## [OPERATIONS.]

*From General Smuts to Chief of the Imperial General Staff.*

(No. G.O.F. 185.)

18th March, 1916, 10.35 p.m.

For the last few days the enemy has shown considerable activity on my flank in the dense bush north of Ruwu, and in consequence I decided this morning to move south towards Ruwu, and accordingly occupied Kilevo and Unterehimo and other points from which I hope to continue to press enemy over the River Ruwu. Owing to the dense bush and the absence of roads operations are difficult. Fortunately the rains have abated, and during the last few days we have effected considerable improvement in the situation as regards supplies, and have been building bridges and making fords over the river.

My infantry continued clearing the dense bush country north of Kafe to-day where the enemy is maintaining a strong rearguard. Enemy positions were ascertained and there was some bush fighting. Our casualties were few. The movement will continue to-morrow.



[REDACTED] commanded by the Army Council to [REDACTED] receipt of your letter 16999 of 8th [REDACTED] relating to the seconding of certain officials [REDACTED] staff of the East Africa [REDACTED] duties in connection with the [REDACTED] in East Africa.

In reply, I am to inform you that the Council [REDACTED] view that these officials should continue to draw [REDACTED] any salaries and to be paid by the [REDACTED] Government as heretofore. Any allowances [REDACTED] travelling, rations, etc., and any travelling [REDACTED] admissible should be issued by the Protectorate [REDACTED] government at the appropriate rates laid down under its [REDACTED] own regulations. It would be preferable that no [REDACTED] allowances or free issues in kind should be made by the [REDACTED] Army authorities.

As regards incidence of cost it is considered [REDACTED] that, unless these officials have to be replaced in the [REDACTED] Protectorate service, their ordinary pay and allowances [REDACTED] should be borne as a final charge against Protectorate [REDACTED] funds. If, however, any of the officials have to be [REDACTED] replaced, or if otherwise extra expenditure is involved [REDACTED]

in

in their temporary employment, I am to suggest that decision of the Treasury should be sought as to the division of such extra expenses between Imperial and Protectorate funds. In any case it appears to the Council that Army Funds should not bear charges in respect of civilian officials employed on political duties. Colonial or Foreign Office funds would seem more appropriate in so far as Imperial funds may be charged.

I am to suggest that when a decision has been arrived at the Governor and the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief in East Africa should be informed by cable.
