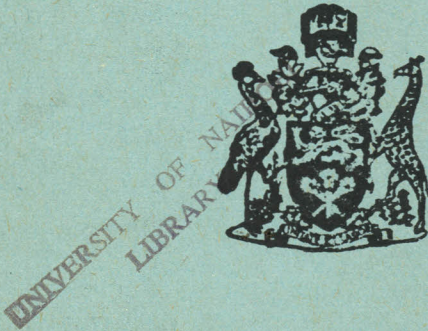

GENERAL

The year's most important development was the decision of the Council of University College to amalgamate the two Departments of the Institute. From 1966-67 onwards, the Institute is to be unified under one Director with a Deputy Director in charge of the Adult Studies Centre (formerly College of Social Studies) at Kikuyu. The titles of both the Department of Residential Adult Education and the Extra-Mural Department will now disappear.

This re-organisation makes possible a more integrated use of existing facilities. It also gives a useful opportunity for us to review the general direction of our work.

THE ADULT STUDIES CENTRE (College of Social Studies)

Official Opening

The new buildings which enabled us to double our student numbers from 30 to 60 were officially opened on 18 September 1966 by the Minister for Education, The Hon. Mbiu Koinange, M.A., LL.D. Mr. Koinange also presented the first Certificates of Adult Studies to the six successful students referred to in last year's report.

The formal ceremonies were happily augmented by some two hundred traditional dancers provided by K.A.N.U. Headquarters.

Courses and Student Successes

- (a) The One Year Course was attended by 9 students, one of whom - a South African refugee - was sponsored by the U.N. Development Programme. 3 students were again entered for the University of East Africa mature-age entrance examination and for the Certificate of Adult Studies of University College, Nairobi. Six students were admitted to various courses in the University of East Africa and

six students passed the Certificate of Adult Studies. One other student is now at Ruskin College, Oxford and another at Princeton Technical College, London.

It is a pleasure to record the continued success of our first one-year course students.

Peter Buzabalyawo, Fred Kabuye and John Okach were all successful in their final B.A. examination -- the last named with Second Class Honours. It is worthy of note that one of these students had only three years formal schooling and another only eight years.

Y.M.K. Gwayambadde has now finished his second Oxford Diploma (in Social Anthropology) having completed his first (D.P.A.) last year. He is now reading for a B. Litt. Jack Gwayambadde had only a primary education plus teacher training when he came on our one-year course. He is also our first ex-student to be a candidate for a higher degree.

(a) Short Courses

Seven general three-week short courses were held, attended by 199 students. In addition there were three special courses:

- i) A refresher course for Social Workers conducted jointly by the College of Social Studies and the Kenya-Israel School (10 students for one week)
- ii) The International Press Institute sent their students in training for a one week course (26 students)
- iii) A Tutor's Conference on the Teaching of English and arranged by the Extra-Mural Department was also held. (8 students)

In addition, tutors from the C.S.S. participated in the Extra-Mural Department's Annual Study Vacation. Mr. Fordham acted as Director of Studies for the Geography Seminar.

Staff Changes

We were extremely sorry to lose the services of both Peter Temu and Mrs. June Knowles, during the course of the year. Mrs. Knowles had been with us since 1962 and Peter Temu since 1963. Their devoted teaching and experience will be greatly missed. Peter Temu has now moved to a Research Fellowship with the Institute for Development Studies at the University College Nairobi.

As our first secondee from the University of Nottingham we were glad to be able to welcome an Economist, Brian Harvey, M.A.(Econ.). His wife has undertaken the duties of part-time librarian: a task which had been neglected for far too long due to staff shortages.

At the end of the session Paul Fordham was appointed Director of the Institute of Adult Studies.

Supporters and Sponsors

Once again we have to record our appreciation at the support given to us by Government, industrial firms, the Ford Foundation, the Dulverton Trust, the Leverhulme Trust, and the Carnegie Corporation, as well as the continued personal generosity of Miss Prince of Derby.

The Carnegie Corporation have announced a renewed grant of £64,400 for both parts of the Institute for the period 1966 - 67. Without such continued generous support it would be impossible to sustain our work at the present level.

EXTRA MURAL DEPARTMENT

The year was marked by the continued growth of classes in Nairobi and further experimentation with radio and television programmes. The Department also organised the Tenth Annual Study Vacation of the University and acted as host for the Annual Conference of the Adult Education Association of East and Central Africa.

Radio and Television

The most ambitious venture of the year was the Department's second experimental television course on 'An Introduction to Law'. Viewing groups were set up in 42 centres. The total number of students who followed the course more or less regularly was 850. In 20 of these centres the weekly talk was followed by instruction given by a class tutor. The registration for these centres was 550.

Contributors to the course included the Commissioner of Police, the Solicitor-General, the Vice-Principal of the College, the Registrar of the High Court of Kenya, the Principal and Vice-Principal of the Kenya School of Law, the African Courts Officer, the Deputy Legal Secretary (E.A.C.S.O.) and the Principal of the Kenya Institute of Administration.

In addition to the law course a television series on 'The Path to Prosperity' was also produced. This course sought to promote interest in the Kenya Government's revised Development Plan.

The contributors included the Minister of Commerce and Industry and the Director of Agriculture. A number of tutorial groups were also organised with locally available economists acting as tutors.

From January 1966 broadcasts were started of a regular weekly radio talk on the general service of the Voice of Kenya. The talks comprised several series on 'The Making of the 20th Century', 'Geography for Use' and 'Mind and Matter'. These were followed later by talks on 'The Law of Matrimonial Causes', 'What is Politics?' and 'Geography in National and International Affairs'. The texts of the talks were published as handbooks which have sold well.

ANNUAL STUDY VACATION

The Extra-Mural Department was this year host to the Annual Study Vacation of the University of East Africa which was held at the University College from 27th March - 7th April inclusive.
