UoN to explore the potential of artificial intelligence and blockchain technologies

s the University keeps pace with the world's top institutions of higher learning, there is need to offer more courses to harness the power of blockchain based innovation and Artificial Intelligence (AI), which can also support in the University administration. Artificial intelligence is seeping into our societies and lives in very profound ways. It affects the way we conduct transactions in our banks, receive medical advice and search for information in the web.

It is now time for AI to transform universities too as it offers a new scientific infrastructure tool for learning and research that UoN hopes to embrace and lead. Through excellent discoveries, UoN will maximize the use of AI to reshape education, innovations, science and the society at large. Some of the areas in which Al's potential can be maximized include; automating academic literature reviews, checking plagiarism; and promoting clinical and medical research collaborations between universities and industry partners.

Al will revolutionize university

education through automation of course schedules. Students will simply key in their desired job area or discipline and get suggested courses tailored to their need and that fits within the duration of their study. Al machine learning models present a solution for assessing student records to select courses that place the student on a successful path to graduation. This enables students to take courses that challenge them while at the same time they enable them to succeed.

I am pleased to note that through the UoN Skills Centre, 25 of our students and staff successfully completed the Huawei Certified Network Associate (HCNA) training and certification process that offers validation of the skills and knowledge required for basic maintenance and configuration of small to medium-sized networks.

Artificial intelligence will streamline the University's admission process by use of accurate predictions and forecasts to avoid over and underenrollment. Al will also allow tracking of every student's performance to retrieve students' data easily.

It is my wish that UoN can maximize on artificial intelligence potential. However, for UoN to make Al innovations a reality, it must prepare for the new technology. Al and blockchain technologies require massive amounts of data. The University must therefore develop a system for aggregating and maintaining its data. Data in whatever form must be stored to enable the University reap from the massive opportunities brought about by artificial intelligence. Data is wealth and properly maintained data will become an invaluable resource for data analysts, scientists and the University at large.

In September 2018, the University of Nairobi was selected as one of the five universities in Kenya which will host the African Development Bank's premier Innovation and ICT Centre of Excellence This is a prestigious opportunity to collaborate with ADB to lead a revolutionary movement to nurture "Africa's next generation of digitally enabled workforce." The ICT skills training opportunity places the University on the right path to harnessing the power of new technologies.

On the other hand, blockchain technology offers another solution to transform University education. Blockchain is essentially a public ledger that verifies and records transactions automatically. This technology will help automate verification of academic credentials and reduce cases of fake certificates. Blockchain technology offers a solution for UoN to secure student records and make sharing of the records easy. This is done by the storage of records in a distributed ledger making reference to data easy. The University can also benefit from security cameras' protection, reduce use of paper through automated records management and minimize fraud and information leaks.

I wish to thank our staff and students for their sincere dedication to the University and wish everyone blessings and the very best in their endeavors. As the year 2018 ends, we pray that God's blessing follow us to 2019 as we continue serving the University diligently. VF

Staff honoured at inaugural awards ceremony

he University of Nairobi held its first Annual Staff Award Ceremony to recognise staff with distinguished long service and exemplary performance through staff appraisal and performance contract.

The landmark event was presided over by the University Council Chair Prof Julia Ojiambo at the historic Taifa Hall on December 14, 2018. It was witnessed by staff from all colleges and campuses.

The acting Deputy Vice Chancellor, Administration and Finance, Prof. Isaac Mbeche, emerged the overall winner as the Best Performing Deputy Vice Chancellor, followed by the acting Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Academic Affairs, Prof. Julius Ogeng'o and the acting Deputy ViceChancellor, Research, Production and Extension, Prof. Madara Ogot.

The College of Architecture and Engineering was position 1 in Best Performing College category. The second position was taken by the College of Biological and Physical Sciences while the third prize went to the College of Agriculture and Veterinary Science.

In the schools category, the School of Engineering was the Best Performing School, the School of Journalism and Mass Communication second best, and Wangari Maathai Institute third.

Internal Audit Department was the best performing unit under Central Administration Units category, followed by Administration and Centre for Self-Sponsored Programmes.

Prof. Walter Jaoko received the Senate Award for his outstanding research over the last 5 years.

Prof. Samuel Kuria Mbugua and Prof. Lilly Bebora were awarded for serving the University for 42 years in the Academic Staff category while Mr. Simon Kairangi, Mr. Bernard Kabiru and Mr. John Njoroge Kanori were feted in the Non-Teaching Staff category for 38 years of service.

In her keynote speech, Prof. Ojiambo applauded all the staff members for the team effort. "In this ceremony, we are all winners. This ceremony is meant to congratulate and celebrate our achievements as a team. Much as we will acknowledge a few colleges, units and individual awardees, I strongly recognize the

accomplishments of each one of you. I do agree that every other employee would have been worthy of this recognition yet you were noble enough to support our awardees today," said the Council Chair.

She said the ceremony's objective was to boost commitment to efficiency in exceptional service delivery and facilitate personal career satisfaction and development. Such events present a chance for recognition of the important part that individual efforts play to overall goals and direction as a University, she added.

"The award of various units and outstanding individuals is meritbased. It is supported by the University of Nairobi's Core Values as its pillars. The core values are freedom of thought and expression; innovativeness and creativity, good corporate governance; integrity, transparency and accountability; team spirit and teamwork; professionalism; quality customer service; responsible corporate citizenship; and respect for and conservation of the environment," said Prof Ojiambo.

The Council Chair reiterated that the University of Nairobi's core values enable the institution to create the best environment for career growth and development to employees and provide quality university education and training to the Kenyan people and the global community.

She encouraged staff members to uphold the spirit of being good employees who always meet assignment deadlines and demonstrate strong work ethics. "We need to show the initiative of going above and beyond the tasks that we have been assigned, take advantage of training opportunities to learn new skills, and take constructive criticism gracefully. Constructive criticism can give some good ideas about what people expect from us and are an indicator that our good performance has room to improve further," she advised.

The University of Nairobi Vice Chancellor, Prof. Peter Mbithi, said the University has adopted a culture of staff performance measured through annual appraisal system. To sustain high performance, it is critical to ensure that staff are highly motivated through various methods, including rewards and making the job tasks more challenging, he said. Prof. Mbithi said the University has featured prominently at the highly competitive Employer of the Year Awards (EYA) 2017 and EYA 2018. "In 2017 we were the overall second runners up and we also won in various categories, such as Innovation and Productivity, Leadership and Governance and Corporate Performance. In 2018 we

won in Innovation and Productivity, Corporate Performance and Inclusivity and Diversity categories," said the Vice Chancellor.

He thanked the staff for being loyal to the University and urged them to always keep identifying with UoN even when they exit the institution on whatever arounds.

In conclusion, Prof Mbithi remarked: "Our University is perceived as a repository and generator of knowledge. Let us invest in our University in terms of generating funding for our teaching and research projects. This translates into producing highly skilled graduates that contribute to the economy as well as research that leads to innovation and develops our economy. We all have an obligation of equipping graduates so that they can obtain viable skills to our human capital. All these can best be achieved if we place more focus on customer service, research, innovation and publishing."

He said the management will continue to discharge its mandate in pursuit of excellence of employee satisfaction and enhance corporate performance. It will continue to make deliberate efforts to improve employee morale and the award ceremony shall be an annual activity in the University calendar. VF

University marks 60th graduation ceremony

he University of Nairobi Graduation Ceremony held on 21st December 2018 is the 60th araduation since the establishment of the University in 1970.

The historic moment is a clear testament that the University has contributed immensely to the accumulation of knowledge and provision of the skilled human resource required by industry, the government and the other sectors of the economy.

With 60 graduation ceremonies, the University has produced over 200,000 graduates, many of them captains in the public and private sector, creating wealth and jobs both locally and worldwide.

It has been a momentous journey for

the University that now bestrides the regional and continental academic arena like a Colossus. Flashback to 1963: a graduating class of three faculties has produced 18 candidates in the arts, science and engineering in the federated university system of East Africa.

Flash forward to 1970: The first graduates of the University of Nairobi are 649, in the first ceremony presided over by the Chancellor, Mzee Jomo Kenyatta. While appreciating the momentous day in the life of any nation when its own university is formed, Mzee Kenyatta states that our Republic expects from the University of Nairobi much more than criticism.

His speech inspired the University to

accelerate the production of medical laboratory technicians and medical doctors by the third graduation ceremony held in 1972. In response to the call for industrial development, the University has produced graduates in diverse fields, including urban, rural and regional planning; food science and technology; seed management; dietetics and nutrition courses.

Over the time, the University has responded to calls to take up a role as the custodian of knowledge. In the last 50 years, the university has produced graduates who have lived to this expectation. The University has developed programmes in anthropology, agricultural engineering, pharmacy, dental

Talks on Universities' Role in Attainment of Africa's **Agenda 2063 dominates RUFORUM**

he University of Nairobi was privileged to co-host with nine other public universities, the 6th Africa Higher Education Week and the sixth Regional universities forum for capacity building in agriculture (RUFORUM) conference. The conference was officially opened on October 23, 2018 at the Kenyatta International Convention Centre by Education Cabinet Secretary, Amb. Dr. Amina Mohammed on behalf of President Uhuru Kenyatta.

Accompanied by Uganda's first lady and Education minister, Janet Museveni and 25 ministers and government representatives from across African nations, Amb. Mohammed underscored the economic importance of the agricultural sector in Africa and the role of institutions of higher learning in enhancing it. "Improving the performance and competitiveness of the agriculture sector remains a matter of great strategic importance for the region," she stated.

On the role of universities, she noted, "at the core of this agenda, is knowledge; and it is today widely acknowledged that the quality of knowledge generated within higher education institutions, and its availability to the wider economy is increasingly critical not only to agricultural performance, but also to national competitiveness."

She reminded the institutions of higher of their central place of national competitiveness through academic research, education and strong linkage to farming communities. "Universities can play a central role in producing innovation-oriented yet practical solutions to local agricultural challenges and can be a critical player in strengthening the link of agriculture and business to create a competitive and indigenous agribusiness sector," she said.

On her part, First Lady Janet Museveni lauded the efforts of RUFORUM member universities and the important role it plays in building capacity in the area of agriculture in Africa."Africa as a continent can no longer wait for the transformation we desire. There is need to embrace initiatives to improve human capital development through initiatives of bodies like RUFORUM," she added.

"Young people who are dying in their numbers crossing the Mediterranean Sea are doing so without knowledge on how they can harness their skills set to contribute to and exploit the wealth of natural resources the continent is endowed," she lamented.

She decried the low higher education enrollment ratio in Africa but was encouraged that this trend was being reserved. She shared the Uganda experience where due to the success of the universal education program and universal post primary education, there was an increasing pressure on higher education subsector.

Speaking at the same forum, the University of Nairobi Council Chairperson, Prof. Julia Ojiambo, noted that the conference had come at a critical point as its deliberations would assist the country in realizing one of the Big Four agenda- food security. "In the Kenyan context, this conference is a boost to the Big Four Agenda namely: Universal healthcare, manufacturing, affordable housing and food security. It is anticipated that this conference will help universities to outgrow their traditional ways of doing things in order to adapt to the new and ever changing environment," she said.

University of Nairobi Vicechancellor, Prof. Peter Mbithi, singled out the role various stakeholders could play in realizing Africa's Agenda 2063. "All of us should rise to the occasion and support RUFORUM and its member universities to deliver the promise of training high quality researchers, impact oriented research and collaborative working relations among researchers, farmers, national agricultural research institutions and government," he said.

"The wide participation of the youth on this forum is a positive pointer of the changing attitude of the African Youth towards agriculture. The youth must seize abundant opportunities in agriculture and the entire value chain," he noted. Themed, "Aligning African Universities to Accelerate Attainment of Africa's Agenda 2063," the weeklong conference brought together over 800 delegates from across the continent with a large proportion of university students and vice-chancellors, policy makers, industry and development partners. In addition, key institutions represented at the meeting, included the African Union Commission, regional economic communities, higher education networks and institutions and research organizations.

Kenya Institute of Migration Studies (KIMS) Launched at UoN

n Tuesday, December 11, 2018, Kenya Institute of Migration Studies (KIMS) was launched by the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and coordination of National Government, Dr. Fred Matiana'i at the University of Nairobi towers.

While delivering his keynote speech, Dr. Fred Matiang'i said that this is the first time in the history of Kenya for an institution that will train the immigration officers on migration issues and boarder security. He emphasized, "This is one of the Government's responses in changing the global migration landscape."

Dr. Matiang'i congratulated the University of Nairobi and all the partners for making the Launch of the Institute and the post-graduate diploma in migration studies a reality. He opined, "I would urge all the partners to have an open mind because migration is a very dynamic terrain. I would also like to add that there should be a mandatory course on public relations under this course. We need our officers at the airport and our boarders to smile more."

He pledged his support by exhibiting and showcasing the Institute and the course internationally.

He concluded by saying that Government of Kenya and the Government of South Africa have made an agreement to give academicians visas of up to 10 years while travelling back and forth for purposes of teaching, learning and research.

The Cabinet Secretary also said that in future, the principal migration officer and above will be required to undertake this course before seeking for a promotion.

On his part, Vice Chancellor, UoN, Prof. Peter Mbithi said that the University is home to a number of global institutes and centers of excellence including the institute of Diplomacy and international Studies, Institute of Development Studies, Wangari Maathai Institute for Peace and Environmental Studies and the population Studies and Research Institute where KIMS will be

Prof. Mbithi said that migration can have both negative and positive impacts on regional economies and it is important therefore for policy makers and practitioners to be equipped with good knowledge that

Governmental migration practitioners, University of Nairobi experts and experts from the Maastricht Graduate School of Governance designed this course together, making it a unique combination of practical skills from regional expertise and academic excellence.

The Better Migration Management Programme (BMM) supported the development of a post-graduate diploma course on migration in cooperation with the KenyaSchool of Government, the Department of Immigration, and the University of Maastricht. The course will be carried out by the Kenya Institute of Migration Studies (KIMS) in Nairobi. VF

Lecturers trained on pedagogy and andragogy

niversity of Nairobi lecturers from the College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHSS) were trained on pedagogy and andragoy during a three-day sensitization workshop.

Speaking during the launch of the programme on October 31, 2018, Prof. Isaac Mbeche, Deputy Vice Chancellor Student Affairs and Acting Vice Chancellor Administration and Finance, urged lecturers to update their skills in delivery of lectures to ensure students enjoy the class sessions and become more competitive in the job market.

"The University of Nairobi is well rated by employers. We are the most preferred University in the region. The learning environment has changed with the digital age and hence we have to redesign the teaching methodology," said Prof Mbeche, who represented the Vice Chancellor during the occasion.

He said unlike previously when lecturers dictated notes to students, the focus now should be on engaging learners, experiential learning, developing communication skills and confidence in students, curriculum development and lecturer-student mentorship to enhance learning.

Prof. Justus Inyega, Director Centre for Pedagogy and Andragogy (CEPA), said lecturers need to share their experiences and best practices. He pointed out the 5Es that aid lecturers in effective delivery of lectures: engaging students, eliciting reactions from students on what they know about the study area, explaining the new concepts, extending or elaborating the concepts in detail and, exploring new areas.

The lecturers were taken through a series of videos and teaching aids that improve teaching methodology. They were told to embrace problem based learning and incorporate current affairs and social problems as part of the problems to be solved by students. More than 200 University of Nairobi lecturers have been trained.

Varsity to provide leadership on establishing a museum of art for East Africa

riday, November 9, 2018, Nairobi... In 2017, United Kingdom travel publisher Rough Guides named Nairobi City the third best city in the world. Nairobi is the only city in the world with a national park within the city where wild animals roam free. There is so much the city has to offer the world and this includes its rich art and culture. To this end, the University of Nairobi (UoN) is planning to provide leadership to the establishment of the Museum of Art for East Africa in Nairobi under its aegis and on its territory.

The University convened a meeting of stakeholders to spearhead the rebirth of Nairobi city through the establishment of a world class museum of art that would eventually lead to the creation of culture and creative art

zone for the city residents and visitors. "The goal is to build a world class museum of great artistic and educational value whose mission will be to collect, preserve and display the wealth and genius of East African Art for the citizens of East Africa and the broader public," said the UoN Chancellor, Dr. Vijoo Rattansi. "I

therefore invite interested stakeholders to join us and support this noble initiative. It requires a strong coalition of ideas, resources, visionary leadership and positive energy."

The establishment of the proposed Museum of East African Art Nairobi was marked with a key note presentation by the Director of the Smithsonian Museum of Art (Washington D.C), Dr. Augustus

illions of Kenyan youth are likely to benefit from the technological innovation that will help them to transition from learning to earning.

The good news to the youth follows the launch of Ajira Digital Programme at the University of Nairobi by Mr Joe Mucheru, the Cabinet Secretary, Information Communication and Technology. The premier online jobs will provide several job opportunities.

Speaking during the launch at Taifa Hall on September 20, 2018, Mr Mucheru said he is engaging government bodies and the private sector to put some of their tasks and jobs online. He said he is in the process of engaging the President of the Supreme Court, Justice David Maraga, on digitization of the judicial processes.

The CS said he hopes to make Kenya the epicenter of freelancing work and online jobs. With the support of the President, Mr Mucheru plans to roll out training in all the 290 constituencies in the country to help young people address the challenge of high rate of unemployment. He said he is working with Google and Telkom Kenya to roll out 85 gigabytes bandwidth that will power thousands of hotspots across the country.

The Permanent Secretary ICT, Mr Jerome Ochieng', challenged young people to embrace technological innovation. He said some three decades ago, energy companies were among the leading companies globally but they have now been overtaken by technology companies. He urged the young people to adopt technological advancements, such as big data and artificial intelligence.

The University of Nairobi Chancellor, Dr. Vijoo Rattansi, said online jobs will help the youth to participate in building the economy. She urged the young people to grasp the available opportunities.

Vice Chancellor Prof. Peter Mbithi regretted that many highly intelligent students cannot get jobs upon graduation. He noted that with the introduction of online jobs, graduates have the opportunity to continue learning and earning.

he University of Nairobi has partnered with Cherami Africa to establish a cancer institute in Nairobi.

The proposed University of Nairobi-Cherami Cancer Institute (UNCCI) is set to be a premier cancer diagnosis, treatment and referral centre in Sub Saharan Africa.

Presiding over the launch of the partnership, the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Education, Dr. Amina Mohammed, lauded the partnership between UoN and Cherami. She said the partnership will address pressing health challenges in the country and regionally.

"I am excited to witness the signing of the agreement between Cherami Africa and the University of Nairobi which will kick start the process towards the establishment of the University of Nairobi teaching and research hospital with a Cancer Research Institute being the first phase of the development," said the Cabinet Secretary.

The UoN Vice Chancellor, Prof. Peter Mbithi, said the Cancer Institute will be situated within the university.

"UNCCI will be a multifunctional facility that offers modern and

outstanding teaching, training and research facilities for cancer healthcare. It will offer holistic patientcentred cancer services, provide research and innovations and raise awareness about cancer," said Prof Mbithi.

The VC further observed that to enhance coordination amona stakeholders, UNCCI shall work in conjunction with the National Cancer Institute to develop a comprehensive National Cancer Registry to ensure efficient and systematic utilization of resources.

When fully established, the institute will comprise Division of Laboratory Medicine ; Division of Radiology; Division of Radiotherapy; Division of Adult Oncology and Internal Medicine; Division of Paediatrics Oncology,; Division of Surgery; Division of Anesthesia, Critical and Palliative Care; Division of Nursing; Division of Pharmacy; and Division of Bone Marrow/Stem Transplant.

The Chairman of the UoN Council, Prof. Julia Ojiambo, stressed the importance of strategic partnerships. "Universities are facing a lot of challenges in resource mobilization for upgrading and modernizing their

teaching and research infrastructure. I am pleased to note that the University has taken the initiative to work with strategic partners like Cherami Africa group to mobilize the resources outside the Exchequer for implementation of impactful projects," said the Council Chair.

The Cherami Africa President, Mr. Wei Xiaolin, said Cherami Africa is a subsidiary of Guangzhou Cherami Investment Management Group, an afro-centric integrated financial services group with over 2 US billion dollars of Assets Under Management (AUM).

"Our core business lines are fund management, private equity, investment banking and international investment. In the latter, our priority areas are around real estate, healthcare, green energy and other environmentally friendly technology, agriculture, manufacturing and internet and mobile business," said Mr Xiaolin. He further observed that Cherami brings the best of Asian technology, knowledge and funds to meet the most socially impactful demands in Africa.

Prof. Chris Wanjala:

Demise of literary icon shocks the world



or many decades, Prof Chris
Lukorito Wanjala bestrode the
literary scene like a colossus so
it was not surprising that his recent
demise created shockwaves that
reverberated across the globe. The
epicenter of it all was at the University
of Nairobi, which has been home to
the fallen scholar for half a century.
The boy born to Temeteo Lukorito and

Ayasi Nakhatama in the little known Chesamisi village, Bungoma County, was a trailblazer in East Africa's literary criticism and one of the finest in the world.

Born in 1943 (official registration documents give his date of birth as 4th April 1944) Prof Wanjala overcame many hurdles to perch on the peak of academia. The long journey began at Kamusinde Primary School in 1953, where he sat the Common Entrance Examination in 1957 before joining Chesamisi Intermediate School in 1958. He was admitted to Bungoma Secondary school in 1962 and the then later to the prestigious Kamusinga Secondary School in 1966. From there he joined the then University College Nairobi, in

September 1968 and graduated with Bachelor of Arts degree in English, First Class honours, in 1971.

Later that year, he enrolled for his postgraduate studies, while at the same time working in the Department of Literature, University of Nairobi. Prof Wanjala rose from the position of Assistant Lecturer to Lecturer between 1971 and 1973. In 1978, he completed his Doctoral studies and graduated with a PhD in literature in 1979. His doctoral thesis, which would later be published as the seminal treatise For Home and Freedom (1980), was an important contribution to

was an important contribution to the Great Literature Debate

. In 1981, Chris (as he was fondly referred to, short for Christopher) was seconded from the Department of Literature to join the Institute of African Studies as a Senior Research Fellow. He became Director of the Institute in 1983. The same year, won a Japan Foundation Fellowship and travelled to Japan several times, culminating in the inauguration of an African Research Institute at Soka University in Tokyo and establishing relations with that University that have now became a permanent feature between Japanese and Kenyan institutions of higher education. In 1985, Chris returned to Department of Literature, where he was appointed as the first African Associate Professor of Literature.

In 1991, Chris moved to Egerton University, Njoro, as a full Professor. He established the Department of Literature and after accomplishing the mission, he returned to University of Nairobi in October 2000. He delivered his inaugural lecture on

"The Growth of a literary tradition in East Africa in 2003. This was the first by an African Professor of Literature.

Outside his academic duties, Chris continued to serve as a key informant for literary, historical and cultural activities related to Kenya. He chaired the technical committee on the devolution of Kenya's Policy on Culture and Heritage.

Chris also sat on the Committee of Culture at the Kenya National Commission for UNESCO and attended meetings on the implementations of the 2003 Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage (ICH) of Kenya.

The scholar also served as Chairman of the National Book Development Council of Kenya (NBDCK) from 2007 upto the time of his demise. He was also a member of PEN Kenya. Through these organizations, Chris honed the skills of budding and established writers. Chris was also a keynote speaker at several academic conferences. notably one for which he was invited in 2013 by President Olesugun Obasanjo of Nigeria on "Women and Youth in the Promotion of Cultural Security in Africa" where he presented a paper on "Cultural Events in East and Central Africa". Due to his significant contribution to Kenyan Literature, Culture and Book Development, Prof. Chris Lukorito Wanjala was honoured in 2012 with the award of Elder of the Order of the Burning Spear, (EBS).

The trumpet call for the man with a remarkable charming smile was sounded on October 15th 2018. He was laid to rest in his Lwandenti home, Kakamega County, on October 27 2018. Rest in peace, Chris. Varsity Focus salutes you.

University shines in Graduate Employability Rankings 2019

he University of Nairobi was ranked fourth best University in Africa in the latest QS World University Employability Rankings 2019. The University tied with Ain Shams University from Egypt, Stellenbosch University, University of Johannesburg, University of KwaZulu-Natal and University of Pretoria – all from South Africa. They were placed in the group of 302-500 best Universities in the world.

The best University on Employability Rankings in Africa was University of Cape (South Africa) which was also placed in the group of 101-110. Number two was a tie between the American University in Cairo (Egypt) and University of Witwatersrand (South Africa). They were both placed in the category of 201-250. Cairo University (Egypt) was number three and in the category of 251-300.

Universities have a part to play in making their students more employable. They cultivate their skills and absorb them into lifelong market-driven learning experiences that boost the student's flexibility in the labour market. Therefore, graduate employability ranking is essential because it gives an

understanding of how successful universities are at nurturing employability.

According to QS, Graduate Employability Rankings is an innovative exercise designed to provide the students with a unique tool by which they can compare university performance in terms of graduate employability outcomes and prospects.

QS Rankings acknowledge the fact that a university's ability to foster employability is affected by the economic performance of the country in which it is situated.





ESDA demonstrates value of universities' collaborations

he United Nations University (UNU) established the Education for Sustainable Development in Africa (ESDA) in eight Universities in Africa in 2009. The University of Nairobi and UNU signed an MoU in the same year and since then, the University has been working with United Nations University in developing a Master of Science Programme in Sustainable Urban Development (MSc-SUD) and the Next Generation of Researchers (NGR). In 2016, the African Youth Entrepreneurship Society (AYES) and African MBA were added into the ESDA portfolio as a way of enriching the programme.

The ESDA programme was founded by the United Nations University in partnership with the African Development Bank (AfDB) and the Japan Trust Fund. During the Sixth Tokyo International Conference for African Development (TICAD) 2016 held in Nairobi, Prof. Peter Mbithi was appointed the Chairman of ESDA for a three-year term (2016-2019) until the next TICAD 7 conference to be held in Japan in August 2019.

To take stock of what ESDA has achieved since Prof Mbithi took over in 2016, the United Nations University organized the ESDA Conference on 29-31 October 2018 in Tokyo. The forum was attended by all the Vice Chancellors from the eight ESDA programme implementing universities. The meeting was arranged into two sections:

- International Symposium on Africa's Sustainable Development hosted by the African Development Bank (AfDB); and
- 4th ESDA Consortium Meeting hosted by United Nations University.

As part of the ESDA October 2018 Conference, the United Nations University's Institute for Advanced Sustainability (UNU-IAS) and AfDB organized a one-day Symposium on 29th October 2018 in Tokyo. The conference participants discussed the role of universities in promoting Africa's Sustainable Development. They identified challenges and opportunities faced by universities and generated new ideas for partnership and support.

The objectives of the symposium were: to report on the results of AfDB grant project (for accountability and additional funding); enhance Japanese government's recognition of ESDA (for JICA support); and make a pitch for the role of universities in building an 'intellectual infrastructure' for promoting broadly-based socio-economic and cultural relations between Asia

(Japan) and Africa (in support of TICAD).

During the forum, Prof Mbithi emphasized the need of developing the next generation of scholars and researchers. He urged the Government of Japan and AfDB to sponsor 500 scholarships in Africa in the next five years to ensure sustainable development in the continent.

The decade-long experience of ESDA provides a useful example of how a network of African universities may develop through collaboration in education and research, mobilizing and utilizing their own human resources and experiences.

The ESDA Programme demonstrates the value of interaction between African and Asian universities, their faculties and students, to enrich the quality of teaching and research. The collaboration is a useful channel for sharing the relevant knowledge and capacities relating to industrial development policy and practice.

The ESDA experience indicates value for money in investing in the next generation of researchers to deliver useful research output and instructional material. Their next challenge is to explore and develop practical ways and means to work with stakeholders, such as young entrepreneurs. VF

wenty five students were trained on Huawei Certified Network Associate (HCNA) certification in November 2018. The training was offered by the University of Nairobi ICT department in collaboration with the Advancement Office and Huawei.

The training marked the beginning of a series of trainings to validate the skills and knowledge networking professionals require for basic maintenance and configuration of small to medium-sized networks.

It covered Ethernet technologies such as Link Aggregations, VLAN, RSTP and STP and their implementation on Huaweiswitches, TCP/IP technologies and basic IP network connectivity. With the HCNA certification, trainees are expected to demonstrate, design and implement a basic understanding of small and medium-sized networks and this

includes general network technologies.

Engineers who have HCNA certification are expected to develop simple networks then integrate storage, security, cloud, voice and wireless technologies into these networks to support a wide range of applications.

Huawei launched the HCNA Training and Certification based on its many years of experience in developing great insight into ICT industry developments and ICT talents.

Huawei also sponsored the "Huawei ICT Competition Southern Africa 2018-2019" on November 21, in which UoN students participated. The second runners up, Wanjohi Gachoki came from UoN, beating more than 4,000 participants from over 40 universities in Kenya. The competition focused on computer

telecommunications and networking and was tailored to create a platform for ICT students to grasp practical and technical skills.

During the Huawei ICT competition awards ceremony held on November 26, 2018, UoN won the 'Best ICT Academy' award. George Ndegwa, from the UoN ICT Department, won the 'Best Lecturer' award.

The Huawei ICT Training Program is an initiative of the Advancement Office and ICT Centre in collaboration with Huawei. The Program Coordinators, Mr. Johnson Kinyua (Advancement Office) and Joram Kinuthia (ICT Centre) and Trainers George Ndegwa and Clifford Nderi from the UoN ICT Centre are proud to have trained the first cohort of 20 students and plans to hold more training in collaboration with Huawei in 2019.

"Over 700 people go to China yearly and 100 students benefit from the C h i n e s e A m b a s s a d o r s Scholarships," said. Ms. Baohong. She congratulated the University of Nairobi for emerging fifth in Africa and requested the University to establish collaboration with top Chinese universities. Such collaborations, she observed, will be

beneficial to both students and staff who will be engaged in exchange programmes, joint research and academic programmes.

Kenyans urged to embrace Non Violence in resolving conflicts

envans have been urged to embrace non-violence while resolving conflicts. The call was made during the celebration of the 12th International Day of Nonviolence at the University of Nairobi in remembrance of the ideals of Mahatma Gandhi.

The keynote address during the celebration on October, 2, 2018 was delivered by Prof. Gilbert Edwin Meshack Ogutu, who proposed the establishment of a center of excellence on non-violence to entrench the ideals of Mahatma Gandhi. He observed that the philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi influenced many leaders, including Nelson Mandela, Martin Luther King, Julius Nyerere, Patrice Lumumba and Nobel Laureate Wangari Maathai.

Gandhi was described as a nationalist, an environmentalist, and a man of action who was devoted to the independence of India. He galvanized millions of Indians to reject the British imperial rule, culminating in India's independence in 1947,

"Gandhi was a great philosopher. Philosophers never die. Men of wisdom never die", declared Prof. Ogutu. He said the ideals of Mahatma Gandhi will flourish for thousands of years to come.

Using civil disobedience, faith in God, and simplicity, Gandhi taught his followers to accept suffering as a way of life and pray to God. Gandhi embraced everyone in the society.

The Director General United Nations Office in Nairobi, UNON, Ms. Hanna S. Tetteh, noted that a world free of violence is at the core of the United Nations' work. "His philosophy remains an inspiration. We recall his commitment to social justice. His commitment to human dignity lights our paths," she said.

The ideals of Mahatma Gandhi have been adopted by the United Nations in resolving conflicts around the world. The United Nations has been using arbitration and negotiations as a way of achieving peace.

University of Nairobi Vice Chancellor, Prof. Peter Mbithi noted that the International Day of Non Violence is a day of reflection on peace and tolerance. He observed that the University has strong ties with the Indian Community, which has been very generous since its inception in 1956 as Royal Technical College. They contributed resources that helped in the construction of Gandhi Wing and the Administration block.

Prof. Mbithi stressed the importance of embracing peace, noting that it is the best environment for growth and development. "Education is the best change agent in the pursuit of peace. I believe Gandhi philosophy will continue to be relevant in our lives." he said.
