Message from the Chairman.


I want to take this opportunity to greet all of you again. The semester has taken off successfully and now it is just a few weeks to the end of the semester examination.

Role of Counseling on Women Suffering Domestic Violence Impact: An Intervention Study, Kenya.

In the last few decades cases related to domestic violence, gender-based violence or after conflict violence trauma, in Kenya have been on the increase.

This investigation is about the role of counseling activities in supporting women who have suffered Domestic Violence, either in the past as children or currently.

The impact of Cognitive Behavior Therapy as an intervention is on focus.

Mrs. Muthami, a Lecturer at the Department, got interested in this topical study, as a therapist and researcher, to be able to help individuals in need of therapy as a result of domestic violence. Most researchers studying this area do not provide clear interventions on how to reduce effects of violence or break the cycle of violence, as observed in the research.

Reading Comprehension: evidence-based practices for children with a hearing loss.

National statistics on reading comprehension for students without disabilities are dismal at best. A recent education report reveals that seven out of a hundred students in class eight cannot read a simple story in English or Kiswahili. Hearing loss has been found to have an adverse impact on communication. It causes a delay in the development of receptive and expressive communication skills. Consequently, the language deficits cause learning problems leading to reduced academic achievement. Studies show that students with a hearing loss graduate with a fourth-grade reading level. Traditional methods of teaching have failed to mitigate this problem. Numerous strategies have since been developed address the performance in reading comprehension. This presentation analyzed current, evidence-based practices that have been proven to significantly improve the reading comprehension of students. Enquiry was made into the suitability of the evidence-based practices to students with a hearing loss.

Stress Experience and Coping Strategies among University Students.

Challenges that university students face during their study on campus are diverse and include academic, accommodation, psychological, social and economic factors. These challenges may be perceived as stressors thus resulting in stress on the students. The perceived stress may have implications on the students' academic performance and psychological adjustment in the absence of appropriate coping strategies. Since students do not come from homogenous backgrounds, their stress experience may not be the same. Therefore, there is need to understand stress experiences among students so that they can be helped to go through their academic and psychosocial experiences with minimal effects of stress.

Education and Outreach Visit.

Paul Kariuki Ngunyi, a student at the Department did his Practicum at Bahati Boys Rehabilitation Center. The Center houses disadvantaged children sourced from the streets of Nairobi. The Center, originally a County Council Hall is dilapidated. The children at the Center are in dire need of basic needs such as conducive shelter, clothing and food. Mr. Ngunyi, who developed a strong rapport with the children was moved by the plight of the children. Prof. Priscilla Kariuki, of the Department supervised Mr. Paul and was equally moved by the desperate need of the children. On one of the supervision visits, Prof. Kariuki brought the students some supplies in form of food stuff, shoes and reading materials. She also gave them a motivational talk on the importance of education and encouraged them to be diligent in their school work. Prof. Kariuki and Mr. Ngunyi interacted with the children who shared their heart wrenching stories of abandonment by their families, police harassment, begging to eke a living and bullying. They also shared their aspirations for the future. Most of them would like to be presidents, political leaders, doctors, lawyers and “high scientists”. It would be important for us to visit such institutions to give of our time, encouragement, and resources.
