# Stiffer road penalties

Characteristically, Kenya's Attorney-General and his staff have shunned half-measures in drawing up the Bill providing for stiffer deterrent sentences for road offenders. In some instances the existing maximum fines have been increased five or ten times, and prison sentences may also be lengthened.

Most motorists will raise no complaint over this. They will accept the need for, severer measures as being in the interests of the nation and its people — and with a private determination not to expose themselves to prosecution, which is precisely the reaction the Bill aims to produce.

If justification were needed for the tougher line, it is provided almost daily by accident pictures in the newspapers, and by the growing number of court cases involving driving offences.

As Mr. Njonjo made clear in his introduction to the Bill, there has been a steady increase in road accidents in recent years, and this is likely to continue in the absence of deterrent action. The increase is partly due to the rapid growth in numbers of vehicles using Kenya's roads, but it also reflects a lowering of driving standards and a disregard by many drivers of safety precautions and legalities concerning licences and insurance.

Failure to satisfy the insurance regulations is one of the most heinous offences, since it may deprive an innocent victim of a drunken or careless driver of the compensation which he or his family could expect. Contravention of the third party regulations will, under the Bill, incur a fine of up to £1000, instead of the present £100 maximum, with the added risk of two years' imprisonment in lieu of fine.

It has been forecast that the insurance provisions in the Bill will cause controversy in Parliament. There is no reason why these, or the other proposals in the Bill, should unduly upset Members of the National Assembly, who have suffered several grievous losses in road accidents. If the heavy financial penalties and the prospect of longer jail terms prompt all drivers whose licences and insurance are not in order to take urgent action to remedy this, they will have achieved their effect.

# BIGGER ROE FOR CHAMBER

by JULIUS KINOTHA. Last December the Kenya Chamber of Commerce and Industry, in co-operation with the Management, Training and Advisory Centre in Nairobi, arranged a new business course to make aware of the challenges they faced with the implementation of the new Licensing Act.

The Chamber members sponsor other seminars on matters of business interest. Preliminary arrangements are being made to arrange a seminar on the new provisions in conjunction with the Export Promotion Show in England.

The president of the Chamber, Mr. Gakuru, has on several occasions urged the members to represent Kenya as leaders of the business community in the world. In the past year he has been to a seminar on Kenya and the world in a Kenya party attending the Royal Show in England.

The Chamber is tackling export promotion, market surveys, external trade and marketing, and other matters on a limited scale. By the latter part of the year, the Chamber will be expanding one of its activities.

Africa businessmen are still in a minority in the Chamber's membership but as more and more African enter business more and more are expected to become members.

There is today an energetic team of officer bearers, committee chairman and executive members. The council and standing committees, in order to carry out particular functions and trade sections have been formed. The Wholesale Distributors Section, whose business is conducted in Swahili, and the Motor Spare Parts Dealers Section. Arrangements are in hand to launch a Retailers section.

The Chamber grows in membership and is expected to pioneer business missions to increase market surveys and to conduct a full-scale in fair and exhibitions in the near future.

A court of arbitration to settle commercial disputes, particularly those involving business firms, is desirable and the Chamber has been successful in securing such arbitration machinery as part of its future programme.

It is believed that research, market surveys and export business advice can be undertaken by the Chamber and a special unit is being set up to support Government policy on Africanization.

The Chamber has provisions for setting up a new advisory administrative district, but for practical reasons this is to be done on the basis of the present commercial boundaries.

The Chamber has branches in four municipalities — Mombasa, Tika, Nakuru and Kisumu. Four others are in rural districts and two more rural districts at Nyeri and Eldoret.

The number of branches can be expected to increase soon.

It can be opened on the delivery side, and the wool can be loaded loose into the store, graded, washed, etc. as if the wool had been washed from the start. What is the problem?

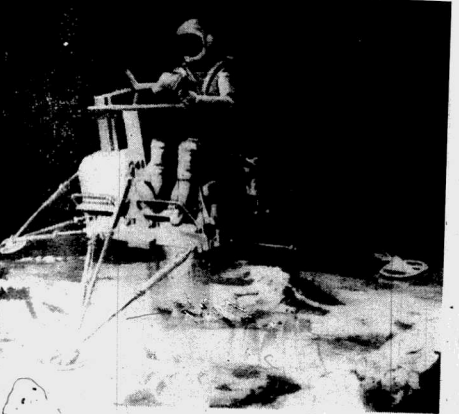

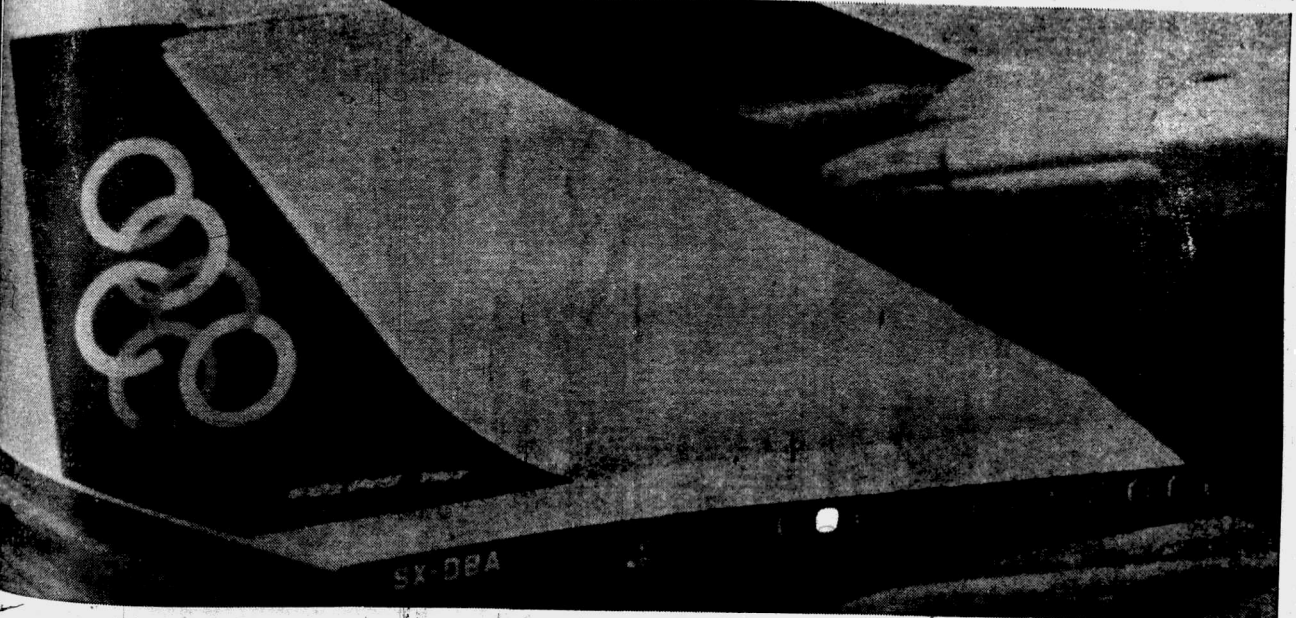

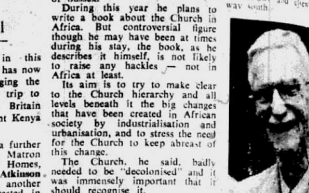

Mr. Karume said there were different brands of democracy in the world. As far as he was concerned freedom was the ability of the people to decide for themselves what was good for their country. That, in essence, was democracy.

People outside a country may see what was happening in a particular country as undemocratic but the people in that country were happy and enjoying the fruits of their struggle.

The chairman of the assembly,

The first United Nations Development decade in Africa had been characterized by political pre-occupation rather than steady economic advance, according to the Minister for Economic Planning and Development, Mr. Mboya.

Speaking to reporters at Nairobi Airport on his return from a conference in Bangkok sponsored by the United Nations, the Minister said that in 1970 Africa would be entering what is effect would be its first development decade. The first decade in the 1960s had been a decade of politics. Some African countries had just got their independence while many were in the process of consolidating their independence.

This was the reason why African leaders had been pressing for special treatment for Africa which was the least developed region of the world in terms of income per capita.

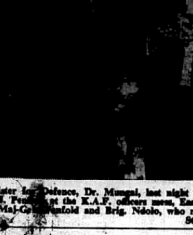

# Development needs of Africa under study by U.N.

**Standard Staff Reporter,** Nairobi.

The first United Nations Development decade in Africa had been characterized by political pre-occupation rather than steady economic advance, according to the Minister for Economic Planning and Development, Mr. Mboya.

Speaking to reporters at Nairobi Airport on his return from a conference in Bangkok sponsored by the United Nations, the Minister said that in 1970 Africa would be entering what in effect would be its first development decade.

The 1960s — had been a decade of political storms. Some African countries had just got their independence while many were in the process of consolidating their independence.

To this extent we have been putting pressure on them through the U.N. to stabilize the price of primary commodities which are normally subject to world market fluctuations.

"We are also struggling to prevail on the developed countries — the populations of the developing countries — to divert one per cent of the gross national product to the developing countries. This they have so far failed to do."

Asked if U.N. experts were worried about concern among some demographers that the populations of the developing countries were "escalating" while production of food lagged behind, Mr. Mboya said that the problem of birth control was important and it had dropped out of his planning discussions.

It was recognised that economic development could not be hastened if a country's population rose by six per cent a year while the Gross National Product rose only by three per cent. However, he did not share the views of many pessimists who saw birth control as a family planning as synonymous with economic development.

The first priority in Africa was the maximum utilisation of available resources both regional and international, and co-operation with the developed nations to ensure that African exports had a market in the richer countries.

Mr. Mboya who also visited Japan said he was impressed by the big strides the country had made in economic development, particularly in the field of industry and the fact that Japan made a major contribution to the Asian Development Bank.

One was struck by the technical sophistication of Japan, its high exports and its skilled manpower.

Asked whether he took the opportunity to persuade the Japanese to increase their imports from Kenya in view of the adverse balance of trade between the two

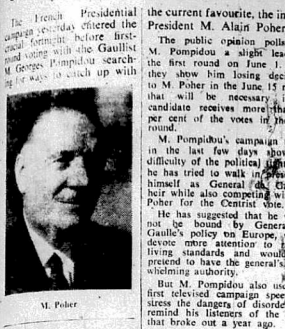

The French President Charles de Gaulle offered the campaign against Pompidou before first round vote with the Gaullist M. Georges Pompidou searching for ways to catch up with the current favourite, the interim President M. Alain Poher.

M. Pompidou's campaign tactics in the last few days show the difficulty of the political tight-rope he has tried to walk in presenting himself as General de Gaulle's heir while also competing with M. Poher for the Centre vote.

He has suggested that he would not be bound by General de Gaulle's policy in Europe, would devote more attention to raising living standards and would not intend to have the general's overwhelming authority.

Mr. Pompidou also says his first televised campaign speech stressed the dangers of disorder and hinted his listeners of the chaos that broke out a year ago.

"I am capable of firmness and have proved it," he said.

In a weekend campaign swing through traditionally Gaullist eastern France, he paid homage to the General, under whom he served as Premier for six years until last summer.

M. Poher is a 60-year-old Senator who has been unknown nationally before General de Gaulle's death.

After Gaullist warnings of show, M. Poher's firmity marked the calm and order that have marked the interregnum so far. It is his quiet style that has won him his high rating in the opinion polls.

President Thieu declared in Saigon: "I hope to have a meeting with President Nixon because I feel it necessary to set up a common policy at this juncture of the situation."

His statement came only three days after White House officials reported that he completely agreed with the Nixon peace plan.

## The perils of looking for a flat in London

Not many strangers to London realise what an amusingly hazardous business "flatting" is in the city. I was totally unprepared for it when I arrived from Kenya a few years ago.

First of all you need to find a flat and for young single people there are various agencies such as Shares=Flat, Flatshare and others who cater solely for those who either want to share a flat or house with others, or want people to come and share with them.

This is probably the best and cheapest way to begin with, but even this is pretty hazardous because you never know what sort of people you might end up with. A friend of mine ended up in a house with a sleepwalker and a kleptomaniac!

Although you may have an initial interview with your prospective flatmates these things rarely get revealed until after you have actually moved in and then I suppose you either move out at the end of the month and start all over again, or you try and cope with the eccentricities of the others — remembering that you probably have a few of your own which the others haven't mentioned.

Generally though, the agencies do try and match up people of similar interests, ages and back-

grounds. For this service they charge you approximately one week's rent as their commission.

An increasing number of people I know are living in what are called "mixed flats". In other words men and girls sharing the same flat. This is not nearly as common and in most cases these mixed flats seem far happier than those in which have all girls or all men in them.

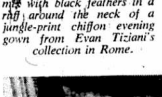
The alternative to that is to set up house on your own whether it be furnished or unfurnished. Advertisements for flats cram the accommodation columns of the daily Press and there are also many agencies which deal in this type of thing. It is not a good idea to commission from both the landlord and the agent. It is better to commission several such agencies which will only deal in flats above a certain price and then you are not likely to be crushed should you happen to find a flat which is below the figure lower than their lowest price.

Rents vary enormously depending on where you want to live and how many people you want to live with. In London it is far cheaper to share a flat, even if you have only one other person. If you want to live alone then you either settle for a bed-sitter, and London bed-sitters are pretty soul-destroying or pay an exorbitantly high price for a minute self-contained flat. I suppose that if you wanted to share a flat, with three other people you could expect to pay around £5 a week or rent and yourself another £1 on top for bills.

When you decide to put your own flat the best thing to do is study all the daily papers as soon as possible, as well as seeing accommodation agencies. When you have selected some which suit you, start phoning around after them and see what fun you can have.

What never ceases to amaze me is the way in which landlords will describe their property in advertisements. I honestly never know how they have the nerve to twist the truth to the extent that they do! For instance — if you read an advertisement offering a "garden flat" or "view of garden" it could well mean a basement flat with a narrow eye view of the garden view stacked in the back garden. The word "bath" in any advertisement for a London flat is a trick one.

An advertisement reading "Large central luxury flat" is far more likely to prove to be a large, sturdily bed-sitter overlooking probably London's noisiest street and the flat the furniture will probably have been purchased from a second-hand store but look as if it belonged to a rubbish dump. Should you ever see an advertisement out to the landlord that this hardly adds up to luxury to you there are several replies you will get. "Another thing that I have noticed is when you are shown over the flat by the landlord and you are delighted to see cushions on the chairs and

PROBLEM ISLES

- 3. ASSOCIATED TERRITORIES: These are territories which are self-governing internally, self-governing in external affairs, but for whose foreign and defence affairs Britain is responsible, five in number: Bermuda (100,000), British Virgin Islands (9,000), Cayman Islands (18,500), Montserrat (14,000), St. Vincent (90,000), scheduled for Associated States, Turks and Caicos Islands (6,000).

Commonwealth mission to sort out the mini-States

Britain, anxious to avoid any more Anguilla, is trying to work out with the Caribbean countries, Canada and the Commonwealth Secretariat, a formula for the future of the Caribbean area.

Talks have been going on for many weeks with Trinidad, Jamaica, Barbados, Guyana, and now the Secretary-General of the Commonwealth, Mr. Arnold Smith, is embarking on a major reconnaissance of the entire area.

Mr. Smith's visit has been planned for some time but had long-standing negotiations from the Premier of Trinidad, Dr. Eric Williams, and other Governments in the area — but the tone taken on a considerable significance.

One idea being floated is that some form of Commonwealth Executive should be set up to look into the whole problem of the British Caribbean islands.

Minds are open at the moment and the end result of the talks could be a round-table conference in London, at which all the islands would be represented; or a small interim group might be formed to take soundings all over the Caribbean and report back to the Secretary, which could then set up a proposed solution to Britain and the Commonwealth.

Mr. Smith will be visiting Trinidad, Guyana, Barbados, Jamaica, St. Lucia, Grenada and Anguilla. Then he goes on to Canada. He will be away for more than a month.

Canada is bound to play an important role in any proposed Caribbean solution, even though the Trudeau Government stayed on the sidelines during the whole Caribbean and report back to Ottawa was not particularly happy about the British military action.

The Commonwealth Caribbean has built up a whole series of trade and political links and her standing in the area is high.

Britain is in favour of a Commonwealth solution in the Caribbean and, therefore, supporting Mr. Smith's mission. Whichever interest would like to disengage completely from the Caribbean area, though it sees no way of doing this.

The policy of creating Associated States — that is, islands or groups of islands which are self-governing internally but whose defence and foreign affairs are conducted by Britain — has been a failure in the Caribbean as a whole.

There are five such States and no more are likely to be created. Indeed, before long the island of Anguilla might follow the Anguilla pattern and break away from Barbados and it is always possible that Nevis will leave St. Kitts, leaving it a lone survivor of the British-Nevian-Anguillan State.

Space city the U.S. hides from the world

At present, and in the weeks to come, the eyes of the world are on Cape Kennedy, as America's Space programme reaches its climax with the attempt to land the first man on the Moon.

All this publicity seems to have eclipsed the fact that there are two other missile test centres in the U.S. Both are top-secret military installations, one of which was even overrun by Cape Kennedy in 1961.

The Minister, who was addressing students at Kenyatta College, Nairobi, on 'African Socialism', said the Government believed that nationalisation could be brought about through a mixed economy in which both private businessmen and the State could participate.
Advocates of nationalisation of land, the economy and production failed to understand the fact that, in the economic and historical circumstances of Kenya, nationalisation of land - the big game hunting production - could be treated as a social and political issue. We believe in a mixed economy and not outright nationalisation because individuals should have the right to own things and not the State, as in socialist countries.
Representations were made to the Cabinet for the mitigation of the Government's policy on nationalisation which would involve the Ministry and enable the ordinary citizen to have a share in the national wealth. In other words, Kenya's national choice. It would be in the interest of the country to have the State owning land in the country and the peasants remaining the owners of their land.
Socialism in Kenya, Mr. Kibaki believes, should be brought about through borrowing of ideologies from the West, China or Russia.
