CAUTIONOUS REACTION TO SUMMIT PLEA

Britain and most of West Germany's partners in the European Community have reacted cautiously to a West German plea that Britain and the six hold a summit meeting in October to give a boost to European integration.
The proposal was aired as a matter for reflection by the German Foreign Minister, Mr. Willy Brandt, as the council of Western European Union (W.E.U.) - grouping Britain and the six - met in a two-day ministerial session in the Hague on Thursday, the first ever without France, its own ally without the W.E.U. for two months.
The Foreign Secretary, Mr. Michael Stewart, said Britain would not take such a conference unless it was accompanied by a proposal to take any formal steps at this stage, and warned that any such steps must be taken that could be justified in the event of a breakdown in the talks.
But he said a meeting of Heads of Governments and Foreign Ministers would be held in October or November after the West German general elections to discuss the problems posed by applications for E.E.C. membership a little more than two years ago by Britain and three other Western European countries.
Such a conference, which could be held in the Hague, should not be given any definitive political character, and should be held outside the framework of existing European bodies, he suggested.
The aim should be to work out procedures and a time-table for negotiations between the E.E.C. and the applicants (Ireland, Denmark, Ireland, Norway), defining key issues in such talks, which could be done in the fields of economic and political co-operation before the start of formal negotiations and mapping out a general working programme for co-operation in the future.
The Dutch Foreign Minister Mr. Joseph Luns, who chaired Thursday's meeting, told newsmen he felt the E.E.C. entry bid must be discussed in the E.E.C. Council. A seven-point summit such as the one proposed by Mr. Brandt must only deal with political co-

SHARP DECLINE IN GOLD PRICE

The sharp decline in the gold price continued yesterday with an 85 cent drop at the morning fixing to a 1969 low of 407 1/2 dollars per ounce after Thursday's record one dollar drop.
Dealers reported a moderate amount of selling orders from the Continent, in particular Zurich, after Thursday's plunge to 411 dollars - the lowest since last December - but which was partly offset by a recovery later in the day.
However, the offer was not matched by demand yesterday morning as buyers remained cautious.
From Tokyo, Japanese Finance Ministry sources reported that Japan had probably received South Africa's offer to sell gold.
The sources denied a report in the French newspaper L'Agence France Presse that South Africa may have sold up to 200,000 ounces in gold to Japan with the acceptance of the United States. — A.F.P.

The Mark of Good Taste

The Soviet Communist leader, Mr. Leonid Brezhnev, ignored an appeal for moderation by the Rumanian leader, Mr. Nicolae Ceausescu, and launched a slashing attack on China at the International Communist summit meeting in Moscow at the weekend.

In some of the most bitter language ever used by a Soviet leader in public against a fellow Communist country, Mr. Brezhnev charged Mao Tse-tung with advocating a world war, trying to organize armed conflicts in various parts of the world, and seeking to split the world Communist movement.

He reiterated long-standing Kremlin charges that China was preparing for war against Russia. After a delegate uttered the first criticism of China at the meeting, Mr. Ceausescu intervened to plead that third parties should not be

attacked. He said a continuation of anti-Peking polemics could jeopardize the success of the summit.

Mr. Brezhnev's attack, which took up about 15 minutes of the 40-minute speech on the third day of the summit, was the longest and most brutal of displeasure from the Rumanian delegation.

There was no immediate indication of a dramatic Rumanian walk-out from the meeting, officially aimed at working out unified action for that part of the Communist movement not allied with China.

The Soviet party leader introduced a radically new idea into Soviet policy towards China since the open break between the two countries shortly after the last such summit in 1960. But in the longest and fiercest criticism of China he has ever given, Mr. Brezhnev said that the Peking People's Daily newspaper called

on the Chinese people to prepare to wage both an ordinary and a great nuclear war with Soviet revisionism.

Mr. Brezhnev indicated that he did not take this very seriously by saying: "The Soviet Union is fully prepared even to fight for itself and the Soviet people have strong nerves and are not intimidated by shouting. But the direction of official Chinese propaganda speaks for itself."

Mr. Brezhnev also charged that Chinese soldiers were continuing to cross the Sino-Soviet border, but he gave no details.

Only last Friday Peking charged that Soviet troops were still shelling Chinese territory while a Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman countered by saying the Far East border situation was "absolutely quiet."

Mr. Brezhnev said the Chinese had had a great victory in the border dispute between the two countries.

To get the summit held at all, the Russians had to promise Rumania that the Chinese would have remained neutral in the Sino-Soviet dispute, that the conference would not be used to economically isolate China and that a condemnation of Peking would not be included in the main conference documents.

But Mr. Brezhnev, in what Soviet sources said was an answer to the Rumanian appeal, declared that he had had to change his mood about not dealing with the Chinese in recent times, notably the recent Congress of the Communist Party.

A new situation has arisen which has exceeded our expectations, and the influence of the entire international situation and on the conditions of the Communist Party of China.

The Polish Communist Party, Mr. Gomulka, told the conference that the political attitude of the Chinese had simply succeeded in driving China from the socialist camp and into isolation.

"We retain the hope and the conviction that, sooner or later, the Chinese Communists will reject the pernicious policies of the Mao group and that China will return to the family of the socialist countries and put an end to the division of the world into Communist and non-Communist spheres."

The conference formally condemned "heinous aggression against the Arab countries" as a gross violation of the national rights of the Arab and Palestinian peoples and of the U.N. charter.

The declaration was contained in a declaration jointly presented by the Arab and Israeli Communist parties, which was adopted at the plenary session of the conference.

The declaration said that Israel had committed "an overt aggression against the U.A.R., Jordan and Syria two years ago and since then Israeli landing circles, backed chiefly by American imperialism, world-wide reactionaries and Zionists agents" had continued the occupation of Arab territories seized at the time of the aggression.

C.I.A. LINKS 'CONFESED' BY GENERAL

A retired general and former mayor of Baghdad disclosed at the weekend in a television confession that he was an agent for the American Central Intelligence Agency (C.I.A.) responsible for facilitating the work of other C.I.A. agents and setting up a subversive network in Iraq.

Gen. Sirri was made contact with a C.I.A. agent while he was in the U.S. during the regime of Gen. Abdel Karim Qasbi in 1960.

Gen. Sirri was also opened for him to facilitate entry and travel in Iraq by American agents, he said in the broadcast.

"These agents" included a "Mrs. Burgh", who claimed to be a nurse, and a "Mr. Williams", who was presumably a news photographer, he said.

Some of the group's activities were attended by a delegation of Kurdish leaders, Mr. Mullah Mustafa al-Bakr, who was supposed to supply arms to the plotters.

'AGAINST GOD'S LAW'

Rhodesia's five Roman Catholic bishops have bitterly condemned Prime Minister Ian Smith's latest apartheid-style constitutional proposals as being "quite irreconcilable with God's law".

In a pastoral message, the bishops say the proposals are, in many respects, "completely contrary to Christian teaching".

They go on: "We must therefore reject them and for the benefit of our own people and all men of goodwill publicly condemn them."

The pastoral message declares that "the spirit of justice and fraternal charity, which is at the heart of our faith, can be fulfilled only by the permanent domination of one sect over the population of the other, in such a way that the practices of racial discrimination shall be intensified and the warranted privileges of one group consolidated at the expense of another."

The bishops say that such a policy is "irreconcilable with God's law".

In time to come, it must have the most tragic consequences for the country as a whole, they add.

"We cannot be silent when the moral issue of such extreme gravity is in question. The Church has the right to ask moral judgments even on matters touching the political order whenever personal bias or the desire for power makes such judgment necessary."

The bishops describe the proposals as "calculated to destroy every possibility of achieving the common good."

They say: "No one should be deceived by them. They offer a superficial but completely illusory hope of security for the future, but only breed hatred and violence. If they should be implemented in a new constitution, it will be extremely difficult for us effectively to counsel moderation to people who have been so patient for so long under discriminatory laws and are now presented with such extreme provocation."

The ruling Rhodesian Front party's new constitution is to be voted on by the predominantly White electorate in a referendum on June 20, along with the question of whether Rhodesia should become a republic.

Leading Protestant Churches have also expressed their opposition to the constitutional proposals, joint-pamphlet handed to Sunday Church-goers appealing for

Christian opposition acts. Proposals could be supported by God's rule all human beings, but the culture of Rhodesia has been destroyed.

The appeal urged Christians to support a constitution which would give the majority of Rhodesia's people the right to express their opinion by voting.

NAVIGATION TALKS AGREED BY PEKING

China has agreed to meet with the Soviet Union in Khabarovsk on June 18 to discuss navigation problems along Sino-Soviet frontier rivers, the New China News Agency announced at the weekend.

Khabarovsk is in the Soviet Pacific territory of the same name close to China's north-eastern province of Heilongjiang.

The Chinese co-chairman of the Sino-Soviet Joint Commission for boundary river navigation notified his Soviet counterpart that a ten-man Chinese delegation headed by Chang Chuan-shan will be dispatched to the Soviet city to attend the meeting, the 15th between the two countries.

Two of these rivers are the Amur and the Amur where, according to a Chinese protest note on Friday, shooting incidents have been in progress since this year.

The Chinese message represented an acceptance of the Soviet proposal on May 23.

The Chinese message said that the Soviet side, while proposing that the talks be held on June 18, again "stood fast" on the date and the location.

The Chinese side did not show the desire to hold the 15th meeting this year and that the 14th meeting in the Chinese city of Harbin in the year before ended up without any result, because the "Chinese side attempted to bring up questions which were not within the competence of the commission, but recalled."

He denied the Soviet allegation as "utterly groundless slander" and counter-charged that the Soviet side was entirely responsible for the failures by adopting an attitude of "big-power chauvinism".

The Chinese message charged that the Soviet Union was trying to "place obstacles in the way of the commission."

"If the Soviet side still has any sincerity for making the commission regular meeting a success, it must change its wrong attitude and earnestly discuss all the questions put forward by the two sides concerning navigation on the Sino-Soviet boundary rivers," it added.

The message did not specify the questions but said that during the 14th meeting in 1967 the Soviet delegation "refused to discuss and solve the questions advanced by the Chinese."

The joint commission meeting, though it might have led to an agreement along river frontiers between the two countries, is not empowered to deal with problems along the land border, the scene of many violent incidents.

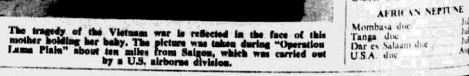

He said he was surprised when Dr. N. Nyumba told the House that the committee met for the first time in April this year. Teachers were 10 per cent justified in striking the Minister.

Public gaming machines again banned in Kenya

All public gaming machines operating in Kenya will be banned with effect from the end of this month, it was officially announced in Nairobi yesterday.

Owners of such machines intending to apply for the renewal of their licences for the year 1969-70 are advised that as their applications will not be accepted by the Kenya Betting Control and Licensing Board.

Making the announcement, the chairman of the board, Mr. Joseph Swaga Karuki, who is also Kenya Assistant Minister for Agriculture, advised owners of such machines to either destroy them or store them away.

The ban, he said, would not affect the Kenya Charity Sweepstake, tombola or raffles.

The ban follows a directive from the Government to the board of the latest Government policy on gaming machines. The directive was endorsed by the board on June 10.

The Vice-President, Mr. Muri, also made a statement in Parliament recently announcing that machines would be banned soon. He did not specify the date.

This is the second time the ban has been imposed by the Government. The first time was in 1967 when their operation was curtailed, save in the case of a few machines which were kept for the use of the Government.

Teachers' grievances

Why does the Ministry of Education and the union threaten to call its members out on strike? The last time this happened, the teachers' forced public sympathy because their threatened strike fell on the ears of exams. This time the support through the children suffer from closed schools. On the other hand, the teachers are entitled to be heard and satisfaction when their case is proved. It would go hard with any private employer, beyond the public sector, if this course of industrial relations were not followed.

As the responsible Minister, Dr. Kioko, has been expected to intervene long ago to restore more equitable relations. If the union says that the complaints have gone by default, it cannot be blamed. The Ministry of Education, however, has not been presented effectively to the teachers through its own representatives. The Ministry of Education details supervision falls to local authorities, but the Ministry of Education has not been made abundantly clear in its complaints to the Press and through the K.N.U.T. The present crisis was precipitated by frustration felt by representatives of the 40,000 teachers who are members of the K.N.U.T. because several grievances, dating back to 1967, have not been settled. Four major issues have been detailed by the union: delay in paying increased salaries recommended four years ago; refusal by the Teachers' Service Commission to discuss the Code of Regulations with union representatives; understaffing and lack of equipment in the schools. All of which add up to a loss of confidence in the Minister and his Ministry.

Moreover, there have been two recent examples of what do not materialise. The first was when headmasters were summoned to Nairobi to discuss secondary school entries, only to be peremptorily informed, by a notice pinned on the board, that the meeting was off. (Subsequently, examination dates were put back, until the order was cancelled by Dr. Kioko). The second was when the meeting of the Teachers' Service Remuneration Committee collapsed last Friday for want of a quorum, the Ministry's representatives having failed to arrive. 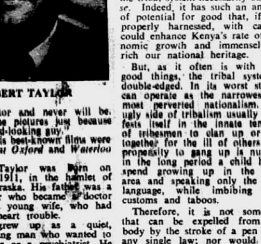

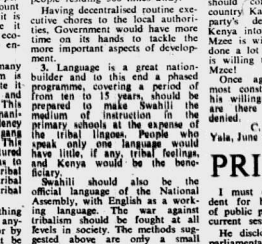

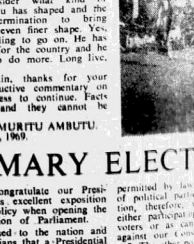

wants European defence body

At least 50 per cent of French voters would be in favour of defence and economic policy being handled by an integrated European Government, if Europe became a united political force, according to a public opinion poll published in Paris yesterday by the right-wing daily *Aurore*.

The poll, conducted by the French Institute of Public Opinion (I.F.O.P.), asked in its first question whether voters would be for or against — given that France being part of a united Europe in which various important political decisions were taken by a central authority, and that a European parliament would be set up to control the universal suffrage.

In reply to part (a), 47 per cent replied that they would favour a central authority and 23 per cent were against the idea. The same percentage favoured general election of the Parliament, and only 20 per cent opposed the suggestion.

To question two, which asked whether voters would be in favour of a united Europe — the voter would rather see certain decisions taken by Paris or European parliamentarians, the following results were obtained:

Fifty-two per cent wanted defence handled by a united European Government, 20 per cent against this proposal. Fifty per cent were in favour and 20 per cent against the handling of economic affairs by the European Parliament and 44 per cent would hand over national defence to Europe, while 25 per cent would rather see Paris maintain central control of diplomatic affairs.

Franco's interim President, M. Alain Poper, will be the ambassador to South Africa if chosen President in next Sunday's election, it is reported. His spokesman has said in Paris.

He was answering questions on the latest disclosure that France has built an air-to-ground missile capable of striking targets in the African continent. The system is now being tested in Algeria, said Gaullist former Premier, M. Georges Pompidou, the other main contender in the election, would, however, only make up his mind on the matter once election results are in, a source close to him. He would first have to study the files on the case.

M. Poper's spokesman said the Senate leader would abide by United Nations resolutions banning arms deliveries to South Africa.

M. Poper, who is now serving to support Franco in his battle with M. Pompidou for the Presidency, has repeated that he had refused to stand down after the first round of the election, but would show up in the first round of voting because "I am a Breton and therefore stubborn."

He was speaking in Dijon, Burgundy, on his first trip outside Paris to persuade Frenchmen to vote for him since the Presidential campaign began.

He told a 1,000-strong indoor meeting he represented "democratic France" and that he was insisting on running for President to disprove that "between Gaullist and Communism, there is nothing."

In the first round of the election, M. Poper won only about 25 per cent of the vote while M. Pompidou took 44.

M. Poper told the meeting: "Let me say this: facing Gaullism there is a democratic France, and that is my aim."

M. Pompidou earlier disclosed that if he were elected, he would quit the Gaullist U.D.R. party. "A chief of State belongs to no organisation," he said in an interview.

Since announcing his candidacy, he has not attended one meeting of the U.D.R., he added.

He also said that he did not think a President of France should stay in power for more than one seven-year term and declared France would always support the right of Israel to exist, though it would continue to clamp down its ban on arms deliveries to Tel Aviv, unless it turned out that the Arabs were exploiting it. — Agencies

Inquiry board inspects damaged Australian carrier

The U.S.-Australian board of inquiry into the *Scato Navy* exercise disaster in the South China Sea flew back to Subic Bay near Manila yesterday after a 14-hour stay in Singapore to look at damage to the Australian carrier *Melbourne*, dry-docked in Singapore following its collision with the U.S. destroyer, *Frank E. Evans*, which cost 74 American lives.

The six-man board, headed by the U.S. Rear Admiral Jerome H. King, were kept strictly away from the press during their short stay in Singapore. However, the six men, dressed in white rubber shoes, were seen on lower decks examining damage to the bows above and below the water-line.

They also were reported to have looked at charts aboard the *Melbourne* and other *Scato* exercise papers. No decision has yet been taken about when repairs will be carried out before the *Melbourne* returns to Sydney.

The board's chairman, Rear Admiral John (Butler) Crabb, the Australian flag officer aboard the *Melbourne* at the time,

told the board of the "many brave deeds" of the crew, some of whom leaped 45 feet from the carrier's flight deck into the sea to help rescue every man left alive.

Admiral Crabb also disclosed that the *Melbourne* could have been involved in an earlier collision during the 45-day "sea spirit" exercise, mounted by the *Scato*.

The *Melbourne* and another destroyer — later reported by U.S. Navy sources to have been the U.S. destroyer *Everett E. Larson* — had passed within 50 feet three days before the *Evans* collision.

Admiral Crabb told the board he had passed over tactical control to the captain of the *Melbourne*, John P. Stevenson, the night before the collision.

Capt. Stevenson is to be called later a witness.

Admiral Crabb said it was a standing instruction in the Australian Navy that destroyers should move away from the carrier and not turn across its course.

"The basic rule on a destroyer escort is that you turn away from a carrier and anybody who ignored it in the Australian Navy would be sacked on the spot," he said. — Agencies

PLEA FOR LIFE OF WOULD-BE ASSASSIN

The head of the Pan-Hellenic Liberation Movement (PAK) on Monday night appealed to all governments to intercede with the Greek authorities on behalf of Alekos Panagoulis.

Papandreou, a former Greek Minister now in Copenhagen, said on government "democratic political forces" and international bodies to help "save the life" of Panagoulis, who was recaptured by Greek police on Monday.

He demanded that the Human Rights Committee should be immediately allowed to visit Panagoulis and question him about "charges" he allegedly suffered in a British democratic party in Europe.

He said a representative to Greece to show the Greek people that democratic forces exist in Greece would be declared.

Papandreou said that Panagoulis had been sentenced to death for an attempt on the life of the Greek Premier before his jail escape last week, was the symbol of the Greek people's fight for freedom.

"The inhuman treatment which he has endured is the symbol of the oppression of the Greek nation," he added.

Greek authorities on Monday night exhibited Alekos Panagoulis after announcements that he had been captured in a four-floor Athens flat that afternoon.

Foreign correspondents, invited to a police station in the eastern part of Philadelphia, saw a bearded young man wearing a blue beret and dark blue trousers. His hands were free but guards held him by the shoulders.

He had shaved off the moustache he wore during his trial. Panagoulis, who is under a death sentence, escaped from Voyiatas Prison outside Athens before dawn last Friday. A reward of 500,000 drachmas (about £5,000) was posted for his capture and police announced a nationwide manhunt.

The Minister for Public Order, Mr. Panayiotis Tzevelokos, told newsmen the prisoner had been captured by surprise. No arms were found in the flat, which had two

other occupants, both missing. Panagoulis had put up no resistance.

A usually reliable source said earlier that security and police officers under Lt-Col. Panayiotis Mavridis surrounded the Kypseli district of Central Athens at midday, then closed in on the flat where an informant had said Panagoulis would be found.

The authorities have said that two guards fled with the prisoner on Friday morning. Sources said one of them, George Morakis, had telephoned police but was wanted to surrender.

Mr. Tzevelokos said Morakis had not yet been found.

In Rome, Panagoulis's brother Stathis said he had just received a letter from his mother, Mrs. Athina Panagoulis, saying she visited Alekos in his prison on June 4.

She wrote that he was in good physical condition and that his prison was permitted to use a bed, a chair and a table for the first time on May 8, the letter said. — Agencies

The Malawi Government has asked the Watch Tower Society, a Government spokesman said in Blantyre yesterday.

In October, 1967, Malawi had the Jehovah's Witnesses sect, which is backed by the American-based Watch Tower Society, because it was considered "dangerous to good governments of the State".

The spokesman said that the Watch Tower took action on the Watch Tower book "The Kingdom of God on Earth".

The ban followed reports that the central and northern provinces of the ruling Congress Party were withdrawing support from the movement.

Under the ban, eleven Ministers of the Government will be liable to resign prior to last Saturday.

The banning of the Jehovah's Witnesses also followed the condemnation of the sect by the Congress Party at its meeting in September, 1967, the party's Ministers challenged "lawful peace and calm which is essential for the smooth running of the State".

The Witnesses were accused of trying to "bring about the overthrow of the Government of Malawi" and of "inciting the people to violence".

After the banning of the sect were declared, the Government was planning to prohibit the activities of the Witnesses and to strip the sect were seized by the Government.

Plot to return Dr. Nkrumah denied

Leaders of Ghana's people's party have denied a report that they were planning to return Dr. Nkrumah back to power.

The party leader, Dr. Kwame Nkrumah, said in a press statement in Accra that the Government had ordered a search for a plot to return Dr. Nkrumah to power.

Miss Ann Barnett, who was ordained deacon this week, is also the first deaconess worker to dedicate much of her time to investigating the possibilities of Kenya women following in her footsteps and becoming actively involved with the church.

Her ordination as deacon, which took place last Sunday morning at All Saints' Cathedral, may well be marked as an important event in opening the door to women deacons in Kenya. Already there is a committee considering the possibility and deciding on a suitable course of training.

Miss Barnett has been in Kenya for ten years as a social worker with the Church Missionary Society, and before arriving in Kenya she was with the Near East Christian Council in Jordan. For the last 18 months, Miss Barnett has been studying theology in Kenya and in Britain, and feels that her ordination as deacon will help in furthering her social work in Kenya. "I have a high opinion of women of this country and feel they are equipped to play a leading role in every sphere of life, including the church," she explained. "They are already very aware of the social problems of this country, and have formed some very active women's organisations".

she went on, "would be mainly pastor and evangelist work, and assisting Christian women to bear the pressures of family life in a changed society."

Now that she has studied theology, Miss Barnett feels she can bring her social concerns more nearly into the life and work of the church.

Her work in Nairobi's Punwani location has helped her understand the social problems of the country and fit her for her new role of ministering the social concerns of women in Kenya so that they will be encouraged to face their problems and tackle them in a practical way.

All present religious training is carried out in Kenya for male deacons. If it is decided to provide training for women it would probably follow the same lines as that already being undertaken. Each bishop in each diocese would then be required to recommend a suitable woman for training.

"But we have to overcome a lot of obstacles in training women for the church," Miss Barnett said. "Most apparent of these is of course the fact that it is against African customs for women to participate in church life."

"This is a pity, for there are certain aspects of church work that women deacons could handle better than men. There is no question of women competing for equality with men in the church; there is a room for both."

580 ways to use a hairpin

Anyone who says diamonds are a girl's best friend is talking through her hat. The real answer, in case you didn't know, is . . . the hairpin. This ubiquitous implement has for years been concealing its true talents. If you still think of a hairpin as being something that collects by the thousand in hairdressing salons, it only goes to show how unobservant you really are.

It has taken a fully fledged survey in America to rescue the hairpin from its anonymity and do for it what a similar investigation in Britain did for the paper clip a year or two ago.

As a result among office workers, you remember, showed that only one paper clip in three actually did any useful work other than making miniature catapults to mending fuses.

Needless to say, the hairpin takes record standing. When a thousand American women were recently asked what they actually used hairpins for, they came up with a staggering 580 different answers.

Clips for letters and office memoranda, book markers, key rings, pop-jar-cord threads — the list is endless, and its ingenuity boggles the mind. Some, for example, would imagine a hairpin forming a useful service in the kitchen sink? Or being used to anchor Christmas decorations?

They are, apparently, indispensable. Little bits that have a habit of being on hand.

The younger generation may scorn them, but the chances are that they'll find one in a handbag or pocket.

Secretaries have devised a whole new hairpin line. It is pressed into service for a dozen different functions — from stirring a bottle of clogged nail-varnish to anchoring down the boss's car when he is dashing off to a director's dinner.

Since Britain alone turns out some 600 tons of hairpins every year, that makes an enormous number of blocked sinks and unthreaded pyjama cords, all the way from Finland to Fiji. Sometimes they are even used for pinning hair, which is leading manufacturers to wonder whether blonde is a dying race.

Of all the different coloured pins made to match varying hair colours, those that are selling best are blonde and grey. But there has been an unexplained increase in the brown and brunette varieties.

Incidentally, the most profitable use to which a hairpin has been put was the work of an American, Saul Crossley. He used it to make himself a fortune.

THE PILL IS CUTTING THE BIRTH RATE IN JAMAICA

Jamaican women tend to be casual in affairs of the heart and when family planning methods are getting acquainted with new patients they ask the woman how many children she has before they ask if she is married.

The reason, according to a Population Council team, is that usually only 23 per cent of the women are married. Most are "single, common law" or "visiting" — the latter apparently meaning a more or less steady boy friend.

But she traditional Jamaican policy of "Love now, pay later" is on the wane. Birth control is

making steady headway on the island. Last year 20,000 women visited family planning centres. About 75 per cent of them decided to take the Pill. The rest chose other contraceptive methods.

That is more than Jamaica's birth rate has dropped to 1.84 per cent. In 1966 to 1967 last year, the birth rate was 2.44 per cent.

Jamaica already has 100 family planning clinics and even plans has one now being opened.

Britain recently by a group of Irish doctors who feel there is a great need for such an institution

in Dublin, because many families suffer health and economic difficulties because of lack of knowledge of family planning.

Most of the Dublin clinic's new patients are those for whom the rhythm method — the only method of birth control approved by the Roman Catholic church — has failed, or those who are medically unable to bear further children.

When patients have strong religious principles they are told how to use the rhythm method more effectively. Others are advised to use the Pill.

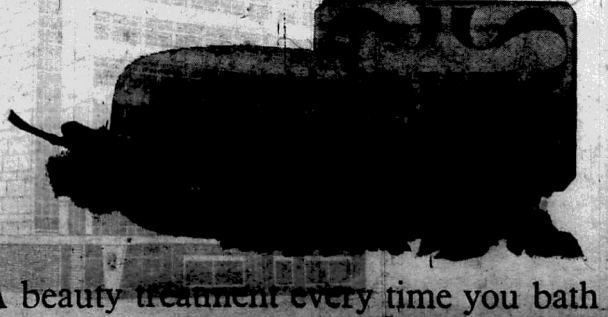

We are sitting at the foot of the famous Mitla Pass in the new tent of Sheikh Abdul Hammad of the Tarabin tribe of Sinai Bedouins.

A more significant warning to the Government had been sounded this year with the success of the radical weekly newspaper *Abeng*. It claims a circulation of 20,000 after only 15 weeks of publication, a large figure on an island of fewer than 2,000,000 people.

The newspaper's success has caused the Black slaves sounded in the springing against the British long ago. Garvey is the paper's chief hero, for its writers argue there is nothing to choose between the Prime Minister, Mr. Hugh Shearer, and the new opposition leader, Mr. Michael Manley.

In Mr. Shearer's words, these radicals are "irrelevant, pushing causes, voting shoguns they have adopted from elsewhere (the United States). We have a Black Government, we have got to get it out of our hands."

Others are not all sure the *Abeng* writers are irrelevant. While

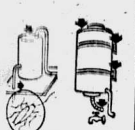

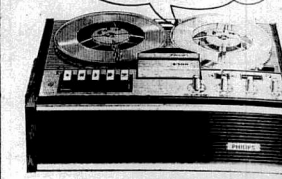
