As we celebrate the birth of Christ, Prof. Judith Mbula Bahemuka urged Kenyans to solidify the gains we have made over the last 50 years. She pointed out that the Vision 2030 is nothing new and is in fact very similar to the message our founding father President Jomo Kenyatta made in 1963. The Vision is anchored on three pillars namely: the fight against poverty; the fight against illiteracy; and the fight against disease. Prof. Bahemuka's message was that there is hope for Kenya moving forward but we all have to play our role to achieve our goal.

Prof. Bahemuka made these remarks during an interview with Jeff Koinange at St. Paul's Catholic University Chapel during their Christmas Concert held on 22nd December 2013 from 7.30 p.m. The theme of the fully packed and very entertaining concert was One@50. The other panelists who appeared on the bench with Jeff Koinange were the Chief Justice Dr. Willy Mutunga who focused on the Constitution of Kenya 2010; Dr. Kenneth Ombongi who dwelt on the History of the Kenyan Nation; Mr. Owino Omollo spoke on the Challenges and Successes of the New Nation; Dr. Fr. Dominic Wamugunda focused on the Promises in the land.
