With reference to the enclosed correspondence from Mr. J. D. R. Nottidge, it could appear that Inspector Rainsford actually commanded this horse and mule, and they were, therefore, at the time, Government property. Could you direct the G.O.C., Kisumu, to hold a Court of Inquiry into the matter, with a recommendation to the G.O.C., upon whom the responsibility for their debt rests, and what compensation, if any, is due to Mr. Nottidge.

The General Officer Commanding the Forces & District sympathising with Mr. Nottidge, regrets he cannot take up the question.

The Regulations are quite clear, compensation is not admissible if the injury or loss is the result of an accident not caused by the enemy, even when such action takes place "on duty".

To quote a similar and typical case that occurred in India, a charger being used on duty was frightened by a monkey with the result that the animal bolted and was killed by falling into a Khud. Compensation was ruled inadmissible.
