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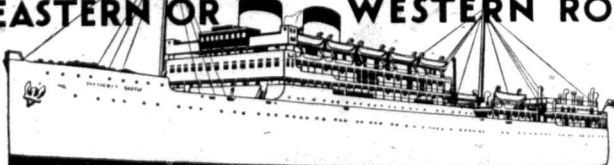

DEFINITE OBJECTIVE OF MR. DE VALERA.

Exchange of Notes.

BRITISH WARNING OF CONSEQUENCES OF SECESSION FROM EMPIRE.

Mr. de Valera has announced his intention of carrying out a policy aimed at the secession of the Irish Free State from the British Empire and the declaration of a Republic, and in a note to the Dominions Office has asked for a plain statement of the British Government's intentions in the event of such declaration.

Notes have been exchanged on the subject during the course of which Mr. J. H. Thomas, the Secretary for the Dominions, has warned Mr. de Valera of the consequences of his attitude. He points out that Ireland cannot renounce its membership of the Commonwealth and at the same time enjoy its privileges.

It is considered probable that Mr. de Valera will dissolve the Dail and have a general election, to be fought on the sole issue of a republic or otherwise.

The British Government regards the Bills recently passed by the Dail as a clear indication of the intention of the Irish Free State to eliminate the Crown from the constitution, and this is regarded as a violation of the Treaty of 1921.

The position of Irish residents in Britain will also have to be considered in the event of a republic, but this will probably have to be discussed by an Imperial Conference.

Breach of the Treaty.

The police authorities in Dublin have announced that they have received information from the members of the Dail that Mr. de Valera, in reply to the letter is understood to have rejected the attitude of the United Kingdom Government towards the declaration of the Irish Republic.

The contents of Mr. Thomas' communication are the subject of a public meeting to be held in the House of Commons, the Secretary for the Dominions has been questioned by a private member.

General R. O'Duffy.

Political circles in Dublin anticipate the Irish Free State default amounting to £8,774,000 (April 1900) and £2,572,000 (April 1901). It is believed that the amount of £8,774,000 will be repaid to Mr. de Valera by instalments of £1,000,000 per annum for the next 10 years. He will be allowed to subject to mortgages but the action will have to be taken by an Imperial Conference in connection with the Free State.

The British Government regards the Free State's communication as a friendly one, but it is understood that the Crown would definitely place the Free State outside the Commonwealth.

The "British Telegraph" emphasizes that Ulster's view on the matter is not to be represented as a threat, and it is stated that the British Government is prepared to consider the views of those who are laboring to widen the breach.

An Ugly Election.

REPUBLICANS ENDEAVOUR TO PROVOKE ARMED RESIST.

The success of the Monarchists in the first elections to the Spanish Cortes has resulted in widespread civil strife, and on the eve of the second elections monarchists decide a number of seats, the country was seething with hatred.

Keynote of Address by Lord Francis Scott.

REPLY TO CRITICS OF WORK OF ELECTED MEMBERS.

Friends Needed in Britain.

ENERGIES SHOULD BE DEVOTED TO STRENGTHENING POSITION.

The first public address on the present political situation by Lord Francis Scott, the Leader of the Elected Members, following his return to the Colony from Britain was made at Nakuru on Thursday night, when he replied to the toast of the "Land We Live In" at the Caledonian Society's annual dinner.

After effectively replying to certain criticisms levelled at Elected Members, Lord Francis emphasized that the most important need for the future was a pooling of the brains of the country, with the main object of formulating and carrying out a policy of development.

He added: "What the country needs is that the best eleven men available should go to Legislative Council determined to serve the country to the best of their ability, regardless of personal ambition or popularity." If such men worked together as a team and proved their ability to take a broad outlook, he believed it would be very hard for any Government to resist them.

He opposed the policy of continuous and blind opposition to Government by Elected Members on all questions. They must be constructive in their ideas, and try and make Government agree with them.

He deprecated continual demands at unpropitious moments, as at the present time, for minor alterations in the constitution. They should rather consolidate and build up their position so that when the right time came they would be in a position to demand greater changes with greater chances of success.

A Constructive Policy.

He said that the Government had to be given a chance to show that it was not so great as it was often made out to be.

THE THIKA MURDER CASE.

Further Evidence Before the Magistrate.

ACCUSED'S WOUNDS.

Alleged Retaliations to Return to Home.

(BY "STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.)

Magistrate's hearing of the case against the Kikuyu Ngorwe was continued by the murder of Shirwan Ranchhand Patel on the Estate of Capt. Walker in Thika on September 23 was continued in the Magistrate's Court, Thika, before Mr. Gillespie on Monday and Wednesday.

Witnesses of the Thika Police conducted the prosecution.

The movements of the accused man during the five days before and immediately following the murder were testified to by several witnesses.

Njiru wa Kibiri said he knew the accused man since the day before the murder, when he was arrested.

Witnesses said that on the day of the murder he met the accused man company with two boys on the following day he saw him again and he was then taken to the Thika Police station where he had happened, and was told that he had been injured in a fight with the accused man.

A Kikuyu boy, Mwangi wa Njiru, said that he was arrested on the basis of the Magistrate's order on the 24th of September. He was taken to the Thika Police station and was held in a locked cell and was told by the police that he was a suspect in the murder.

Motion For Reference To Select Committee.

PROPOSALS THOUGHT TO BE GENERALLY ACCEPTABLE.

Need for Caution.

DESIRABILITY OF BUILDING UP RESERVES RECOGNISED.

The debate on the 1954 Budget of the Colony was commenced in the Kenya Legislative Council on Tuesday on the usual motion by the Colonial Secretary for its reference to Select Committee for detailed consideration.

In the course of his statement the Colonial Secretary said that the revenue from the alternative forms of taxation originally estimated at £111,000 was now only expected to yield £65,000.

The motion having been seconded by the Acting Treasurer, the debate was opened from the unofficial side of the House by Lord Francis Scott (Rift Valley) and continued by Capt. the Hon. H. E. Schwartz (Nairobi South) and the Hon. Conway Harvey, Leader.

All issued the warning to Government and to Elected Members that although the Budget had been balanced that the reserve funds must first be built up again.

Colonial Secretary's Outline.

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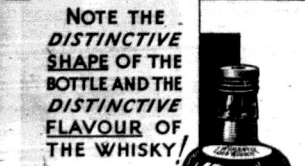

Italy Demands
Revision of the League.

AN ATTACK ON BRITAIN
AND FRANCE.

Present System Impossible.

OTHER POWERS INVITED TO SUBMIT
NEW PROPOSALS.

Radical reforms of the constitution and objectives of the League of Nations have been demanded by a meeting of the Fascist Grand Council, which meeting was attended by Signor Mussolini and all members of the Cabinet. Italy's continued membership was, it was stated, dependent on these revisions being effected in the shortest possible time.

It was suggested that the Versailles Treaty should be the framework of the League, as it was the basis of the League of Nations, and that the League should be a permanent institution for the preservation of the gains of victory.

Other suggestions included the curtailment of the right of the smaller Powers to vote on problems which only partially affected them and the simplification of procedure.

A later message explains that this resolution should be taken purely as an invitation to other Powers to submit new proposals through diplomatic channels. Italy does not intend to take the initiative in the matter.

War Debt To America.

It is understood that Italy has a heavy revision of three lines. Firstly, the curtailment of the rights of smaller Powers to vote on problems which only partially affect them; secondly, the simplification of League procedure; and thirdly, the curtailment of the rights of smaller Powers to vote on problems which only partially affect them. It is considered that the protection of dominions and the multiplication of committees are proposals which are virtually impossible; thirdly, the liquidation of the League from the financial and political point of view, and the League of Nations as a post-war institution for the preservation of the gains of victory nations, under the dominion of Britain and France.

It is not expected that any further action will follow in the near future.

An Invitation To Submit New Proposals.
Well informed circles state that Italy does not intend to take the initiative for the revision of the League and last night's communication should be interpreted as an invitation to foreign powers to submit new proposals, which can be discussed through diplomatic channels, or at the Council meeting. It is officially denied that the Fascist Grand Council will draft a scheme of reform for the League.

Paris, December 6.
Also revision of the League of Nations requires unanimity on the part of members, and France will submit to League reform only if approved unanimously. It is an alternative French committee to handle on the Fascist Grand Council's decision.

Practical Hints The Charging of Accumulators.

ALTHOUGH it is by no means a highly technical subject, the charging of various types of accumulators has always led to a certain amount of confusion. This confusion may be avoided if we have a few points to appreciate the term "capacity" and the term "ampere-hours" and their relative values. In the case of all accumulators the fundamental unit is the cell which may be constructed to have any reasonable capacity and which in the case of the lead acid type has a voltage of approximately two volts. The capacity depends on the size or perhaps more accurately the plate area of the cell and is expressed in ampere hours (i.e. the number of amperes that an ampere can be drawn from the cell without discharging it entirely).

He did not accept the statement that the British immigration policy was being applied on absolutely impartially, and was strictly governed by the interests of the country.

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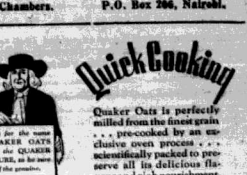
