With reference to your letter of the 14th instant, No. 46400/1915, I am commanded by the Army Council to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that they agree to the proposed apportionment between Imperial and Protectorate funds of the charges made by the National Bank of India, Nairobi, for negotiating the East Africa Protectorate Government's drafts on the Crown Agents for the Colonies.

With regard to the rate charged by the Bank, the Council concur generally in Mr. Bonar Law's opinion. It appears however, that an important element in the rate is the interest for the period between the date on which the draft is presented at Nairobi and that on which it is met in London. I am accordingly to ask whether there is any reason why, for future transactions of this nature, the ordinary commercial practice of adjustment by telegraph should not be followed. It is understood from the Crown Agents that the sanction of the Colonial Office would be required for this procedure.





Reference my letter No. 340 S section 2, subsection 3, of 18th September. The man-tracking hounds mentioned are being sent out Southampton. Can you kindly facilitate their being forwarded from that port? I will notify you the date of their arrival there if you can do so.

From General Officer Commanding, Egypt, to War Office.

My No. 1961 E. There is no prospect of a boat to Mombasa before 10th November.

From War Office to General Officer Commanding, Mauritius.

(No. 9179, cipher M.O. 1 (n.)

25th October, 1915, 6.20 p.m.

We have decided to withdraw the garrison except for a detachment of Royal Engineers and Royal Garrison Artillery with necessary administrative details. Will you please consult the Governor and then cable proposals for the composition of this detachment on a basis of about 25 Royal Engineers and 50 Royal Garrison Artillery. The remainder of the British troops with staff will be brought to the United Kingdom. Company Hong Kong—Singapore Royal Garrison Artillery, with the two 10-pr. B.L. guns and all remaining 10-pr. ammunition, will go to Egypt to complete the battery to six guns. The two 4.2 in. guns and all the 4.7-in. ammunition is to be sent to Egypt. The 17th Infantry will proceed with all maxims and 20,000 rounds per gun for service in East Africa. Please cable in each case the numbers by classes requiring conveyance to the United Kingdom, East Africa and Egypt.

From General Smuts to War Office.

Arrangements are being made by us for the removal of all the garrison of Mauritius except a few Royal Garrison Artillery, Royal Engineers and administrative details. The 17th Infantry go to East Africa to relieve the 18th Rajputas, who will go to Ceylon, and when the latter arrive the 28th Punjabis will go to East Africa. The Hong Kong-Singapore Company, with two 10-pounder guns, go to Egypt.

With reference to your telegram No. S. 24118. The Double Company for the 130th might join the 28th in Ceylon and accompany them to Africa. Returning transport is to bring the Double Company of the 46th Punjabis to join you. Will you please let us know what arrangements you can make for sea transport? The troops for Egypt it is suggested might be freighted.

General Officer Commanding Taylor has been informed of these arrangements in telegram No. 6544, letter M.O. 1 (n), and General Tighe has been informed in telegram No. 6544, letter M.O. 1 (n).
