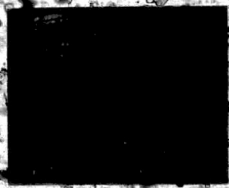

GOVERNMENT AND COMMISSIONS FINDINGS

The Attorney General advised the Kenya Commission of Enquiry that the police officers concerned in the preliminary inquiry and in the conduct of the case guilty of grave irregularities that Native prisoners and witnesses were intimidated and ill-treated by Native police, and that as a result his own investigation was flawed. 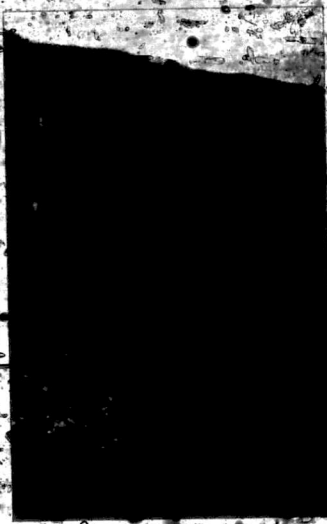

The colony is ideally placed for people who have retired from business with a moderate income; the population is small, to which they wish to enjoy in the sunshine, and with the advantage of being taxed little about them. There is no income tax in Kenya, and since all taxation save a small property tax is indirect, a person who is prepared to live mainly on the produce of the colony can support himself in the comfort of an English home surrounded by his own people far more cheaply than ever in England or the United States.

Near Nairobi land is generally more expensive and so are building costs. The Native servants command high wages, but only in the closer settled parts of the country districts it is possible to procure thirty or forty acres on a small river at a cost including building a house and making a garden, not in excess of a similar scale of residence in the rural districts of England. One can have a fine house fitted with every amenity and convenience known to modern times, the local furniture manufacturers being first class, and the local timbers very beautiful and well adapted for panelling or for furniture. Moreover, when you first arrive to live in Kenya you can buy with you any of your personal belongings, which, with very few exceptions, will be passed through the Customs free, provided that they are your personal property and are not imported for sale in the colony. This includes household furniture, and other articles.

Having done this, it is possible to live a comfortable and standing of comfort at a rate not comparable with that in England. There are no rates and taxes, so that you can live about a year, which have servants, boys, and maids, inside the towns range from £500, and less a month. These boys can be engaged into a number of ways, whether as cooks, house boys, gardeners or chauffeurs; ample staff for a family of four people is a cook and kitchen boy, two house boys and two gardeners, at a total cost

£100 a month including laundry, household fuel, and cleaning and oiling.

One man who makes his home in Kenya but who has no ambition to farm can put up a pleasant day in this sunny climate, tending his orchards and his garden, which will provide him with all the fruit, vegetables and flowers he can use, if he has the ability to supervise his own garden.

Kenya Gardens.

Gardening is one of the chief joys of life in Kenya, and the gardens must be seen to be believed. It is surprising to hear any country possesses garden possibilities, such as Kenya. Apart from the tropical and sub-tropical flowers one can grow all the English bulbs, such as tulips, lily of the valley and delphiniums; in fact, all the annuals and perennials of an English garden, while it is not an uncommon thing to see the garden, the violet, the rose and the pansy, all thriving in the soil here. Results can be obtained in a Kenya garden in eighteen months which would take years to achieve in England.

One can on any day, a game of tennis in the afternoon, shoot an occasional buck, and in the evening play a game of bridge; and on week-ends in the sports clubs, and these exist everywhere, will find a number of other Rugby, Soccer, Hockey, and in some cases polo.

Although there are a present of duties in Kenya, they are only two thirds of the English duties; and in these days of financial stress this is an important consideration for the retired family man who has the future of his children to think of.

A man with children will find the educational facilities adequate. Apart from the Government schools which cater for boys and girls there are two main types of private schools, which provide boys for the English public schools and an international school for girls, which takes girls up to the age of thirteen. There is also a girls' boarding school.

There is no part of the world in which a more enjoyable three months' holiday can be spent, with a better variety of entertainment, and a more varied and also believe that a man's family will find five months' holiday in Kenya a most profitable effort financially unattainable anywhere else.

COFFEE AUCTIONS IN NAIROBI

Views of a Shipper to America

To the Editor of "East Africa"

In the recent letter to you Mr. Richard Porter quoted an extract from a previous letter of mine, and utilised this quotation apart from its context, and completely misrepresents the matter, giving it as a great admission of my being generally dissatisfied with the coffee shipments that have been made up to the present.

During a representative period in the past season my company exported 3,500 bags of coffee direct to the Pacific ports of America. Of this quantity three consignments of 150 bags and the balance proved unsatisfactory. The remainder arriving on the East Coast of Africa of the consignments. An analysis as to the three consignments proved unsatisfactory. It disclosed that the coffee came into contact with naphthalene during its period of transport, thereby causing contamination. The depreciation in value has been paid by insurance companies, and the third is the subject of a claim. In no case has the quality of the original consignments ever been improved.

When I was in London, the coffee was brought out to me that whilst a number of direct shipments from Kenya had been taken down on arrival in America through the quality being inferior, shipments made in London merchants to the same ports had received the same fate, and for the same reason.

To amplify the urgent need of a Coffee Exchange I will quote an extract from a letter my company received from its American friends.

If the plantation in Kenya realises the extra cost to himself in marketing his coffee in London, whence a considerable percentage is re-exported to America, he would undoubtedly prefer to dispose of it locally for direct shipment to America, and so save the benefit of higher prices all round. It should be explained to him that the moment we can procure Columbian and Central American mild coffees at lower prices, then our interest in Kenyas ceases.

Despite Mr. Porter's criticisms, I maintain the holding of a course for my own company, that with a London-trained expert and accommodation for inspection of consignments in bulk when being offered for sale, we can offer on description with the same reliability as any London merchant house, and so secure a higher return to the planter. It was our intention to inaugurate our public sales this month, but the time was considered inopportune. With the arrival of the early pickings of the many crops we hope to hold the first sale in the middle of November.

Mr. Porter's apparent fears that the Nairobi coffee sale will completely supplant the London sales are unfounded. It is most obvious that a very considerable percentage of Kenya coffee will always find its way in the London market where current prices are fixed, but it is equally obvious that the increase in production of Kenya will be reflected in the near future. It is our intention to make a big sale in London in the near future, but the market expects to keep the price at a high level. I would remind Mr. Porter that a considerable quantity of Costa Rican coffee has at the moment been sold in London to foreign markets, the prices of which are based on prices realised in Mombasa.

EUROPE BUYS EAST AFRICAN COFFEE

A committee of government regarding the consumption of East African coffee in European countries has been organized by the East African Coffee Producers' Association, Ltd., London, from the following countries:

Austria.—For the first six months of 1930, 9,600 metric tons of coffee were imported. This is not specially classified, but will probably be derived from the following: 1930-31, 5,372 metric tons; 1931-32, 4,228 metric tons. The total coffee imports during 1930 were 47,417 metric tons.

Czechoslovakia.—East African coffee imports in 1930 were 48 metric tons, valued at 8,000 kronen (45.25 krona to the £). The quantity of coffee imports during 1930 were 1,000 tons.

Denmark.—East Africa is not specially classified, but total coffee imports during 1930 were 2,700 metric tons, of which 2,000 tons came from America.

France.—Statistics of coffee imports are not available. The total coffee imports during 1930 were 17,672 metric tons, of which 1,000 tons came from East Africa.

Germany.—East African coffee imports during 1930 were 10,000 metric tons, valued at 1,000,000 marks. The total coffee imports during 1930 were 1,000,000 marks.

KENYA GAME REPORT FOR 1930

Serious poaching of natives.

While poaching is not so serious during 1930 as it was in 1929, it is still an important factor in the game industry of Kenya, though cases of the unwarranted use of motor cars or dogs, chiefly in the vicinity of washups, still occur. Poaching by natives, particularly in the Northern Frontier Province, was very bad. Ivory and rhino horn smuggled from Kenya to the coast, and then re-exported to the East Indies, is still a serious problem. The returns of these trophies imported into the country from Italian Somaliland are as follows:
