Kenya lion's victim was trail-blazer for Zambia copper riches

George Grey was eaten by a lion in Kenya more than 60 years ago. But how from Zambia makes a postscript to his brief career as one of Africa's leading trail-blazers.

Kansanshi Copper Mine is expected to be re-opened.
George Grey was the man who came across the astonishing Kansanshi mine one day in September, 1899, and launched a new era of copper production in Africa under the White man's rule. Kansanshi itself had had a bizarre history since 1899. But it heralded the opening up of the great copper mines of the Congo and Zambia. Today they produce more than a million tons of metal a year.

Grey's mine lies near what is now the Congo's eastern border and west of the Zambian Copperbelt. Its discovery amazed White prospectors in Africa, for this was the biggest pre-European mine they had seen in Central Africa.

Digging for malachite "green" ore was five miles across, and thousands of tons of ore had been removed from the extensive trenches and great shafts some of them over 100ft deep.

Huge, mature trees growing from the abandoned shafts indicated that mining had flourished here long before the arrival of the first Portuguese and the Arab slave-traders in the middle of the 19th century.

A few years after Grey's find, a new shaft was cut through 300 miles of forest and fifteen-foot high anti-bulldozing equipment was used. The herds of elephants, lion and buck and the White man's mining and smelting equipment was brought in.

Grey had prospected for Tanganyika Concessions, under the régime of the British South Africa Company of Cecil Rhodes. The equipment was brought in from the railway which had been pushed northwards from the Victoria Falls as an extension of Rhodes' Capro-Cairo dream.

When war broke out in 1914, the smelting at Kansanshi ceased. A set of official records states that 2,576 tons of copper had been produced, valued at £156,693.

The title to the mine was closed when a Government official caught sleeping sickness in the area, and the mine lay idle until 1952. More than a hundred Europeans and 2,000 Africans were employed at the mine now.

Brick houses were built, shafts with elephant grass gardens and tennis courts were laid out and shops opened to cater for the families of the miners.

Nearly 10,000,000 tons of ore were developed, then water flooded the deep shafts and once again it became necessary to close the mine.

The Anglo-American Corporation reclaimed the mine in 1952, but though much water had been pumped out earlier, by 1954 three million gallons a day was flowing into the main shaft and at intervals over the next few years the mine had to close.

Finally, a great flooding disaster in 1957 put an end to all operations. Kansanshi became a ghost town, its buildings indistinguishable from the wild bush. A few tenacious lemon trees survived in what had

once been a garden, but the tennis courts were soon invaded by bush plants.

"Elephant grass grew tall around the mine and hid the workers who were rescued from one of Grey's shafts and buried by a landslide in the mementoes by miners of another era."

The first miners of all at Kansanshi had been African women. Their shafts cut out the shafts with picks, then the women went underground on rope ladders.

Bundles of dried grass were burnt to give light, and the rock proved too hard for the women to break with their picks, they cracked it by burning wood on top.

The ore was hauled up in bark buckets to be hand-carried by women and children, then washed in the river before being smelted.

The second of the smelting ritual were guarded rigorously by the tribe and were surrounded by mystery and taboo.

Before work began, the miners prayed to the spirits of former chiefs. "You have prospected us, you have opened the inside of the mountain for your children, grant us the favour of finding treasure there."

The master smelter was forbidden to have intercourse with his wife the night before smelting took place, otherwise the metal would be spoilt.

He bathed his hands and face in a potion made from bark by the witch-doctor. Then he built his furnace from anti-hill soil reinforced with sticks.

TANZANIA FREE VISITS TO PARKS TEACH VALUE OF WILDLIFE

BRIAN MANN'S reports from Arusha

While Tanzania's National Parks are making in world-wide acclaim and visitors safari by land, sea and air to enjoy the spectacle of wildlife in unparalleled surroundings, an education programme to bring home the importance of the parks to Tanzanians is gathering momentum.

The National Parks is gathering momentum. Under an education scheme, is introducing both present citizens and those of tomorrow to the wonders of the wildlife and at the same time instilling a pride in one of the country's finest resources and an understanding of the need to preserve this heritage from the worst elements of modern society.

For many years the director, Mr. John Owen, and his staff have been concerned that Tanzanians should appreciate the need for conservation and in 1961 an education officer was appointed to set up an education programme to cover the country.

From the beginning the programme financed by the Ford Foundation of America was seen as a dual approach to the country firstly by instilling organised groups, especially schoolchildren to visit the parks.

The second approach has been to bring the parks to the people so that even in distant areas people who would probably never visit a park could gain some idea of the need for conservation.

With aid from the Municipal Foundation, a Land-rover was bought and fitted out as a complete mobile film projector unit and under the charge of the organisation's Information Officer, Mr. A. O. Odoro, the film show has travelled extensively throughout the country and reached an audience estimated so far at 200,000.

About half a dozen films are currently being used and a new one, "Uchurri Naarshi", featuring the various uses of land in Tanzania, has recently been completed. Made entirely in Tanzania and with a Swahili soundtrack, the film shows that land set aside for parks is being used wisely and economically.

As well as film shows, officers are given talks and even if for many it is a "night" more than a "night out" there is an atmosphere of goodwill.

But it is in the parks themselves that the organisation is making its strongest bid to educate its citizens. Men, women and children are given talks and schoolchildren who book themselves on the "night out" are accommodated free of charge in

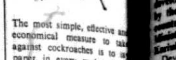
tables with simple cooking and eating equipment. They have to provide their own food and bedding.

Each hostel has a projection room with a sound projector and supplies of films.

But the amount of solid education, especially for schoolchildren, is kept to a minimum and the National Parks believe that a child who is enjoying himself on an eye-opening holiday is more likely to retain vivid memories than by sitting too long watching films or a blackboard.

The practical results of this attitude are piles of enthusiastic essays and paintings from children arriving at the National Parks offices. A small prize, usually a book on wildlife, is given to the best effort from each school party.

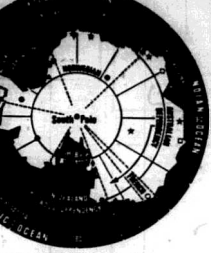

Violence in Asia - problem facing many nations

The racial violence that raged in Malaysia recently could happen anywhere in Asia, especially in developing countries with a high percentage of Chinese population.

Many Filipinos believe the loyalty of quite a number of Chinese residents in the Philippines will be influenced by political events and the shifts in the balance of power in Asia.

The last conference of South-East Asia Treaty Organization delegates at Bangkok decided to keep growing conviction among the present members that the Asian

countries themselves, sooner or later, will have to form a new security grouping without the Western powers. Asian and Pacific countries will form a mutual defense treaty for their mutual protection.

Such a security organization is likely to include, besides the present Asian members, Malaysia, Indonesia and Singapore and possibly Taiwan, South Korea and New Zealand.

It is generally assumed that this mutual defense alliance would displace, if not just from external attacks but from internal subversion.

Many of the Chinese residents in the Philippines were not well-to-do but middle class, engaged in various professions and trades.

The Chinese were so deeply rooted in the retail business and in the marketing of the nation's main staple foods, particularly rice and sugar, that they could starve the masses and choke the economy if they choose to.

In 1956, therefore, the Philippine Congress passed a law liquidating the Chinese-owned retail business.

But Chinese business men are so versatile that they have turned to retailing or merchandising.

Philippine policy-makers hope to solve the Chinese problem eventually through assimilation of legitimate Chinese residents who have made this country their home and do not desire to return to the mainland.

Ghana on the road back

Chane stands out as one of the bright spots of a troubled continent. It is the only country where order is being restored by a leader and people are preparing for another democratic election in the national referendum credit on their discipline and common sense.

After three years of military rule since the overthrow of the autocratic Dr. Kwame Nkrumah in 1966, a general election is to be held on August 29 which will return the country to civilian rule under a democratic parliamentary system. It will be the first real election to be held since Ghana became Africa's first republic in 1946.

Voting will be completed on the day, instead of being spread over a whole week as in the past; and the Army will remain in control during the election and for a month afterwards. This is a wise precaution, to allow the process of forming a civilian government to go ahead in orderly fashion before the formal handover to the politicians takes place on September 1.

There is no need to doubt the motives of the National Liberation Council, which has kept its hand on the reins of the country to civil rule, even though the timing of the event has been delayed. The disarming of the Nkrumah government was forced to resign after admitting he had been involved in illegal fund-raising activities with foreign firms, was a setback. It is apparent that the general hoped to retain his post as President within a political system.

No such suspicion attaches to his youthful successor, Brig. A. A. Afrifa. Since he took over from Mr. Ankrah he has not wavered in his determination to carry out the timetable for the elections, but has taken firm action to prevent further financing of politicians or others from outside Ghana.

Well-known leaders of pre-Nkrumah days have reappeared. The Progress Party is led by Dr. Kofi Busia, the former Opposition leader and chief opponent of the deposed President. Dr. Busia has a good chance of gaining the post — though not the same sweeping powers — of the man who forced him into years of exile.

Mr. Joe Appiah, son-in-law of the eminent British statesman, the late Sir Stafford Cripps, and another victim of the Nkrumah regime, leads the Nationalist Party; and the former Opposition leader Gbedemah leads the National Alliance of Liberals. Mr. Gbedemah was one of Dr. Nkrumah's senior Ministers and figured in the headlines some years ago over a gold bond issued by his wife.

He suffered the general disapprobium meted out to the Nkrumah Ministers, but has been rehabilitated and is campaigning vigorously. Significantly, perhaps, his N.A.B. has three of his old Ministerial colleagues as prominent members — Mr. Alex Quaison-Sackey, once Foreign Minister, Mr. Kwaku Bonsu; and Mr. Bauniwa.

But the one party which has been banned from taking part in the elections on the grounds that it intended to restore Dr. Nkrumah to power and was

thus "not in Ghana's interests" is the Ghana People's Party. Another party based on the fair measure of support in the Action Party, but it is exposed to present a major challenge to Dr. Busia and Mr. Gbedemah. There are several other minor groupings.

With the exception of the ban on the neo-Nkrumah party — which is justified on security grounds as feelings against the exiled President are still strong — all political activity is going on in complete freedom.

Breakthrough in bilharzia diagnosis

A young French biologist has after five years of research succeeded in drawing up a diagnosis for bilharzia, a disease afflicting more than 250,000,000 people, mainly in Africa. This, on Tuesday, in Lyons, France, was disclosed by the scientist Dr. Michel Pothier, 28, a specialist in the study of parasites at the Lyons University Medical Faculty.
