IT WAS inevitable that the reactions of the public to the findings of the Salaries Review Commission would be one of disappointment and protest. Admittedly the recommended increases for the bulk of its members are small, amounting to 10 per cent and 20 per cent in lower grades.

The recommendations over the recommendations published on Tuesday by the Commission on Salaries and Wages for the public sector have been met with disapproval by many unions whose members' terms and conditions of service are affected by the commission.

The secretary-general of the Kenya Civil Servants' Union, Mr. G. N. Onyulo, said that his union condemned the report and warned that unless negotiations arising from it were handled carefully and realistically a general strike was inevitable.

The union's national executive had been summoned on Saturday to determine the union's approach to the proposals. The executive officers of the Kenya National Union of Teachers, Mr. P. L. Lubulilo, pointed out that his union had been disappointed that Parliament had been properly adjourned so as to delay the implementation of the report.

He added, however, that teachers would reluctantly accept the "little that has been offered to us" but would continue to press for their established demand of a minimum salary of £25 a month.

## Congressmen blocked in escape dash

PIERCER fighting is going on 30 miles from the border town of Bukavu, Eastern Congo, where the Congolese National Army has blocked rebel mercenaries and an unknown number of Katangese gendarmes and European hostages, arrived in the area in 40 trucks.

# Roaraka brewery expansion reaches the £1m. stage

AN INVESTMENT OF £1,000,000, out of a total of £1,750,000, has now been spent on a major expansion of the Roaraka brewery for Kenya Breweries Ltd. Work on the project started early in 1966 and is due to be completed at the end of 1968, when the capacity of the brewery will be increased from 125,000 cases per month to 225,000.

When completed the brewery will be one of the most modern and well equipped in the world. The layout has been designed so that further expansion can take place in future years as and when the trade justifies it.

It is not only the brewery plant itself which is undergoing expansion, many of the other aspects of the company's activities are also being modernized or enlarged. The project includes the construction of a new plant to serve as a training centre for the company's technical staff to study such subjects as engineering, workshop practice and vehicle maintenance.

The expansion programme is being financed from local company resources — something the 7,000 local shareholders in East Africa can be proud of. Some 11.2 per cent of the company's shareholding is held locally in East Africa and the group as a whole constitutes East Africa's largest single locally owned public company. Over 90 per cent of the company's own employees are also local.

Commenting on the expansion plan the managing director, Mr. E. H. Hobson, said: "This development project is to a large extent financed from profits ploughed back into the company. Our group policy has always been to plough back surplus profits into the country where we sell our beer. Our second policy has been to make absolutely sure that wherever such consumption grows we are always able to meet the demand. These two policies are complementary and both of these policies being carried out."

## Latest aids utilised

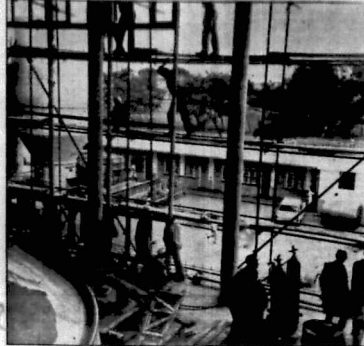
All the latest scientific aids and methods have been utilised in planning the expansion programme to ensure that work goes ahead according to schedule without disrupting existing production. The company has bought time in a local computer and used network analysis to ensure the maximum co-ordination of the various constructional activities.

"Of particular," Mr. Hobson said, "the latest techniques are being introduced to ensure the maintenance of maximum quality in the production of our beers. The company's own quality control organisation will be utilising the most modern methods to ensure the highest standards in all the phases of production."

Roaraka is not the only place where the company is expanding. Work has recently started on an expansion programme at the Brewer's' maltings in Nairobi costing over £1,000,000 which will increase the malting capacity from 10,000 bags per annum to 115,000. This expansion will provide an enlarged market for Kenya's malting barley growers. It is not beyond the bounds of possibility that in time Kenya could even become an exporter of malt.

## Export 'Tusker' goes down well

KENYA BREWERIES are now marketing a beer specially for export and for sale to shipping and international airline companies. The first consignment, called 'Tusker for Export', of 800 cases was sold to the Seychelles, and a further consignment of 2,000 cases has recently been dispatched. More than 500 cases have been sold to the shipping trade in Mombasa.

Inquiries are now going on with Malawi and Zambia in the hopes of obtaining orders from those countries.

Commenting on this new pack the group sales and marketing controller of the company, Mr. A. P. Moller, said: "Our exports to the Seychelles have been well received, and there has been particularly favourable comment about quality."

The "dumpy" six bottles, which are made in Mombasa, hold slightly more than the normal small bottle sold in Kenya. The beer is being brewed in Mombasa, and the cartons are made in Nairobi.

Discussing the decision to enter the export trade, the managing director, Mr. E. H. Hobson, said that the company was now confident that the very high quality of its locally produced beer would enable it to meet the stiff competition likely to be encountered in export markets.

"We are particularly pleased," he said, "that East African Airways have introduced 'Tusker for Export' on their international routes. Other international airlines have also shown interest in this beer."

"For various reasons, however, it will not be possible to market the beer internally within East Africa."

# Rebels battle for Bukavu escape route

Rebels arrived again yesterday in Bukavu, capital of the Congo's eastern Kivu province, between foreign mercenaries and troops of the Congolese National Army.

Late last night it was not clear whether the mercenaries, said to number more than 150, were trying to occupy the town or fight their way through it to reach the Kwanda border and safety. The mercenaries are supported by several hundred Katangese guerrillas.

Few details are available about the action, but the Congolese regulars under the command of Brig-Gen. Massala are using mortars, while the mercenaries are being helped by an unidentified light plane which has carried out many strafing runs.

### Air-lift for troops

Advanced elements of the mercenaries entered Bukavu late on Monday but withdrew later, and the bulk of them spent the night on the outskirts of the town. Their column was described as being composed of 20 military trucks, 60 mixed vehicles including jeeps, and several passenger cars.

Congolese official sources have hinted for the past few days that a major battle would take place in Bukavu should the mercenaries attempt to cross into neighbouring Rwanda. The border is about 20 miles from the center of the town. Several hundred Congolese troops have been flown in Bukavu since Monday, 120 mainly in the north, aboard an American C-130 transport plane, in the past few days.

### TSHOMBE RESTRAINT CALL

SIN Robert Kennedy has interceded on behalf of the former Congolese Prime Minister, Mr. Moise Tshombe, by urging all parties concerned with this fate to act with restraint.

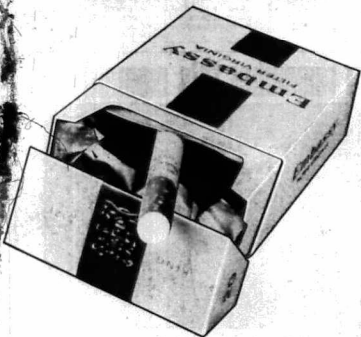

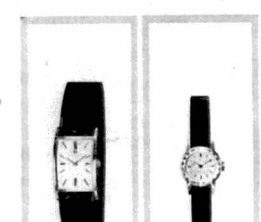

# E.A. Treaty 'firm foundation for co-operation'

Standard Staff Reporter Dar es Salaam. The East African Treaty has not inaugurated a federation of economic states, but it has provided a firm foundation for mutual co-operation on the basis of equality between partners. President Kenyatta made the opening speech of the Central Legislative Assembly in Dar es Salaam yesterday.

He said: "I believe that this is of fundamental importance and that the spirit of unity which exists in East Africa will enable us to build well and rapidly upon this foundation."

The President described the treaty as a document which laid down a realistic basis for co-operation, on equal terms, by three sovereign States. It had taken into account the problems and aspirations of the partners and their overriding recognition of the mutual benefits which could come from united economic action.

## COMMON MARKET STRENGTHENED

The machinery the treaty contained was realistic because it drew on past experience. It had greatly strengthened the common market and common services so that they should operate with increased efficiency.

President Nyero had particular emphasis on the fact that the treaty provided for the free movement of goods, services, labour and capital between the three States. It would be strengthened and the East African Community would have such approaches as appropriate.

## NEW PARTY OFFICIALLY IN BEING

The Kenya Socialist Party, a new political organisation which plans to fight the general election in 1969, was officially announced yesterday by its Honorary Secretary, Mr. J. M. Njiru.

Mr. Njiru said the party was formed by a group of young people who were dissatisfied with the existing political situation in Kenya.

The party's programme includes the abolition of the existing constitution, the introduction of a new constitution, and the holding of a general election in 1969.

Mr. Njiru said the party was open to all Kenyans who were committed to the party's programme.

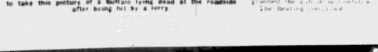

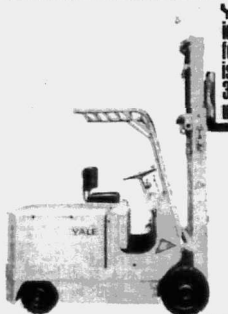

## NIGERIA DECARES FULL-SCALE WAR

### No mercy to Biafra says Federal ruler

#### Federal ruler

**NIGERIA** yesterday declared full-scale war against Biafra, the former Eastern region. The Federal Army ruler, Maj-Gen Gowon, announced that he was ordering his Army, Navy and Air Force into an all-out battle. The move was being taken to avert mass bloodshed following the Biafran seizure of the mid-West region and its air attacks on Lagos and other Federal cities.

#### Heavier blows warning

The Federal Government had previously described its operations against the breakaway State as a limited police action, but yesterday Gen. Gowon said the Federal armed services had been ordered "to carry out full-scale military operations against the rebels, wherever they are."

#### U.S.-SOVIET ATOM PACT NEAR

**THE** chief United States negotiator, Mr. William P. Foster, announced yesterday that the United States and the Soviet Union were close to preparing a draft of a five-year pact on the subject of nuclear energy in Geneva.

Mr. Foster, who is in Geneva with the Soviet negotiator, Mr. Leonid Brezhnev, said the pact would cover the use of nuclear energy for peaceful purposes and would include provisions for the exchange of information and the sharing of technical data.

#### Police dogs break up Salibari protest

**THE** police in Addis Ababa used dogs yesterday to break up a demonstration against the government in the suburb of Salibari. The protesters were demanding the release of political prisoners and the end of military rule.

The sources said the Nigerian Air Force had launched an "all-out war" by air on Biafra in accordance with the instructions of the Federal leader, Maj-Gen. Gowon, to wage "full-scale war" against Biafra.

Enugu Radio monitored in Cotocol, Imo State, named Okene as the main town taken by the Biafrans, and said the objective of the Biafran offensive was the Federal Army's support base at Lokoja, 47 miles to the north-east, at the junction of the Niger and Benue Rivers.
