
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# Britain's Amazing Bank Holiday.

## SUNSHINE, TRAVEL AND ICE-CREAM RECORDS BROKEN.

### Railways Defeated.

BATHERS RETURNED TO SHOULDER ON SOUTHERN BEACHES.

Britain had a marvellous Bank Holiday. Holiday crowds sat in packed masses, shoulder to shoulder on the beaches.

London. (By Air Mail.) Records of all kinds were smashed this holiday, including least records, numbers travelling, and numbers bathing. Very best record since 1880, when temperatures were first registered, was broken.

In the three days of the week-end there were 302,636 bathers on the shores in the London area alone—a record which has only once been beaten in the last 55 years.

It was a very unwhimsical army of holiday-makers who returned from the sea and the country late last night to the shore, study aid of London.

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## Terrible Tragedy in Swiss Alps.

### FOUR ETON MASTERS DASHED TO DEATH.

#### Fall Over Precipice.

FATAL SLIP ON GLACIER AFTER LOSING THEIR WAY.

A terrible tragedy in the Bernina Alps in Switzerland has been reported, involving the death of four well-known masters of Eton College.

The party were all expert climbers and set out, without guides, to negotiate the famous Snow peak. They apparently missed their way on the ascent and slipped on the glacier. They fell down an 800 feet precipice at the bottom of which their bodies were discovered huddled together.

A rescue party set out immediately the return of the party was overdue, and the first indications of the tragedy was the discovery of an ice-axe and snow spectacles. A further search confirmed the accident.

## Bodies Recovered.

News has been received from Eton College that four masters of Eton are believed to have been killed in a climbing accident in Switzerland.

**The Discovery.**

Pontresina August 28.—The discovery by a guide of an axe and snow spectacles on the Eton Glacier in the Bernina Alps was the first indication of the tragedy which resulted in the deaths of three Eton Masters, Messrs. H. E. H. Howson, E. V. Haines, and E. W. Powell, and one assistant master Mr. C. H. White-Thompson. The bodies have not yet been recovered together at the foot of the precipice having evidently fallen several hundred feet.

**Expert Climbers.**

The party who were all expert climbers, and members of the Swiss Alpine Club left Pontresina without guides on August 16 on what was supposed to be the last expedition before returning to England. They spent the night at Chertol, and on the next day started for Snow Peak on Thursday, but they apparently missed their way in descending and slipped on the glacier. A rescue party was sent out immediately and a guide reported the discovery of the bodies, but it will be impossible to reach the spot before September 1.

It is stated that while 90 Assyrians were killed in the actual fighting, over 400, chiefly non-combatants, met their death in the surrounding villages.

Britain has lodged an official protest against this massacre, and the British Ambassador to Iraq is returning to Baghdad immediately from England.

INFLUENZAL PNEUMONIA.

A Successful Treatment.

In London Hospital.

Use of Serum From Convalescents.

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT] London, August 8.

Two cases of influenza pneumonia which were successfully treated by injection of convalescent serum are quoted by Dr. Ronald Hare, of the Bernhard Baron Memorial Research Laboratories, Queen Clara Hospital, London, in the current issue of the Lancet.

He recalls the demonstration (already reported) by Doctors W. Smith, P. F. Ludlow, and C. G. Andrews, that the cause agent of influenza is filtrable and can be inactivated, and that the serum of convalescents can protect the animal against infection.

Dr. Hare says the first case was that of a woman of 27, in hospital, whose condition became grave, while the second case was under the care of a doctor. Both cases reacted in very similar and very dramatic fashion, the serious temperature began at once to fall, reaching normal within 12 hours.

IN RURAL ENGLAND.

Why the Motorist is Not Popular.

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT] London, August 8.

Motorists are not popular in the country. A story, which every motorist knows, is only too truly representative of the way our motorists behave.

Lieutenant-Colonel Sir Arnold Wilson, M.P., who is a member of the Council for the Preservation of Rural England, recounted a tale he had with a farmer. "This is the farmer told him: 'These people who come out in their motor cars from London treat us something more than hell. I tell you what happened last week-end. Some people drove out to my farm. They found the cattle they took took from the car and pulled out the chain. Then they turned their car into the field and drove about looking for a place to picnic, spending nearly half an hour of my labour. They did not find a place they liked, so they took their car into the field again, and when they had finished they put up their empty luncheon tins and asked stones at them to see who could break them. 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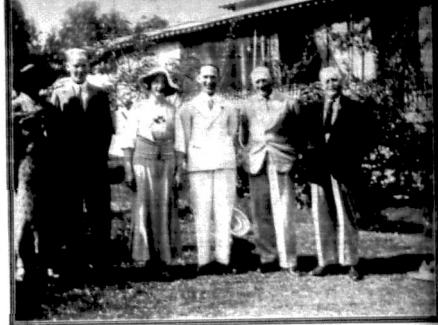

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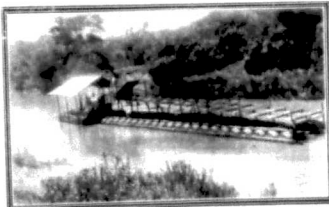

England Wins Third Test Match. WEST INDIES BATTING COLLAPSE AT THE OVAL.

Fine Bowling by C. S. Marriott.

KENT AMATEUR TAKES 11 WICKETS FOR 96 RUNS.

A complete batting collapse marked the West Indies display in their third and final test match against the chosen of England at Kenning Oval yesterday. In their first innings the tourists could only muster 100, while in the second they succeeded in getting 195.

Four personalities figured in the M.C.C. side. In the batting there were three, Bakewell, Nichols and Barnett, and in the bowling one, C. S. Marriott, the Kent amateur, who had eleven wickets for 96 runs during the match.

Of the three Tests which have been played England have thus won two, while the other is a draw. In the first Test, Manchester, was drawn. In the first encounter at Lord's England won with an innings and 27 runs to spare.

A Good Wicket.

England's captain, R. E. B. Wyatt, was the boss at the Oval today, when the third and final test match against the West Indies commenced. The wicket was perfect, but there was only a handful of spectators present, while the game commenced. The crowd improved in numbers as the day progressed. England made a poor start losing two wickets with only 41 on the board. Bakewell started unconvincingly, but improved and secured a century in his first test. He was at the wicket for 21 firsts and hit one 5, nine 4's.

The fielding of the tourists was brilliant, particularly that of Grant. The ground was inclined to be on the tourist's side. The expression was deplorable, although there was a ball knocked high, but he kept a good length throughout. Constantly was missed from the tourists attack.

Good Bowling.

England has scored her second victory over the West Indies. The match came to a conclusion early on Tuesday morning, the first five wickets being taken in 37 runs. Only a few minutes' play was required this morning to complete the match.

The first encounter at Lord's ended in a victory for England by 100 in innings and 27 runs. At Kenning Oval, Manchester, the tourists succeeded in forcing a draw. In the first Test, England won by 11 wickets, while in the second they succeeded in getting 195.

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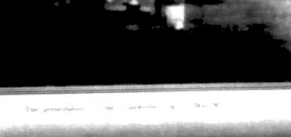
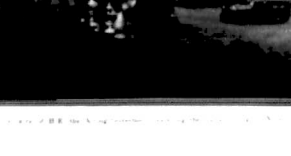

INVESTIGATIONS BY A COMMITTEE.

Departmental Organisation.

MEMORANDUM SUBMITTED BY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

The Uganda Chamber of Commerce has submitted a lengthy memorandum to the Departmental Organisations Committee appointed by the Uganda Government to investigate the question of economies in the service.

The memorandum sets out a number of suggestions by which various savings in expenditure might be obtained. In certain departments, it is stated that no work can be done through overhauling which cannot be dealt with in a cursory manner nor by a superficial examination.

The headquarters of certain departments situated at Entebbe should, it is submitted, be removed to a more suitable and economic centre.

Investigation into items of petty expenditure by departments should also be the subject of the closest scrutiny on a business basis with a view to economy being effected, as it is contended that these items mount up to a considerable sum per annum.

Largely as a result of the lead given by the Prince of Wales in fostering local social service work, much more has been undertaken and something of practical value accomplished by personal initiative and local contributions of forces in very many villages and in almost every town. The National Council of Social Service in its annual report states that at a time when many nations are seeking to solve their difficulties by placing the burden of the social service on the Government and central control, it is significant that in this country one reaction to the national crisis should be a great revival of local enterprise and a spirit of self help.

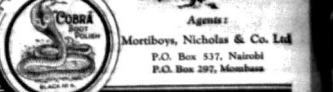
