#### ITALY STAGGERED BY EVENTS: WATCHING ANXIOUSLY.

A critical situation has arisen in Europe as a result of an attempted coup on the part of Austrian Nazis in Vienna on Wednesday. The coup failed but Dr. Dollfuss, Chancellor of Austria, has been murdered.

An astonishing story is told in messages from Vienna of a reckless adventure. A false message announcing the resignation of the Government was first broadcast from the Vienna radio station after the superior had been threatened with death by eight Nazis who broke in and compelled him to read the announcement.

### CHANCELLORY INVADED.

Later, 150 Nazis dressed in police uniforms invaded the Chancellery where a Cabinet meeting was in progress and Dr. Dollfuss, imprisoned several Ministers, and held out for a number of hours against battalions of troops and police who invested the building.

Although Vienna after one of the most eventful days in its history is now quiet, the martial law events of Wednesday have startled and alarmed all Europe. There is no proof that the attempted coup was instigated by Germany, indeed the Nazi Government denies connection with it, but it is felt that the German attitude to Austria at least gave encouragement to the revolt.

### ITALY'S ATTITUDE.

Italy particularly, guardian of Austria's independence, is watching anxiously the developments in the situation, but is unlikely to take extreme action without consulting France and Great Britain.

In the meantime the Government of Austria has regained complete control and Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, formerly Minister of Education, 39 years of age, a staunch Catholic, and an ardent Monarchist, has succeeded Dr. Dollfuss as Chancellor.

# East African Bar Gold Stolen.

## ON WAY TO LONDON BY IMPERIAL AIRWAYS.

Valued at £4,000.

Twenty-five kilograms of bar gold, valued at £4,000, had been stolen from an Imperial Airways liner at Cairo, while being conveyed from East Africa to London.

The bulk of the stolen gold was loaded at Mbeya having been produced by the Lupu mines. Smaller quantities were despatched from Nairobi, Kisumu and Kampala.

The Egyptian police have arrested two Imperial Airways employees—an Armenian and a Native—on suspicion, but the gold has not yet been recovered in spite of an extensive search.

# Terrible Flood Havoc in Poland.

## BETWEEN TWO AND THREE HUNDRED DROWNED.

### Damage Estimated at Ten Millions.

#### FARMERS RUINED: THREAT OF TYPHUS EPIDEMIC.

## PRODUCTION METHODS OUTDATED BY RAND ENGINEER.

### Undetermined Mine Values.

To overcome this deficiency, he advocates the employment by Government of a specially qualified technical adviser.

To build up public confidence in the industry, thereby assuring the successful development, he recommends the publication of fuller information concerning the results of development work and the actual values of mines in pennyweights per ton of the ore mined and treated.

### Securing Public Trust.

He also had considerable experience as a consulting engineer in the Rand mining industry, and he is an industrial adviser to many of the Rand mines. He is a member of the Institute of Mining Engineers, London, and is a member of the Rand Mining Association.

Northamptonshire are cutting a sorry shape in the championship. They have only won one game so far, and have a total of 25 points out of a possible 235—not a very heartening record of achievement. Leicestershire, who finished at the foot of the table twelve months ago, have shown marked improvement during this, and are now 13th in the table. Essex have fallen badly from grace. At the end of last year they were fourth, but today they are fourth in the list.

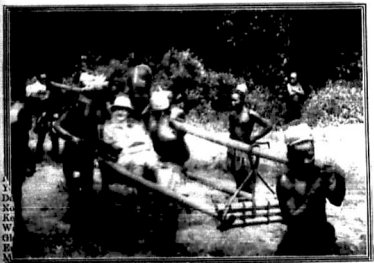

VEGETARIAN RECIPES

Here are three recipes for vegetarian dishes which can be made easily and rapidly, and are light and delicious.

Fried Eggs and Cheese.—Mix together three tablespoonfuls each of breadcrumbs and grated cheese and in a large, shallow, greased dish, lay four lightly poached eggs on the breadcrumbs and cheese, sprinkle with salt and pepper, pour in a gill of white wine, and cover with the remainder of the crumbs and cheese. Bake with butter, and bake in oven till the top is browned. Serve immediately.

Carrot and Potato Mould.—Boil seven or eight carrots, till soft. Drain and wash them. Add a tablespoonful of mashed potatoes, two ounces of butter, pepper and salt to taste, and about a tablespoonful of milk. Put into a greased mould, cover and steam for half an hour. Turn out, garnish with chopped parsley. Serve separately or with well-seasoned white sauce.

Chow Chow.—Put into a large pie-dish three-parts fill in with slices of thin bread and butter. Sprinkle with a layer of bread crumbs, moisten with water, made mustard and salt and pepper to taste, and leave for a quarter of an hour. Serve hot in the dish.

nutrients and intrinsically greater 200 lbs. However, if pasture is to maintain two to three good cows a acre, the fertilizer is of equal importance with the species of grass itself.

On one acre pastures one acre of pasture up to 65 per acre per annum in fertilizer; and management in a 10-acre farm profits equal to over 300 per cent with milk at the low price of 10/- per gallon.

Establishing Kikuyu Grass.

The best method of establishing Kikuyu grass on well-prepared soil is to dig or plough out sods from the nursery and cut or chop them into strips about the size of one's hand, leaving as much soil adhering to the roots as possible. For this reason it is well to establish the nursery in soil of an adobe nature, such as a heavy loam. The older a sod the double furrow plough, and drop the sods of grass behind the plough every twelve inches, exactly as one would when planting potatoes. Do not plant too deeply and, where possible, leave a little of the leafy portion of the grass showing above the soil.

For mowing at a later date it is necessary to level the land. A roller will do the work very well. Before this implement anything that will not tear up or otherwise remove the sods will answer the purpose. 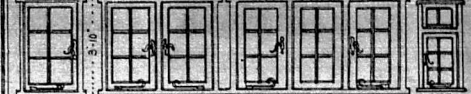

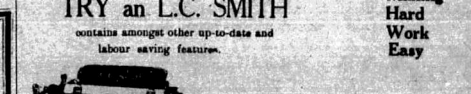

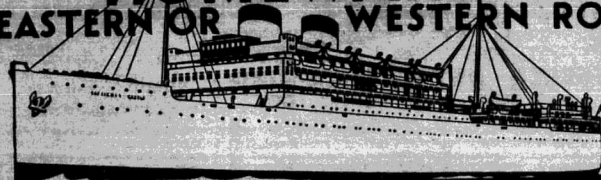

How Europe Was Plunged into War

BRITAIN'S ELEVENTH HOUR EFFORTS FOR PEACE.

Nairobi in August, 1914.

STIRRING PROCLAMATIONS OF THE STATE OF EMERGENCY.

Twenty years ago last Saturday Europe was on the brink of the catastrophic war which in two decades has brought such grief and misery in its train.

Sir Edward Grey, British Foreign Secretary, had just made his historic speech in the House pleading Britain to open negotiations with Germany guaranteeing the defence of the northern French Coast.

An ultimatum had been sent to Germany asking for an assurance that Belgium's neutrality would be respected. Germany refused and Britain, which had been trying to save the situation by diplomatic means and had proposed an international conference for the purpose, was at length drawn into the war.

British East Africa, as Kenya then was, had its own share of the world excitement and something of the atmosphere is conveyed in the Proclamations of the early days of August 1914 reprinted below.

Protecting the Railway.

The following extracts are taken from the "East African Standard" for the week ending August 8, 1914: From Heligoland it is reported on July 29 that an Austro-Hungarian mine has been delivered to the British, demanding suppression of the Pan-Serbian movement, and also the payment of 500,000,000 marks as security for negotiation. The situation is regarded as exceedingly grave. Everybody is asking what attitude Russia will adopt.

Austria Declares War.

Austria has declared war (July 29). The declaration of war was cheered by the crowds at St. Petersburg.

In the Commons Sir Edward Grey expressed the view that so long as the dispute was confined to Austria and Serbia alone, Britain had no title to interfere, but if Austro-Russian relations were threatened, the peace of Europe was affected, the question would concern Britain.

Speaking in the House of Commons (July 29), Sir Edward Grey said he regretted that the situation was not less grave than it was yesterday. Great Britain continued to strive for the peace of Europe.

The second reading of the Amending Bill has been postponed. Mr. Asquith, explaining the reason for this, said that the House, on July 29, "We now meet under conditions unparalleled in the existence of any State. At the same time of peace and war are hanging in the balance, with the risk of a catastrophe of which it is impossible to measure the dimensions."

The Vienna newspapers announce that Serbia accepts Austria's terms under protest.

The King of Serbia with the Czech and Russian armies are marching on Belgrade. Mobilisation is proceeding.

The Tsar of Russia has approved the decision of the Cabinet and mobilisation proceeds forthwith.

On the Stock Exchange international stocks are demoralised. Russian, Austrian and three other markets are depressed. Markets closed with the gloomiest aspect. Consols at 72 1/2. In some sections there was a fractional recovery, but in the last hour yesterday the utmost depression prevailed.

It is stated in Brussels that 100,000 Germans are crowded in the present crisis and announced that the British fleet would be in the course of Northern France against the British fleet and proclama- tion had a supreme appeal for Belgian independence. Sir Edward pointed out that if the independence of Holland was the consideration that British interests were at stake "if we ran away."

At the end of the speech Mr. Asquith expressed Ireland's sympathy with Mr. Ramsey MacDonald, who affirmed that we should have remained neutral.

BRITISH EMPIRE GAMES OPEN AUSPICIOUSLY.

Splendid Times Recorded.

SIXTEEN DOMINIONS REPRESENTED BY SIX HUNDRED ATHLETES.

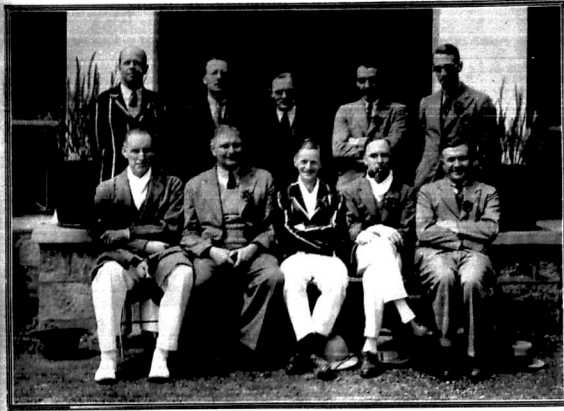

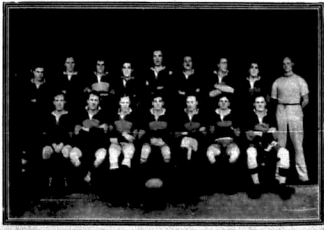

EXCESSIVE SENTENCE.

Official Corruption Charge Against Native.

REVISION CASE IN SUPREME COURT.

Last week a case in which a native, Joseph Triga, had been charged with official corruption and sentenced to six months' imprisonment with hard labour, was brought before the Acting Chief Justice and Mr. Acting Justice Gamble for revision in the Supreme Court, Nairobi.

Joseph Triga had been charged with fraudulently transferring but tax tickets to a person not entitled thereto, and using the Shs. 12/- payment therefore for his own purposes. Joseph, it was stated, was the official clerk to the headman of Babai, for which work he received a monthly salary from Government of Shs. 20/-.

In the opinion of His Honour, the trial magistrate had not directed his attention to two factors in mitigation. First, that the accused, though a native clerk, was receiving the wages of a manual servant, namely Shs. 20/- per month, that His Honour not consider that a high standard of trust or responsibility would be expected of a clerk at such a wage.

The Magistrate had, however, observed that the principle of law is that a native clerk was entrusted with but tax monies was a bad one, and was being stopped, secondly, and more important the accused actually handed over the money to the District Commissioner who returned it. The accused then kept the money for about a week and then as no one appeared to claim either the money or the but tax receipt in law, he converted it to his own use. In other words, the accused at first had committed no offence, and only yielded after some time had elapsed to the very strong temptation placed in his way.

In His Honour's opinion, had the Magistrate considered these two factors, he must have imposed a lesser sentence. There was no evidence that this class of offences was very prevalent in the Kiiff area, and for these reasons of His Honour thought the sentence excessive. They therefore reduced to three months' hard labour.

WITHHOLDING WAGES.

Two Europeans Remanded in Custody.

Mrs. George Stuart Watt of Kapangulanyi and Mr. D. F. Bakerman—who had failed to obey a summons issued by the Resident Magistrate, Eldoret, on a charge of withholding native wages—were yesterday arrested. They appeared before the Resident Magistrate, Nairobi, and, unable to obtain bail, were remanded in custody to Eldoret, where they were conveyed later in the day by train. It is understood that a sum of about £200 is involved in this case.

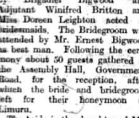

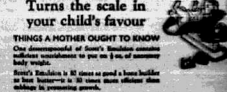

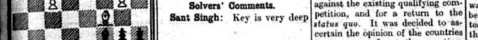

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BUSHE COMMISSION.

Present System Continued.

WIDE POWERS OF "UNQUALIFIED" DISTRICT OFFICERS OPPOSED.

First extracts are published below from the Report of the Commission appointed last year to investigate the question of the administration of justice in criminal cases in East Africa.

The Report is a challenging document which declines to accept the theory that substantial justice related to a knowledge of Native mentality and African law and custom that is widely or sound. The three Governments make vigorous replies.

The Commission prefers what might be termed "professional justice" by trained individuals and proposes that the powers of Magistrates in Kenya and Uganda be reduced to the scale applied to Tanganyika Magistrate of two years.

Additions to the bench of judges in all Territories are proposed.

As later extracts will show, the Commission also concentrated the powers from serious charges, dealt with the difficult question of confession, and upheld the principle that fines should bear relation to the accused's ability to pay.

It suggested a Public Defender for poor prisoners, and a custom that there should be no alternative to the death penalty for murder.

Restoring Functions of High Court.

After delay of more than a year the Commission has published the Report which shall be the basis of the inquiry into the Administration of Justice in Kenya and Tanganyika. 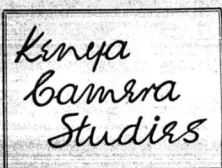
