With reference to the letter from the Government of India in the Fereign and Political Department, No. 220-E.B., dated the 21st May 1915, regarding the refusal of the Arab recruits engaged for service in the British East Africa Protective to perform inditiary service. I am directed to state that the Political Resident, Aden, reports that although it was not explained in the telegram from the Foreign and Political Department, No. 674-S., dated the 31st August 1914, whether the men were required for military service or for police work, they were clearly told that they might be required to fight, and they accepted the condition without reserve. The Political Resident also observes that they did not deny this fact when they were seen by Captain Reilly, the then Assistant Resident in charge of the police on their return from Africa, but stated that the refusal of military service on their part was solely due to disagreements as to rations.

a. As regards rations, the Political Resident, Aden, explains that the recruits were not promised rations on the Indian scale, but were merely told that they would get Rs. 16 as pay with rations, and that they never enquired as to the nature of the rations. As it now appears, they had expected to receive rations on the Indian scale.
