The pictorial section contains selected images of important corporate activities of 2013. We hope that this Annual Report highlights interests for our stakeholders. We appreciate your feed back.

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

1.2 Board of Postgraduate Studies

The Board of Postgraduate Studies (BPS) was established in 1985 in accordance with statute XX (now XXI) to manage and coordinate postgraduate studies in the University of Nairobi

POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS' ENROLMENT

In 2013, BPS processed 8,061 postgraduate applications including 421 doctoral applicants.

GRADUATION

In 2013, the number of postgraduate graduands reached a record high of 3,611 comprising two DScs, 94 PhDs, 3,409 Masters and 106 Postgraduate diplomas, becoming the highest number of postgraduate graduands produced so far in the history of the university.

MARKETING OF POSTGRADUATE PROGRAMMES

In 2013 the University of Nairobi run 305 postgraduate programmes in its six colleges. The Board continued to reach out to those interested in our programmes through participating in local and international exhibitions.

VETTING OF PROGRAMMES

The Board vetted new and revised syllabi for 11 programs.

AWARD OF SCHOLARSHIPS

In 2013, the BPS in a joint meeting with Deans/Directors allocated a total of 132 UON and Sasakawa scholarships. The Board also participated in the National DAAD forum for scholarships distribution.

1.3 Administration Department

STAFF

In 2013, the University had a staff complement of 5,404 members of staff out of which 1,654 were academic staff. In 2013, the status of staff was as follows:

1.5 Student Welfare Authority

Introduction

The Student Welfare Authority (SWA) is the hospitality wing of the University. SWA is mandated to provide quality and affordable accommodation and catering services to enhance student welfare.

REVENUE COLLECTION

In 2013, SWA realized KES.216.8 Million from its operations in catering, accommodation and income generating activities.

REPAIRS AND RENOVATIONS

During the year, SWA undertook repairs/ renovation of its facilities including painting, repairs as follows: Painting was undertaken in one hall and kitchen in Lower Kabete, Chiromo Hall and the ceiling of the Chiromo kitchen, one hall in Upper Kabete, one hall in Kikuyu, Mamlaka block B (rearview). Repair work was undertaken for T.V room Chairs, Lower Kabete, Washroom partitions in one hall in Women's Hall, and replacement of worn out flush doors in Parklands.

CHALLENGES

In 2013, SWA faced challenges that included; the continued rising costs of goods and services against constant selling prices of accommodation and catering services; limited financial resources, over used facilities, inadequate bed space.

1.6 Centre for International Programmes and Links [CIPL]

INTRODUCTION

The Centre for International Programmes and Links [CIPL] was established in November 2001 and charged with the responsibility of initiating, promoting, facilitating and coordinating international programmes and links, staff and student exchanges

and mobility, collaborative research projects and worldwide networking.

The Centre acts as a window for internationalization of the University of Nairobi (UON), and works to provide better services to international students and faculty in addition to fostering global partnership linkages for national development.

ACTIVITIES

In 2013, CIPL facilitated the signing of 20 bilateral collaborations with renowned international universities, organizations and industry around the world. These collaborations mainly focused on joint research and publications, exchange of academic material(s) and publications and mobility among researchers and students.

The Centre also engaged with other institutions to establish linkages, through these linkages, the Center leveraged funding from European Commission funded projects (AFIMEG, ARISE, ANGLE), Commonwealth scholarships and Education International (EI,) among others.

During this period, the Centre facilitated staff and student study abroad programme in France, South Africa, South Korea and Japan, while 15 students studied in foreign institutions. In addition, several students were facilitated on industrial attachment locally. The Centre facilitated the appointment of six visiting professors in teaching and research activities on an exchange programme. The Centre also realized a significant improvement In the proportion of incoming and outgoing international students and staff increased as compared to the previous year.

In 2013, there were 130 International students registered in the colleges. During the year CIPL updated its webpage in compliance with corporate requirements. Other features in the webpage update include face book, twitter, photo gallery and videos which have all become interactive and made the website more robust.

The CIPL will continue to work with all sections of the UON in order to continuously make our University, which has always had a distinctly international profile, attractive by ensuring high quality research in all academic disciplines.

CIPL's strategic activities for 2013 included marketing the activities of CIPL locally and internationally by use of mass media, websites, workshops and exhibitions.

WAY FORWARD

The Center for International Programmes and Links will continue to demand full disclosure of all on-going international projects in departments/schools from the respective Deans/Directors. In this connection, the Centre posted the MOU monitoring questionnaire on the UoN intranet to enable it monitor and ensure compliance with the provisions of Memoranda of Understanding and Agreements by various colleges/faculties/schools/ institutes/ departments.

CIPL will maintain data on active and inactive MOUs/MOAs and data on international student enrolment.

1.7 Construction & Maintenance Department

The department is charged with the responsibility of developing and managing new capital projects and maintaining the existing physical facilities. One example of new capital projects is the beginning of construction works for the proposed University of Nairobi Towers, a 22 storey building that is set to alter the landscape of the University of Nairobi. By the end of 2013, the construction progress was 40 percent complete.

COMPLETED PROJECTS

In 2013, the department completed a number of projects as follows:

- Phase 1 of the proposed construction of SEMIs Laboratory at CAVS
- Supply, Installation and Commissioning of a 500 KVA generator at set at School of Engineering
- Drilling and equipping of boreholes at Kikuyu Campus, CCU & Upper Kabete Campus
- Prefabricated classrooms at Lower Kabete campus
- Refurbishment of Embu University College

STRATEGIC ISSUES

In 2013, the department faced the following challenges:

Development of state-of-the-art physical facilities that support the core functions is hampered by PPOA regulations. It is difficult to attract and maintain high caliber and qualified staff due to lack of motivation and low emoluments offered. There is need for increased funding for capital development and maintenance of buildings.

FUTURE PROJECTIONS

The department intends to attract and maintain high caliber and qualified staff to enable it meet the requirements of developing state-of-the-art physical facilities that support the core functions of the University.

1.8 Office of the Dean of Students

The office of the Dean of Students is primarily concerned with the holistic growth, development and well being of students in support of the universities vision, mission, and objectives.

The office encourages students' positive involvement in internal and external events and programmes often planning and facilitating activities with the student community to enhance professional and personal well- being and nurture the right values, strong social responsibility and responsible citizenship.

STUDENT OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

In 2013, students engaged in activities that included tree planning, peace through service forums, community service, free medical camps, drug abuse sensitization, visits to children's/old people's homes, mentorship fellowships, legal aid clinics and community cleanups.

ADVOCACY AND LIAISON ACTIVITIES

The Office of the Dean of Students represented student welfare interests in various University committees, appeal and disciplinary hearings and in special meetings and task forces.

PLACEMENT SERVICES

In 2013, the placement office organized 33 career talks, attended by over 4000 students. The organizations that participated in the presentations included: Nation Media Group, East African Breweries, Microsoft, World Bank, CITI Bank, Kenya ICT Board, Unilever, PWC, Bamburi Cement, Equity Bank, KASNEB, NSSF, Housing Finance, BAT, PKF and General Electric Company. Students were offered attachments by various organizations amongst which included the United Nations Office In Nairobi (UNON); ICRAF, CFC, Maersk International, TNT, Bamburi, varied banks, including Cooperative Bank, Barclays, and Kenya Commercial Bank.

CHAPLAINCY

In 2013, the Catholic Chaplaincy organized two leadership workshops away from campus. At the community level, the chaplaincy guided, and encouraged and involved students in charitable activities outside campuses for instance visits to children's homes, cleaning up during environmental week, car washes for fundraising for student activities and charitable activities, further, the chaplaincy provided meeting space at St. Pauls Chapel for the AA (Alcoholics Anonymous) for the benefit of students and staff of the University.

The Muslim chaplain organised a leadership and mentorship seminar at the CCU for all Muslim students in the University; in addition, the Chaplaincy organised and supported the annual Quran recitation competition. Students participated fully and the Muslims Students Association of University of Nairobi (MSAUN) provided gifts to the winners of the competition. During the holiday of Eid ulFitr, MSAUN in conjunction with the chaplaincy organized lunch for Muslim students in all campuses. Donations made by students and well wishers were a welcome contribution towards the expenses of preparing the lunch.


In every month, of 2013, the MSAUN organized talks, in which Muslim scholars addressed relevant topical issues.

PEER COUNSELORS TRAINING

In 2013, over 100 students were trained in peer counseling and life skills. These students now counsel other students who need assistance and watch out for early warning signs of possible problems.

STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

In 2013, the office provided support services, advocacy and advice on issues related to special needs. In addition the office provided disability aids such as hearing aids, repaired and maintained the mobility, visual and auditory aids, provided sign language training and interpreter services for the hearing impaired.

1.9 Estates department

INTRODUCTION

Estates Department is charged with the responsibility of managing the University's physical assets spread out in the campuses as well as in several regions of the country. These physical assets include land, buildings, houses, lecture halls and classroom laboratories, libraries, students' hostels, etc.

In its mandate of managing the physical assets, the department ensures that the University's land is secured by processing and by registering all the parcels in the name of the University. This mandate also include making sure all the University's buildings are well maintained and the staff houses are fully occupied and rents are paid on time.

The Department also undertakes lease administration for University owned commercial building and premises leased by the University.

UPDATES

In 2013, the department planted 100 indigenous trees within the University's compound and the area next to Chancellor's Court. External painting of two residential blocks at Kenya Science Campus and Mamlaka Flats i.e Blocks A,B,C & D was undertaken, and the processing of 4 title documents completed.

In terms of safety, fire assembly points were clearly designated and marked in all our campuses, and all firefighting equipment was serviced as per maintenance schedules.

2.0 Information and Communication Technology Centre (ICTC)

INTRODUCTION

The ICT Centre's mandate is to assist the University enhance the innovative use of ICT products and services to support teaching, learning, research and administrative processes.


UPDATES

VOIP Phase II implementation commenced in October 2013, VOIP and PABX integration was successfully completed for Main Campus, Kikuyu (CEES) Campus and Upper Kabete (CAVS) Campus. ISDN (Integrated Services Digital Network) was also reconfigured and integrated with the new infrastructure.

Wireless Access points were successfully installed at the School of Law (Parklands Campus) and have been active since November 2013. This wireless depaloyment is based on a new technology known as the Beam Forming Technology which is able to focus the wireless signal to the intended recipients. This enables effective coverage of all the open spaces, hostels, classrooms and staff quarters in Parklands Campus.

In partnership with KENET (Kenya Education Network) which is the only NREN (National Research and Education Network) in Kenya, a wireless network with a very unique feature was set up in Kikuyu Campus. In addition to the wireless signals, this wireless network has Eduroam. Eduroam (education roaming) is a secure, world-wide roaming access service developed for the international education and research community. This pilot project will be rolled out to the rest of the University in due course.

The ICT Center rolled out a Corporate Antivirus solution (Kaspersky) in the entire University. This was occasioned



by the fact that the University network extends to several colleges which need to exchange data. In response to the security needs of such an extensive network there was need for protecting information, both from deliberate attack and from "non-structured" risks such as the spread of a virus within the network. The ICT Centre installed Kaspersky Endpoint Security on over 2,500 hosts across the colleges in its network infrastructure.

UNIVERSITY RANKINGS

The University System of Websites was continuously updated at the faculty/institute/departmental levels. The content was enriched and the design improved to cater for the needs of diverse stakeholders including interactions through the social media. Consequently, the University continued to perform well in the Webometrics and 4ICU rankings of Universities and Colleges.

Webometrics ranking is based on a criterion that focuses on various indicators, which include: Impact (50%) and Activity (50%). Activity consists of three sub-indicators: presence (1/3), openness (1/3) and excellence (1/3). The University of Nairobi has steadily improved in its performance since 2004 when the first Webometrics ranking was released.

LAN EXTENSION

In 2013, five extramural centers were connected to the University backbone, these are: Nakuru, Nyeri, Kisii, Kakamega and Meru. The Library in Kisumu campus was also interconnected to this LAN extension. This enabled the University fraternity in these extramural centers to utilize all the services and have the same seamless experience available in the mainstream university network.

In addition to the above projects, in order to increase student's capacity to access internet resources Wireless LANS were implemented in five Campuses i.e. Mombasa, Kisumu, Parklands, Kikuyu and Kenyatta.

STAFF

The Center had 130 proficient members of staff working across all the University Colleges. Staff fully embraced the Center's vision, mission and core values thus fostering unity, efficiency and discipline; a perfect blend to create a strong working team. It is due to this that the students and entire University staff have reliable access to ICT services in line with University priorities.

The Center highly appreciates its staff's dedication to their performance of duty and promotes meritocracy. In the year 2013, fourteen members of staff were promoted; with six, five and three members of staff from Management Information Systems, User Support and Network Infrastructure Service sections respectively.

UPCOMING PROJECTS

In line with its strategic plan and commitment to provide quality services, ICT Centre has embarked on a number of projects to ensure that the University aligns itself with modern IT technology demands that will cater for teaching, learning and research applications as well as service delivery systems.

The following projects were in progress for the year 2013/2014.

- Implementation of Wi-Fi networks in the Dental School, and College of Agriculture and Veterinary Studies (CAVS).
- Firewall Upgrade
- Data Center Facilities Refurbishment
- Installation of 3 new servers and Storage Area Networks
- Installation of Microsoft Active Directory and Upgraded Microsoft licenses
- Refurbishment of ICT Centre Corporate Lab
- Centralized printing solution for ICT centre
- Installation of a new 250 KVA generator for the Data center
- LAN & WIFI extension and connectivity to SWA, SMU units and student common rooms and hostels.
- Upgrade of CCTV Surveillance system for JKML Library
- Hyslop building LAN upgrade

The MIS section's planned projects include;

- Automation of the tax filing process on the HRMIS, popularly known as P9
- Online application for degree programmes
- Payment of some levies via mobile money e.g. Examination Center levies
- Automation of the procurement and cash module on the Financial Management System (FIMS).

2.1 Planning division

INTRODUCTION

The Planning Division is located in the Vice-Chancellor's Office and is headed by the Registrar Planning. The Division provides support to the Vice-Chancellor's office and other related units. In conjunction with other departments/units, the Division plays a pivotal role in ensuring successful preparations of annual University of Nairobi graduation ceremonies and regular participation in national agricultural shows and Universities academic exhibitions.

INTRODUCTION

The University of Nairobi Press (UONP) was established in 1984 as a company limited by guarantee. Since its inception, the Press has been publishing scholarly books consistent with the primary objectives of the University of Nairobi to disseminate knowledge through publications. This portfolio has made UONP an important partner in research and dissemination of intellectual enquiry; through its publications, UONP continued to mirror and extend the University's intellectual strength and reputation.

In 2013, the Press maintained its publishing partnership with the African Economics Research Consortium (AERC), the World Health organization-Africa Office, Brazzaville and the Collaborative Centre for Gender and Development.

STRATEGIC ISSUES/CHALLENGES

The challenges in scholarly publishing are not unique to any single publisher including UONP. Generally, university presses must keep pace with rapid developments and a highly competitive environment and meet their obligations to the parent institutions. Specifically, UONP is confronted with serious challenges in the contemporary business environment. As is the case in other university presses worldwide, institutional support has been instrumental to the continued operations of the Press since its establishment. The shrinking government support for higher education, however, is making it increasingly difficult for UON to sustain its support for the Press. Instead, UONP is expected not only to generate sufficient revenue for continued publication but also to return regular and substantial surpluses to the university.

The rapid technological advances in the publishing industry are another challenge. There is need to invest in acquiring the technological resources and skills that will enhance the capacity of the Press to produce quality work at minimal cost.

WAY FORWARD

One of the major activities undertaken within the year is the initiation of the process of reviewing of the activities of the UON Press for enhanced performance.

The office of the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (RPE), with support of the Vice-Chancellor's office mandated the UNES to engage with UON Press to strategically help the UON Press in enhancing its sustainability. The following are some of areas currently proposed is the way forward:

There is need to support implementation of provisions in the UON Research Policy that recognize the University of Nairobi Press as a key channel for dissemination of results of UON research:

This will achieve the following:

- Harmonising the publishing of University research work to make it more accessible.
- Building the image of the UON with consequent benefits including worldwide recognition and establishment
 of collaborations, and enhanced web ranking and hits on the web site.

In order to enhance the revenue generation capacity of UONP, the current mandate of UONP of scholarly publishing should be expanded to allow for investment in other income generating publishing activities such as the following:

- Publishing in other areas as determined by the market rather than sole reliance on unsolicited manuscripts of a scholarly nature.
- Buying and selling publishing rights.

UONP will require technical advice to facilitate the identification and implementation of income-generating activities in other areas to enhance its revenue-generation capacity. Partnership with Management will be critical on this aspect.

2.3 Department of Sports and Games

The Department is as old as the University, dating back in the late 1960s. The Department of Sports and Games is located in Hall three (3) behind the students' clinic, off State House Road.

The Department has four (4) staff at the Central office and a Games Tutor in each of the Colleges/Campuses.

ACHIEVEMENTS

In 2013, the department realized the following achievements:

- Enrolled and sustained most of the University teams in the National leagues and tournaments (i.e Rugby, Basketball, Volleyball, Soccer, Hockey, Swimming, and Handball among others).
- Crowned the National ZUKU sponsored basketball (1) league champions in November, 2013.
- Achieved elitism in a number of students (e.g in the month of July 2013, a female swimmer qualified and participated in the World University Games held in Kazan, Russia).
- Realized wellness programme in a large number of students through the existing sports programmes, the students were networked to the corporate world for employment.
- Awarded scholarships (e.g sports on and others) to excelling students particularly in Volleyball, Soccer and Track athletics.
- During the 3rd Edition of the Universities women sports day, UoN were second overall.
- Crowned the champions of Soccer Nairobi Branch.

CHALLENGES

- Lack of enough office space.
- Inadequate allocations of financial resources to run students' sport fixtures, buy equipment and kits, develop, maintain and or repair sport facilities.
- The ratio of existing Technical staff overstretched for the required services (i.e about 50,000 students against seven Games Tutors)
- Lack of adequate support staff at both college and university level.
- Difficulties in incorporating the upcoming campuses in the existing sport programmes and sport facilities.
- Inadequate sport facilities and equipment to cater for the ever increasing student population.
- Lack of centralized departmental transport facility to coordinate students' sport programmes.
- Lack of a University gymnasium facility for both students and staff.

FUTURE PROJECTIONS/WAY FORWARD

- Request and follow-up approval of extra technical staff.
- Continual follow- ups with University Management the establishment of a gymnasium complex within the main campus.
- Initiate teaching programmes to offer diploma certificates in refereeing, sport psychology, sport pedagogy, swimming instructors and life saving.
- Review the existing departmental structure to accommodate the departmental expansion for effective services.
- Develop additional sport facilities at both College and University level.
- Follow-up with corporate world the award of scholarships to excelling student athletes.

2.4 University Health Services

University Health Services (UHS) is mandated to provide quality healthcare of international standard to the University community, in pursuit of the universities vision and mission. In this regard, UHS commits to manage the resources at its disposal in a transparent and accountable manner.

UPDATES

In 2013, the department uploaded material related to recent development in health care delivery for members of staff to read.

The department sustained the provision of quality health care to the University community, acquired two new ambulances and a new saloon car for the Chief Medical Officer. Further, the department renovated and painted the student clinic, and more nurses, clinical officers and cleaners were recruited.

CHALLENGES

In 2013, the department faced the following challenges: limited/inadequate authority to determine levels of sourcing and acquiring health care resources needed for delivery of quality health services; rising demand for quality health care by university community against available few resource e.g. space, ambulances and personnel.; rising awareness for health care right by consumers.

2.00 COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND VETERINARY SCIENCES

2.1 Faculty of Agriculture

INTRODUCTION

The Faculty of Agriculture has four departments: Plant Science & Crop Protection (PS&CP), Land Agricultural Resources Management & Agricultural Technology (LARMAT), Food Science, Nutrition & Technology (FSNT), Agricultural Economics.

Given that agriculture is still the backbone of the economy and the main source of export earnings, the Faculty plays a pivotal role of improving livelihoods of the Kenya population. Consequently, significant breakthroughs were made particularly in diagnostics of crop pests and diseases, integrated pest management, crop improvement, appropriate crop husbandry technologies to mitigate the vagaries of climate change, production of environmentally friendly goods and services, diversified food products and expertise ready to provide extension and community services. To this end, the Faculty commercialized 11 varieties of beans that are now being sold in supermarkets and is a leader in production of the Bio-fertilizers. The Faculty also established local and international partnerships with institutions and scientists which expanded opportunities for capacity building, knowledge sharing and fund raising.

PROGRAMMES OFFERED

In 2013, the Faculty offered eight undergraduate programmes covering agriculture, food science and technology, food, nutrition and dietetics, range management, management of agro-ecosystems & environment, agribusiness management, agricultural education and extension, and horticulture. The faculty offered diploma and postgraduate diploma training in crop protection, food safety and quality, agricultural information and communication management, food safety and quality, and agricultural information and communication management.

The Faculty run 20 masters programmes covering various fields of specialization: food science and technology, applied human nutrition, plant breeding, horticulture, agronomy, agricultural resource development, crop protection, plant pathology, agricultural and applied economics, agricultural economics, agricultural information and communication management, soil science, range management, land and water management, livestock production system, poultry sciences, animal genetics and breeding

In addition, the Faculty offered a regional PhDin Dryland Resource Management.

2.3 Wangari Maathai Institute for Peace and **Environmental Studies**

The Wangari Maathai Institute for Peace and Environmental Studies (WMI) was established in 2009 as centre of excellence in environmental governance and its linkages with peace and democracy. The institute was established in close collaboration with the 2004 Peace Nobel Laureate, Prof. Wangari Maathai and will house her works and walks for posterity. WMI aims to promote good environmental practices and to cultivate a culture of peace by shaping values, ethics and attitudes of its graduates through experiential learning, mentoring and transformational leadership.

The Department of State, together with parallel support from the MacArthur Foundation, has created a wPOWER Hub at the WMI, founded by the late Nobel Laureate Wangari Maathai, at the University of Nairobi in Kenya. The new wPOWER Hub will build the evidence base on women, energy access and climate solutions; hold train the trainer workshops; facilitate African and Indian women entrepreneur and leadership exchanges to build a network of women climate leaders, and build public awareness.

7.5 Institute for Development Studies

The Institute for Development Studies (IDS), University of Nairobi, is the oldest of 20 such institutes in the world. It is the premier multi-disciplinary and a multi-purpose development research institute in Eastern and Southern Africa region. IDS carries out full time research on high priority areas of social-economic and political development in Kenya, Africa and the world in general.

Courses Offered

In 2013, the Institute offered the MA in Development Studies program in addition to enrolling PHD candidates

ENROLMENT

In 2013, the Institute admitted 16 students to pursue the Master of Arts degree in Development Studies. In addition eight students continued pursuing Doctor of Philosophy programme in Development Studies.

RESEARCH ACTIVITIES

In the year under review, IDS made tremendous strides in its quest to remain the premier research institution on the continent. This is manifested in some of the projects the Institute engaged in locally and internationally:

AFROBAROMETER

The Institute for Development Studies released the Afrobarometer Round 5 Global Release findings on freedom of speech, sources of news and information and the spread of communication technologies in Africa.

PIMA

The Politics and Interactive Media in Africa (PIMA) hosted a roundtable briefing and discussions at the Nairobi Safari Club in February 2013. PIMA is a research project that studied how select radio and TV stations in Kenya and Zambia reflect, gather, disseminate and influence public opinion.

SOCIAL MOVEMENTS STUDY

A three-year study on social movements in East Africa was concluded in the year under review. The study, "Rethinking Social Movements in East Africa", generated knowledge on how to build and sustain social movements. It inquired into the conditions that give rise to social movements and those that lead to the fall or expiry of social movements; created the opportunity for CSO actors to interact with academia on social movements in Kenya and Uganda in order to promote healthy debates and sharing of knowledge on social movements; and generated practice-informed knowledge to help shape the form and nature of engagements between the CSOs and the society in Kenya and Uganda.

REGIONAL CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE FOR THE CLOTHING AND TEXTILE INDUSTRIES

Research carried out by the African Clothing and Footwear Research Network (ACFRN) project has underscored the need for high-level technical training for the apparel industry. Research carried out in 2010-2012, with funding from IDRC, showed that across the Eastern and Southern Africa region, most technical workers in the export clothing industry were expatriates. Since November 2012, IDS has partnered with a range of stakeholders, including the Export Processing Zones Authority (EPZA) and the African Cotton Textile Industries Federation (ACTIF), to propose the formation of Regional Centre of Excellence for Training and Skills Development for the Clothing and Textile Industries.

YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROJECT

The Institute for Development Studies began a collaborative research project on youth employment in East Africa in January 2013. The main objective of the regional research project is to conduct quantitative and qualitative analysis

in order to identify constraints to job creation, productivity and access by the youth to employment opportunities, and identify policy implications from the results.

ACET PROJECT

A stakeholder's conference was hosted in Nairobi in November 2013 to discuss findings on Non Motorised Transport (NMT) and Paratransit research conducted in the last five years. The research was conducted under the auspices of African Centre of Excellence in Public and Non-motorised Transport (ACET). The researchers and stakeholders exchanged ideas and made proposals for informing policy and decision making relevant for improving the urban road transport sector to restore safety and sanity.

SAFIC PROJECT

The Successful African Firms and Institutional Change Project (SAFIC) is collaboration between Copenhagen Business School, Denmark, with the University of Dar es Salaam, the University of Nairobi, the Rosklide University and the University of Zambia. The Kenya country study investigates food processing and the manufacture of food processing equipment.

CHRONIC POVERTY PROJECT

From July 2013, IDS researchers worked on a project entitled "Analysis of Poverty Reduction Policies and Outcomes" funded by the Chronic Poverty Research Centre – Kenya. The research project was aimed at yielding results that help researchers, policymakers, students and other stakeholders to understand the variations in poverty reduction policies and associated outcomes and shed light on the dynamics of elements of the policy process that include inputs, outputs and outcomes of poverty reduction policies

INTERNATIONAL LINKS AND COLLABORATIONS
