GERMAN WAR DIARY

26th February. The reports from all the areas showed no movement of enemy troops. Heavy rains fell in both in the Longido and Nairobi District.

28th February. The reports from the Coast Detachment showed considerable increased activity by the enemy's patrols.

An attempt was made by two Germans to blow up the waterworks at Bura. They openly visited the Pioneer Officer's office at the Works, and, after having obtained all the information they could obtain, one of the Germans, who was accompanied with a revolver while the other three were without, had. Fortunately, the attempt failed.

The reports from Nairobi and the vicinity of the Fortification of Bura show that heavy rains have fallen in the districts north and south of Bura.
