Sir,

I have the honour to report that among those killed by insurgent Somalis at Beroni in February last was Mr. E. P. Pinto, the Military Clerk, and I have recently received from his mother a petition praying for the grant of a pension or gratuity in view of the necessitous circumstances to which she has been placed owing to her son's death.

2. I have caused enquiries to be made with regard to the statements made by this lady and I am informed that the late Mr. Pinto was accustomed to remit her certain sums for her maintenance.

3. I am aware that under the rules of the Service any such grant as is now requested is precluded.

precluded. I considered, however, that the exceptional circumstances of this case justified an exception being made to the ordinary procedure, and I therefore referred the matter to my Executive Council who were unanimously in agreement with my opinion.

4. I understand that a grant of Rs.15 per month would be sufficient for the purpose and I therefore recommend that a pension of that amount should be awarded to Mrs. Pinto with effect from the date of her son's death.
