A General Information Sheet from the Vice-Chancellor

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1. THE 10TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NAIROBI - 1980

In July 1980, the University of Nairobi will be 10 years old since it became a national university. The last ten years have been years of rapid expansion. Student numbers have increased, new departments have been started and physical facilities have been expanded to cater for these developments. Although accelerated growth is a matter of great pride, the problems it has generated are a great challenge as the University tries to provide educational facilities for all those qualified and who wish to have university education in an effort to provide high level manpower for national development. It is for these reasons that the Joint Meeting of the University of Nairobi Council and Kenyatta University College Council held on 24 January, 1980 decided to get the University to celebrate its 10th Anniversary.

In the last ten years, the University has done considerable work in relevant research. Since 1970 the contributions of departments and individuals in the field of research are reported yearly in the annual reports. Over the years, more and more emphasis has been laid on research and consequently the research capability of the University has improved considerably. The University has in this way contributed towards solving national and international development problems.

Efforts have also been directed at improving professional and cultural activities of the University community as demonstrated by the exhibitions put up by various departments each year, by participation in sports at both local and international levels, by performances by such groups as the University of Nairobi Free Travelling Theatre, and the departments of music and performing arts and dance. A lot of professional services are provided to the public by all departments and individuals of the University.

The University and, hopefully, the public have a lot to be proud of regarding higher education in the country.

Celebration of the 10th Anniversary will offer the University community and the public an opportunity to look back at these achievements and to focus attention into the future.

All the faculties and departments are, therefore, requested to consider the most suitable ways of celebrating this occasion. It is suggested, for example, that there should be exhibitions of University publications by individual members of staff, by departments and faculties; displays of work done by various departments and individuals for the advancement of knowledge and for solving international and national development problems; cultural activities by performing groups; sports competitions; and public lectures. The public will be invited to view these during the period that may last for some 7 - 10 days.

2. INAUGURAL LECTURES

A programme of inaugural and public lectures which will be held during the year will be published shortly. It is hoped that the lectures themselves will not be too technical for the layman in a given area of specialisation. The lectures will be given in a form which will enable non-experts in a given field to benefit from listening to them. As many members of the University community as possible are encouraged to attend. An abstract of each of these lectures will be published in the Varsity Focus in a form which we hope will be general enough to enable everyone to be involved in interdisciplinary debate of issues raised by the lectures. The first of these lectures was given on Thursday, 31 January, 1980 at 5.30 p.m. in the Taifa Hall by Prof. J. Muhangi of the Department of Psychiatry, Faculty of Medicine, on "Psychiatry in Kenya: the new horizons in medical care".

3. FACULTY BASED STUDENTS' ORGANISATIONS

Interdisciplinary activities in the University take various forms and have different objectives. The University will endeavour to facilitate such activities by both staff and students and will provide opportunities for all to interact. In order to do so all the students' associations, clubs and societies are invited to programme their activities during the year, to include activities of an interdisciplinary nature. In particular, these organisations should emphasize the need for specific programmes aimed at achieving the objectives of each group. The Vice-Chancellor hopes to participate in some if not all such activities. It is important, however, when programming these activities to keep the overall University objectives in mind.

5. STUDENTS

5.1 Mughal Tariq Mahmood : Condolences

The University has sent condolences to the family of the late Mr. Mughal Tariq, a 2nd year medical student, who died at the Aga Khan Hospital on 24 August, 1979. He was a respected athlete among his peers — he won a scholarship to study in the U.S.A. on account of his outstanding performance on the track. A pleasant and hard-working student, he is missed by all, especially those that have studied, competed and lived with him. The tragic circumstances of his death are still fresh in our minds. /late Mr. Tariq was a victim of the violent attack by gangsters at the home of Dr. Mustafa early this year.

5.2 P.N. Wanyika

Mr. P.N. Wanyika, a 2nd year student in the department of Mechanical Engineering, sustained a fracture on his right leg in January 1979. Although he received all the necessary medical attention, his health deteriorated. He received the rites of the sick in St. Paul's Chapel. Soon after this he was admitted to Kenyatta National Hospital where he passed away on Friday, 19 October, 1979.

5.3 Elisha Omondi

The University learnt with great sorrow of the death of Mr. Elisha Omondi, a 5th year medical student. This occurred after a car in which three 5th year medical students were travelling was involved in an accident on 25 October, 1979. Omondi died a day later at Nakuru Hospital. We extend our deep sympathies and condolences to his parents and relatives.

Mr. Kenneth Otieno Ouro Sigu and Mr. Isaac Omondi Obiji Olum, who were also in the same car, were injured. Mr. Sigu was treated at Nakuru Hospital and discharged. Mr. Olum is still at the Kenyatta National Hospital.

5.4 Pauline Nyokabi Mugo

The University also learnt with shock of the death of a 2nd year student, Miss Pauline Nyokabi Mugo. Miss Mugo died after a car accident on Saturday, 27 October 1979 on Mombasa Road. Once more, our condolences go to her parents and relatives.

8. THE WORLD UNIVERSITY GAMES

In September 1979, students of the University participated in the 10th World University Games which were held in Mexico City. Samuel Nyarfki, a Pharmacy student, won a bronze medal in the 10,000 metres race. When it is considered that the medal was one of the only two that the whole of Africa won, where 92 world nations participated, it was no mean achievement.

Europeans countries dominated the games. The Soviet Union collected 71 medals, followed by the United States with 51 medals, then Rumania with 30 medals. Other nations followed in the following order: West Germany, East Germany, Hungaria, Italy, Holland, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Great Britain, Japan, Mexico, Brazil, China, France, Australia, South Korea, Austria, Cuba, Finland, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, Uruguay, Switzerland, India, Ivory Coast, Canada and Kenya. There were 63 countries that never won any medals.

In tennis, James Ilako, a B.Sc. student put up good performances and won his games against Korea, Lebanon and Swaziland, before losing in the quarter finals to Rumania. It is gratifying to note that Ilako has kept training hard. In January, we won the top awards in Singles and Doubles of the Parklands Open Tournament which attracted players from Kenya and from other countries as well.

The stage is already set for our University students to participate in games at top national and international levels. We have the potential for forming the best teams in the country if the University puts in hard and disciplined training. Examples have been seen in Rugby, Basketball, Handball and Hockey.

Meanwhile, a body of University students and staff have formed the Kenya Universities Sports Association with the purpose of promoting interest and standards in sports. University staff the who have got some contribution to make in sports are encouraged to assist the students in uplifting the standards of sports at the University.
