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Recent milestones

t is the end of the year and again this issue of the *Varsity Focus* takes stock of the milestones in the later part of 2009 and also updates you on some of the recent activities in the University. The month of December is normally associated with the graduation ceremony for the Colleges of Humanities and Social Sciences and Health Sciences. On fourth December 2009, this lot will constitute the 42nd congregation ceremony and conferment of degrees and award of diplomas to more than 3,500 students at all levels. The congregation will be in addition to the 3976 graduands awarded during the 41st ceremony held in September this year. This graduation will increase our alumni base close to 115,000 since we became a full fledged University in 1970.

In the last quarter of this academic year, over 9000 new students joined various academic programmes. The students from all levels, have since been oriented with the University life and are progressing well with their academic acitivities.

Elsewhere, the Department of Surgery, School of Medicine partnered with the Starkey Foundation to distribute over 4000 pairs of hearing aids to affected people in Nairobi and Kisumu. Also, the School of Dental Sciences received a micotome while the Department of Ophthalmology received a retcan from Daisy's Eye Cancer Fund.

In its public outreach activities, the University participated in this year's Nairobi International Trade Fair and the Public Service Week. In both activities, the University was represented by all colleges and central administration. This is on top of earlier efforts that included participation in the national and regional exhibitions and the annual open day that was held in May this year.

Our collaboration with international institutions also moved a notch higher. In November we hosted the World Bank Vice President for Africa Region, Ms. Obiageli Ezekwesili who was on official tour of the country and shared with students and staff in a lively interactive session on issues of youth unemployment and their role in development. Our association with Chinese institutions led to the UoN successfully hosting a four- day International Confucius Institutes Conference in October – the first such conference to be held in Africa. The prospects of strengthening ties were further boosted by the Chinese Ambassador H.E. Deng Hong who promised to enhance collaboration between UoN and leading Chinese Universities.

Well, all these 2009 activities will be crowned by the 2009 sports extravaganza featuring local universities between December 17 and 22, 2009. The event, showcasing most indoor and outdoor games, will staged at UoN and will be open to the public. What a sporty way to say bye to 2009 and usher in the end year holidays. Discharging our mandate



he University of Nairobi in conjunction with the Starkey Hearing Foundation and other Kenyan Hearing professionals distributed free hearing aids to Kenyan children with hearing impairment. The mission was carried out in Nairobi and Kisumu in October 2009, and targeted over 4000 children. According to Prof. Isaac Muthure Macharia of the Department of Surgery, University of Nairobi, this is the largest such mission to target hearing impaired children in Kenya. The launch

of the initiative kicked off at the University of Nairobi and benefited 1500 children from Nairobi and its environs.

The exercise which took over 10 days, targeted different levels of hearing impairment, according to Prof. Macharia, the distribution of the hearing Aids is expected to support our children to experience a change in their lives, "improved hearing and sound perception is taken for granted by many people and we must not fall into that trap denying our children the ability to hear properly " In this connection, Prof Macharia singled out Kenyatta National Hospital, the Kenya Society for the Deaf as some of the partners who had made it possible for the mission to succeed.

Hearing impairment may not be fatal but the implications at the individual, family and community

levels and the disruption that it causes to the people involved is considerable. It has far reaching implications on development of communication skills and a child's scholastic achievement. This in turn affects the ability to realize their full potential leading in many instances to socioeconomic marginalization, poverty, dependency, social isolation and poor quality of life.

The fact that hearing impairment cannot be "seen" means that it has been given a very low profile. It is therefore gratifying to note that the commitment of the Starkey Hearing

Foundation to alleviating disability from hearing impairment has resulted in distribution of more than 300,000 hearing aids to children all over the world since the year 2000.

The World Health Organization estimates that there are 278 million persons with disabling hearing loss in the world. At least two thirds of the burden of hearing loss is found in

developing countries. In Kenya, it is estimated that between four and six percent of children have hearing impairment which is severe enough to affect their learning ability. The effects of hearing impairment can be mitigated by prevention, early detection, treatment and rehabilitation.

With industrialization and increased life expectancy, hearing impairment from noise exposure and aging are likely to increase in developing countries with consequences on health care provision. It is estimated that 50 per cent of all hearing loss is preventable

through interventions that are not only currently available but could be implemented at the level of primary healthcare. Implementation of hearing prevention and preservation programmes in developing countries has been hampered by shortage of appropriately trained healthcare professionals. To alleviate this shortage of ENT and Audiological personnel, the University of Nairobi has developed training programmes through which Hearing health professionals for Kenya and the neighbouring countries have been trained. Indeed we are proud to offer the only Diploma programme in clinical Audiology and Public Health Otology in Africa while our masters' programme in ENT surgery has been recognized as one of the leading training programmes in Africa and attract students from various African countries.

Our involvement in this mission is consistent with the University of Nairobi's ENT section which has been involved in various activities, among them training audiologists for the region, convention of stakeholders forum. runnina surgical outreach programmes in various parts of the country, training ENT surgeons for the region, carrying out research and treatment of chronic discharging ears among others for Kenya and the neighbouring countries through the Diploma in Clinical Audiology and Public Health Otology. Two UoN graduates played a key role in the success of the Starkey Foundation Hearing mission in Mozambique last year.



Alumni hit 110,000 as 41st graduation is marked

he University held its 41st Graduation Ceremony on Friday, September 18, 2009. The highlight of the ceremony was the conferment of degrees and awards to 3,926 graduands broken down as 928 diplomas, 2618 bachelor's degrees, 36 postgraduate diploma awards, 381 master's degrees and 13 Doctor of Philosophy degrees. A total of 1,566 female and 2,410 male graduands were feted during the ceremony, which brought in graduands from the Colleges of :Agriculture and Veterinary Sciences; Education and External Studies; Architecture and Engineering; and Biological and Physical Sciences. The remaining two colleges – Health Sciences and Humanities and Social Sciences – will hold their ceremony in December 2009. The current number of Alumni now stands at 109,090.

In his remarks, the Chancellor, Dr. Joseph B. Wanjui stated that University has the necessary intellectual capacity to assist the government in addressing the many challenges that affect the development of our country. "The country looks upon the University as one of the key sources of practical solutions." There is thus a challenge for the University to give an account of itself by continuing to be relevant and sensitive to the development need of the people of Kenya.

In his brief remarks, the assistant minister for higher education, Dr Kilemi Mwiria reiterated the government's commitment to implement the recently negotiated terms of service with unions representing staff in public universities. Hon Mwiria was clear that the staff is an important source that should neither be wasted nor neglected.

In his remarks, Prof. Magoha, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Nairobi, commended the Principals of the College of Education and External Studies(CEES) and the College of Biological and Physical Sciences (CBPS) for their outstanding performance in the just concluded 2008/2009 contractual year. He also commended the entire staff of the University noting that it was due to their efforts and hard work that the University remained focused, stable and able to fulfill its mandate of excellence.

The Chairman, University of Nairobi Council, Mr. John Simba appealed to members of staff to remain patient noting that Council was committed to implementing the CBA signed with the Unions.

The ceremony was attended by thousands among them; Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Higher Education, Science and Technology, Prof. Crispus Kiamba, Profs. Florida Karani and Bethwel Ogot – Chancellors of Maseno and Moi Universities, respectively, the graduating students, parents, and the general public who braved the scorching sun in order to witness the proceedings.

Breast Cancer Free Clinic

This quotation is an apt introduction to the activities of a small group of students of the University of Nairobi, who decided to participate in their own small way in the Breast Cancer Awareness Month held in October, 2009. The group, which is a chapter of the Kenya Model United Nations UoN- set up a free Breast Cancer clinic in conjunction with the Aga Khan University Hospital at the UoN Main Campus on October 31.

It was certainly good to see students being involved in social responsibility and community oriented outreach, in an event which was open to students and staff. Not to be ignored or outdone was the general public, which to give them their due not only turned up, but were patient in the long queues that formed at the various registration desks set up for the oneday clinic at the Exhibition Hall of the JKML. As far as Varsity Focus estimates, over 500 people including men and women were tested, what was even more fascinating is that the event attracted a mix of people. Even before the clinic was opened at 8am, people had already queued, awaiting registration which unfortunately had to close at 1.30pm because the number of people registered by then were going to be tested well past the 5pm, planned time.

Dr. David Makumi, the Manager, Oncology Services at the Aga Khan proposed that the Hospital, in partnership with KMUN make the screening an annual event and expand it to a two-day clinic, given the large turn-out indicative of a real need. "We are very honoured to be here to deliver this service free of the usual charges, it is a service that many would benefit from"

The sentiments were echoed by Dr. Paul

Mbatia, the Patron of KMUN. In lauding the efforts and the initiative of the group he noted that "To organize a successful event requires meticulous planning, for the members of KMUN to have achieved this is no mean feat," Mbatia also alluded to the need for more preventive health initiatives, and welcomed other stakeholders to partner with the University of Nairobi in such initiatives.

According to Sonia Muasa, the Under Secretary General of KMUN-UoN Main Campus Chapter, KMUN is a United Nations youth Club, which is concerned about the welfare of humanity. The involvement of KMUN therefore in the free breast screening, is part of the Millennium Development Goals (MDG) 3 which calls for

the promotion of gender equality and empowerment of women.

One of the issues of concern as raised by those who attended the clinic was cervical cancer, as well as other cancers, indeed there was opportunity for open talks, video shows and other presentations. The breast cancer free clinic, was sponsored by among others, the University of Nairobi, The Aga Khan University, Pelican Signs, H2O Beverages and Homeboyz Radio 91.5 FM.

Sustainable water conference

he Pan Africa Chemistry Network (PACN) Kenya Hub, an initiative of the Royal Society of Chemistry and the University of Nairobi recently held a successful International Conference on Sustainable Water at the College of Biological and Physical Sciences. The Conference which ran between 25th – 28th August, 2009, was attended by over 200 participants drawn from East and Southern Africa, including the Horn, as well as the United Kingdom.

The Conference reviewed critical issues in water resource management at both theoretical and applied water knowledge. The participants who extended the "water wisdom" concept submitted their work on the following areas: sustainable water management and training, technological development that enhances water quality and quantity, water policy, legal and institutional and financing of water resources and the effects of climate change on water quality and availability.

It was noted that African countries face several water challenges that require solutions at national, regional and global levels, not least because the quality of water world wide is generally in a state of decline. The sanitation standards are unacceptably low due to lack of technology for water re-use, recycling and treatment. Water quality is therefore inadequate and below the World Health Organization standards.


Above all, the rural and periurban water supply quality is not considered as an essential part of most water treatment systems. It is critical that most of the rivers and water courses in the world are non-gauged, and therefore water pollution statistics are limited, old technologies are being applied and water laboratories are scarce. Hence there is a need for robust and low cost technologies to measure key water quality parameters.

In addition, the water demand for agricultural use is increasing rapidly due to food security issues. The rainfall pattern is varying due to climate change, deforestation, a high evaporation index and over exploitation of water resources. The development of most of the hydropower projects has resulted in the damming of rivers, with subsequent reduction of water flows and volumes. Due to these shortcomings there is a knowledge gap with respect to water data.

It was also noted that, at present, a segmented approach to African water issues is not yielding positive results. The following UN Organizations have some activities related to water: African Ministerial Committee for Water of UNEP, the World Bank, the UN Economic Commission for Africa, Africa Development Bank, UN Children's Fund, WHO, UN Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and World Meteorological Organization. However, there is great need for a central coordinating body to handle water in the continent.

he University of Nairobi scooped several trophies and prizes during the 2009 Nairobi International Trade
Fair held at the end of September.
The theme of the trade fair was "agribusiness in attaining food sufficiency in vision 2030."

This year, over 21 departments/ units took part in the trade fair. Popular exhibits included cactus flower syrup extraction; the Osama weevil and control methods; the dream drip irrigation tool kit; and education through distance and e-learning. A major attraction was the services offered where dental

checkups, blood pressure readings;; blood sugar and weight calculation took centre stage.

The College of Agriculture and Veterinary Sciences (CAVS) departments scooped 31 prizes in the farm and dairy competitions, the wins which ranged between 1st and 3rd prizes were as follows:

Field station -18 entries including local vegetables-10 entries won 1st prize, five entries won second prize, three entries won third prize. In Plant Sciences, 23 entries including spices, herbs, flowers were entered; three entries won 1st prize, four

entries won second prize, six entries won 3rd prize. In the Cheese category all the five entries scooped position one. Others were the rabbits' category where UoN won first prize for male rabbits and 3rd prize for weaners, while in the category of eggs, position one was also secured.

By participating, the University was able to: enhance its visibility in the market; transact business; establish and strengthen business relations; provide information. Overall the University was judged second in the category of institutions of higher learning.



Microsoft leadership lecture at UoN

he University of Nairobi posted another first when it hosted the Inaugural Microsoft Leadership Lecture Series in the East African region on October 1, 2009. The lecture series has been designed to target the young people in Africa, addressing different themes and challenges facing the people and continent of Africa.

This year, the lecture was delivered by Dr. Alioune Sall, the Executive Director of the Institute for African Futures. His lecture was based on a book that he authored titled "Africa 2025: What possible future for Africa?" Dr. Sall challenged the young people to take advantage of the expanding field of information technology to address the problems affecting the African continent. The Institute for African

Futures is an African platform for prospective thinking to facilitate the formulation by African countries of endogenous development models and approaches to achieve social justice, safeguard the dignity of their people and win the battle of the 21st century.

During the occasion, the chairman of Microsoft Africa Dr. Cheik Modibo Diarra revealed that the corporation was translating its software into African languages in order to reach more people and break the literacy barrier in accessing IT. Dr. Diarra challenged African universities to take advantage of the corporation's free translating software to translate computer programs into more African languages. He revealed that Microsoft has translated some of their software programs in the Zulu language, and was willing to sponsor outstanding computer science students within the various institutes.

On his part, the Vice- Chancellor in remarks read by Professor Enos Njeru, Dean, Facultly of Arts, thanked Microsoft for mandating the University to host the Lecture Series. He revealed that the University has a clear policy on the use of IT in carrying out its mission. The team later paid a courtsey call on the Vice-Chancellor where they were met by Prof. Henry Mutoro, Principal, College of Education and External Studies on his behalf.

In his brief remarks, the Chancellor



Meet Mwalimu Rayya Timammy, from a distance Rayya simply strikes you as an ordinary, buibui covered Muslim woman. But come closer now and her ever covered face catches your attention, wait a minute you think, you now have the new impression that there is more to this woman, her grey eyes are focused, her face exudes deep contemplation, captive, penetrating, leaving you to guess about the missing details of her intellectual and social background.

Rayya is a combination of intellect and social affluence, this is essentially what I see as we interact more, I realize that I have known her, but I have known her not.. Let me tell you about her...



Determination, intellect

Rayya Timammy is a senior lecturer and associate dean of the faculty of arts; she is based at Kikuyu campus. Rayya is one of the few muslim intellectuals on campus, often standing out at meetings of the Senate, College Management Board and at times in the Deans Committee where she has often succeeded in riling up male obstinence. This last bit excites the feminist in many of us. Rayya has a tongue that can cut to shreds, but she tempers it with logic, public relations and charm

Rayya was born and brought up at the coast. Her father, a civil

servant, was always on transfer and thus Rayya started school in Lamu, one year later her father moved to Mombasa, then back to Lamu, Kilifi and back to Mombasa. Rayya thus has moved schools in different district, the saving grace being that government primary schools do not deter anybody wishing to learn even when their parents are on transit.

After sitting her Certificate of Primary Education exams, Rayya joined the Aga Khan High School in Mombasa for form 1-4 and then Coast girls for form 5-6. Between 1985 and 1988, Rayya pursued a Bachelor of Education course at Kenyatta University. In 1989-'990, Rayya was admitted to the University of Nairobi to pursue the Master of Arts program in the department of linguistics.

I guess that Rayya is the quintessential student, she married and started her family before she joined Kenyatta University, her three children thus are university bred in the sense that they have read and done their homework as their mother was reading her notes and preparing her thesis. "I have faced the challenges of academia all my life because I have studied

while still raising my babies and children" Rayya's mother has been one of her greatest supporters in that when Rayya joined her undergraduate class, her mother needed no persuasion, she simply took in Rayya's eldest child and raised him for three years. This young child, a son, graduated from the University of Nairobi in 2008, no doubt motivated by his mother.

Rayya's first job was as an untrained teacher, in 1989; this was just three months before she commenced her master's course."I was picked to pursue a master's course at both Kenyatta and the University of Nairobi. I choose Nairobi because I had already studied at Kenyatta and I wanted new experiences in the world of academia and especially new exposure. However, what spurred my interest in academia was Prof Mohammed Bakari." Prof Bakari was then a lecturer in the department of religious studies at the University of Nairobi, and during her undergraduate days, he would visit her family, he provided Rayya with a lot of material and he would encourage her to read and to pursue knowledge, "I am a hard worker but he was the one who pushed me to apply my talent through masters and even up to PhD level"

Rayya believes that the PhD requirement in academia is critical" if you see people with a title you also want to have the same title applied to you; it

makes you to aspire for the same." Rayya registered for her PhD studies in 1994, and was awarded her PhD in 2002, her seminal work was titled "Mombasa Swahili Women's Wedding Songs: A Stylistic Analysis" At this point in the interview I pause, I know what is coming up next and I am not disappointed, tell me she asks, have you registered for your PhD studies? Why ever not? Tell me what the problem is, and let us see how to tackle it. I laugh sheepishly.

Mwalimu Rayya teaches units in Kiswahili poetry, oral literature, stylistics, and literature to students at both main campus and at the two schools at Kikuyu campus. Apart from teaching Mwalimu has supervised at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels and to her credit has supervised over 20 candidates. Dr Timammy has five publications to her credit while at least 10 papers are due for publication in referred journals and publishing houses. Dr Timammy serves as mentor to airls in high school in her home district of Lamu and Mombasa, she also mentors on career choices and study during school holidays.

Mwalimu Rayya is a devout Muslim and has gone the pilgrim way twice; she has served on SUPKEM as well as with the Muslim sisterhood. I have always been struck by the way that Rayya keeps the faith, wearing the Hijab is not a chore or duty but rather is her belief. But she quickly as always tells me that decency in dress and manner is the mark of a gentle lady, muslim or non muslim" you, she is addressing me now, have also kept

to decency in dress and manner, don't you see its relationship to intellect and personal style"

In her own right, Dr Rayya is a writer; she has several poems, short stories to her credit. She is also an advisor on peace, sexuality, religion and women. Her research /consultancy interests are varied, they include medicine and health; education and sexuality; family planning and ideology; gender disparity and development. The bit on sexuality has caught my attention, no doubt because my philistine nature perceives that muslim women is cannot be sexual beings, but I am wrong because as Dr Rayya explains to me, she has studied this area with great diligence applying the rules of scientific discourse and she has some interesting results to share.

Dr Rayyas career has not been all that smooth; there have been those who have attempted to derail her, based on their perception of Islam. After she finished her undergraduate course, she was offered a position at the post office. At the time, there was a policy of offering jobs in parastatals to minorities based on race, religion, gender and ethnic groupings. At the time, she had been offered the masters scholarship. A friend of the family implored her husband not to allow her to pursue her studies, perhaps on the mistaken notion that educated women look down on their husbands. However, her husband would not be drawn in by the pressure. He told me that I should complete my studies; he is a great supporter of all my efforts.

Dr Rayya continues to share her experiences based on the fact that she knows her rights in the religion. There are those who think that Islam hinders women, but she herself believes in knowing her rights. The Koran has several Hadiths which stress that all must seek knowledge. The knowledge is not defined nor is the seeker gender specified. Thus Dr Rayya has been confident and strong that she is following her dream and talent in the strength offered by the Koran


which says "seek for knowledge" from the cradle to the grave". Thus Dr.Rayya emphasizes that the search for knowledge is incumbent upon both men and women.

Dr Rayya first joined the University in 1991 as a temporary lecturer and was later appointed assistant lecturer. Her base of operation was the department of Kiswahili at kikuyu campus. Rayya has risen up the ranks and has many experiences to relate. During the merger of the faculty of social sciences and the faculty of arts, the administration were satisfied that she was capable of handling the departments shared by the school of education, the school of business and the faculty of arts. These eight departments needed a coordinator and hence her appointments as associate dean. Dr Rayya has worked hard taking up

the challenge of managements such that she is serving a second term as associate dean. But she has taken time to write papers and to publish because she is convinced that her next appointments should be that of associate professor. "In the corridors of the university, there are so many people who called me doctor even before I got my PhD, now that I have a PhD they call me professor, I believe that this is a challenge to me to get the title and soon."

In her parting shot, Dr
Timammy states that anybody
can aspire, anybody can
achieve so long as they apply
the best to their jobs, to their
studies, applying the best of
their ability will take them far" we
Muslims believe that whatever
you have been given, you are
answerable to God"

Dr., Mwalimu Rayya Timammy is a combination of intellect and social breeding, pillared by her deep faith in God and in the tenets of Islam. The sky is the limit; heaven is the goal for this quintessential scholar, mentor, teacher and friend.

he Mitsubishi Corporation (MC) recently donated Kshs 864,000 to support nine students from the department of Geography and Environmental Studies. The donation was presented in a ceremony jointly organized by the University of Nairobi and the Corporation in the Council Chamber, University of Nairobi, on October 2nd 2009. Apart from the donation, The corporation also signed a memorandum of understanding with the University, for more linkages and support.

The Japanese Ambassador to Kenya, H.E. Shigeo Iwatani, who was the chief guest, said that the scholarships will strengthen the relations between Kenyan learning institutions and Japanese companies. He challenged students to utilize the opportunity and further studies in environmental education.

Training of research and devt of medicinal plants

he University of Nairobi hosted the 7th Advanced Training Program of Research and Development of Medicinal Plants for African Countries.

The training which was jointly organized by the University of Nairobi and Tianjin University of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TUTCM), Tianjin, China ran from 2nd to 16th November 2009.

The programme attracted 22 participants drawn from different institutions in Ethiopia, Kenya,

Rwanda, Sudan and Tanzania. The training program is for researchers in the field of traditional medicine. There have been annual training programs since 2004. The history of the training programs dates back to 2001 when the 1st advanced training program of research and development of medicinal plants for developing countries, sponsored by the Ministry of Education (MOE) and undertaken by Tianjin University of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TUTCM) was held.

Over 120 practitioners drawn from 23 developing countries with

11 coming from Kenya have been trained so far.

The advanced training program aims at equipping practitioners with the basic theories, knowledge and skills of natural botanic chemistry, instrumental analysis, and pharmaceutical formulations of medicines from nature among others. In order to assist the participants in the field of the research and development of new botanical medicine, they are given theoretical and practical aspects in different areas

The University of Nairobi became the first institution outside China to host this training program. This is a great honor to the University, and marks what can be considered as the beginning of a long and lasting collaboration between the University and TUTCM in the area of medicines from nature.

The training was officially opened by Prof. J.T. Kaimenyi (Deputy Vice Chancellor -Academic Affairs) on 2nd November 2009. Also present at the ceremony which was held in the School of Medicine Board Room were the Principals of various Colleges, Director- Centre for International Programs and Links, Deans and Directors of College of Health Sciences, officials from the Chinese Embassy, senior TUTCM administrators led by Prof. GAO Xiumei (Ms.), Vice-President, Prof. HU Limin, Dean of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) Institute, Prof. XU Li, Deputy Dean of International Education College, Prof. CHU Lirong (Ms.), Deputy Dean of International Education College, lecturers from TUTCM and the practitioners.

he University of Nairobi recently played host to the first Confucius Institutes Conference in Africa bringing together delegates from Confucius Institutes in the world. The local host, the Confucius Institute at the University of Nairobi organized the four-day conference between September 22-25, 2009, during which, delegates exchanged experiences on establishing and managing Confucius Institutes.

Confucius Institutes are named after a great Chinese personality Confucius or Kong Fu Zi who was a thinker, political figure, educator and a founder of the Ru school of Chinese thought. In a speech read by the Assistant Minister for Higher Educatioin Science and Technology, Hon Dr. Kilemi Mwiria, on behalf of the minister Dr Sally Kosgei, lauded the Kenya-Sino relationship and congratulated the University of Nairobi for living up to its vision of being a world class university. The minister noted that the conference would enhance collaboration between

China to Increase ties with UoN

he Chinese government will increase educational ties with University of Nairobi (UoN). This was revealed by the Chinese Ambassador to Kenya, H.E. Deng Hongbo, when he paid a courtesy call on the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. George Magoha.

The Ambassador said that the embassy attaches great importance in promoting educational exchanges between the two countries and strengthening existing relations. Ambassador Hongbo underscored the importance of UoN networking with leading Chinese institutions of higher learning emphasizing that his office will play the necessary facilitative role.

While welcoming the new ambassador to the University, Prof. Magoha observed that

there are visible signs that ties between China and Kenya have been strengthened in the recent past. He cited the Confucius Institute at UoN as a leading educational outfit in Africa offering Chinese language. He added that UoN is keen to extend ties in science, information technology, medicine, agriculture, and engineering among others with leading top Chinese universities. UoN has a Memorandum of Understanding with Tianjin Normal University that crystallized into the Confucius Centre in 2005.

Prof. Magoha represents Africa on the International Council of Confucius Institutes board. In October, 2009, UoN hosted the International Confucius Conference which brought together all Confucius Institutes in Africa.

Those present during the courtesy call were Prof. Henry Mutoro, Prof. Lucy Irungu and Prof. Agnes Mwang'ombe – Principals of Colleges Education, Biological and Physical Sciences, and Agriculture and Veterinary Sciences respectively. Also present was the Director, Centre for International Programmes and Linkages, Prof. Simon Mitema.

Chairman nominated environ ambassador

he Chairman of the Students' Organization of the University of Nairobi (SONU), Mr. David Osiany has been nominated the East Africa region Bayer Young Environmental Envoy (BYEE) to the United Nations.

Mr. Osiany and two other nominees, Beth Wambui Mbote and Jack Omamo - Homeboyz and the media nominee , are scheduled to attend a meeting in Germany later this month, as part of information and data gathering. UON-DAAD Links celebrated

n October 22nd 2009, the University of Nairobi hosted the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) in a celebration of constitution making. The celebrations brought in distinguished scholars from East Africa, Germany, Kenyan DAAD alumni and the general public. The celebration dubbed 60 Years of German Constitution was held in the 8.4.4. Lecture hall of the University of Nairobi's Main Campus.

In brief remarks, the Vice-Chancellor, University of Nairobi, Prof. George Magoha stated that the University remains committed to its policy of fostering an intellectual culture that bridges theory with practice. Prof Magoha lauded the presence of the new Ambassador of the Federal Republic of Germany to Kenya Ms. Margit Hellwig-Boette, among the more than 100 former and current DAAD fellows. He congratulated Germany on the 60th anniversary of her constitution and expressed his hope that the talks and debates at the conference will contribute to processes that most Kenyans hope will soon lead to a new constitution in their own country.

On her part, Ambassador Hellwig-

Boette, highlighted the long standing history of collaboration that Kenya and Germany share, emphasizing that at present and in future, there are a lot of interests that the two countries should pursue in the spirit of partnership and for the mutual benefit of the citizens of both nations.

Gabriele von Fircks, the DAAD director for Subsahara Africa, introduced Prof. Gilbert Gornig from the University of Marburg (Germany) who delivered the key note speech on the Grundgesetz (the so called "basic law"). According to Gornig, it is the debates and traditions that eventually culminated in the German constitution six decades ago. "There is need therefore for the people of Kenya to debate extensively and to interrogate the constitution making process without fear or favor"

During the forum, there was a panel of discussants on the relevance of the German case for present legislative developments in Kenya, moderated by Louis Otieno, and including Ambassador Hellwig-Boette, Prof. Gornig, Dr. Bernard Sihanya, Dean School of Law, University of Nairobi, Dr Sebastian Seedorf, Ministry of Interior, Berlin/ Germany, Prof. P.J. Kabudi, Dean School of Law, the University of Dar es Salaam, and Mr. Wilfred Nderitu, Vice-Chairperson-Kenya Section of the International Commission of Jurists).

Participants also extended their discussion to the areas of constitutional issues that evolve around the key concepts of federalism, electoral law, parliamentary - presidential constitution and pluralism in law.

Yesterday I received a reprieve, a learned man who I am interacting with reminded me of my student years by his reference to the words they used to use for girls and boys in the dating scene. It brought to mind my high school days and a flash forward to Bollywood.

There was a time, when I was still young, when we referred to our boy friends as dudes, this may have been

a silent reflection that while they often looked good, they were a bit fake or useless. Depending on which side of the social life you belonged to the boys went by different names, my friends from Eastland's called their girlfriends mandista or madame. In the southern part of town, boys were known as blokes and charlies, I guess many behaved like Andy Capp, with behavior typical of Riverwood.

At some point, depending on where you went to school a dude referred to his girl friend as my main squeeze, my babe, my chick, I don't know why guys are not called jogoo, or cock, maybe those words were too sexual, and the boys were not that great....AKA Bongowood.

In the last few years the words chilles, jamas, mpango wa kando, piriton, shipep and ciirunda have gained currency. Some of these are gender specific, with at least references to what relationship to expect for instance if your girls is piriton, she makes you very sleepy after some activity. Just last week, my young friends with a straight face told me that women now refer to their boyfriends as hubby, while women are known as Ma'am. They made me laugh as they informed me that it was now not polite to refer to each other with names such as ATM, tour guide, cnnlive and anti-Jcheeky buggers!!.

At the University, as we pretended not to notice each other, we denigrated the opposite sex; the men were roaches or clip boards, the women were boxers. Roaches believed we was appropriate as the men and our associations with them tended to come up out of the wood work the same way that cockroaches do, again as a large number were scholarly inclined they all tended to carry their clipboards

of notes around with them, maybe to impress us. The men decided that since the women think more or less the same, they are boxed in their thinking hence the name maboxer, they live in the box. Appropriate then that the cockroach must invade the box regularly.

A friend of mine remembers that in high school, there was interaction with both gender taking advantage of debating societies; economic clubs etc to meet each other. For all of us dancing was an important vehicle to enable us to get in close contact. The dancing exercise provided opportunities for developing relationships with the girls as potential future partners. Another friend, an older man insists that as young high school boys and university students, they looked forward to fruitful relationships with girls and it was important for

them to have their own style of communication—the equivalent of today's "sheng."

The older generation also had its words for girls, "We used to have discussions which people outside our circle could not comprehend. For example, we had nicknames for girls in our time, the names related to the anatomy and makeup of the girls, others to the predilection for some hank-panky, others related to our reactions to them. The list of names included: atom, molecule, nightcargo, generous, micro, mini, cricket, timken, bone-shaker, conjugate, and hydraulics. I guess and I must be right that this was a rotten society; the names are not complimentary of the morals of the women. Maybe those guys were just cockroaches. The names suggested a Hollywood lifestyle.

As we talk of boys and girls, there was always stiff competition for

the few cultured men and women available. It was quite normal for young men to fight over a girl especially during occasions like evening parties and dancing. The fighting would take the form of boxing and wrestling, or could sometimes turn ugly with bottles and chairs flying in crowded dancing halls. The girls were less vocal and forward but there was, I must admit some ugly, quiet and malicious fights were clandestinely carried out, if you want to know the nature of the fights, watch the Nigerian Nollywood movies.

Prof. H.W.O Okoth Ogendo: An Appreciation Tribute by Prof. Makumi Mwagiru

In all of academic life, there are images, and people that we think always about, and who we always remember when we think about the trials, tribulations and challenges of life in the academy. There are those in the dawn, and in the setting of the sun whom we feel privileged to have been associated with. And there are those who in their evening have reminded us of how great the journey has been.

Prof Okoth Ogendo was a great teacher, and a humble scholar, so

humble that in his greatness, he wore his great scholarship lightly. He did not burden his students with the awesomeness of his scholarship; rather, he wanted to grow his students, and to nurture them into the soaring intellectual heights that he, had already reached. The Guru was awesome in his learning, and awesome in the reach of his mind. The suppleness of his mind was a matter of wonder, and a thing of great beauty.

The Guru as he came to be fondly known, taught most of the lawyers of Kenya, both great and small - the beauty of land law, and brought to that complex subject a humanity that told of the toils and joys and undying hunger of millions of citizens. He brought to land law the unceasing and undying dream of the hearts and minds of those who love the country and its soil.

But he had other loves too, one of which was the constitutional laws of Africa. He wrote and taught of constitutional orders that would enhance the dignity of people. He hated dictatorships, but stood toe to toe with those who had different opinions. He worked for and lived for a constitutional order that would make gentler the lives of the African people.

And oft forgotten was his mastery of the labour laws. He studied under Kahn Freund at Oxford,

and when he came back home, as he always would, he taught labour law, and instilled in it the passion of his teacher. Then, with brilliance, he demonstrated why that philosophy of labour law lacked the understanding and the appreciation of the culture and history of the people of Kenya. We learnt the labour law and philosophy of an old master, but appreciated the labour law and jurisprudence of a master for the future.

The Guru had a profound understanding of jurisprudence. Unlike others who pretended to know this subject, his was not knowledge of the jurisprudence of commentators, but a profound knowledge of the issues of the philosophy of law. He used this knowledge to enhance the understanding of the legal system of Kenya and our continent and to make great our understanding of other peoples and their systems of government.

But what marked his standing as a great teacher was his relationship with his students after they left his hands. And they went into the magistracy and judgeship, to the academy and to the diplomatic service; to politics and to business; to the arts and to sports; to the media and theatre, and to all the corners of the diverse life of Kenya and the continent.

University to host National Inter-Varsity Sports Championship
