EAST AFRICAN FORCE.

RESUME OF WAR DIARY from 4th Movember to 17th November 1916 (incl.).

4th Movember 1916. 1st Mounted Brigade instructed to move with all speed from Morogoro to Iringa.

3rd S. A. Infantry Brigade ordered to place strong posts at Kikomi, Mjukwa's, Kissanga.

Intelligence Section states that on General Northey's front Madibira Mission is reported to have been re-occupied by the enemy on November 1st.

5th November. In the Kilwa area, acting on information in captured documents which states that enemy intend attacking our posts in this area, the G.O.O.-in-Chief has ordered the L. D. Lancs to remain at Kilwa instead of going to Lindi. The 40th Pathans will also move to Kilwa from Lindi. Arrangements are being made to reinforce the Lindi garrison.

Intelligence Section state that on General Northey's front it is fairly definitely ascertained that the bulk of the enemy's Tabora forces are concentrated at Ngominji, with a detachment at Madibira and a small post at Buini, 3 miles South of Malangali.

Oth November. Let Division. - the 2nd F. A. Brigade proceeds to Par-es-Salaam on 7th instant en route to Kilwa. The division will now consist of 2nd and 3rd B. A. Brigades (3rd Brigade consists of treops at present at Kilwa, and 1st R. A. Brigade will now come under command of C.H.C.).

- 8th November. Yesterday, in the Iringa area, an aeroplane located
 a large enemy force proceeding along road in the direction of
 Walangali. The aeroplane was subjected to heavy machine gun
 and rifte fire.
- 9th Movember. One of our aeroplanes was totally wrecked at Iringa on 7th imstant.
- loth Navember. We reports of changes in the situation have been recaived.
- 110. Rovember. We reports of changes in the situation have been rescived.
- 12th November. No reports of changes in the estuation have been received.
- 13th November. The G.Q.C., lst E.A. Brigade, reports that the enemy trenches near Dakawa were shelled yesterday and their picquets sniped at night. One askari and 19 porters deserted from the enemy.
- 14th November. 1st Division reports enemy at Mtumbei Jini and that Paluchis, less detachment at Kitambi, have been ordered to attack them.

2nd Division reports that S African M. C. C. was compelled to evacuate Muhange Mission on the 12th instant owing to superior enemy force.

18t E.A. Brigade reports enemy party at Masunga on 18th. Patrols investigating.

15th Revember. 1st Division reports enemy have retired from Mtumbei Jini but still ecompains Pungutini.

and Division reports that supports have been sent to evoliat patrol at Lukigeta which is being pressed by enemy. Mounted regiments are operating against enemy patrols at Msutaa.

1st B. A. Brigade reports enemy opened fire on our trenches at Dutumi on 14th instant but it was immediately stopped on our replying.

5th November. We shelled enemy trenches opposite Dakwa on night of 15th instant.

Aeroplane bombed Kissangeri on 13th instant.

17th November. Aeroplanes bombed Madbeira on 15th and Kibesa this afternoon.

General Northey reports that Malangali was relieved on 12th instant. The enemy on November 8th delivered three assaults on the garrison which were all beaten off with heavy losses to the enemy.

Two Europeans and nine enemy blacks were picked up dead, and eight Europeans, 18 wounded and unwounded native soldiers were captured, together with one machine gun, 72 enemy carriers, 15 mules and donkeys, and fifty head of cattle. 40 cases of ammunition, some shells, and quantity of stores were destroyed by fire. Enemy force dispersed to Eastward in disorder and in small parties without kit or carriers. Our casualties in garrison and relief force, one killed and five wounded.
