Sir,

With reference to paragraph 2 of your despatch No. 646 of the 2nd of September, I have the honour to report that the question of the continuation of the Central Committee of Supplies was fully discussed in October last by the War Council with the Deputy Director of Supply and Transport and a deputation from the Committee.

2. The General Officer Commanding had expressed the opinion that, as far as military requirements were concerned, the services of the Committee could be dispensed with, and suggested the appointment of two local purchase officers. The Committee of Supplies was in complete accord with this proposal, and the necessary steps were therefore taken to bring it into effect.
