- 1. To correlate goals of the undergraduate curriculum with the market needs to ensure they are in tandem
- 2. To review curriculum content with an aim to enhance clinical knowledge and skills in line with the global trends
- 3. To review curriculum content in order to enhance practical exposure aspect so as to meet the international standards
- 4. To review the mode of content delivery by incorporating the E-learning platform
- 5. To incorporate common courses such as communication skills and other courses such as supply chain management, leadership and management in the curriculum
- 6. To revise the current examination rules and regulations

Objectives for the Stakeholders-workshop to review the various curricula of Post-graduate programs to be held on Fri 20th June 2014

- 1. To correlate goals of postgraduate curriculum to the market needs
- 2. To restructure postgraduate courses to enable specialization and specialty recognition
- 3. To review the curriculum content with an aim to enhance practical exposure through collaboration with the stakeholders
- 4. To harmonize the common courses for the various postgraduate programs across the departments.

5. To review mode of content delivery so as to incorporate the E- learning platform.

Some areas of emphasis include:

- 1. Criteria for the identification of student attachment sites and suitable preceptors.
- 2. Propose and justify list of potential attachment sites for both undergraduate and postgraduate students.
- 3. Indication of competencies and skills expected by Pharmacy graduates.
- 4. Identification of roles and responsibilities of pharmacy graduates and hence career development.
- 5. Propose postgraduate programs to support enhanced delivery of services in your sector to meet market demands.
- 6. Provide a list of strengths, weaknesses of current pharmacy graduates.
- 7. Propose new units or content to be included in pharmacy degree curriculum to enhance the quality of the graduates.
