I am commanded by the Army Council to acknowledge the receipt of Colonial Office letter No. 31949 of June 27th, and in reply to state that in view of the situation in Jubaland as described by the Officer Administering the Government of the British East Africa Protectorate, the Council concur in the proposal that Serenli should now be re-occupied.

The Council, however, attach the greatest importance to the improvement of the road-communication between serenii and the coast, and their concurrence as above is based on the understanding that work on the road shall be pushed forward as rapidly as local resources admit.

The Council suggest that a sufficient force may co-operate with Colonel Berrett, from the direction of kismayu, with the object of providing an adequate garrison for the post itself, and for any intermediate posts that may be necessary, and also a small mobile force for action at a distance from Serenli. The Council consider that it would be most undesirable for Colonel Barrett's small body of troops to proceed unaided to the occupation of Serenli, or to constitute itself the garrison of that place, since this would lead to its immobilisation

at a considerable distance from the nearest support.

Reoccupation of Serenli see my cypher telegram of 27th June. Greatest importance attached by Army Council to improvement in road communication between coast and Serenli, and they concur in proposal that Serenli be now reoccupied on understanding that this work is pushed forward as rapidly as local resources admit. Army Council suggest that sufficient force cooperate with Barrett from direction of Kismayu with object of prowiding adequate garrison for Serenli and for any intermediate posts necessary and also small mobile force for action at distance from Serenli. It is considered by Army Council most undesirable that parrett's small force should proceed unaided to the occupation of Serenli or constitute itself the garrison of that place, as this would lead to its immobilisation at a considerable distance from nearest support.

I am prepared to approve of Serenli now being reoccupied provided that action is taken strictly in accord
with Army Council's views detailed above. Before move
is definitely begun, I must know to what extent it is
desired to pass through Italian territory, so that we
can obtain the prior consent of the Italian Government.
