# No relief for fire danger until shanties go

The Government is anxious to find a solution to the problem of shanty towns but, while it continues to ignore by neglect and build them, there will be the hazard of fire disaster, an Assistant Minister for Local Government, Mr. Mwanjama, told the National Assembly last night.

He was replying to points raised by Mr. E. E. Kibuka (Kauu) who had been asked to inquire into the fire disaster which occurred at 4,500 people left homeless in the shanties.

Mr. Lubembe said he had spent six months at Kaburiri. His calculations showed that 156 houses, each with an average of seven people, were destroyed. If each of the 1,092 rooms held an average of five persons, that meant that 6,460 people were left homeless.

They have lost all their money in the disaster. He believed that the total cost of the property and possessions lost in the fire was no way in any way met by the Government and that this was why the people of Kaburiri are appealing to the Government to do something to help them. He said that the Government is trying its best to help those people who have been appointed a Commission of Enquiry. The Ministry of Local Government should try its best to see if anything can be done at all.

He said that the city council had ordered the people to build their shanty houses but that the people have not been repatriated, what are we going to do about sheltering these people, the old people and the young?

Mr. Lubembe suggested that a committee of Members of Parliament from both provinces be set up to advise the Government on how best they could do that.

### Ministerial gratuities

What the Speaker challenged in Kenya's National Assembly was not the existence (for otherwise) of Ministers and Assistant Ministers to their gratuities, but payment before authorisation in the House.

With that exemplary regard for constitutional procedure which characterises Mr. Slade's conduct of the House's affairs, he stated that, as the Government had not undertaken to make any attempt to get this unauthorized expenditure put right by the authority of this House, within the same financial year, it will become a deliberate excess of payment which represents contempt of the constitutional authority of the House.

As an impartial arbiter from the Chair, Mr. Speaker is not involved in politics, nor is he expected to influence the country's debate and the voting, other than to ensure constitutional practice and to uphold the dignity of the National Assembly as the paramount authority.

He acted according to the obligations of his high office in directing the attention of the House to what has occurred. Moreover, he asked the Auditor-General to furnish a report in his earliest convenience. In the report, he was misheard in the Press Gallery and incorrectly reported in the *East African Standard* as calling on the Attorney-General for the report. Regret is expressed to both Mr. Slade and Mr. Njonjo for this error.

A keen controversy has continued for some considerable time over what has come to be known as the Gratuity Bill. Like the M.P.s, public opinion, as expressed by readers, is divided. Not everybody, by any manner of means, is against these gratuities.

Opponents ask why Ministers and their Assistant Ministers should expect payment in addition to their salaries and maintain this as an unpropitious time to stake the claim. In view of the deficiency in school equipment and the unsatisfied estimates of last year, having particular reference to any payments in respect of gratuities, not expressly authorised by House.

What remains to be done? In view of the years that Ministers have rendered invaluable service to the country, before and since independence, so that they have been able to acquire on top of salary, pursuing this line, private firms pay gratuities to contract staff who are not pensionable. In view of the insecurity about the tenure of Ministerial posts, which are subject to political and other shifting winds, it is reasonable to recompense Ministers in a similar manner?

Suppose the last point is accepted, are the gratuities in the private sector as taxable, so the Exchequer also benefits; and seldom are they put into a special fund, but are paid out of ordinary revenue, whereas the Ministerial ones are 20 and 10 per cent.

On balance, an amount of "topping up" seems justified for those who have served the country well, bearing in mind, also, that some may lose their appointments and have to seek jobs outside politics. As to timing, it was previously considered by most people that the Bill had to go through before the end of the present Parliament and before the forthcoming elections. Now it has become clear there is another reason to regularise payment.

Many M.P.s heard the Speaker's statement with anger, calling on the Ministers, and the Government to resign. As the Speaker pointed out, the Government would be expected to resign only after an express vote of no confidence, tabled with four days' notice. He did not consider the rejection of a certain amount of money by the House serious enough to merit a mass resignation.

Through the Assistant Minister for Finance, Mr. Balala, the Government accepted an amendment to the motion, requesting approval of £41,185,312 for necessary expenditure, reducing the figure by £1,185,312, with the provision that any amount which did not imply approval of any item which did not appear in the original estimates of last year, having particular reference to any payments in respect of gratuities, not expressly authorised by House.

### Ballooning to take first aerial picture of Nairobi in 1909

In three days' time it will be July 1909. That first aerial picture has been photographed from this side and the other side; the world has been photographed. It is like making it look like a blood red, the coloured marble we played with when young.

Aerial photography is not a new invention; indeed much was made of it during the First World War. But comparatively speaking the art is new.

I wonder if anyone knows when the first aerial photograph was taken in Kenya? Just five to three days ago and you have the date: July 1909. It was on that day that a man in a balloon, who had a camera, flew over Nairobi and took the picture.

That photograph is historic. It is probably in the archives of the Boyce family at Chicago and it was the first aerial picture of Nairobi. It was taken by a famous naturalist, Mr. E. A. Mearns, by the way, was a millionaire newspaper proprietor and it was on his instigation that the picture was taken.

The whole idea of the Ballooning Expedition was to take still and movie pictures of animals on the ground. The project was doomed. Soon after the original expedition camp moved to the top of the Rift.

And so the balloons went home. Somewhere perhaps are those first and later aerial pictures taken from the air on July 1, 1909.

The East African Flying Doctor Service flown its millionth mile in bringing aid and comfort to thousands of sufferers in all parts of East Africa.

The picture above of a Flying Doctor aircraft about to land at a desolate airstrip, greeted by just two dogs, seems to epitomise the atmosphere in which this work is conducted: Quietly, efficiently, and usually unpublicised.

The service is, however, in danger of slipping into a financial barrier which may one day cause the limitation of its work. To get out about the service and how its stands, Larry Ruddock spent a day at the Flying Doctor Service's headquarters at Nairobi's airport.

The Flying Doctor Service of the African Medical and Research Foundation has just flown its millionth mile. One day last week the organisation's Medical Director, Mr. Michael Wood, flew a child into Nairobi's Wilson Airport marking this significant event in the Service's 10th year of operation.

It was in May 1957 that the late Sir Archibald MacIndoe, the famous work in rebuilding the burned faces of crabled warms R.A.F. flying crews, visited East Africa with Dr. Thomas Kees, a plastic surgeon from New York.

In conversations with Mr. Michael Wood it was agreed that there was a great need for a voluntary agency to carry on medical

work in East Africa in conjunction with the Government service. The formation of the African Medical and Research Foundation soon followed and three boards were established to initiate such a service; one in New York, one in London and one in Nairobi. Since then other committees have been established in West Germany, Switzerland and the Netherlands.

The Foundation, which works in close co-operation with the three East African Governments, then started its Flying Doctor Service and set up the complementary radio network. Since then the demand for the flying doctors' service has always been increasing, so much so that although there is no crisis at the moment, the cash position is, so to speak, within walking distance.

The health education adviser, Mr. Bernard Shaw, said that last year it cost £73,000 to run the service and if we do all the work we expect to do this year it will cost £80,000.

Mr. Shaw said that one of the reasons being considered is a request to those donors, private persons and firms who regularly make donations to give the service one final but considerable sum. These, lumped together, will form an endowment fund to turn the bank balance into healthy black figures and the service can work on the interest.

"We have specialists, plastic surgeons, working for something like £2,000 a year, not paid by us. The eye surgeon is paid from Holland and an American surgeon is paid by C.A.R.E. in America. They could get ten times that amount back in the States or Europe. In the main we are a voluntary service providing specialist care which no country could pay for at this stage of development."

While the service did take on a great deal of emergency work its prime function was making a doctor available to anybody who needs one, and taking doctors into the bush on

while this was not the main function of the East African service. It was said of the Australian service that it had "cut a swathe of safety over the Continent". He was sure the East African service was doing the same.

Mr. Wood went on: "I estimate that we are running our service at about a quarter of the cost of the Australian service."

Apart from Australia there were also flying doctor services in Alaska, the Falkland Islands, and Zambia. There did not appear to be much call for it in Uganda as ground communications there were good.

The combination of radio, light aircraft and helicopters had completely revolutionised air medical services in Vietnam. The Americans could get their men out of the bush after they had been wounded within 20 minutes, then, even in the last war, they would probably have died just because of the time factor.

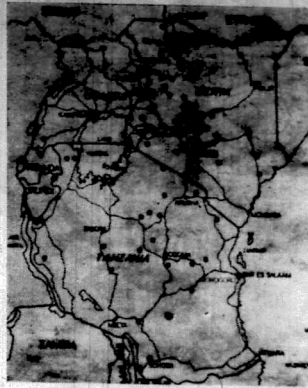
"We carry out four or five emergency flights if we do anything from air bases in the N.F.D. to car accidents at Mt. Kenya. We sent two planes there the other week to pick up four people hurt in an accident. We do sometimes

help those who come to Africa to do a safari. Although we were here to help the African people, mainly if anyone gets into trouble in the bush the obvious thing to do is pick them up by plane."

Then there was the health education. Although it was not as glamorous as air rescue it was just as important. "I consider preventive medicine the most important thing we can do. We try to run a balanced programme in curative and preventive medicine, both at the centre and on the periphery. Although I am a great believer in preventive medicine, I also believe that unless you are seen to be doing curative medicine the health education programme will be an uphill struggle."

Mr. Wood is acting chairman of the Prevention of Blindness Committee, an advisory body to the Ministry of Health on eye problems. The service has its own eye project and works with the Government Eye Department.

Most of Kenya's blind were probably in the rural areas where their eyes have gradually failed through trachoma, cataracts or injuries. There were some places where the incidence of trachoma was 100 per cent. He hoped that if

the Government would allow it a question could be put on the form for the next census, asking information from people who were blind or relatively blind. The cure for trachoma was basically a question of hygiene, cash and education.

On disease eradication Mr. Wood said the answers which would enable the epidemic and other diseases of Africa to be wiped out would be found in the laboratory.

Laboratory personnel had to be fed with the right kind of information from the field to enable them to solve these problems. The big problems were malaria, bilharzia, amoebic dysentery, tuber-

culosis and malnutrition. Mr. Wood continued: "I estimate during the war, that took a surgical degree and it was one that I started being taken about 10 years ago. I might just as well fly myself and so I learned it."

routine trips so that they could arrive fresh and able to carry out operations or other medical services without strain or loss of efficiency. It avoided the waste of a skilled surgeon's manpower by having him spend four days of a working week in a wagon.

During 1968 surgeons on flying safaris visited 184 hospitals, saw 6,234 surgical cases and performed 2,118 operations. More than 15 hospitals at the periphery were visited and more than 72 operations were performed each month.

Basic statistics are inadequate to describe the detailed work of the surgical field. In addition to medicines, supplies, drugs, and spares were air-lifted and the service carried out a programme of medical training.

Mr. Wood said the service had kept expanding over the past ten years and its personnel would continue to see that it expanded much further if this was needed, but it would mean more and greater support from more than one direction.

On Africanisation, Mr. Wood said he thought the organisation should become fully Africanised and such a programme was being pursued.

"But, in the case of pilots and doctors, we cannot yet offer that. There is contract work, of course, but many African doctors want to go into Government or private practice so that they can see themselves building up a firm life. We, at the present time, cannot see far enough ahead to start thinking about pension schemes and the like."

Does the East African Flying Doctor Service use anything in the Australian Flying Doctor Service?

"Yes indeed," said Mr. Wood. "I have been twice to Australia since at the invitation of the Australian Government. I went to compare the technical side of it in Sydney. I went to Darwin and spent a week going with them, studying their way of working, what the operating costs of the radios and planes were and by other means. There are differences between the two organisations."

Australia is a rich country with a small population. East Africa is not a rich country and we have a big population.

Australia used its service primarily as an emergency service.

Supervision is one of the big problems facing the blood transfusion authorities in Kenya, according to Miss Anna Young, publicity officer of the Kenya Blood Transfusion Research Fund.

# Sleepers awake when it's bongo time

Midnight at Treetops. Propped on one elbow in a comfortable chair, you can see through the window a large cow rhino perched on the salt lick just 40ft. or so below. There's another rhino, a shadowy shape, out in the mud. It might be, but there's not much water just now. To the left, a small herd of buffalo are lying in a circle. A giant hog roars across the open-air stage, then exits right where headlights fade into the "wings" of a woodland night. It's even like this for an hour or so, with few changes in the scene as good a time as any to call it a day, in the few minutes sleep — with a stern self-admonition to be up before sunrise — a final hour of earnest photography by flashlight.

Why did the elephants have to come back now? If only those rhinos would move away! Scoury reward for two sets of unstimulating performers who have filled the evening hours with a non-stop spectacle, lumbering, jostling, frolicking and doing what comes naturally. But all eyes are on the bongo — *Procyon curvipes* in the reference books — "extremely shy animals which are seldom observed under ordinary circumstances". The magic of the bongo lies in this. Carbo reputation. Handsome as it is, it is not so unlike other antelope. It is not even rare. There are believed to be four sizable concentrations in Kenya — in the forests of Mount Kenya, the Aberdares, South-west Mau and the Cherangani (though there has been heavy poaching in the latter).

The Aberdares herds were sadly depleted by forest fighters during the Emergency, but now seem to be back to strength. The Director of Kenya's National Parks, Mr. Perce O'Nolan, also watching from the verandah, mentions that Sgt. Karau of the Aberdares National Park had seen a herd 100-strong a week or two earlier. You're never likely to have that kind of luck. After all, many of Kenya's professional hunters have never seen a bongo in a lifetime in the wild. The first one recorded at Treetops was in 1961 and the following year six were recorded on one day. But in the last few months they seem to have developed a liking for the place and have appeared often. A month ago 13 rhinos were killed in a fight with a rhino under the artificial moonlight. Now the four are moving off again into the forest and the break out and guests begin to shuffle back to their rooms — including two women who in a fit of ecstasy had been jiggling in their nightdresses with cries of "At last, at last — I've seen a bongo". Back to bed. But at 2 a.m. up again. Eight bongos this time and one moves boldly to the middle of the salt-lick, an unforgettable sight. This completes the pageant and it means that back in Nairobi next day the Treetops scoreboard in York Street will record that guests on June 20, after the Vice-President had opened the hotel extensions, saw among lesser breeds, 40 elephants, 13 rhino, 247 buffalo — and eight bongos. A memorable day — and a spellbinding night. Three hours uninterrupted sleep. Then you're unaccountably awake, of your own accord, at 3.30 a.m. and doggedly getting dressed. The

phenomenon of Treetops, still unique despite its imitators. The first house, in a giant mugumo tree, was built in 1932 in a private hidey-hole by Mr. and Mrs. Eric Sherbrooke Walker. It was that the animals would be undisturbed by the scent of humans kept above them, and if they happened to notice movement in the trees they would put it down as some new kind of pink-baby monkey. Do the animals like that there's something different from the rest of the forest at Treetops? One wonders. They behave naturally enough and follow the jungle law, buffaloes shooing off the back rhinos scattering the buffalo and elephants forcing the rhinos to give way — though the rule is sometimes reversed when a certain tall cow rhino digs her formidable heels in the mud. But one elephant had a penchant for wandering from the herd to stand directly below the visitors verandah with trunk raised — like a ringmaster soliciting applause for the act behind him.

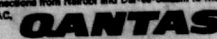

one topic of controversy that is becoming a hard nut to crack is the "intruder" Bobby Shaftoe who was Bobby Shaftoe anyway?

It is fair to Bobby Shaftoe, who could say that folk-singing is the most relevant part of the world's song that varies in content from the irrelevant to the wonderful to the downright boring — in other words, more than the joy of singing a song that is also experienced by the people whose minds are not so complicated politically.

Experts tell that there is a distinct family relationship between folk songs from various

parts of the world which is not influenced by contact between those who sing them.

Pablo Robson, who collected folk songs from many countries, points out vocally and could spend a great deal of time in a political and highly entertaining manner on the subject of folk songs. The name Bobby Shaftoe, which appears in many of the folk songs, is as yet very great many interesting, and there are a number of books which have been written about it in Kenya without seeming out of place.

This is not to mention those references to almost any society. It has been noted recently, for instance, that relevance, Shaake, there still Kenya. Why are there still Shakespearean produc-

But it is also because Shakespeare is robust — in his humour, in his tragedy and in his action. He offers a glorious opportunity to let off steam, to feel larger than life and generally to feel young people lively. This is what makes him so popular.

There have been occasions in which he has become so popular, however, that the safety of actors in the more violent scenes of all this may not be taken for granted. This is what suggests that those who want to bring "culture" up to date, by following up his traditions, or put up with him!

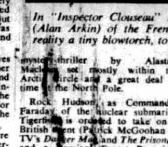

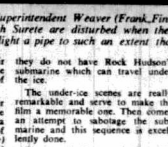

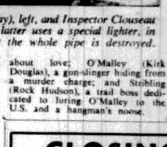

SINGLES THAT TOP the charts

Only a few weeks after its release, Elvis Presley's latest, In the Ghetto, is already climbing the charts and should soon be popular in East Africa.

This is something new for Elvis - a song with a message. It tells the story of a youngster's life in the Negro slum quarters of Chicago, the bitterness it generates, and ends with him being gunned down in a street battle.

The song has an almost gospel flavour, and represents Elvis's launching into the protest song.

Plenty of excitement in the latest number by the American group Three Dog Night called simply One. There is a forceful vocal from the leader of the group, supported by a rattling piano and a raucous guitar.

The Monkees have not had a big hit recently, and their latest, Someday Man, may have disappointed. Their new single seems to have improved at the expense of their commercial success.

Fans who admired the Marmalades' Ob-la-di Ob-la-da Beatle number which enjoyed such popularity over here, will be pleased to know that their follow-up is likely to have equal success.

But his latest release Don't Cry, My Angelina sounds as if it may have the right formula - a sing-along ballad starting off with a gentle background which swells later to a full orchestra accompaniment.

Another group which seems to be falling in popularity and its style improves as the Kinks. If it is the Kinks' style generally that is falling from favour, their latest release, Drivein', may not save them.

# Aniseed sauce can get your dinner talked about

She loves entertaining and is one of the best cooks I know, and Mrs. Maureen Metzger rarely has a dinner party in her own home. The August Moon Caterers, of which Mrs. Metzger is catering director, demands part of her time in organising the food for other people's dinner parties.

**Carrot Soup:** 2½ kilo carrots, 1 pt. stock, 1 large potato, 2 pt. thick cream, 1 large onion, 2 tablespoons butter, 1½ pt. chicken stock, seasoning, 1 pt. milk.

**Slice** the carrots, potatoes and onion thinly, slice in the butter—do not brown. Add the stock and simmer for 45 minutes. Pass through a sieve or blender. Add the milk and simmer for about 30 minutes and do not boil. When cool add the egg yolks and cream into. Serve with crustons and chopped parsley.

# Author's view of Spanish politics

Spanish Government and Opposition figures speak frankly about the problems of their country in a book which is causing a political sensation in Madrid.

A Catalan intellectual, Salvador Garmet, conducted searching interviews about philosophy and politics with 24 key personalities to produce his 367-page book, *Conversations on a Historic Crossroads* (Futura).

It provides fascinating inside evidence that political life flourishes in Spain despite appearances to the contrary such as a two-month State of Emergency earlier this year and a continued ban on political parties.

Senior Paniker, who married into the industrial and aristocratic elite of Spain, his home, profound and interview with a razor-sharp profile of the personality involved.

He succeeds in bringing the thoughts of men ranging from some of the most brilliant to the most mediocre of the Francoist Cabinet Ministers and an influential Army general to Left-wing opponents of the régime.

The result is that each of them is being devoured with equal eagerness about philosophy and politics by the Government Ministers and Members of the Opposition.

General Manuel Fraga Iribarne, Minister of Information and Tourism, who made it possible to publish the book uncontrolled, is one of the interviewed. He vigorously defends the Franco régime and gives Spain economic progress and tranquillity over 30 years and argues that it is liberalising gradually.

Admiral like Prof. Joaquín Ruiz Jimenez, once General Franco's Education Minister and Ambassador to the Vatican, paints a different picture.

Prof. Jimenez who has become a significant Left-wing Catholic opposition leader, says Spain is going through a grave crisis — outlines his plans for a "democratic Left" political front, and indicates how he has become involved in Marxist political and economic theory.

But the professor speaks first time about his own past. From an interview reveals details for the first time of his confrontations with the Spanish Government, once General Franco's Ambassador in Washington and Paris and now exiled Prefect, Don Juan Bourbon, Franco the monarch as the best solution for Spain's future.

But the most historical solution is Don Juan, Prince Juan Carlos, argued that he is General Franco's candidate for the throne, the Count of Molina says.

For Motrino, the Franco régime's mistake has been a failure to evolve with the times and forget the 1936-39 Civil War, a common opinion in Spain, but he rapidly expressed in print like many other opinions in this book.

"There is a weariness of hypocrisy. I have the impression that these 30 years' peace have been a waste of time," says Laureano Lopez Rodó, General Franco's Economic Minister and one of the régime's leading ideologists before the Opus Dei Catholic Lay

Movement. Spain has made unprecedented progress under General Franco and Army constancy and peaceful evolution.

"It is not a minimum of material well-being, no liberty possible," he says. "The man who suffers from it only tries to get out of it."

Senior Lopez Rodó says other prominent political figures belonging to the Opus Dei, like Senor Rafael Calvo de Hevia do not share his views, and puts this forward as evidence of the controversial nature of his political and purely religious views.

Senior Calvo Sere, another of the figures interviewed in Paniker's book, says he has been "liberalised" financially by Government sanctions against his evening newspaper, *El Sol*, since the régime.

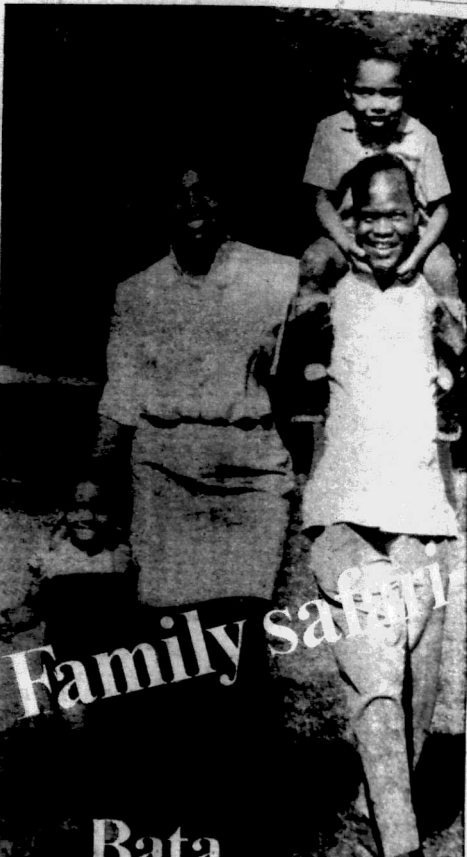

# M.S. to be re-elected

Continuing his statement, Mr. Mboya said the motion was accepted and approved by Parliament on December 5. Only one conclusion could be drawn from this approval and that was that the House agreed to the payment of these gratuities as well as to their exemption from tax.

Turning to Mr. Slade, he said: "You see, on December 5, I gave a ruling on the matter in which you are in respect of gratuities: they are a matter of service (Mr. Balala) that they (gratuities) were covered by estimates and by an Appropriation Act. If they were not they would be illegal."

# Commonwealth to act on sanctions NEW COMMITTEE

The Commonwealth Sanctions Committee decided at a meeting yesterday to set up a special seven-member working party to study the possibility of 'additional sanctions' against Rhodesia.

A communiqué issued at the end of the meeting, under the chairmanship of the Kenya High Commissioner, Dr. Karanja, said that the working party will start immediately "to discuss and close review of the workings of the present sanctions against Rhodesia."

This would be on the basis of reports by the United Nations and information provided by governments and other appropriate sources.

The seven nations are: Britain, Canada, India, Jamaica, Kenya, Pakistan and Zambia.

Concern was expressed in the communiqué about Rhodesia's success in exporting goods to States which had declared their intention to comply with sanctions.

The committee noted that although sanctions had had some adverse effects on the economy of Rhodesia, the potential impact of sanctions was being reduced by Africa and Portugal, but because of the regime's success in exporting.

The committee, which is made up of London-based diplomats of the Commonwealth, named the working group at a three-hour session yesterday.

Britain has also asked the United Nations sanctions committee to approach European governments in an attempt to stop a delivery of sanctions against Rhodesia.

Reliable sources confirmed British Press reports that a ship said to be carrying about 1,000 tons of tobacco valued at £200,000, had left Britain in Mozambique and was now in the area of the Canary Islands.

Labour backbenchers in Parliament have called for an extension of sanctions against Rhodesia to include all communications.

In a motion tabled in the Commons they also proposed that all airlines serving Rhodesia should be suspended from the country.

The backbenchers called for the establishment of an independent United Nations institute to supervise sanctions and for maximum publicity for social and breaking operations wherever they are attacked.

The motion, sponsored by Left-wing M.P. like Mr. Michael Foot and Miss Joan Lewis, has attracted support from other sections of the party.

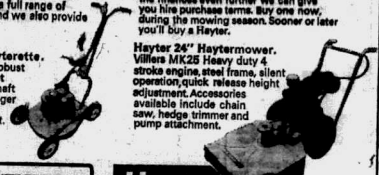

From imported billets the new plant will produce wire rods and flat, round and square steel bars

essential to the country's fast-growing steel industry. It will also give the existing equipment the life of 10 years or more.

The D.F.C.K. has a majority shareholding in the new operation.

East African Wire Industries Ltd. was formed in 1952 by a merger of the nail manufacturing business of Kenya Aluminium and Industrial Works Ltd. and the East African Nail Works Ltd. Since then it has greatly expanded.

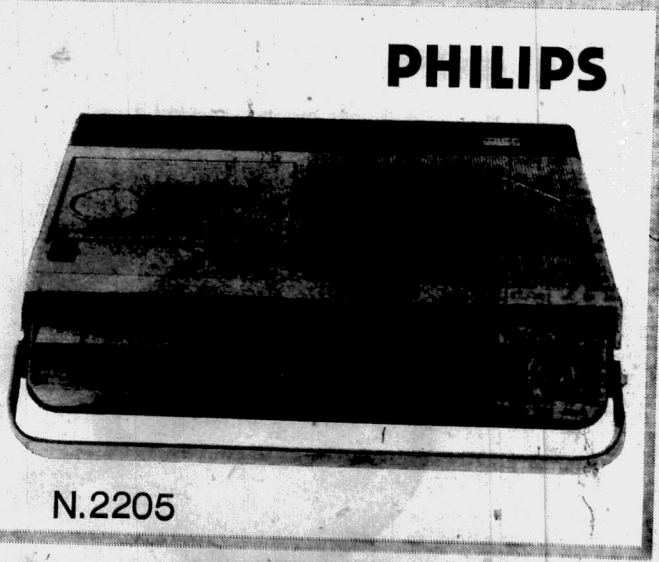

## WANTS £250,000 LOAN FOR HOUSING

The recommendation that Kisumu Municipal Council may use £68,000 of its 1970/71 development plan for a housing scheme was adopted at the full council meeting on Thursday.

The council also recommended that the financial committee be asked to apply for loan sanction for the sum of £68,000. — K.N.A.

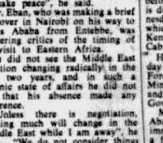

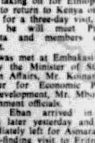

# Key to peace in Laos

North Vietnamese and Communist Pathet Lao forces have captured the strategic Lu-Phan town of Muong Souk, about 100 miles west of the capital, Vientiane, after a week of fierce fighting.

In Paris on Saturday the Laotian Prime Minister, Prince Souvanna Phouma, confirmed the capture of Lu-Phan to Britain and the Soviet Union, as co-chairman of the Geneva conference on Laos. He intervened with Hanoi to stop the North Vietnamese from declaring the capture the signature of the 1962 agreement on Laotian neutrality," he said.

The loss of Muong Souk, near the Plain of Jars, was the latest in a series of setbacks for the neutralist Government this year in the north against North Vietnamese and Pathet Lao forces in the northern part of the country.

In March Communist troops captured the strategic outpost of Nakhong, 270 miles north of Vientiane, in the heart of Sam Neua Province, which bulges into North Vietnam.

Nakhong provides the main link for the Ho Chi Minh supply trail into South Vietnam.

The Laotian Cabinet met in emergency session to review the situation in the Muong Souk area, where the Laotians and North Vietnamese are believed to have won battalions each.

The fighting at Muong Souk was described as the fiercest since Laos. Helicopters continued to shuttle wounded to the north of Vientiane at the weekend in addition to the 100 or so counted on Friday. Collections were taken for aid to the wounded.

Radio contact with the town was lost and its airstrip was knocked out. Government dead were 20.

The monkey, named Bonny, blasted into space by the space shuttle *Cosmos* is scheduled to follow a 10-day orbit 500 miles above the Earth's surface.

If the program goes according to plan Bonny will return to Earth as the holder of the record for the longest space flight by a living being, beating by a wide margin the two Soviet dogs that spent 22 days orbit in 1966.

As he was placed in his space cabin Bonny, who has undergone a rigorous training program, was obviously on top form despite the fact that he had been ill in his heart and in other vital organs.

With the aid of these electrodes and other medical instruments in his space helmet, he will be able to study his central nervous system, including his powers of decision, his ability to learn and sleep, his cardiovascular system and blood pressure, his general metabolism, including his feeding, and changes in his energy, bones, muscles and bones, and his urine.

During the 30-day trip Bonny will be submitted daily to tests designed to test his memory and the co-ordination between his sight and action.
