naivasha on Sunday.

#### Victim Badly Bruised.

Mr. A. Semini, is progressing favourably at the European Hospital, Nairobi. It was learnt on Tuesday that he was in a very bad way, and that he was being nursed by his wife, and only one, on the right arm, is causing a little anxiety. As a result of the attack, Mr. Semini also sustained injuries on practically every part of his body from the heavy usage used by the natives, as well as small cuts, so that it is unlikely that he will be well enough to leave hospital for some little time.

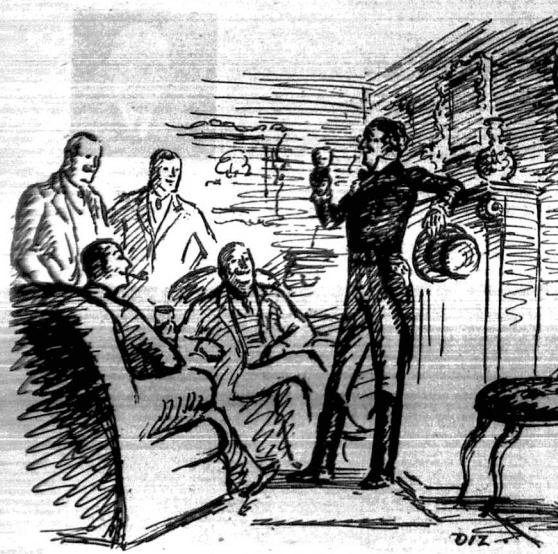
Fortunately, he also made the journey from Kinangop to Nairobi in the police motor ambulance very well indeed.

An intensive police search is in progress and although at the moment no arrests have been effected there is reason to believe that with the capture of one or two others will soon be rounded up. There has been a double identification of a native who is believed to have been a ringleader.

#### An Opinion Charged.

An Indian named Abhinav Chigagga was charged before the Resident Magistrate, Nairobi, on the charge of stock theft referred to by Mr. Semini. The Court Proceedings stated it was an offence punishable by a fine of £200, or ten years' imprisonment, or both, for "stealing with intent."
