Personal recommander showed that our defensive line along the Kagera hiver would be weakened rather than strengthened by the inclusion of Bukoba. But as the latter is a base for the sestern section of the memy's forces which face us and the Kagera, the destruction of the stores, fort and wireless installation there would hamper the anemy's sperations and thus indirectly strengther our defensive line. There would also be a considerable political effect.

Before organizing the expedition, I will send a more complete report.
