

DEPARTMENT OF LINGUISTICS AND LANGUAGES ANNUAL REPORT (2012)

In the year ending 2012, there were many activities that the Department of Linguistics and Languages recorded. To appreciate this statistics, I will outline them briefly as follows:

Modes of Study

In 2012, the Department offered a variety of academic programmes in three main modules:

- a. Module I (Regular)
- b. Module II (Evening and Day)
- c. Module III (Open and Distance Learning mode)

In all the modules, there was an increase in the intake of students.

Academic Programmes

The Department offers academic programmes at different levels including Certificate, Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts and PhD.

- **Certificate Programmes**

The Department offers certificate courses in English Bridging and in Chinese Language and Culture. In 2012, the Certificate course in Chinese language graduated had a good number of students.

- **Bachelor of Arts Programmes (Module I & II)**

The Department offers Bachelor of Arts programmes in the following areas:

- i. Linguistics
- ii. Arabic studies

- iii. German studies
- iv. Kiswahili studies
- v. Chinese Language and Culture
- vi. Language and Communication

In all the areas except Chinese language and culture, the department recorded an increase in the number of graduands.

- **Master of Arts Programmes (Module I & II)**

The Department of Linguistics and Languages offers Master of Arts degrees in the following options as offered in the 2012 academic year.

- a. M.A. in Linguistics
- b. M.A. in Kiswahili
- c. M.A. in Arabic studies
- d. M.A. in German studies
- e. M.A. in Translation and Interpretation

In all the above programmes, the Department also recorded an increase in the number of graduands.

PhD Programmes

The PhD programme at the Department which is done only by research thesis for a minimum period of 3 years is offered in following areas:

- a. Linguistics
- b. Kiswahili studies
- c. Arabic studies

In the year 2012, the Department graduated a record 5 Ph.D students spread as follows: two in Linguistics (Discourse Analysis and Sociolinguistics), One in Arabic phonology, one in Kiswahili poetry and the other in Kiswahili Novel.
