between this Office and the London Office of the Bank, and the position as indicated above has been explained to the Bank authorities.

The Bank, however, is unwilling to waive its claim to priority of treatment in financial matters in which the Protectorate Government are so closely concerned, and has further offered to undertake the provision on existing terms of delivery required month by month for military purposes in East Africa for the period of the war, thus obviating the necessity of any further shipment of Government silver from India.

It will be borne in mind that by Colonial Office telegram 11.31.1916 of the 11th ultime (communicating the substance of War Office letter 0165/730 of the 8th inst.) the Protectorate Government have already been requested to decide where the combined amounts tendered by the two banks exceed requirements. A proportion shall be drawn from each bank. The Council are prepared still to leave the matter to the discretion of the Protectorate Government. They suggest, however, that as the present method of pro rata apportionment appears to have been communicated to the banks it should not be departed from except after timely notice, and that preferably such notice should be given through this Office.

They consider also that if the Protectorate Government elect to confine this business to the National Bank of India it should be on the clear understanding that that Bank will provide all funds required throughout the war in accordance with the new letter referred to above.


