Sr. P. Cunliffe-Lister Arrives in Nairobi.

LARGE CROWD TO WELCOME HIM AT AERODROME.

A Strenuous Day.

SIX HOURS' CONCENTRATION ON OFFICIAL BUSINESS.

The Secretary of State lost no time in getting down to work when he arrived in Nairobi by air yesterday morning.

The machine in which he was travelling landed at ten o'clock and less than an hour later Sir Philip was immersed in official discussions at Government House.

These continued until late yesterday afternoon and interfered with the original programme of visits to various institutions—starting with the Secretariat—planned for the Secretary of State's first day.

Delayed Town Tour.

Due to an accident, the town tour of Nairobi by the Secretary of State was delayed for some time. The Secretary of State was accompanied by his private secretary, Mr. C. O'Hagan, and Mr. E. K. O'Connell, his driver, and Mrs. Smith, his daughter, who also accompanied him.

On the aerodrome the formation was broken up as the machine slipped on after the other, and the subsequent proceedings were some or less obscured by the thick clouds of dust raised as they whirled into view near the main runway above of traffic. They had down that morning from Toronto when the Secretary of State and his party had sprung the night.

DEPUTATIONS, A LUNCH AND VISIT TO A FARM.

Ten Hours' Work.

MEETING NAIVASHA RESIDENTS ON THE RETURN JOURNEY.

Nakuru will welcome the Secretary of State for the Colonies this morning.

The use of air transport will enable Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister to visit both Nakuru and Naivasha in a day, to lunch with Nakuru settlers, visit a farm, meet several public bodies and have tea with the people of Naivasha, returning to Nairobi about half past five.

Sunday will be a quiet day, although the afternoon will be the occasion for a tour of the Kyanbu district and a sundowner meeting at the local sports club.

Kyanbu on Sunday.

Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister has a well-planned programme in front of him today. It will require only a few hours to be in Nakuru, where he will be met by the representatives of Nakuru Chamber of Commerce and half an hour later, the directors of the Kenya Farmers' Association.

On Sunday, the programme will allow him a little leisure. In the afternoon he is visiting a coffee farm in the Kyanbu district and on his way back to Nairobi will call at the Kyanbu Sports Club, at the sundowner hour and will meet the residents of Kyanbu.

**ROAD AND WEATHER
 REPORT.**

**Prospect of Normal Long
 Rains This Year.**

Mr. Gailton-Penn was fol-
 lowing up the weather conditions
 of course early days to
 state definitely as to what the long
 rains will be in this year, but
 as far as we can see at present
 I think there is every prospect
 of this at present. The long
 rains come up from Northern
 Rhodesia and leave there about
 the middle of December. Coming
 up like a wall this usually
 reaches Nairobi about the third
 or fourth week of March. As
 far as the long rains are pro-
 ceeding in a normal manner. They
 reached Mbera about two or
 three weeks ago, and last week
 they nearly reached Kisumu.
 Yesterday's telegram states that
 the long rains had definitely
 started at Iringa, and they should
 be at Dodoma about the end of
 January and Nairobi some seven
 or eight weeks later.

I have also been informed that
 in Northern Rhodesia (Kasapa
 land), as this all looks good for
 our rainy season here.
 In Kenya this week there has
 been hardly any rain, except for
 a few showers. The roads at
 Seyid, Naivasha and Lamuru. The road
 of the country is parched and
 dry. The Executive Engineer at
 Nairobi took over the Fort Hall
 Sappers Road on January 1st and
 has been busy, as several cables
 of boys and engineers are now at
 work on the road. It is not
 reasonably good condition. The
 three lead drains running at
 the Sappers Road on January 1st
 in Southern Transvaal, as al-
 ready mentioned the rains are
 in full swing, and points may
 be obtained from the District
 Officer Iringa, before one can
 proceed to Mbera.

I would like especially to
 mention the excellent work
 which has been done by the Ex-
 ecutive Engineer, Mr. Brown,
 on the Mbera District. Concrete
 bridges now replace the old
 bridges on the Mbera District
 and Mbera-Nairobi roads. The
 road planes have been smoothed
 out, and these roads are now in
 good condition as can be
 expected in this dry weather. An
 immense amount of work has
 been done on the Mbera
 District road which is now bet-
 ter than it has ever been. It
 is very surprising however, that
 the Londolozi Nyanza road is
 not in a better condition than
 ever, and I should advise all
 members to get the extra 40 miles
 round by Nairobi. Notice when
 they wish to get to Mbera. Some
 attention is also wanted on the
 17 mile stretch between Londolozi
 and the Kenya border, so I be-
 lieve it has not been touched for
 about three years.
 The Nyanza Londolozi road
 can now be definitely classed as
 good, and it is a great feather
 in the cap of the Engineer in
 charge of this section.
 Information just received:—

 south as mostly in fair condi-
 tion, the trouble being that

Desirable Throughout
 East Africa.

The Chamber desires to re-

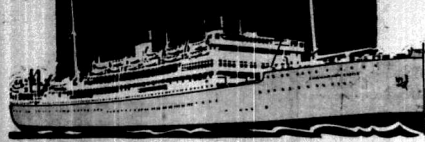

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—With your favouring I would like to join conclusions with Mr. F. P. Mayer with regard to the implications of Dr. Gordon's research on the average mental capacity of the negro African.

That which has been enumerated by Dr. Gordon is not new but follows the line of enquiry of many physiologists in the past, right through to the primitive origins of mankind itself. I think, however, that the qualitative brain capacity is a measure of intellect demonstrated in the case of great thinkers of the past and criminals and degenerates of the present—an intellect which is not an accepted fact with such exceptions as are attached to mind races. One cannot mathematically measure intellect with the callipers over the cranium. There is quality as well as quantity, but research in a racial sense does tell the tale. The apellous, linking the human with the brute, had revealing features and prognations, jaws with slanted brain capacities, in contrast with the higher types of civilized man through historic periods.

But it can be maintained that practical experience tends to confirm scientific theory, to confirm scientific theory. There has been outstanding intelligence among African negroes, such as Booker Washington, Dr. Aggrey and several others of somewhat low grade, but the black man, taken as a whole, as a race with all their national and individual variations, amidst as they are in geological periods, have never been known to have reached a high civilization as in the case of the European, Aryan, Semitic and Mongol races. Why should it be thought that this disparity will ever disappear, that their remote future just as it has persisted in the remote past!

THE POLITICAL OUTLOOK—"CORPORATE STATE."

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—A great deal that is misleading has of late been written about the "Corporate State." For instance, it is often spoken of as an invention of the Fascist leader. This is not so, he was to be seen, but originally it was an English inheritance from our Gothic ancestors. Now, Benito Mussolini has discarded it in favour of a totalitarianism, what is called in Germany, "totalitarianism." This is the governmental experiment of the future, and the world is waiting for the results of the experiment. There is nothing new under the sun.

The Corporate State affords the most perfect contact between the governing body and the governed. It is a true form of representative and for this reason, perhaps, it was adopted by Mussolini as being the most convenient means of communicating his ideas to every stratum of the nation.

But this was not its use in the Italian system. It was adopted to convey, to those who ruled, the feelings and wishes of the people, and show how their legislation on its interests. In this way it was secured the most direct and democratic government attainable, every individual was truly represented and would express his wishes. Statecraft—such as the control of supplies and taxation—made the representatives of the people to put a check on the ruler.

You can take the form of State as a parallel with the republic of the laws in the contract between the various strata and the representatives of the public, courts, and parliament—with the ruling class.

Now, I have said that this is the most democratic form of government attainable, because it is able to give a direct measure of democracy is ever possible. Government never oversteps the limits of the majority by a small and vile minority, the man of the people is too diverse in its interests and outlook, too untrained to be in sufficient agreement to be able to govern itself. Some few people of a single persuasion hold the scales and maintain the necessary control either by consent of the people—in the case of paid rulers governing in the honest capacity of by-employers, by force, or by fraud. All forms of government lead down to one or other of these. To rule, either the interests and aspirations of the rulers and ruled must be one, or some form of force or persuasion must be employed. And so each word such as "Democracy," "Liberalism" and "Socialism" is about to become the populace as part of the act of government.

In ancient Rome, as one time, the people were left their government of themselves. They went through the form of electing senators, but the decisions were so manipulated as to secure the same to a favoured man. S.P.Q.R. was written on the laws, but the people knew that they had a share in the government. They were kept quiet by means of "bread and circuses." How like our modern Parliamentary system!

When the modern carpet-bagger who, when returned, are the servants of this party or that, whichever adopted them, and without whose help, they would have no means of support, they are excited by slogans and bribes and loss and increase of franchises beyond their own sight of the real issue. It has been said that when they turn their backs on their own land, they have all the excitement of a revolution with none of the bloodshed, and this applies to them; that their writers have also said that the London Labour Party would confer together behind the scenes.

STEAMSHIP PASSENGER FARES.
Chambers to Approach the Lines.

An attempt is now made by the Association of Chambers of Commerce of East Africa to induce the steamship companies to lower the rates of passenger fares to and from East Africa.

This effort was started at yesterday's sitting before the Chamber of Commerce, at the instigation of Mr. J. G. Ansell, Secretary, assisted by the colleagues, Major P. Cavendish, District Officer.

Mr. Ansell pointed out that while there had been reductions in many directions, there had been an attempt by the assembly companies to substantially reduce the passenger fares. Similar reductions that had been made by the East India Company and Messageries Maritimes, and would be an inducement to people to travel periodically during the off season, not only to England but also to other parts. Mr. Ansell stated the fact that such reductions were available at certain times in the year between East Africa and South Africa, but not in the reverse direction.

Major Cavendish, District Officer, informed the Association that, regarding passenger rates from the south the shipping companies had been approached but they had declined to lower the fares to the South to East Africa. He hoped the Association would press this matter generally because the fares were too high.

Mr. D. D. P. Hall, Indian Chambers of Commerce, asked that reductions in fares to and from East Africa be kept in mind when the companies were approached. Mr. A. F. Tannahill, supporting the resolution, suggested that the Government subsidize the services by a grant of the resolution and asked to be put in every way.

The resolution was then carried.

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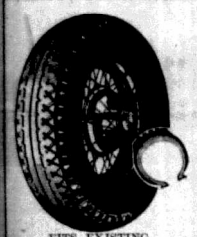

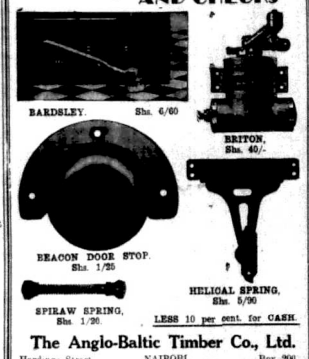

TO BE HANDLED BY A BUSINESS ORGANISATION.

New British Proposal.
AWAITING THE APPROVAL OF THE IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT.

A new impulse will be given to Empire migration if the British Government backs a scheme which will be placed before them during the next Parliamentary session.

The aim is to settle half a million people in the Empire during the next ten years.

500,000 in Ten Years.

(BY WIRELESS.)
London, Jan. 22.
Empire migration may be speeded up on a large scale by a special organisation, such as a new corporation or financial trust, it is hoped to get started with a scheme for settling 500,000 people in the Empire during the next ten years.

A committee of the House of Commons, during the last Parliamentary session, as a result of a new year's investigation by a committee of Empire interests, has announced that migration will be speeded up by the appointment of a special committee to investigate the possibilities of settlement in the Empire. The committee was made up of representatives of the various Empire territories, and its report is expected to be published in the near future.

MOTHER OF PROMINENT LABOUR EX.M.P.

United States to Increase Navy.

AIRCRAFT-CARRIERS AND FOUR NEW CRUISERS.

Airship to be Scrapped.
PRESENT CONDITION OF VESSELS SAID TO BE UNSATISFACTORY.

The United States is making provision to build new aircraft-carriers, and four cruisers, while a large sum has been set aside for new aeroplanes. This information was given in the report on the Naval Supply Bill presented to the House of Representatives.

It has been decided not to replace the ill-fated airship "Akron" while the "Los Angeles" will be scrapped. It was announced that the condition of many of the existing warships was very unsatisfactory.

The Supply Bill.

Washington, January 22.
The Naval Supply Bill of 284,740,000 dollars which was reported to the House of Representatives last night includes \$20,000,000 for the purchase of new aeroplanes, including aircraft-carriers and four cruisers. The Bureau of Aeronautics has been allocated \$18,000,000 for the purchase of new aeroplanes.

The funds are allotted for the replacement of the airship "Akron" by the "Los Angeles" and for the purchase of four new aeroplanes. The "Akron" is the world's largest dirigible, was built at the cost of New Jersey on April 4 last, when it plunged into the sea during a terrific thunder storm. One of the 77 officers and crew on board, 74 lost their lives.

MAIZE SEED GROWING COMPETITION

Conditions of Entry for This Year.

IN THREE LOCALITIES

Connecting Between Good Seed and High Yields.

In conjunction with the Department of Agriculture and with the assistance of the Kenya Farmers' Association, the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of Kenya has decided to run three competitions during the year 1934 and third an entrance fee of Shs. 50/- shall cover entry for all three competitions. The competitors are to be held in the following localities:— (1) At Nairobi in the Kiunga Valley (Victoria reserve) and in the Trust Zone.

Any farmer desiring to enter these competitions shall send the entrance fee of Shs. 50/- to the Secretary, Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of Kenya, P. O. Box 200, Nairobi, who will pass on the information to the Department of Agriculture and to the Agricultural Officer located nearest to the farm of the entrant. In no case does the Agricultural Officer concerned will either be the Applicant or the Secretary, either The Kenya Breeding Station, Nairobi or the Agricultural Officer, Nairobi, P. O. Box 200, Nairobi. The entrant should at the same time inform the appropriate Agricultural Officer what day will be most suitable for him to collect the seed from the farm. The minimum number of bags of seed which the entrant should prepare to be no less than five and the minimum acreage of seed maize to be planted up by him to be fifty acres. There is no money however, any entrant should send only one number of bags of seed maize than five or plant up more acreage than fifty acres if he so chooses to do so.

Seed Collection.
The method of seed collection will be as follows. When the entrant has put up all his seed maize and is ready to start then he will send to the Agricultural Officer concerned who will visit his farm and collect a random sample

of about one hundred of the seed corn. At the same time that farmer will send to the Agricultural Officer who will take away sufficient for this end for sowing in the competition, the remainder being sent by the farmer for his fifty or more acres.

The results of the competitions, that is the names of those who appear in the top third or half of the ranking list—according to the number of outstanding ears, competition (figure with the yield given by their seed) will be published on the Agricultural Show or Farmers' Day after the completion of the 1934 Agricultural Show or Farmers' Day after the completion of the 1934 Agricultural Show or Farmers' Day. The method of presentation of competitors' seed at the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of Kenya will be as follows. A random sample of the seed from the original hundred, will be placed on the bench together with the seed and the farmer's position on the ranking list, together also with a display of an average acreage row of ears from the competition. The original seed, as they are produced by the seed from the original hundred, will be considered for the ranking list and published; if the entries are few less than ten, the seed from the original hundred will be considered. The names of the winners of the top third or half of the ranking list will be published in the official programme of the 1934 Agricultural Show or Farmers' Day.

No competitor will receive a prize unless his seed shows a 20% loss of seed maize from his 1933 crop in conjunction with the 1934 Agricultural Show or Farmers' Day. The names of the winners will be published in the official programme of the 1934 Agricultural Show or Farmers' Day.

Higher Yields.
It is hoped that the proposed exhibition will prove most instructive and interesting and will most adequately replace the maize collection of previous Agricultural Shows. They will certainly be of greater value and interest as well as of more to those competitors in order to help both in selecting the best varieties of maize and in obtaining higher yields, per acre without extra cost. These higher yields may be the deciding factor in successful maize growing and it is of the greatest importance that farmers should appreciate the close connection between good seed and high yields. Past competitions have shown that all other factors (such as climate etc.) being equal, good seed has resulted in an average increase in yield of about 20% over the seed which yielded less and which yielded worse, and even that which yielded worse was presumably largely selected seed. It is highly important that every farmer should realize that the value of his own seed or know where to obtain good seed. The only way of finding out is through the action of the maize seed growing competitions. They may look good but the only way to find this out is through the best growing competitions.

Entries must reach the Secretary of the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of Kenya not later than March 15, 1934, and should if possible be sent in such a manner to facilitate collection of seed.

Wireless Notes.

Practical Hints

Finding Faults.

This page, devoted to the interests of Wireless, is conducted by a qualified and licensed experimenter with wide knowledge of East African conditions.

SETS are greatly in their individual characteristics and even sets of the same make and apparently identical in every respect can give different results when used side by side under the same conditions. There is always a reason for this and it is a matter of fact that it is not as a below par, but through investigation should be made. It is a well known fact that a set can be made to operate without the other noticing it and being at all aware of it until comparison with another set is made. It is also true that there is something wrong. More reports of results obtained are inadequate for this comparison and the inferior should endeavor to hear the results himself.

A Bad Position.

Situations do not place in a very important part and it may be impossible to reach a very high standard in some localities. Nevertheless a great deal can be done to nullify the effects of a bad position by experimenting with various types of aerial and one should not seek content with indifferent results merely on that score. On account of the varying conditions experienced on the short waves, it is not easy to tell which set one should definitely better than another especially on all wave-lengths and for that reason it is probably better to use two or more which can be connected to the receiver at will when direct comparison will show which is the better. An eliminating process can be gone through and the better of the two aerials left.

Another Financial Scandal in France.

BANKER ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF SWINDLING. Huge Sum Involved.

ALLEGATIONS OF BRIBERY AGAINST THE POLICE.

Another financial scandal has been discovered in France in which a prominent banker is stated to be concerned and who has been arrested on a charge of swindling, the sum involved being estimated at £7,500,000.

The banker concerned is M. George Alexandre, who was formerly an old-clothes dealer in Rouen, but subsequently had a meteoric career in high finance.

It is stated that complaints against the Banque des Fonctionnaires, of which M. Alexandre was the founder and director, were made four years ago, and the newspapers alleged that the police were bribed not to prosecute.

The directors of the companies controlled by M. Alexandre include a number of high titularities of the Honorable, and the case will be before eventually have to go before the Court of that Order.

Public Incensed.

Washington, Jan. 25. The Senate Banking Committee by 15 votes to 2 approved President Roosevelt's monetary bill but with vital modifications, including the planing of the \$200,000,000 Stabilisation Fund under the control of a board of five members instead of three.

JAPAN'S BUDGET.

To Be Balanced by Raising Loan. Japan has decided to raise a loan of 800 million yen to cover the fiscal deficit, due to operations in Manchuria, increased expenditure on national defence and the new railway system.

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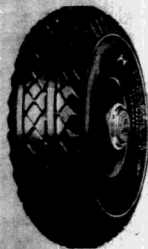

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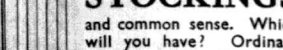

MORE CRITICISM OF RAILWAY RATING.

ASSOCIATED CHAMBERS ASK FOR COMMITTEE OF USERS.

To Recommend Policy.

GENERAL MANAGER STRESSES SOME OF THE ESSENTIALS.

An address lasting over an hour, to delegates attending the half yearly session in Nairobi of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa, the General Manager, Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours, explained the reason for the Railway's rating policy.

After listening attentively to General Rhodes's statement, the Association passed a resolution expressing the views that the present rating policy was not in the best interests of Kenya and Uganda and asking the High Commissioner of Transport to appoint a representative committee of users of the Railway to make recommendations as to the policy which should be adopted.

The General Manager explained that the present rates policy had been dictated by the necessity for having a balanced budget and the fact that in past years reserves had been dissipated in giving concessions to users of the railway, which made it necessary for the administration at the present time to ensure that income was sufficient to meet its requirements. The only alternative would be to ask the Government concerned to fulfil their guarantee in the form of subsidies to the Railway.

Although the public had glibly rejected the recommendation of the fifth Report, it was a fact that the General Rhodes very much doubted whether a committee of the kind suggested would be of any real assistance.

A Matter for Experts.

He emphasized the fact that all users of the Railway who had any criticism of the rates had access to the Railway Council where they could state their case.

He said that the question of duties on imported goods into this country was also under review, as a result of which the duties on certain goods were being raised and a rate for locally grown steel and cast-iron pipes was being introduced. A very definite policy was brought about at the meeting of the High Commissioner of Transport, and the Committee was sitting, and the meeting was going through the 15th time. Discussion on this matter was ruled out of order and Mr. Aronson occupied the sitting without question as it must have been his experience that a matter of this importance such as a change in the Commission of the Board could not have been discussed without proper notice which would have allowed adequate opportunity of ascertaining the views of those concerned.

At a later stage in the debate in the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Aronson was reported to have stated that Commercial Representatives would only be allowed to serve on the Board without any remuneration whatsoever. In fact, Mr. Aronson was not understanding it should be explained that the members of the Coffee Board give their services and time without remuneration and are only refunded their fare out-of-pocket expenses. The Coffee Board is at all times glad to receive representatives of other bodies whose matters affect particularly those of its interests.

EUROPEAN GIRLS SECONDARY SCHOOL.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir - I was in holiday's at the East African Standard that Sir P. Curlliff-Lister visited the Prince of Wales School last Saturday. I must have been pleased to meet someone of his rank and position. Captain Nicholson, to be able to show the Secretary of the Society for the Canning the splendid buildings and beautiful situation of the school in which the children of the colonists are educated. At the same time would it not give our distinguished visitor a better insight into conditions of life had also been taken to see the Girls Secondary School? He would have been let down greatly, when he came to see the class room and hall first, and then from there he might have visited the Lower School and the dormitories. There he could have seen that, although the senior boys are housed in comfort and decency, the senior and junior girls are housed in a building recently abandoned by the Municipality as unfit for human habitation, a veritable trap in case of fire.

I am quite aware that the Director of Education did not see much amiss and declared that conditions were "equal surroundings." Still our "jets" have not been raised in "equal

surroundings" and all parents will see some of the "jets" daughters have at least as much to say as the boys. The same applies to domestic safety and comfort. I cannot understand why it should be more necessary for girls than for boys to become inured to, and finally, to equal and to equal.

THE RICKSHAW.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir - I have read with interest the letter from Mr. Dermot Fitzgerald in East African Standard this morning and I am surprised with him that "some" of the rickshaw boys are "hard and unclean workers," but I will never agree that they should be allowed to roam the town "loitering."

Taxi drivers are allowed a certain stand and any "loitering" on their part results in immediate action in the Courts. Why not the same with rickshaw boys? To my mind, it is not fair to allow five stands with a radius of a quarter of a mile of Nairobi House, whereas there are only two taxi ranks, so the bottom drops out of Mr. Fitzgerald's argument about the stands being "few and far between."

Perhaps your correspondent only "loitered" in the day time when the sun was in the present but let his come every night at 10 p.m. and he would soon change his tune - or perhaps he has some interest in the rickshaw trade.

I am not suggesting that the rickshaw be done away with, but when a rickshaw holder from the New Market Hotel to the east of Athelstan Bridge with the central request for the rickshaw to be done away with, an annoyance is killed, once and for all.

I am not a motorist but I do know that when a license is applied for, one is not to call and the authorities to see to fall and head lights, brakes, etc.

Perhaps when Mr. Fitzgerald has been posted as much as I have he will realize what a nuisance these boys are to him. In conclusion, I may state that my office is not near a rickshaw stand but when in need of a rickshaw I have only to call from my door and at least six boys are waiting to be chosen.

LOCAL NATIVE COUNCILS.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir - I see that my friend Jeremiah Hinkins has once again taken up the political question in his recent letter with regard to the Secretary of State's visit. I, too, am interested in Native politics but what one does find in the Native, is consistency, otherwise one gets tired and discouraged.

Jeremiah in his latest effort seems to think that the Kikuyu Central Association, the Kavirondo Employees Welfare Association, and Native Chamber of Commerce, etc., are more capable of voicing the opinion of the Native Community than the Local Native Council. He says the L.N.C. cannot be the real pupil since they "are people of short sight, and they lack very much the experience and understanding to be able to talk intelligently and sensibly in this connection."

Now let us turn to a letter of Jeremiah's which appeared in your issue of September 17, 1930. In this letter he makes certain allegations against Mr. Deane, because of what he thinks was unfair treatment on the part of Mr. Deane on

Squatters' Ordinance Discussion.

SUGGESTIONS SUBMITTED.

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.] Eldama Havine, Jan. 14. The meeting was a very representative one and the District Commissioner of Nairobi attended the meeting. The definition of "squatter" appears to be quite clear in the new Ordinance, under the old one the definitions were many and varied. Under the new Ordinance "squatter" means "a native who occupies land and holds it as a tenant." It appears that a native can, with his employees, occupy land with some doubt about this point. With the exception of the Kaimosi very native lands, he has his own title piece of individual and to prohibit this would be a real hardship. The following were some of the suggestions submitted to the District Commissioner:

The regulator of squatter stock should contain provisions of cattle, sheep and goats only instead of the particulars required by the new Ordinance. That squatters be required to mark their sheep and goats. That the question of Hut tax or Poll Tax. On this question, Jeremiah Hinkins considered the decision of the L.N.C. as the one best policy. He had used the common method of carrying out a survey for a majority opinion. This question would have been settled long ago. (Evidently Jeremiah is in favour of Hut Tax.) I ask you Sir, whether I am right or wrong in assuming that the L.N.C. is not a more "than" conviction that the Kikuyu Central Association or the K.W.A. or in the Native Chamber of Commerce, etc. are more "than" and thousands of other Natives who have quite different opinions and who are not members of these political and other organizations.

That a "reasonable area of ground for cultivation" be more clearly defined. That a date for the planting of crops be fixed, as the clearly stated, so as the case for native crops. That a notice to terminate a squatters agreement be a period of three months after the signing of the agreement. That there be no offence for a squatter to plant any crops after receiving notice of the termination of the agreement. That there be no offence for a squatter to hold a land in a dry condition on the termination of his agreement. When this Ordinance becomes law Districts will be able to enforce local option as to whether squatters are to be allowed in their Districts and the amount of stock they can have. The Head charge with some criticism but it was pointed out that this only applied to very exceptional cases.

A letter was read from the Veterinary Officer, Nairobi, pointing out the quarantine area for Italian explaining how it affected the movements of stock. It was pointed out that Rabbits (which are similar to the cattle and sheep) should be treated as such. People travelling through District with dogs should be themselves concerned with Rabbits Quarantine Regulations in the area affected. The District Commissioner should be advised of the spread of the disease by the movement of dogs. The District Commissioner should be advised of the cost of a telephone line from Nairobi to Havine would be too high for consideration. The meeting was of the utmost importance that the local option be more economically and better maintained by a local contractor, as has been done in the past, than by the District Council.

No rain has fallen in the District since December 17. There have been periods of high drying wind and the grazing is showing signs of the dry weather. A good season would be a immense good. When in parts of the District has been standing up well to the present dry weather. The small maize crop need more rain to make them fill out. The maize harvest will not be general here for another month. Barine did well at the recent Nairobi show, the Nairobi Estate obtained the cup for the most pounds in produce and for the best selling wheat. This wheat is grown from "Brown" seed, especially imported from Canada by that estate.

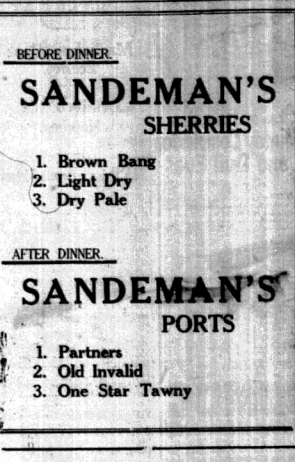
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UNEMPLOYMENT.
