NO TRIBALISM IN ARMY OR POLICE RECRUITING

Many Luo members says Mr. Moi

The Vice-President and Minister for Home Affairs, Mr. Moi, told the House at Question Time that for security reasons he was unable to answer a question from Mr. M. Ondiek-Chillo (K.P.U. Nyak) asking why no police or army recruiting had taken place in Nyanza for two years.

Asked as a supplementary question if the Government had adopted a policy of not recruiting the Luo, he answered a definite "no."

Mr. Moi went on: "We have on numerous occasions stated that we cannot as a Government bring recruiting on to a tribal basis."

A large section of the Luo people were in the police, he said, "so why should we people say we are afraid of the Luo?"

The question was raised again on September 19.

Mr. Ondiek-Chillo (K.P.U. Ugunya) asked the Minister of State in the President's Office, Mr. Koinange, what steps had been taken to discipline chiefs and sub-chiefs who, he alleged, had practically involved themselves in a Kano meeting at Ugunya market on January 19.

At this meeting, he alleged, riotous and abusive words against K.P.U. MPs and the opposition leader, Mr. Odinga, were used.

Mr. Koinange said no steps had been taken because the allegation was unfounded. The chief and sub-chief had been at the market, but no administration duties. They

had taken no part in the meeting. Another matter to be raised later on adjournment was the Attorney-General, Mr. Njoroge, from Mr. Kamukahi Mwangi (Kanu, Embu East) asking when non-citizens working as resident assistants would be replaced by those who were replaced by citizens with the proper qualifications, character and ability in due course, pointing out that several posts were presently being Africanised.

At present the country was fortunate to have "these gallant gentlemen" working for the Government.

"We have had Africans join the judiciary as magistrates, but the one by one we are pushing them to go into private practice or join the Authority, and at the moment there are only two Africans in the service."

Police disperse election meeting

Nakuru

Riot police under the Nakuru Police Divisional Commander, Super. Gusho, dispersed a crowd of Kanu supporters who had gathered at the Naivasha Community Hall yesterday to elect office-bearers for the party's Naivasha sub-branch.

There were no incidents but police kept guard at the Kanu office, which was closed by the sub-branch officials themselves a fortnight ago after a dispute over the administration of sub-branch funds.

The decision to disperse the crowd, which had been picked up as delegates to conduct the elections, was understood to have been made in Nairobi and communicated to the Rift Valley provincial authorities through Police Headquarters, Nairobi.

News that the election would not take place was conveyed to the Nakuru District branch chairman, Mr. Kihika Kimani; the district executive officer, Capt. Geoffrey Kamau, who is also the Mayor of Nakuru; and the Naivasha sub-

branch chairman, Mr. Kariki Chutara, by police at Naivasha.

The officials who had made arrangements for the election were astounded by the news. The meeting had been licensed by the D.C. for Nakuru and the delegates, who spent the night on the farm on the outskirts of Naivasha, had been brought to the hall.

The officials frantically tried to contact Nairobi by telephone for clarification. They were unable to obtain any reasons and later told Nairobi branch to find out what had happened.

The Naivasha sub-branch office, which has been in constant dispute since last year, was closed when Mr. Chutara, supported by the organising secretary, Mr. Chaka, openly disagreed with the sub-branch treasurer, Mr. Joseph M. Kiruru, and the vice-chairman, Mr. Elijah Kibuchi.

The officials closed the office and later asked the administration to ensure that nobody used it. The matter was brought before the district branch, which decided to hold fresh elections.

Four delegates from each farm around Naivasha were selected to attend the election meeting yesterday.

African call for U.N. debate on Rhodesia

Africa's group of delegations at the U.N. has agreed to call for an early meeting of the Security Council to consider the implications of Rhodesia's proposed new constitution and republican status.

Rhodesia's four non-white political parties have called on their supporters to vote "No" in the constitutional referendum. A joint communiqué was signed by the United People's Party, the Democratic Party, the National Association of Coloured People and the Southern Rhodesia Asian Organisation.

The leader of the U.P.P., Mr. Percy Mukuau, said a radio and TV broadcast that Africans in Rhodesia under the proposed constitution would remain political outcasts or bloody revolutionaries.

He appealed to all the voters not to allow the races to be cut apart in conflict by the totally unacceptable new constitution, which no African can possibly support.

GAULLISTS FACE RIGGING CHARGE

The former French Deputy, M. Paul Vergès, accused the Gaullist organisation of full-scale election rigging in the overseas territories when he spoke with the Communist candidate, M. Jacques Duclos, in a television broadcast in Paris.

Speaking particularly of the state of affairs in the Indian Ocean islands, M. Vergès said: "Dear people vote at each poll, but a lot of people who are still alive are not registered voters."

People were often registered in several places and hired strongmen were used to stop Opposition voters from polling stations.

On election night an announced result was given which was completely untrue and which had nothing to do with the actual voting.

M. Vergès, who spent several months in prison for sympathising with Algerian freedom-fighters during France's Algerian war, said that all this explained the overwhelming "Yes" vote in overseas territories in last month's referendum, which saw metropolitan France vote "No" to Gen. de Gaulle.

The "Yes" vote in Reunion was 92.5 per cent and the average positive vote for all the overseas territories was 84.6 per cent, M. Vergès said.

He added that the victory of the "No" vote in the referendum was the reason that the Finance Minister, M. Debré, had now gone to Reunion, where he was voted Deputy after being defeated in a

maintain election, to increase the "Yes" vote of last April.

M. Vergès accused the Gaullist "totalitarian regime" of guaranteeing privileges for an "initially small minority."

"For the vast majority there is nothing but low salaries, high unemployment figures, ruin for thousands of peasants and the stripping out of their property. There is permanent repression and daily humiliation," he alleged.

M. Vergès then asked the Electoral Commission to ensure that the television broadcasts were shown to viewers in the overseas territories.

Grand jury questions boxers

Italy's world middleweight boxing champion Bruno Benvenuti and Biafra's Dick Tiger have appeared before a New York District Attorney.

Mr. Frank Hogan, in part of a two-month-old investigation into the influence of the Mafia criminal organisation on professional boxing in the United States.

The two boxers fought a ten-round light-heavyweight bout at Madison Square Garden, New York, on Monday, when Tiger scored a unanimous points verdict over the favoured Benvenuti who fractured a hand early in the fight.

Tiger was accompanied before the grand jury by his lawyer, Mr. John McAnulty. The Biafran former world champion said, "I do not know at all why they wish to interview me. I am a boxer - that is all."

Benvenuti appeared at mid-day with his injured hand bandaged and his arm in a sling. He was accompanied by his manager, Mr. Bruno Amaduzzi. He said after receiving the summons that he knew nothing about the matter but would cooperate.

Mr. Amaduzzi, a light-heavyweight boxer, Frank Depaula, and his manager, Mr. Gary Garofalo, also appeared before the grand jury after questioning by the Assistant District Attorney, Mr. Lawrence Goldstein.

Membership brings fun and friendship

Membership of the K.Y.H.A. gives young Kenyans a tremendous chance to travel overseas with little money but more importantly, it enables them to see and realize that they live in one of the loveliest countries in the world.

With guidance from the K.Y.H.A. warden and members or from the wealth of international information available through the association the young people of Kenya can spend their holidays touring overseas or exploring their own country and showing its heritage to visitors from all over the world.

These young visitors come from many countries — Canada, the United States, India, New Zealand, Japan and even Iceland — to stay in Kenya hostels.

Kenya's Youth Hostels can take pleasure in helping these overseas guests but before they do this they must show the necessary pride in their own country. Now is the time for them to show the spirit of Harambee by co-operating in the association's work.

Some of the many students and teenagers I have met through the K.Y.H.A. during the past three years have contributed to the Youth Hostel spirit by writing of their travels and adventures, many of them hair-raising.

Some Belgian friends on their honeymoon gave a great deal of trouble collecting bush-beds (the Game Department will reimburse them), lads from Switzerland, passed through Nairobi near the end of a fantastic winter tour, German boys looked in for something of East Africa after graduating and before setting down in their own country to their respective professions.

One Danish boy I met had spent six months in Japanese Youth Hostels simply to learn the art of yoga.

These are only a few examples of the people to be met by joining the K.Y.H.A. Then there is the fun of long discussions over the cooking stove, or pointing over maps, explaining travel necessities and whether one can stay in a tent or at such a place or if over captains are prepared to give "lifts" to youngsters on their travels.

All this adds up to the exciting essence of Youth Hostelling. Given the opportunity these visitors could bring much interest to Kenya girls and boys by hiking, climbing, exploring and swimming together. This is what Youth Hostelling really means.

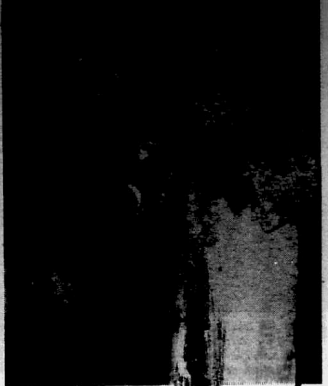

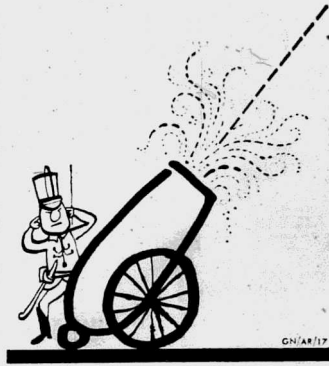

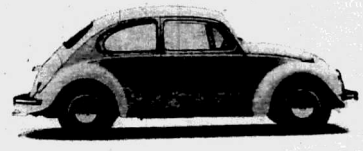

On a fleeting visit to the coast, which hardly gave me time to have a good look round, I was nevertheless impressed by the atmosphere of gay amuseurism which pervades the nightlife there.

It seems that everyone is invited to join in and no one can escape the nightclubs of not encouraging local talent.

In some cases, waitress like of their aprons and respond shortly afterwards platonically dressed to perform a dance routine and in some cases striptease which is every bit as eye-catching as that of their overseas sisters, so when they obviously use their style.

In some cases entertainers give impromptu staging and instrumental displays (I was particularly impressed by the style of a blind singer at the Sunshine Day and Night Club) and if they are out of tune — well who cares, it is all part of the fun of being down at the coast.

A word of praise too for the pianist at the Casablanca nightclub who manages to bang out quite a handy tune in spite of the fact that about a dozen or so keys appear to be missing.

The clubs were rather empty when I was there, but more due to the fact that there are few ships in anyway at this time of the year, and the absence of a festive feeling was undoubtedly helping away local business.

Certainly Mombasa has lost none of its clearly cosmopolitan air which tourists and musicians alike find very attractive.

It might be wondered whether or not the do-it-yourself approach to entertainment could not be imported to Nairobi and I know of at least one nightclub manager who is thinking of introducing some of the Mombasa girls to Nairobi audiences to encourage a bigger participation by local artists on the lucrative cabaret scene, which unfortunately, however, needs more new faces than it can possibly employ all the time.

The long-term answer would be, as was shown by the example of Gigi (see story below) to seek engagements, eventually, outside Africa.

It was also pleasant to see off Broadway (Broadway being the main nightclub area of Kilindi Road) and visit some of the small bars patronised mainly by locals and where a large Tucker only costs 2.50.

Some of these have attractive light gardens, and all of them are situated in the friendly, lazy atmosphere of the coast.

Anyone staying at Mombasa, by the way, should give the Castle Hotel a try. Since it was rescued from its former oblivion in 1960 (the Castle is one of the oldest existing hotels in Mombasa, being built in 1927) it has been doing good business.

Compared with some of the new super-modern hotels in Kenya, it is nothing like Victorian in its decor and atmosphere — and with bed and breakfast in a room with its own balcony, toilet and shower at only 40/- — who can complain?

Gigi — well known for many years on Kenya's nightclub and modelling circuit — has been appearing in evening television for four months now and accord-

ing to newspaper reports I have received from Britain, she is causing quite a sensation.

Even allowing for the fact that the Press are usually over-battering when they describe cabaret artists, such praise as "Gigi" in the Bardot mould and sings in seven languages" give some idea of the hit she is making there.

One report says "Gigi has a capability which can handle pop and ballads, but with her figure and poise is obviously marked down for the torches and nightclubs."

The *Sunday Mirror* has a tantalising "Gigi" picture of Gigi in some kind of mini-skirt, although a report that she is finding it hard to get a date in London.

One of her warmest moments occurred when she visited the tropical plant house and basked in the 75 degree heat.

She has also appeared at the Grey Tower at Covent Garden where her version of *Winniethe Love for Sale* and *Impossible Dream* raised the temperature, according to reports.

Let's hope Gigi's success sets the trend for a number of other East African artists who are trying to make the big break in Europe.

The new record by John Lennon and Yoko Ono, the Zapple label, *Unfinished Music No. 2, Live with the Ono's*, contains many other attempts to achieve the ultimate in spontaneity.

On one track, John and Yoko feature Yoko's misarrange at the Queen Charlotte Hospital, November in songs, heartbeats and two minutes of silence. There are also a lot of scratchy noises and a short call by John to an Anthea at Ambassador 5973.

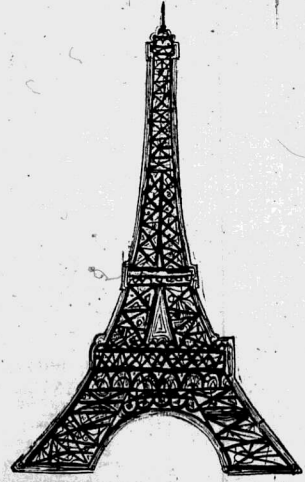

Her name was also asked by King's College, Ibadan — then the Kabakole College — to find a tutor for their girls who were waiting with boys in higher education. When Miss Graham came to Africa she hoped to interview 130 women from whom she would accept 100 students to start the first women's class at Makerere. She was disappointed to find only one girl in form six eligible for university entrance in the whole of East Africa. Her name, Catherine Senkatuka, of Ibadan. Her colleagues were supported by other well-known women educationists in East Africa like Mrs. Mary Stoker, wife of the former Archbishop of Uganda, who has been honoured by her name having been given to the single women's hall of residence on Makerere hill. Five of the pioneer students, except Mrs. Marjorie Kabusi, who is overseas, were so excited to learn that their former teacher was returning to East Africa that they turned up in force at Eniobele Airport to welcome her. When she landed on Uganda soil after being away for over 15 years, she was presented with a bouquet by Miss Floori, the daughter of one of her former students. A

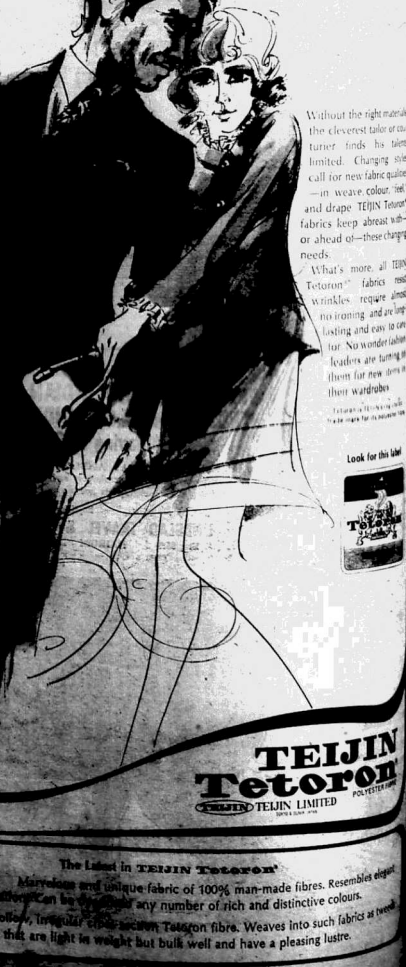

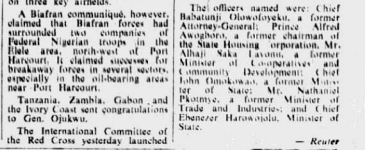

Ministers of the six European Community Countries and 18 Afo-Malagasy States associated with them agreed on Thursday night in Brussels on a temporary measure until a renewed of the six-year-old Yaounde Treaty of Association, due to expire today, can be negotiated.

Earlier the "Six" reportedly agreed among themselves to give Africa a total of \$775,000,000 and \$116,000,000 worth of aid to the 18 developing nations over the next five years. This compares with \$350,000,000 during the first term.

The temporary measure, decided on three days of intensive talks, fulfils the provision of the present Yaounde Treaty in trade matters, but imposes restrictions on development.

It appears that the 18 failed to obtain special aid for the transitional period and that part of the money will come from the third European Development Fund, set up in 1970-75.

The 24 failed to reach final agreement on the second term of their convention and will hold another Ministerial meeting in Luxembourg on June 26 and 27.

A memorandum submitted to the President by President Hamani Diori of Niger, who toured Europe last week, urged that the African spokesman, said a minimum of 407,000,000 was necessary to counter the aid from the west and to help the continent to develop.

In addition, the "Six" face the major problem of deciding their individual contributions to the third European Development Fund.

On coffee, cocoa and palm oil, three vital tropical products for the Africa, the sources said the "Six" agreed to lower the tariffs on these products from 10 per cent to 6 per cent.

Countries attending the meeting were: France, West Germany, Belgium, Italy and Luxembourg.

Measures way to protect new traders

Amendments would soon be made in both the Trade Licensing Act and the Rent Restriction Act to deal with "current malpractices" and "discrimination against African citizens," the Minister for Commerce and Industry, Mr. Kibaki, told Parliament yesterday.

Disputing criticism that the Trade Licensing Act was not effective, Mr. Kibaki said: "The Trade Licensing Act is working like a bomb. The charges are obvious everywhere and anyone looking in the streets of townships like Mwarini will not fail to see how the change-over has come so smoothly."

"What we are concerned with now is to remove the few obstacles," but the Government is worried about some non-African citizens who have cashed in on the situation brought about by the Trade Licensing Act. Some of them are buying a lot of property and are determined to buy as many buildings as possible, leaving none to their fellow African citizens who do not even have one.

"Equality for all citizens, which is enshrined in our Constitution, will be difficult to achieve if we have greedy citizens who do not

have the interests of the country at heart."

The Minister was speaking on an M.P. for Embu East, Mr. Karunguru, who read:

"In view of the present discriminatory attitudes being practised by some landlords throughout the Republic against the African citizen by denying them the opportunity of renting or by demanding exorbitant rents or by demanding the Government to inquire into these prevalent malpractices, I beg to make recommendations as to remedial steps which the Government should demand executive rents by buildings built in 1910."

The Government was aware of some traders' difficulty by the Trade Licensing Act but refused to let their promises to the Government had been completely rendered off.

The Government had therefore agreed to a suggestion by the chairman of the Rent Tribunal, Mr. Mwangi, that immediate measures were needed to close loopholes which allowed discrimination.

It had been decided to strengthen the powers of the tribunal in the assessment of rents when a tenant felt he had been aggrieved. This meant that the tribunal would have to have qualified assessors, whose findings would be binding on both parties.

The Government also intended to bring an amendment to the Trade Licensing Act to ensure that a trader moving into premises vacated by non-citizens affected by the Act was charged the same rent as the original trader.

A motion by the Member for Kirinyaga East, Mr. R. Khatana, calling for the introduction of macadamia nuts in Kenya as a cash crop and for encouragement to be given to co-operatives and any farmers interested in growing the crop to eliminate monopoly, was accepted by the Government.

Mr. T. Mwalewa (Karu, Kitui East) said a leading Asian businessman and Karu supporter had requested to let his shop in an African town in Nairobi. West. Many Asians said openly that they would not under any circumstances let their premises to Africans.

"I got a shop in Nairobi and was asked to pay £12 a month. From one man in Asia, paid only £7 a month."

Ministry not ready to take over roads

The Ministry of Works was planning a smooth take-over of secondary roads and of other roads financed by external agencies, the Minister, Mr. Mwangi, told M.P.s.

He was replying to a question by the K.P.U. M.P. for Nyakach. The Minister said that the Government had been urged by Parliament to maintain all secondary roads in the country. He wanted to know if the legislation had been implemented and if so why secondary roads were still deteriorating.

Mr. Mwangi said: "The House is aware that at present secondary roads are vested in the county councils, and before the Ministry could take them over the existing legislation must be revoked and a new legislation embodying the change passed by this House."

The Ministry is not presently fully staffed or equipped to carry out both the maintenance of trunk roads and secondary roads in the country. Taking over secondary roads would mean an

additional 100 to 2000 miles of road to maintain.

The Ministry is currently planning to set up a road supervisory staff which will have to be staffed by the Ministry. About 100 road foremen will be required but these will not be available for recruitment immediately.

In any case arrangements are being made to open a road supervisory training school where staff will be trained over the next two to three years.

Similarly more plant operators, drivers and other staff will be required and training of all this staff will take some time to complete. The staff that will be required for the additional work, funds will have to be found to purchase additional equipment such as graders, bulldozers, trucks and rollers.

"The Ministry realised that taking over all secondary roads as well as other roads serving special agricultural activities such as tea roads, sugar and settlement roads is a process that is bound to incur a fairly long time because of the heavy additional responsibilities that would have to be assumed. It would be unreasonable to expect such a process of taking over to be phased over a period of two years."

An Assistant Minister for Works, Mr. Bomet, told Mr. P. N. Mwangi (Karu, Kitui West) that two high-level bridges would soon be built across the Tiva River in Kirinyaga District. The Government had allocated £5,000 for widening the river bed and improving its approach.

President says 'a ready to go on'

Primarys before 'forthcoming election' plan

Before next Madaraka Day Kenya will have moved into its first general election as an independent republic, President Kenyatta told a cheering audience of thousands yesterday in his Madaraka Day address to the nation.
The fifth chapter in the history of the young nation, he added: "This is, therefore, an important and historic celebration. It marks the end of one chapter of our national story and the beginning of another."
The fifth chapter has ended today on the keynote of success, after six years of independence.

Speaking from the date of Nairobi's new Uhuru Park, the hub of nationwide Madaraka Day celebrations, the President also confirmed that new measures would be introduced to turn over to the people the nomination of all candidates in the election.
He pledged that no candidate would be imposed from above. The new measures would prevent any intrigue aimed at giving seats to men of wealth or to relatives of party officials.
The President gave a stern warning to people, including some Members of Parliament, who he said, stayed comfortably in Nairobi looking for prostitutes instead of going to their constituencies to explain Government policy to the people.
He told electors to reject those who went around trying to bribe them with beer. "Vote for the people who you would help you," he advised.
The President, in good mood, was loudly applauded throughout his long speech and frequently joked with the crowd.
Thousands of people, armed with umbrellas and handbags, poured into the park and every seat in the park was taken an hour before the President and Mrs. Kenyatta arrived to a tumultuous welcome under grey skies.
After the National Anthem Kenya's armed strength went on display with a big marching band of the Armed forces, the police and prison services, the administration police and the National Youth Service. The parade was capped by a display of formation flying by the Air Force.
Kenyatta all over the country celebrated Madaraka Day with colourful programmes of events and entertainments in their towns and villages.

ISRAELI THREATENS JORDANIAN ARMY

Israel has warned that it may strike at Jordan's army unless Jordanian troops stop collaborating with Arab guerrillas, reliable sources said yesterday.
The warning follows a two-week build-up in the number of clashes across the Jordan-Israel ceasefire line. The area has now, according to the Israelis, replaced the Negev as the main centre of activity in the Middle East fighting.
The sources said the warning — the second of its kind in a week — was conveyed to King Hussein through American channels by the United States Embassy in Tel Aviv.
The Israeli Foreign Ministry declined to confirm the report. Ministry officials have recently complained that Jordanian regular forces assist guerrilla forces by providing covering fire for operations into Israeli-held territory.
Just how and when any Israeli reprisal might be launched could only be a matter for speculation. In the past, Israeli warnings of this kind have been followed fairly swiftly by action.
During May, the Israelis reported more than 30 major incidents involving Jordanian forces in the West Bank, including the burning of five times across the Jordan-Israel ceasefire line, and only once struck at regular Jordanian military.
The only Israel ground strike was against an alleged guerrilla base near the Jordanian town of Deir Yassin. In general, the Israeli Army has held up to now, avoiding any strikes against the Jordanian Army, but it has been accused of the army's co-operation with the guerrillas is the result of a long policy decision in Amman rather than initiative by local commanders. The theory is that Egypt persuaded Jordan to step up border harassment and that Egyptian reinforcements ceased to have their former effect on the now deeply frustrated Jordanian Army.
On the Jordanian ceasefire line, too, the Israelis are being fortifying their positions against bombardments which are the only vulnerable targets left are Arab towns such as Jericho which last week was bombed by Russian-made Katiusha rockets.
Israel will not repair the Katiusha missile pipeline blown up by terrorists in the area. Such incidents will not be repeated, according to the new Israeli Military chief of staff, five sources. — *Agency*

FRANCE FACES SECOND POLL

A run-off will be necessary for the French Presidential election, as no candidate obtained an absolute majority in yesterday's first round, according to reports from Paris.
The former Premier, M. Pompidou, the leading candidate, was expected to obtain between 40 and 45 per cent of the total vote.
The fight was extremely close between the Interior Home of State, M. Faur, and the Communist candidate, M. Jacques Duclos.
M. Faur received between 21 and 25 per cent of the vote, and M. Duclos between 19 and 24 per cent.
M. Pompidou came top of the poll in 100,000 votes, followed by M. Faur with 75,000, M. Duclos with 65,000, and M. Defferre with 55,000.
France voted heavily yesterday in the early stages of the first round of the Presidential election of the country's leader for the next seven years. The first four hours of voting saw as many electors casting their ballots as in last month's referendum which ousted Gen. de Gaulle.

The problems facing the rapidly-developing field of cargo handling will be studied at an international conference at Gotenburg this week.

More than 200 delegates from 33 countries are scheduled to attend the ninth biennial conference of the International Cargo Handling Coordination Association which opened in Gotenburg on Tuesday.

The only speaker from a developing country is the general manager of the Nigerian Ports Authority, Mr. Joseph McEwen, who offers a number of interesting facts on the difficulties, such as taking up the fact that extensive container traffic is still in the infancy stages.

According to one Swedish specialist, Mr. Hans Samuelson, of the Ministry of Transport, cargo handling in Africa is still in the 19th century by comparison with the industrialized countries. It is expected to improve the plight of the developing nations.

At a container conference organized by the United Nations in London in 1967, delegates participated in talks over the heads of the African representatives.

Besides inter-continental trade, he said, intra-continental trade, particularly between the U.S. and Europe, Atlantic lines, cargo handling established routes, also likely to be under consideration.

Delegates to the annual meeting of the International Institute for Cotton in Kampala, Uganda, which opened on Monday, made progress in meeting composition from management and technical assistance.

The delegates from nine cotton-exporting countries, however, were developing more, it is expected to give content for the finishing of cotton material to make them easily available.

The institute is an organization enabling cotton producers to deal with trade and industry in the main cotton producing countries. Its president is Mr. Julian Rodriguez of Mexico.

The meeting was attended by delegates from India, Mexico, Spain, Sudan, the United Arab Republic, the United States, Uganda, Tanzania and Greece.

Reports presented to the delegates said cotton had suffered from severe competition from man-made fibres in the last 10 years. During that period the production of shirts made from cotton had fallen from 90 to 60 per cent.

Mr. Read P. Dunn, executive director of the committee, who is based in Washington, reported that advances had been made. He described a new development of twixle yarn, producing yarn without spinning, as possibly the biggest breakthrough since the invention of the loom.

This process was still being developed but, it is expected to give cotton a big advantage over other fibres, which so far had proved unsuitable for it.

World Bank to BACK RANCHES

President Kaunda announced at Kite in the Southern Copperbelt at the weekend that an agreement had been signed with the World Bank to provide for a better beef market and the dairy farms would help to combat malnutrition, especially among children.

The President, who was opening the twelfth Copperbelt Agricultural Show, said the marriage of copper and agriculture in Zambia would have great productive potential.

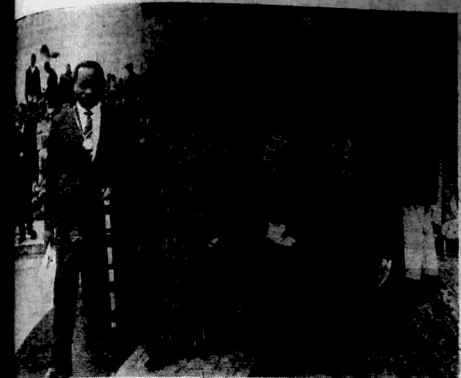

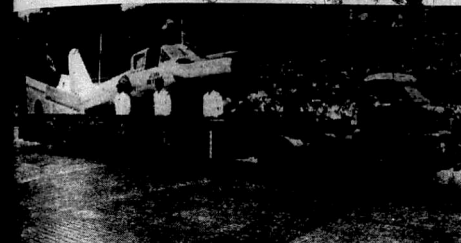

machine-gun defies strikers

The Prime Minister of the troubled Netherlands Antilles, Mr. Girol Kroon, walked to his office in Willemstad with a submachine-gun cradled in his arms as a strikers' ultimatum to quit expired.

Striking dockers had called on the Government to resign within 48 hours or see the Caribbean capital burned to the ground. The ultimatum expired on Saturday night without further incident.

About 70 per cent of Willemstad's retail shopping area was destroyed by fire when rioters went on a rampage of arson, looting and assault on Friday. Four people were killed and 150 injured.

Troops patrolling the gutted streets were ordered to shoot to kill looters.

More than 40 Dutch troops flew from the Netherlands at the weekend to reinforce heavily-armed Marines from the resident garrison of 50 guarding key installations. Another 200 soldiers were rushed in from the neighbouring island of Aruba.

Mr. de Kroon said there were enough troops and police in the colony to guarantee law and order.

"This is no time to compromise," he added as he walked to his office in Fort Amsterdam, a heavily-guarded citadel in the city. "Some 400 people, described as agitators and rioters, are under arrest there. They include Stanley Fox, a Curaçao-born American Negro, who police said, was arrested as he tried to enter the island accompanied by several members of the U.S. Black Panther movement.

A police officer commented: "To me this is a very confirmation that there was a definite plan for unrest."

The riots started when construction workers went on strike for more money, and dockers and workers at the Shell oil refinery joined them in sympathy.

A Justice Department official said: "There were ready-made Molotov cocktails and other necessities."

At one stage several labour leaders threatened to broadcast their ultimatum to the Government over the local radio station, but they were arrested a little later.

In the meantime tourists crowded Grand Parade Airport for the flights to Curaçao.

Mr. de Kroon said he had ordered the fortifications to be manned and that he had ordered the stocks of clothing, sawing, flour, fuel and telephone sets and other supplies.

Violent sniping broke out in front of "Antilla House" in the capital between West Indian demonstrators and the police. People were injured on both sides. About 10 arrests were made.

A delegation handed in a petition calling for the resignation within 24 hours of the renegades on power and demanding the departure from Curaçao of all Dutch troops.

CZECH FLEES IN TANK

A young Czechoslovak soldier in a light tank crossed the frontier in a light tank near West-Schlag at the weekend and asked for political asylum, official sources said in Vienna on Sunday.

FEAR OF RIOTS STOPS U.S. ENVOY'S TRIP

Governor Nelson Rockefeller of New York was flying home yesterday after cancelling his visit to Caracas at the request of the Venezuelan Government.

Mr. Rockefeller, on the second of his 23-hour "listen and learn" tours to Latin America and the Caribbean has a Special Envoy for President Nixon, told a hastily-called Press conference "I regret this situation very much. I think it is very important for us to try to understand, especially in terms of United States public opinion, the possible reaction in our country to this resolution, and our efforts to the party with the question of the Pact would not help Prague Radio said.

The Government and his team of 20 experts were expected to arrive in Washington for consultations with President Nixon, who will be in Washington for only a few hours before flying to his mid-annual meeting with South American Presidents. They are staying in Colorado, South Dakota and California.

In Caracas, a spokesman for the Federation of Student Centres of the Central Universities of Venezuela said the Rockefeller visit would have "lit the match that burned the country from end to end".

The organisation has called off massive demonstrations, scheduled to mark Mr. Rockefeller's planned arrival.

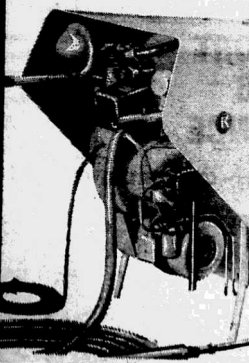

Each year the Greek taxpayer was perhaps the most ingenious dodger of all.

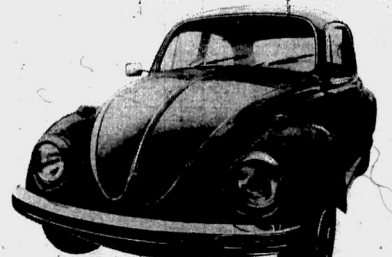

The total of income reported rocketed even more sharply. In 1966 this had been Drs. 2,945 million; in 1967 it jumped 44 per cent to 4,220 million. The 1968 total is expected to top 50 million drachmas, double an average cut in the income tax rate of 6.2 per cent.

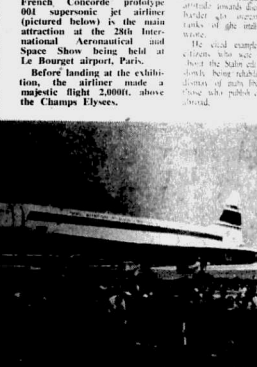

Speaking on the agreement between the National Development Corporation and United Transport Overseas Limited, he said the company had agreed to invest £125,000 in a proposed transport company which would be jointly owned by the N.D.C. and U.T.O.I.

Mr. Kahama said this company would transport tourists all over the country. It would be known as the Tanzania United Transport Company.

Speaking on agreements reached with six French national banks, he said the banks were prepared to finance any project in Tanzania.
